Clouds and showers on Sept. 21 failed to dampen the hopes of political workers who gathered outside Charlestown's seven voting sites asking the 4,459 voters who went to the polls to consider their candidate. The number of Charlestown voters casting ballots in the city's Preliminary Election on Tuesday was 52 percent, just slightly above the city average of 50 percent.

For the first time in 10 years, since Raymond Flynn took over the corner office at City Hall, the field was wide open — and what a race it was. Acting Mayor Tom Menino captured the top spot in Charlestown with 26 percent of the vote cast for mayor. He was followed by Rep. James Brett and Sheriff Bob Rufo, both

For years, the federal government has been trying to computerize its system for handling Treasury notes, bills and bonds. New Treasuries have been issued in computerized book-entry form since 1986. - · Interest coupons would no longer have to be clipped by investors and presented to a bank or Federal Reserve on pay-
- No more waiting for that check to arrive if your certificates were bought through a brokerage firm. Interest payments could be deposited directly into a checking or savings account.
- · Since there are no certificates to lose or have stolen, the computerized system is much safer. It also could save the cost of keeping the certificates in a safe deposit box,

 The principal could be easily reinvested in a new Treasury after your Treasury securities have matured.

Charlestown Neighborhood Council Chairman Peter Looney has notified the **Patriot** that the special meeting of the council originally called for Monday, Sept. 27 to discuss the impact of the proposed off-ramp in three of the Central Artery project's designs for the Charles River Crossing has been postponed.

Monthly Meeting

The monthly meeting of the council will be held on Tuesday, Oct. 5 at 7 p.m. at the K. of C. Hall, 75 West School St.

The council meetings are open to the public, and all are welcome to attend.

★ Charles River Crossing . . . Residential concerns on the plans laid out by the Massachusetts Highway Department on the designs for the crossing of the Charles River as part of the Central Artery/Tunnel Project and the inclusion of a northbound off-ramp from I-93 dumping thousands of cars each day across the Bunker Hill Community College playing fields onto already congested Rutherford Avenue have been expressed at a recent meeting in Charlestown and at a public hearing at the Museum of Science.

The sense of residents is that transportation officials are leaning toward the no-tunnel alternative that calls for a 14-lane bridge across the Charles River adjacent to the dam at City Square.

The staff at Bunker Hill Community College, area businesses and residents have been looking carefully at the I-93 off-ramp into Charlestown, which is part of three of the Charles River Crossing designs. Traffic would exit onto Rutherford Avenue just across from the Mishawum Housing development, a heavily congested area, posing health and hazard issues for area residents and businesses. In addition, since the reconstruction of Sullivan Square is not included in the plans and details on the ramp and subsequent traffic flow is not outlined clearly, the group is opposing this aspect of the plans. Experts who have looked at the impact of the ramp have stated that a more severely congested Rutherford Avenue is bound to send traffic into the community via Bunker Hill and Main streets.

The general consensus is that Charlestown will have to live with the final plan for many, many years and the Mass. Highway Department is being asked to look carefully at the crossing and the off-ramp, focusing on the impact it will have on the abutting communities.

Written comments and concerns on the Charles River Crossing plans must be submitted by Tuesday, Oct. 5. They should be sent to both: Trudy Coxe, secretary, Mass. Executive Office of Environmental Affairs, 100 Cambridge St., 20th floor, Boston, Mass. 02202, attention MEPA Unit; and to Daniel Berman, project manager, Central Artery/Tunnel Project, Federal Highway Administration, 55 Broadway, 10th floor, Cambridge, Mass. 02142.

★ Update On Baby Kyle . . . A discouraged and angry Cindy Fitzpatrick, mother of year-old leukemia victim Baby Kyle, spoke about problems with the family's health insurance carrier late last week as the Fitzpatrick's prepared to travel to Minnesota to meet with an oncologist and transplant specialist at the University of Minnesota.

She said that when Kyle was diagnosed with leukemia, the insurance company assured them that they were 100 percent covered for a bone-marrow transplant for Kyle. What they failed to explain to the family is that they are not covered for the search for a donor nor for a donor's expenses.

There was no perfect match, Cindy said, in the 1800 involved in the HLA testing at MIT in early August. Blind Sailors To Compete In Sailing Regatta

Blind sailors from throughout the area will compete in the third annual Harry McDonough Memorial Sailing Regatta for the Blind that will be held in Boston Harbor out of the Courageous Sailing Center, Charlestown Navy Yard on Friday, Oct. 1 and Saturday, Oct. 2.

The Regatta, conducted each year by The Carroll Center for the Blind as part of their competitive and recreational sailing programs for blind persons, is sponsored this year by Massport. The event is named in memory of well-known Bostonian Harry McDonough who dedicated his life to bringing the sport and enjoyment of sailing to inner-city youth and to blind persons.

Six teams of blind sailors will race in J/22's, a 22-foot racing boat, and are expected to compete in six races throughout the two-day event. Each team includes two blind sailors, one as helmsman, one as crew, and two sighted guides, one

(continued from page 14) where teamwork and good communications will declare the winning boat.

The rules require that a blind sailor must steer the boat throughout the race course with verbal direction from the sighted guide. The blind crew member must trim the sails accordingly while the second sighted guide acts as navigator and tactician. Otherwise, the blind sailing teams follow all of the standard rules of racing prescribed by the International Yacht Racing Union. A special audible compass is sometimes used by blind sailors enabling them to sail a very straight and accurate course by sound.

The Boston Regatta is one in a series of three scheduled national regattas for the blind that also includes Houston and Newport, which are preparatory events to help select and prepare the best blind sailors to represent the United States in the World Championship Regatta for the Blind to be be held in Perth, Australia, on Jan. 3-16, 1994. The Carroll Center's SailBlind Team of Nancy Aronson of Malden and Chuck Hanlin of Melrose, guided by Lyn and Emily Comfort of Newport, were the recent winners of the Newport Regatta held last month and are expected to be the team to beat. They were followed closely by the blind sailing team from

Houston, Texas. The Carroll Center, most noted for rehabilitation programs for newly blinded persons, pioneered the development of organized sailing instructions for blind persons in 1979, and currently their SailBlind program is the only organized sailing program for blind persons in the U.S. According to Carroll Center president, Rachel Rosenbaum, "Sailing a boat is just another example of the unlimited potential of blind and vision-impaired persons when given the opportunity and the training."

In 1992, the Carroll Center published a manual, "Facing the Wind," that shares adaptive methods and techniques of teaching blind persons how to sail.

Spectators are invited to watch this interesting event that can be viewed from the Courageous Sailing Center, Pier 4 in the Charlestown Navy Yard or from other vantage points throughout the inner harbor.

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



Weld's Proposed Gas Tax Will Cost Jobs And Cut Transportation Projects

If Gov. William Weld's proposal to cut the Massachusetts gas tax by 4.3 cents per gallon is implemented, it will cost the state millions of dollars each year that should go into key infrastructure and transportation projects. In turn, that will cost the construction industry thousands of new jobs, according to a recent Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) memorandum.

Revenues from the existing 21 cent per gallon gas tax finance the state's transportation projects through the highway fund. Each penny of Weld's proposed reduction in that tax means the loss of about \$27 million in annual revenue available to transportation investment. A 4.3 cent reduction would mean a decrease of \$114 million of capital investment each year. The governor has already withheld over \$200 million from the highway fund to balance the state's general revenue shortfall. delaying crucial transportation construction projects. Any additional cut in funding will be devastating.

"With the Massachusetts economy running out of gas, it is more important than ever to marshall our resources carefully," said Paul L. Barrett, director of the BRA. "Gov. Weld's proposed cut in the gas tax

does just the opposite, it squanders revenue that is critical to key transportation projects and job creation in the city of Boston and throughout the state.

"Beyond the immediate negative impact on both the city of Boston and the state, the loss of these funds and the indefinite delay in key infrastructure and transportation projects will cripple Massachusetts' competitive future. Infrastructure improvements are crucial to the state's ability to attract new business. Without them, businesses will go elsewhere, and Massachusetts will lose out on job creation and tax revenue," said Barrett.

The negative impact of this cut on transportation projects in the city of Boston, and particularly on the neighborhoods of Charlestown, Roxbury, the South End and Jamaica Plain, would be dramatic.

Among the many deserving and critical projects which are likely to be affected is the construction of the Medford Street by-pass road which would provide traffic connections between the Charlestown Navv Yard and the regional highway system, and assist in the development of 1.1 million square feet of new medical research space in the Yard, creating 2,300 new

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

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

Compassion For Power Is Misplaced

To The Editor,

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It was very heartwarming to read the wonderful and insightful articles about Katherine Ann Power, or "Kathy," as she has been affectionately referred to by family, friends and members of the media. A lump rose in my throat as I read of how she struggled with her feelings of "intense guilt," how she was forced to live as a fugitive and how "she has been in prison for virtually 23 years." Now she was willing to suspend the life she has built for herself and face the consequences of her past. The severity of the consequences of course, having been negotiated from the safety of being

She threw herself a "potluck" dinner with 30 or 40 adoring friends and burned sage to cleanse the energy before returning to Boston to surrender herself and appear in court with a broad smile on her face. She released a statement in which she spread the blame for her crimes on the Vietnam War, the government, the times and social activism. Katherine Ann Power, a bank robber and accomplice to murder has not, however, denounced or expressed remorse for her knowing and willing involvement in this outlaw gang of murdering thieves who advocated and actively participated in an armed and violent attempt to overthrow the government of the United States. To this day, she is described as an Anarchist who does not vote and believes democracy

During her 23 years of "virtual prison," she was able to have a child, a home, get married, earn a living and make friends - not a bad sentence so far.

However, Walter Schroeder, known to his nine children as "Daddy," hasn't had the opportunity to do any of these things in the past 23 years and didn't have time to enjoy a farewell dinner with his family and friends. All he got was a funeral. Walter Schroeder, a husband, father, a police officer and a man of honor was murdered. He was shot in the back as he responded to a hold-up alarm at a bank being robbed by Power and her group. He will not be allowed to barter his future or re-unite with his family. His family

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will celebrate birthdays, weddings, anniversaries, holidays and the simple everyday joys and sorrows of life without Walter Schroeder.

Walter Schroeder will never again kiss his wife and children or hold them in his arms. He won't be there to raise his family with his wife or build a future. He will never escort his daughters down the aisle, or bounce his grandchildren on his knee. All this because of "Kathy" and her cowardly terrorist friends and their warped set of values.

Whatever Power gets for a sentence will not be enough. If she had committed her crimes in some other states, she would be subject to the death penalty, and well deserving of it. Any sorrow or compassion for Power is sadly misplaced and should be reserved for the Schroeder family and Walter Schroeder himself, who laid down his life for the people he was sworn to protect.
