## Charlestown Taxpayers On DOR

＂Christmas List＂＇Of Unclaimed Refunds

The Massachusetts De partment of Revenue （DOR）has $\$ 539,820.63$ in refund checks waiting for 3,077 taxpayers，Commis－ sioner of Revenue Stephen W．Kidder has announced． ＂All these people had their refund checks returned to us by the Post Office as un－ deliverable．With the holi－ days，this is probably the most expensive time of the year for most people and we certainly want to do everything we can to make sure that these taxpayers get every dollar they deserve， Kidder said．

Taxpayers who see their name can then call their nearest DOR office to claim their money The Boston headquarters is at 100 Cam－ bridge Street．Boston，tele phone 727－4545．
＂These refunds range from $\$ 1$ all the way up to $\$ 40,000$ ，with the average amount coming in at \＄175，＂ Kidder pointed out，adding that，taxpayer confidentiali－ ty prohibits DOR releasing the amount of an individual refund to anyone other than the taxpayer．＂It is hard to believe that someone owed
$\$ 40,000$ would not call us wondering where it was， Kidder commented．

"Kids Building Boston" Students
Learn About Urban Planning
The "Kids Building Boston" students, sixth graders from the McKay School in East Boston, learned about arban planning during a class taught by Mayor Raymond Flynn and Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) Director Stephen Coyle at the BRA offices at City Hall on December 19.
The urban planning class began with a discussion by William Whitney, director of development, and Homer Russell, director of design, of why Boston needs both large and small buildings. The children shared their opinions about their favorite buildings including the State House, City Hall, John Hancock Tower and The Prudential Center.
They studied the BRA's scale model of downtown and the waterfront while receiving an overview of Boston's masterplan from Coyle. Coyle asked the children what professions they wanted to have when they grew up and how many of them wanted to work in Boston's buildings. Mayor Flynn also visited the class and talked to the children about his role in planning Boston's future
This urban planning class laid the foundation for future Kids Building Boston classes, a program developed around the three-year construction of the One Twenty Five High Street project in Boston. This month's class was designed

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ed their ideas of how Bos ton could be made better for kids. The goal of the class was to make students aware of the important role the BRA plays in shaping the future of the City.
Prior to the urban planning class, the students received classes in Boston's topography, the history of its development, and a construction/engineering class in which they were able to tour the construction site to examine firsthand the excavation equipment and earth retention systems.
"Kids Building Boston" brings 50 inner city young sters from all of the city's neighborhoods into direct contact with architects, developers, engineers, artists, public officials, construction workers and company presidents. This unprecedented initiative by the partnership team developing One Twenty Five High Street - The Prospect Company, New England Telephone, and Spaulding \& Slye - turns a major downtown development into a valuable teaching tool and provides hands-on learning experiences. The pro gram is receiving widespread support from educators who believe it could become a prototype for si milar programs in cities across the country.

BRA Issues Default Notice To Developer Of 44 Warren Street

The Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) Board of Directors has authorized the issuance of a project default notification to Tontine Crescent Associates, Inc. President James R. Adams.

This vote by the Board was taken at their December 22 meeting for the developer's failure to commence construction of a single-family residence on the "Hearth House" site at 44 Warren Street, as was required under the terms of the project's Land Disposition Agreement (LDA) executed June 28, 1985. Un-
der the LDA, the developer was required to begin construction of the site by August 27,1985 and complete construction of the project by August 27,1987
The Authority stated that they made repeated requests, both oral and writ en, to the developer regarding 44 Warren Street, but that the developer has fail ed to either begin construction of the single-family residence on the site or offer a suitable explanation why such construction has failed to commence. The BRA lso stated that as of De cember 22 , the developer is

40 months in default of his obligation to begin construction on the site The Board of Directors voted to authorize BRA Director Stephen Coyle to execute and issue a formal notice of project default, notifying the developer of such default and requesting that such default be cured within the time period provided within the agreement, allowing the developer 90 days to "cure such violation or failure." In accordance with Section 802 (3) (a), if the developer does not exercise his right to cure the default with the 90 day per-
iod, the developer must "convey" the unimproved property to the Authority.

Further, under Section 802 (3) (a) if the developer fails to reconvey the proper $y$, the BRA (under Section 802 [3] [a] of the Agreement) may "Compel specific performance and the payment of damages, ex penses and costs by the redeveloper," which, under Section 802 (3) (c) of the Agreement, can includ and revert such title and all rights and interests to the property back to the Authority.
