Comella had made two petitions to the Licensing Board, one for a C.V. 7-day Malt and Wine License to be exercised at 83 Main St. in one room on the first floor with a bar area, and a kitchen and storage in the rear. A

10:30 p.m. closing was indicated on the notice.

The second petition was for a Retail Package Store Malt and Wine License at the same address.

At Wednesday's hearing, Judge Norman Weinberg and Comella made the presentation on the license application to the board. Also present was store manager Kate Sherman. Weinberg formally withdrew the request for a Retail Package

Store license during the hearing, leaving the board to make a decision only on the beer and wine license for the restaurant.

Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, reported to the board on a community meeting held Aug. 8 and conducted by the Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC).

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Colombian Teachers Visit Charlestown

During July and August, Charlestown became the host for 50 English teachers from Colombia. The teachers are participating in an intensive seven-week English Language and Teacher Training Program for secondary teachers from Colombia. Bunker Hill Community College (BHCC) and Middlesex Community College in Lowell are jointly administering this program. An additional 25 Colombian teachers are attending Newbury College and UMass-Dartmouth.

The teachers are at Bunker Hill to advance their English skills while learning about new methods and techniques of teaching English to their students in Colombia. Their daily schedule includes four hours of classroom instruction followed by two hours of computer lab work in BHCC's advanced computerized language lab center, and time with individual tutors. This program is being funded by the government of Colombia and was generated by a visit to Colombia by Gov. William Weld, Secretary of Education Piedad Robertson and members of the

Governor's Trade Mission staff who visited several countries in South America with the goal of establishing opportunities for education and trade.

The Colombian teachers are staying at the YMCA in the Charlestown Navy Yard. They have articulated their love of Charlestown and Boston and are greatly enjoying the opportunity to learn about America and meet area residents. To quote Harvey Tejada, group coordinator, "Everyone thinks Boston is terrific and

this is a wonderful opportunity for them. We really are going to have a hard time leaving Boston."

During their stay, the teachers are touring Boston through weekly planned activities such as walking the Freedom Trail, seeing the Museum of Science, the John F. Kennedy Memorial Library and trips to the Harbor Islands and area beaches.

During free time, they attend Sunday morning Mass in Charlestown, shop at Filene's Basement and avidly seek public musical

events like the Boston Pops. Many of the Colombians express a strong interest in learning about American culture. Thus, faculty and staff of BHCC have generously extended invitations for "home visits" for barbecues and fun in the evening.

Anyone who meets the Colombians will be impressed by their warmth and friendliness. Bunker Hill is pleased to be offering this program and expects that it will serve as a model for future activities with other countries.

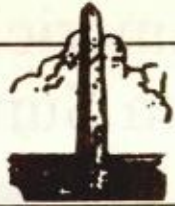

★ Neighborhood Council Meeting ... Monthly Meeting

The next monthly meeting of the CNC will be held at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 6 at the K. of C. Hall, 75 West School St. All CNC meetings are open to the public.

★ **Rapids Report** ... In response to numerous inquiries from local folks when the demolition of the former Rapids Furniture warehouse will get underway, Ron Carron of the Boston Fire Department reports that there is still an ongoing investigation of the June 24 fire and the Arson Squad will make the determination on when the remains of the structure can be razed. He will keep the community updated.

★ **Highway Reconstruction** ... Mayor Thomas M. Menino has announced that bids will be received today, Aug. 11, on the construction of "A" Street from Rutherford Avenue to "A" Street Extension and "A" Street Extension from "A" Street northerly for approximately 1,080 feet. The estimated cost of this construction project is \$900,000.

★ **Board Of Appeal Decisions** ... The city of Boston Board of Appeal has heard the petitions regarding several Charlestown properties over the past several weeks. The decisions included:

- The petition by Town Hill Associates, doing business as Figs which is located at 65-71 Main St., was granted approval with provisos for a 36A, or license for take out, and the decision was filed with the Inspectional Services Department on July 15. The permit was granted following discussions with abutters and the signing by the principals of Figs on various considerations in an agreement drawn up by abutters.

- The petition by Formacs Inc. to subdivide 253-255, 257-259 and 261 Main St. each with a two-family dwelling and store and with a one-family dwelling at 3A Lawnwood Place was approved by the board with provision that there be design review. Attorney Patrick Sweeney made the presentation before the board. Testifying in support of the development were Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services; Doug Housman, director of the Office of Business Services; Amy Chardavoyne, aid to Boston City Councillor Diane J. Modica; and the Boston Redevelopment Authority. All noted that the development was an

important project that would revitalize the neighborhood and be an investment in the beautification of Main Street.

Work crews will install the remaining lamp posts on Tremont Street and then proceed to Union Street and Soley Street.

The finish course of pavement was placed this week on Winthrop, Tremont and Union Streets. Pavement rehabilitation work is scheduled to begin within the next month on Soley, Pleasant, Cordis and Boyle streets, as well as Monument Avenue, Monument Square and Cordis Street Avenue. This work will include grinding and milling the surface of the existing pavement to be followed by placement of a new pavement surface.

Residents are reminded that weekday parking restrictions remain in effect as posted, on those streets where construction work is taking place. Continued cooperation in complying with these restrictions is appreciated.

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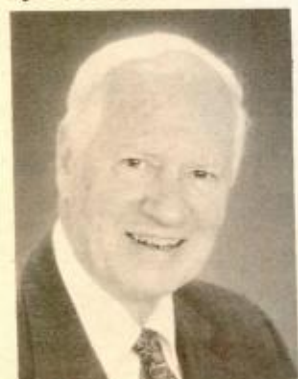

In addition, the registry computer can be accessed by the police, fire and other city departments for their own ongoing research.

In the near future, the Suffolk County Registry of Deeds will be physically relocated to the new courthouse, which will be constructed on New Chardon Street. The transfer of the land records of the Suffolk County Registry of Deeds, dating back to the 17th century, will require much detailed planning and supervision by the register and his experienced staff.

Tierney is hopeful that the voters of Suffolk County, which includes Boston, Chelsea, Winthrop and Revere, will endorse his candidacy for re-election.

Kelly Gay Announces Candidacy For Re-Election To Governor's Council

Stating that she is running for re-election "because I have worked hard during the past two years to improve the quality of criminal and civil justice in the commonwealth" Sixth District Governor's Councillor Dorothy Kelly Gay formally announced her candidacy for re-election.

Gay vowed to build on the accomplishments of her first term and to continue her style of independent leadership on behalf of her constituents.

"I am running for re-election because I have lived up to my campaign promise from 1992 to represent the concerns of the citizens from the district's cities and towns, and not to special interests on Beacon Hill."

Two years ago, Gay decided to run for the Governor's Council because it has the important responsibility of confirming all judicial appointments by the governor. At that time, she

stated that she would not be a "rubber stamp" Governor's Councillor or just one of the boys. She has asked tough questions of prospective judges, clerk-magistrates and other such positions. Gay stressed that the Governor's Council has the critical duty of reviewing and voting on the governor's recommendations for commutations of sentence for inmates in our state's correctional institutions. "I co-chaired a committee of the Council, establishing the rules for our public hearings on these matters and requiring appropriate notice to be given to all interested parties. Personally, I have tried to be fair in each case, balancing the need for punishment of these offenders and

respect toward the victims of the crime with an understanding of the rehabilitation of these individuals."

Last year, Gay led the effort to change a 70-year-old state accounting procedure that was costing the taxpayers millions of dollars, and will save the state, conservatively, \$5 million each year.

Gay said: "I believe that I have made a real difference on the Governor's Council as a strong independent woman. I can do even more during the next two years with the continued support of my constituents."

Gay is employed as a registered nurse and administrative coordinator of nursing at the Hebrew Rehabilitation Center for the Aged in Boston. She served as a member of the Somerville School Committee from 1986 to 1993; has been a volunteer and board member of the Mass. Youth Leadership Foundation; has been an active Democrat, serving on the Somerville Ward and City committees and as a delegate to 10 Democratic State Conventions; and is a member of the Somerville Rotary Club.

She is married to Bert Gay, a former machinist and past trustee of the United Auto Workers Local 1596. They are the parents of two children and grandparents of two.

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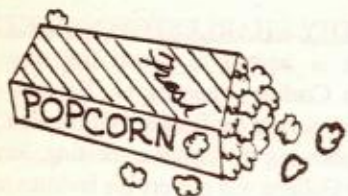

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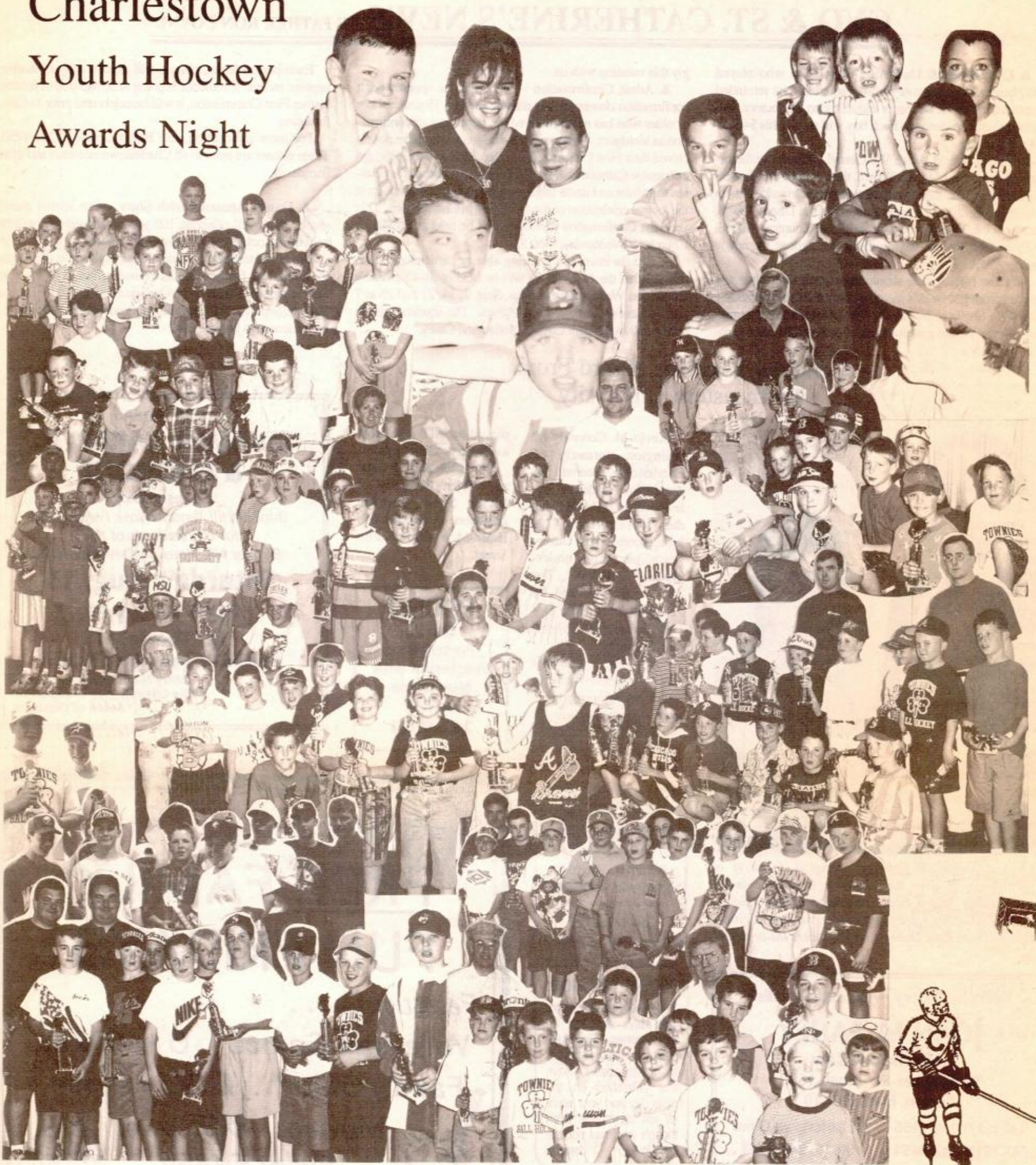

Voke Acts To Protect Pharmacy Freedom Of Choice

Rep. Richard Voke recently announced that the legislature has enacted the so-called "Pharmacy Freedom of Choice" bill. The move, which is being hailed by consumer groups across the commonwealth, came in the form of an override of Gov. William Weld's veto and is designed to allow consumers to maintain their freedom of choice in pharmacies and keep the pharmacy business competitive.

Commenting on the legislature's action, Voke said, "This is an outstanding win

for the commonwealth's consumers and neighborhood pharmacies. It was my belief that this was an instance where large health insurers were infringing on the rights of the average consumer. This victory is especially gratifying to me because of the countless number of elderly who contacted my office to express their deep reservations relative to being forced to shop for their prescriptions elsewhere."

It had recently become common practice for HMOs

to contract with large chain drug stores to become the sole providers of prescriptions for their members. Under the new law, the small pharmacies can sell to the consumer at the same discounted prices agreed to by the chains and therefore, keep the customer with which they have built a long, personal and trusting relationship. For the 2.2 million HMO subscribers, the recent vote ensures that they, too, can buy pharmaceuticals at the drug store of their choice. The measure

take effect on Jan. 1, 1995.

"I am really excited about the momentum that my fellow consumer advocates and I are gaining here on Beacon Hill. Whether it be ensuring pharmacy freedom of choice, defeating the banking industries, attempts to stop returning cancelled checks to account holders or reforming the medigap insurance market, I have and will continue to diligently protect the rights of the commonwealth's consumers," concluded Voke.

explained that he came to Charlestown two years ago and began the process of renovating the 83 Main St. site for a restaurant. He said it was a one and a half year project using his own money and noted there was no electricity or running water and several unsafe walls. He added that he has moved to Charlestown.

Comella told of his 30-seat cafe with no beer or wine license located in Wellesley which has been open for six years. He stated that his Charlestown restaurant opened May 10 and has lost many customers who prefer a setting where they can enjoy a glass of beer or wine with their meal. He noted that area restaurants all have some liquor available to their patrons and he is "disheartened" to lose business because of not being a licensed establishment.

In response to questions from CNC members, Comella explained that the premises currently has two licenses, one for a 99-seat restaurant, although there are just 50 seats at present with eight at an existing bar, and the other license is for retail where uncooked pasta, food and salads are sold for take out. He added that he will be applying for a 36A license for take out. After hearing numerous objections to the package store application from CNC members and several area abutters, Comella said that he would withdraw that application.

The CNC voted unanimously to approve the petition for a malt and wine license for Comella's with the restriction that the license stay with the business and not be sold separately. The decision of the Licensing Board will be handed down in approximately two weeks.

Dear Commissioner Bhatti,

It has been brought to my attention the pedestrian passage across the McGrath Highway and Gilmore Bridge intersection is an extremely hazardous situation. I understand that this intersection is also noted to be hazardous to vehicles as well.

The intersection is crossed by pedestrians and cyclists quite frequently to gain access to the Charles River and the new shopping mall. Because crossing is so unsafe, those who must travel on foot do so at great risk.

I understand that you have received correspondence from a Charlestown resident with several suggestions as to how to improve the current situation. There must be accommodations made for the increase in pedestrian travel across the intersection.

The traffic lights need to be synchronized to allow pedestrians to transverse the entire street instead of being crowded on the narrow median strips that cannot accommodate the increasing foot traffic.

There is a need for "no turn on red" signs to be posted because cars are constantly turning on red signals exacerbating the situation. "Yield for Pedestrian" signs are also needed to ensure that operators of vehicles are aware that the intersection is heavily trafficked by pedestrians.

I would appreciate your immediate attention to this matter as it is a definite public safety issue. Please contact my office at 635-3200, if I can be of any assistance.

Voke And Birmingham Cop Police Funding

The powerful legislative team of Rep. Richard Voke and Sen. Thomas Birmingham won a major victory for Charlestown as the police department is guaranteed a second year of funding through the state's community policing program.

Created by Voke and Birmingham with the help of their colleagues last year, Boston will not only receive for FY '95 the same amount of \$421,885 it was awarded in FY '94, but will also receive an additional

appropriation of \$1.5 million for local policing initiatives.

"As local officials, community advocates and our dedicated police department continue their efforts to make our homes and streets safer, I am pleased to also contribute to the cause by winning even more money to enhance public safety. Especially given that this year Boston need not even apply to get these much sought after policing funds, I am quite pleased to

know my goal of getting Charlestown every dollar it deserves from the state is being realized," said Voke.

Only about 10 percent of the state's cities and towns will receive such funding. Voke and Birmingham used their leadership positions to assist them in guaranteeing last year's monies while also gaining the additional \$1.5 million from a newly created pool of \$6.1 million in policing money.

"As I continue my ef-

orts to combat crime, I am very pleased to be able to assist Boston's police force with these additional funds. Whether it be the increases in community policing monies, enacting truth in sentencing legislation or securing increases in local aid, one of my top priorities remains to provide our law enforcement and judicial officials the necessary resources to properly protect the citizens of Charlestown," concluded Birmingham.

New Loans For Small Business Owners

Any small business eligible under the regular 7(a) loan can apply under Low-

Doc if its average annual sales for the previous three years are \$5 million or less and it employs 100 or less, including affiliates.

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A Tree No Longer Grows In Charlestown

THE CHIPPERS and the clean-up crew, members of the Boston Youth Cleanup Corps (BYCC), were hard at work this past week removing dead and decaying trees from the rear of the former J. J.'s on Main Street, adjacent to Mishawum Park. There have been children injured falling from the trees and one of the trees cracked during the last wind storm narrowly missing a Mishawum balcony. 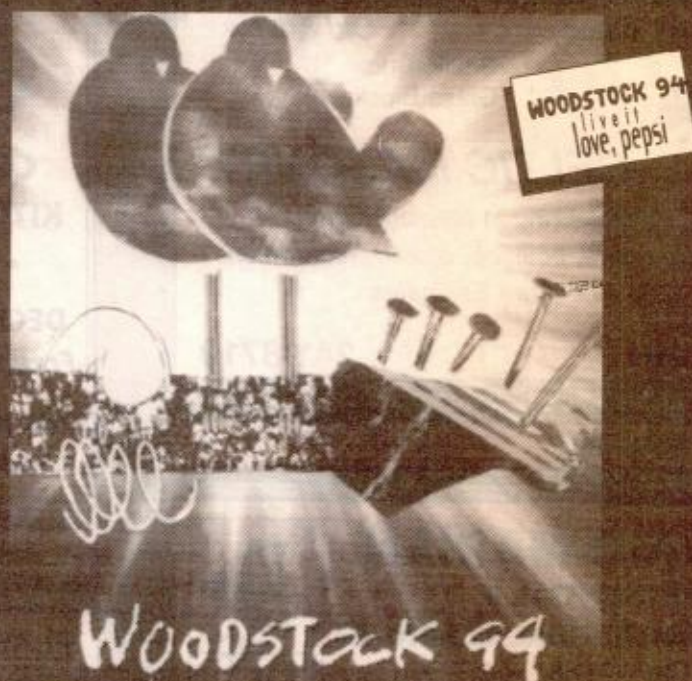
