## Issues On Aging

**Question:** Does everyone eventually become senile?  
**Answer:** Senility is known in medical terms as senile dementia; is a disease, not the normal consequence of aging. It is characterized by impairment in memory and concentration. Judgement and orientation to time may become impaired as well. Although this problem is one of the most feared among older people, two thirds of all people beyond the age of eighty do not show signs of true senility.

The brain, as all other parts of the body, undergoes changes with advancing age which can contribute to problems in mental functioning which are not dementia. Many other factors, however, can cause dementia. Reactions to drugs, alcoholism, low blood pressure, infection, fever, and anemia are among them. Depression may be mistaken for senility, as it frequently exhibits similar symptoms. It is important to recognize these contributing factors, as there is a chance that the condition can be reversed by determining its cause and correcting it. For example, improvement in nutrition or the treatment of depression can sometimes alleviate symptoms of senile dementia.

People often think that memory changes signify that a person is becoming senile. Memory changes occur in all people as they age; the majority of these do not end up with dementia. In fact, changes in memory supposedly start after the age of 25!

In summary, although senile dementia cannot be prevented in all people, those who keep their minds active by learning and socializing, and who maintain their health through good nutrition and exercise usually suffer much less from the effects of senility.

### Graduate From B.C. High

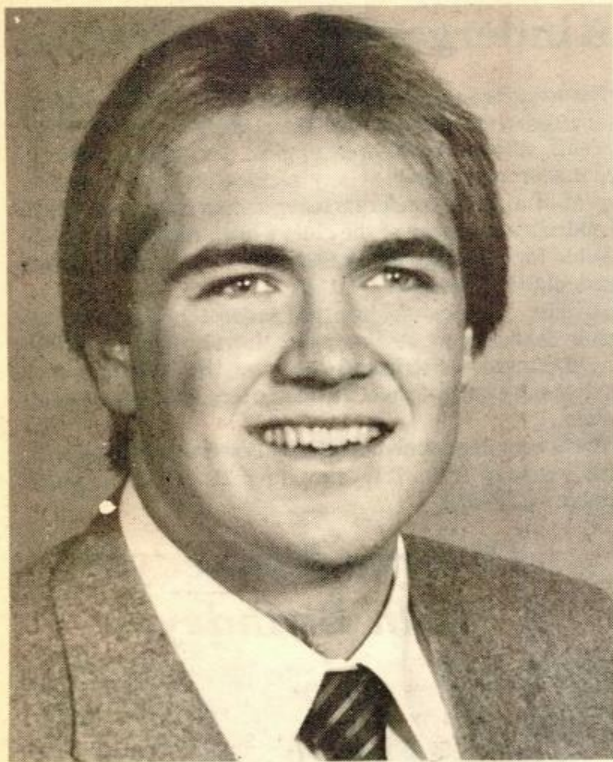

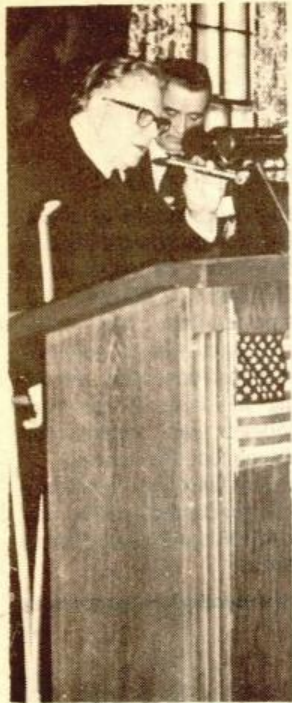

## Mescaline Masquerade

Contrary to popular belief, mescaline is non-existent on the streets of Charlestown and nearly everywhere else in the country today. Mescaline is an hallucinogenic derived from the fleshy parts or buttons of the peyote cactus plant which is found in Northern Mexico.

Hallucinogenic drugs, both natural and synthetic, are substances that distort the perception of reality. They induce a state of excitation of the central nervous system, causing changes in mood. Under the influence of hallucinogens, the pupils dilate, and body temperature and blood pressure rise. The senses of direction, distance, and time become disoriented.

It taken in a large enough dose, the drug produces delusions and hallucinations. Occasionally depersonalization and depression are so severe that suicide is possible, but this is rare. The most common danger is impaired judgement, leading to rash decisions and accidents. Anxiety, restlessness and sleeplessness are common until the drug wears off (5-12 hours).

Recurrent use of "mescaline" produces tolerance, which tends to encourage resorting to greater amounts. Although no evidence of physical dependence is detectable when the drug is withdrawn, recurrent use tends to produce psychic dependence, varying according to the drug, the dose and the user. It should be stressed that the hallucinogens are unpredictable in their effects each time they are used.

As noted earlier, what is being sold on the streets posing as mescaline is not mescaline but P.C.P., L.S.D., or a miscellaneous assortment of chemicals. So why is this duping continuing? Simple, since transforming mescaline from the peyote cactus into pill form can be a costly process (as a result could not be sold so cheaply on the street - \$2 - 3 dollars a hit). They simply produce P.C.P. or L.S.D. (which only costs pennies to produce) and sell it as mescaline on the streets. One of the most important things to remember about the drug business, and it is a multi-million dollar business, is that people go into it in order to make a PROFIT.

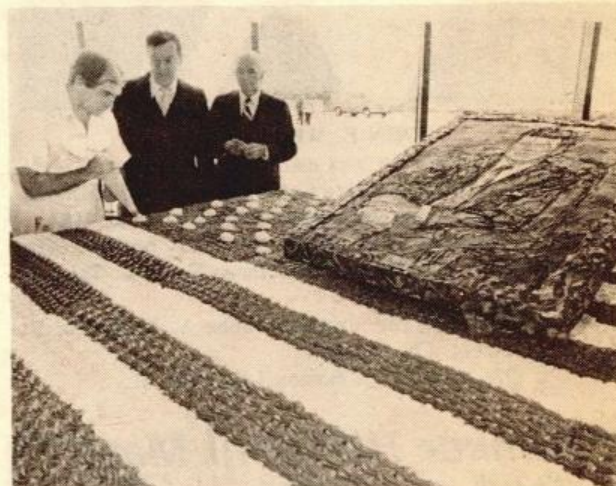
## Kindergarten Registration

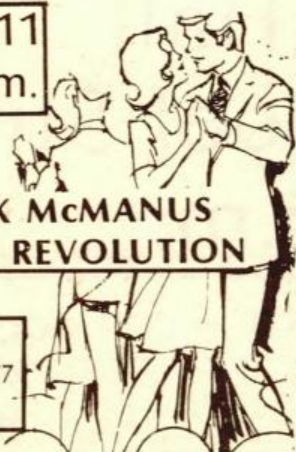

## Board Updated On Kennedy Center Financial Status Following Heated Debate

Last week's Kennedy Center Board Meeting became a feud between the chair and certain members of the board over the minutes of previous meetings and the right of the chair to hire a parliamentarian and policeman at a time when the Center faces a financial crisis.

Although the board was gathered to discuss Kennedy Center budget cuts and the possible layoff of staff, the meeting struggled for an hour to get past the approval of the February 9, March 11, March 22 and May 4 Board minutes and the April 22 Executive Board minutes. Incoherent arguing over the 6 to 7 vote, disapproving the minutes, continued through each motion to approve the minutes with Cushman voting to create a tie thus escalating the argument.

After pressure from board member Anne Conside, Cushman agreed to take a hand vote on the minutes. Finding that the minutes were disapproved by one vote, Cushman then exercised his power to vote, created a tie, and declared the minutes approved.

Although board members loudly protested, the parliamentarian did

not offer an explanation. However, according to Robert's Rules of Order, Cushman is allowed to create a tie. However, his tie vote did not approve the minutes as he claimed. Creation of a tie vote by the chairman can only be used to defeat a measure, so states Robert's Rules.

Heated argument also ensued over the questioning of Cushman's right to hire a parliamentarian at \$60 per hour without the board's approval. Board member Bobby Wallace stated that he felt the hiring of the parliamentarian, Cornelius Sullivan, to be a conflict of interest as he

was the cousin and law partner of the Kennedy Center's financial advisor, John Sullivan. This is the second meeting to have Sullivan act as a parliamentarian.

Board members also expressed dissatisfaction over the hiring of a policeman to expel disorderly board members or spectators. According to the Boston Police Department, a paid detail must be paid for a minimum of four hours at \$11 per hour. Thereafter, he must receive \$11 per hour or fraction thereof.

In addition, the Center pays a stenographer to take the minutes instead of

Secretary Joe Owens whose duties are to take the minutes of the meeting. Half way through the meeting the stenographer walked out of the meeting apparently because of friction between her and a spectator.

Following the debate on the approval of the minutes, Executive Director John Gardiner spoke on the center's financial picture saying the center has enough money to last through June at the present operating level. Gardiner said he had submitted numerous proposals to private organizations in the hopes of getting a grant

from Permanent Charities of approximately \$55,000 which would fund the center through the beginning of September.

According to Gardiner the center will continue to run through the next fiscal year, which begins in October, if ABCD approves an advance. Gardiner said his other alternatives were to either borrow money or terminate seven or eight staff members.

Gardiner introduced John Nucci of ABCD who further explained ABCD's funding problem, saying that the city's ABCD and the 24 other anti-poverty agencies throughout the

state were vying for these federal monies which will be distributed through the state, as part of President Reagan's New Federalism Plan.

In other business: — Eileen McClellan was elected to fill the board seat left vacated by the death of Mary Colbert. McClellan was a long-time staff member of the Charlestown Community Center. She will serve a three year term.

— A report on the center's Youth and Social Service Department was given by Tom Harrigan, briefly explaining the services of the department and funding level.

### Honored For Life Saving Effort

Delisa Perry, a student at Charlestown High School, recently administered life saving CPR to an elderly woman. Miss Perry's immediate action is credited with saving the

woman's life. The school honored Delisa at a luncheon which was addressed by Boston City Councillor Bruce Bolling. So impressed was the Councillor with the event that he introduced a resolution in the City Council and permanently recorded the feat in the City Record.

## Views On Dental Health

Bits of food left in the mouth, is by far, the most common cause. Food debris gets caught in any number of places in the mouth, mixes with bacteria and the product is "bad breath." Onions, garlic, alcohol and tobacco, by their nature, can also cause foul breath. Cavities (which are food traps for bacteria), tartar buildup, and poorly-fitting dentures are also common causes of halitosis.

What can you do about halitosis? It's a simple, two-pronged approach: dental appointments on a regular basis and regular home care for your teeth. The dentist will fill the cavities, remove the tartar, and make sure the bridges and dentures fit. A proper brushing and flossing regimen is the key to your personal dental hygiene. Between brushings, rinse your mouth to dislodge food particles.

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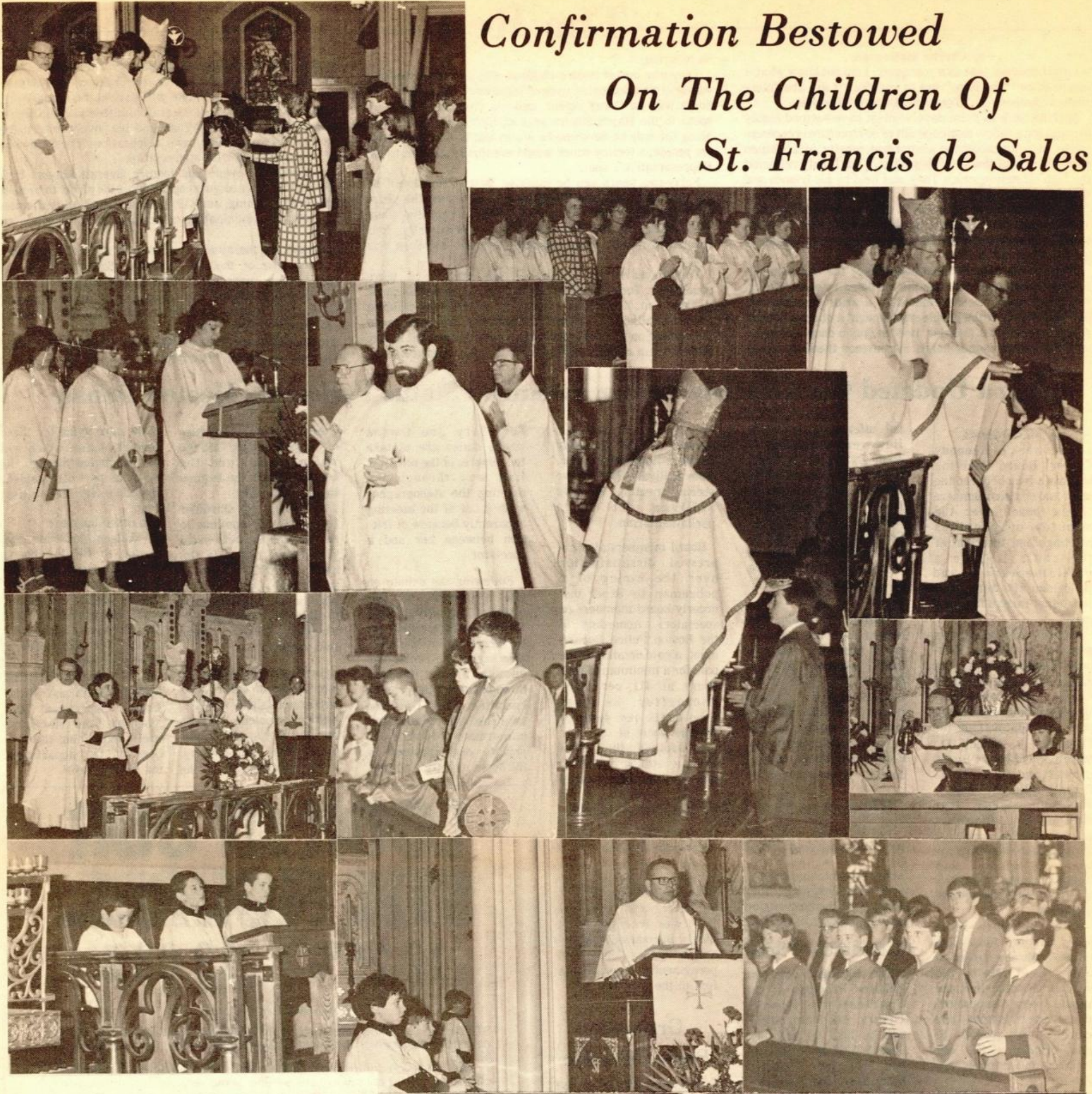
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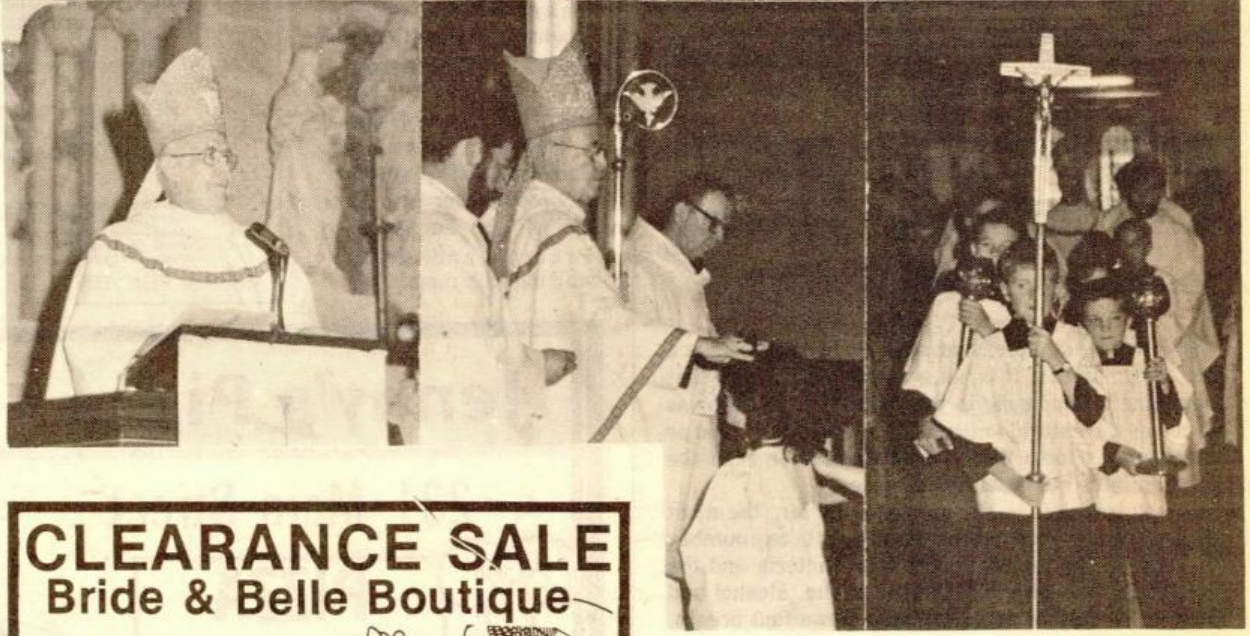

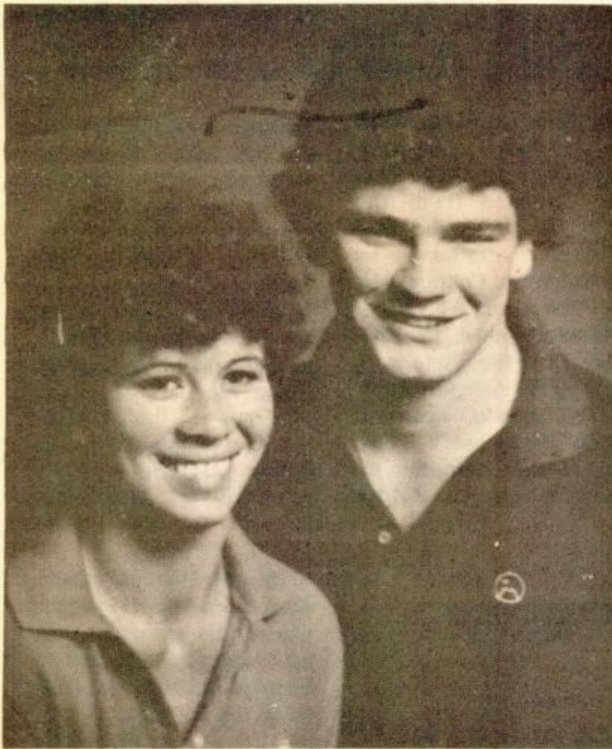

the evening was climaxed with the presentation of the major school athletic awards.

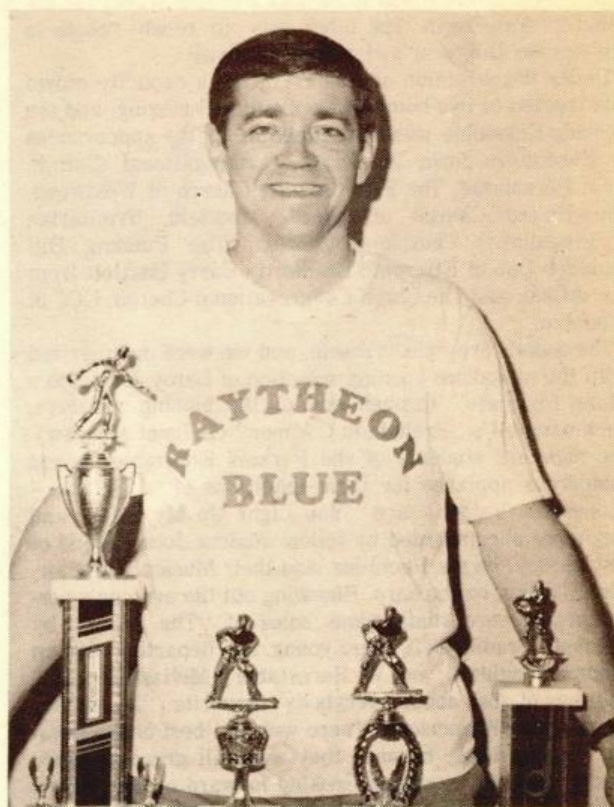





The following is an explanation by Umpire in Chief, Bill McKeon from the rule book:

**OBSTRUCTION:** The act of a fielder who impedes the progress of any runner while such fielder is not in possession of the ball or in the act of fielding the ball.

**INTERFERENCE:** An act by the offensive team which interferes with, obstructs, impedes, hinders or confuses any fielder attempting to make a play or an act by the defensive team which hinders or prevents a batter from hitting a pitch. Interference may also be caused by an umpire or a spectator. The ball is dead on any interference play.

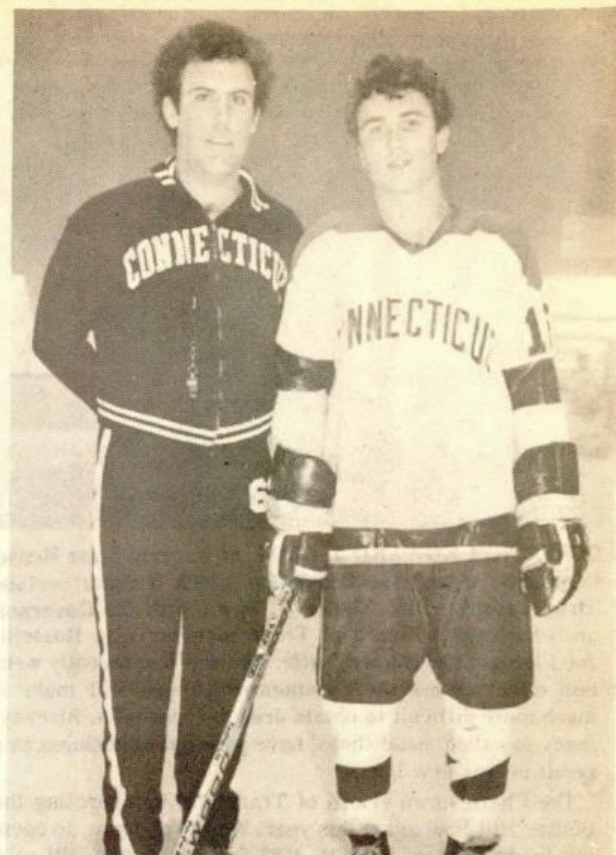
Penalties are imposed for either call by the umpire. There are thirteen interference calls caused by a batter or a runner. Here's one that occurred in a recent game:

It is interference by a runner when a fair ball touches the runner in fair territory before touching a fielder. If a fair ball goes through or by an infielder and touches a runner immediately back of said infielder or touches the runner after having been deflected by a fielder, the umpire shall not declare the runner out. If, in the judgement of the umpire, the runner deliberately kicks such batted ball on which the infielder had missed a play, then the runner shall be called out for interference.
