The Bunker Hill Health Center would like to introduce Marsha Leikkanen, M.D., who will join the Internal Medicine staff on July 1, 1979. Community Center Benefit On Friday

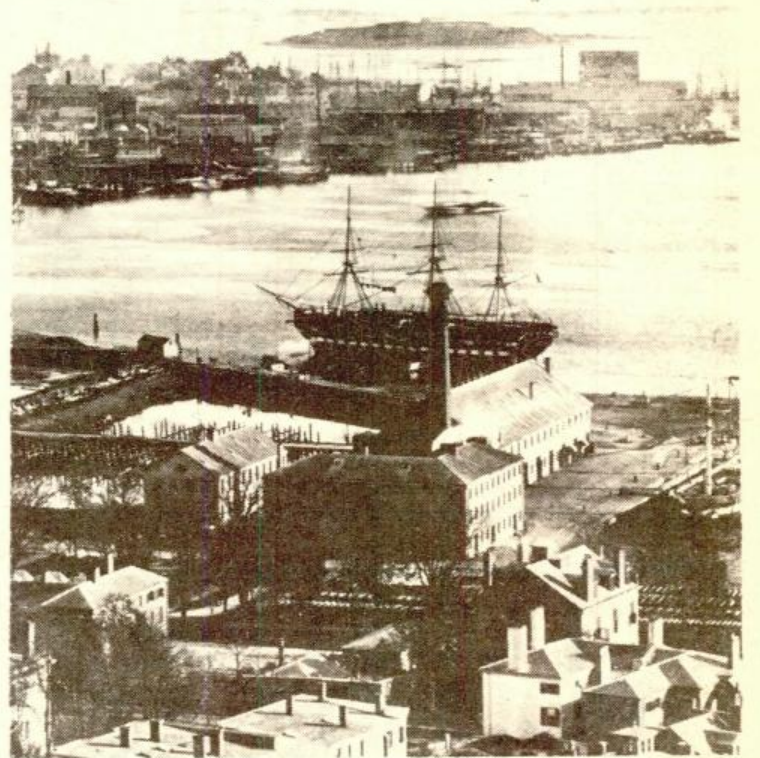

Walking Tour Planned

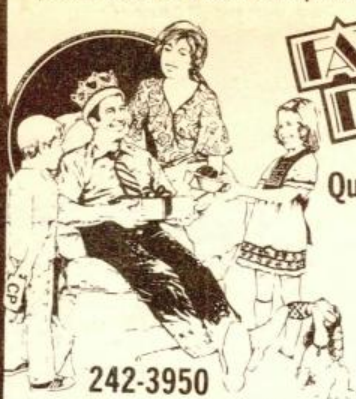

Jobs For Youth "Awards Night"

Several Charlestown youth will be among the 50 youngsters who will be recognized for outstanding achievements in employment, education and training at the Jobs for Youth-Boston "Awards Night". The ceremony will be held Thursday, June 7th at Northeastern University. This is the third Jobs for Youth Awards Night honoring special successes.

Now in its 3rd year of service to economically disadvantaged high school drop-outs, Jobs for Youth has provided education, counseling and job placement to over 1000 youth. Jobs for Youth is a private non-profit youth employment service to assist 16-21 year old Boston and Cambridge residents.

Michael Guisano will be honored for having completed one full year of employment and Kathryn Eull for outstanding performance in Educational Services.

Mayor Kevin H. White has officially announced that he will seek an unprecedented fourth successive term as Mayor of Boston.

The Mayor said that he "will build on a reputation established over the past twelve years as the man who can get things done for Boston."

"Boston's neighborhoods are stronger than any other city in America," the Mayor said, "and that is the result of the spirit of the people who live there - and of the major commitment by my administration to elderly care, medical, educational and recreational facilities unmatched by many of the more affluent suburbs. If re-elected, I will continue to nurture this spirit over the next four years."

Mayor White has focused much of the attention of his administration upon the neighborhoods of the city. Over 88

percent of the city's budget is funneled into neighborhood projects. That's in sharp contrast to the 53 percent of city funds earmarked for the neighborhoods prior to the White Administration.

Increased public and private investment have been translated into a number of neighborhood improvements in Charlestown between 1968 and 1978. They include:

HOUSING: 758 new or converted units; Housing Improvement Program totalling \$725,000 for 459 completed properties, which triggered a total investment of \$3,233,000 in private funds by homeowners.

SCHOOLS: Kent Community School, \$5,000,000

FIRE STATIONS: Charlestown Station, \$400,000

PARKS AND RECREATION: Athletic Complex, \$1,000,000; George White Pool, \$800,000; and McCarthy Playground, \$200,000

LIBRARIES: Charlestown Branch, \$400,000

RETAIL: Thompson Square and the Bunker Hill Shopping Mall

EDUCATIONAL: Bunker Hill Community College (library and cafeteria), \$6,000,000; and Bunker Hill Community College (auditorium, and administration buildings), \$15,000,000

CULTURAL: Ironsides National Park, \$1,200,000; and Bunker Hill Community Museum, \$10,000

More neighborhood improvements planned for the Charlestown community include the completion of the Charlestown High School and Community School at a projected cost of \$20 million.

Mayor White also pointed to his leadership in the successful tax classification campaign last fall which prevented a \$70 million shift in property taxes from

businesses to taxpayers in Boston's neighborhoods.

Among the Mayor's accomplishments are:

---18 Little City Halls established which respond to over 730,000 requests per year.

---18 Community Schools established providing educational and recreational services to over 30,000 Bostonians.

---A chain of neighborhood health centers established to make health care readily available to neighborhood residents.

---Establishment of the Mayor's Commission of Affairs of the Elderly to provide for the special needs of Boston's large population (approximately 100,000) of older people.

---The Consumers' Council established to help Bostonians get a fair deal from businesses in the city. Over \$600,000 a year has been returned to people as a result of aggressive efforts by this agency.

"During my administration," Mayor White said, "Boston has grown from a city that was dismissed as on the decline into one of the most livable, workable cities in America - and I am proud to be part of that resurgence."

"Johnny, We Hardly Knew Ye"

Project YES Enrollees In New Energy Program

Moving slowly from table to table, teacher Joyce Newhouse answers her students' questions about "fossil fuels" and "hydrocarbons" and checks their work for a reading assignment on air pollution. A scene from any science classroom, yet this education program—the Energy Training and Education Center (ETEC)—could hardly be described as typical.

ETEC, which is funded through the City of Boston's Employment and Economic Policy Administration (EEPA), links school and work for eligible youth, 16-19, with an unusual twist—the students' jobs and their education focus on energy.

"Not only is this energy

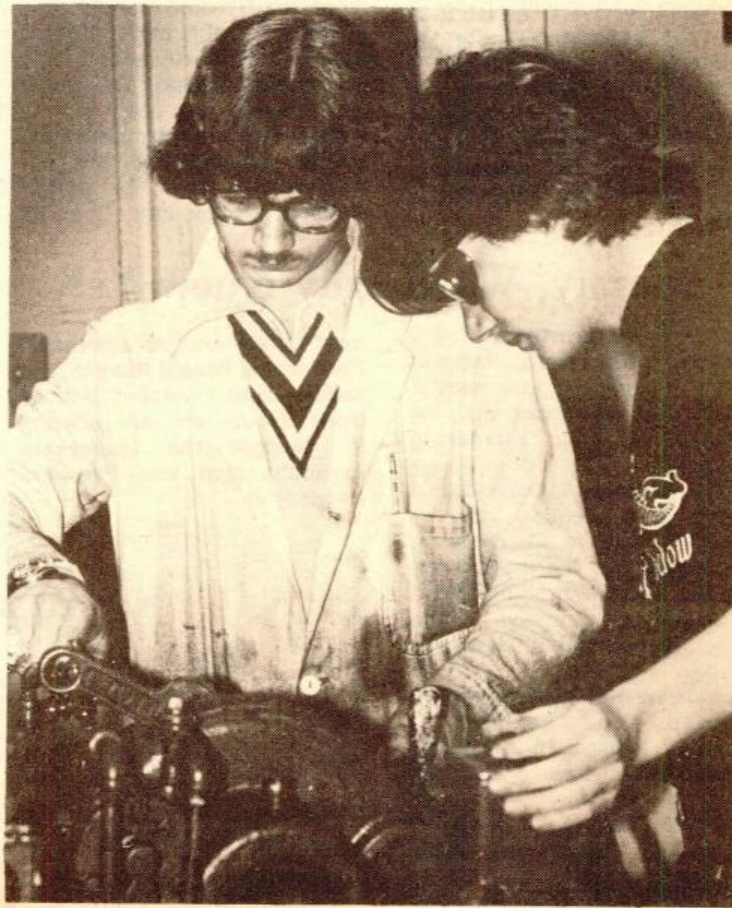
program offering students a unique opportunity for a high school education and a part time job, but a unique advantage in learning the skills and techniques for energy-related jobs. They've got a jump on the future," said Mayor Kevin H. White, in discussing the innovative education center.

The energy program, operated by the Education Collaborative for Greater Boston (EdCo), enrolls students from Boston and suburban schools. Eligible Boston youth participate through

The actual classroom site is located in a Copley Square office building, but the students work at 23 different sites in Boston and Cambridge. They attend class one week and work full time the next. During one week, half the students are at work and half are at school.

Under The State House Dome

Millions of barrels of so-called "contract crude"—petroleum supplies destined for U.S. consumption under long-term contracts between major American oil corporations and oil-producing Arab states—have been resold and redirected to Israel, a Washington-based conservative newspaper charged this week.

The SPOTLIGHT, which often features insider revelations ignored by the Establishment media, said in its May 28th issue that "highly placed and exclusive confidential sources" reported that light crude and processed oil supplies consigned for the fuelshort American market are being diverted to Israel in ever-growing shipments under a little known 1975 treaty which grants that nation first call on U.S. petroleum resources whenever

supplies grow short.

"This unprecedented collusion is one of the hidden causes of the current gas crunch which has crippled the flow of oil, inflamed the temper of a hundred million motorists and triggered off-the-pump prices ranging between \$1 and \$1.40 per gallon," said the report bylined by George Nicholas.

Under the 1975 U.S.-Israeli Strategic Resources Pact there was a proviso that if Israel were unable to defend itself because of a total cutoff of oil supplies then the U.S. would refuel the tiny nation's war machines from its own stockpiles.

"But subsequently in 1977 and 1978," the report said, "the original treaty was amended and 'amplified' by a series of procedural and 'implementing' agreements which are now interpreted by Washington to permit Israel to have the first drink at the oil well whenever supplies run low."

Certainly, these are serious charges and raise grave questions about the integrity of the Carter Administration which keeps telling us that the oil

"shortage" is because Iran cut back imports by five percent. What the Administration thus far has failed to explain is how this five percent loss suddenly translates into a shortage of 17-50 percent.

With New England, and especially Massachusetts, hardest hit whenever there is a crunch on heating oil and gas supplies, these serious accusations call for an immediate investigation by the Bay State's two most influential lawmakers at the nation's capitol, U.S. Senator Edward M. Kennedy and Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr.

Kennedy and O'Neill, either singly or together, certainly wield the clout and influence—plus expertise on their staffs—to get at the root of these allegations and determine whether their constituents and the rest of America are being shortchanged in this fashion.

As the polls show, most Americans are strongly supportive of Israel. And there is little question but that if the Israeli war machine were faced with being crippled and unable to defend itself under war con-

ditions most Americans would agree to tighten their belts and accept heating oil and gas shortages. But for the Carter Administration to shortchange Americans under the present conditions, and under this alleged umbrella of secrecy, is unconscionable and should be debated openly.

The SPOTLIGHT asks, "Why should America willfully aggravate its own energy crisis to fuel up a client state which is not at war?" It's a good question.

Hopefully, Senator Kennedy and/or Speaker O'Neill will answer that question to the satisfaction of all of us.

Beacon Hill Guessing Game: Who is the author of the Boston Herald American's series "The Pols?" Former Gov. Frank Sargent's top aide, Jack Flannery, was the original suspect. Now insiders are betting that its District Court Judge Al Kramer, also a former Sargent insider. In fact, you can almost bet your house on that. . . Heisman Trophy winner Johnny Rodgers, stuck in a California gas line in his Rolls Royce, decided to buy the station to solve his problem. Will ex Boston City Greeter Bob DeSimone do likewise for his green Rolls when his Massachusetts oil refinery deal comes through?

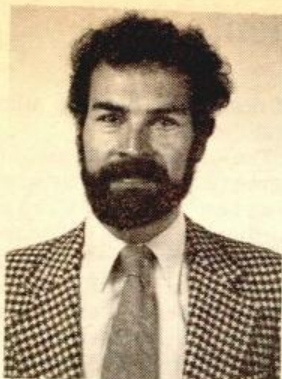

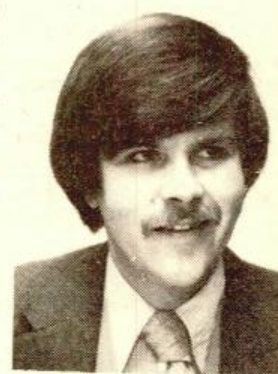

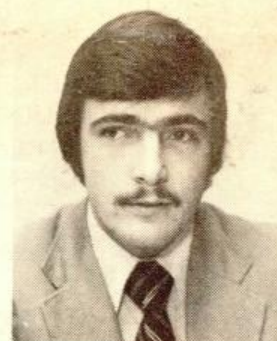

Governor Edward J. King has announced his intention to approve the agreement between the Massachusetts Port Authority and the City of Boston to develop a containerport facility in South Boston and to allow for the development by Societa Generale Immobiliare of a \$200,000,000 housing and commercial development in Charlestown.

"We have taken a positive step which will permit the handling of existing business in a much less expensive manner. It will attract business rather than discourage it," Governor King said.

The Governor's approval is required by statute as the final step in allowing the development of the two major harbor projects.

Massport can now proceed with plans for a containerport on land to be leased from the city's

Governor To Approve Mass Port-City Agreement

Economic Development and Industrial Commission (EDIC).

Speaking at the Propeller Club of Boston's 52nd observance of National Maritime Day, Governor King said he intends to expedite the permit process so the filling and diking at the South Boston site can begin soon. "We're going to work with the

EDIC, the City, and Massport to see that the bureaucratic interference stops when the papers land and that we proceed in a constructive manner." He indicated that fill will be available from the MBTA's Southwest corridor project.

The agreement was reached May 10, 1979 after several years

of negotiation between Massport and the City.

The major elements of the agreement reached between the Boston Redevelopment Authority, the Economic Development and Industrial Commission (EDIC), and the Massachusetts Port Authority are for EDIC to lease to Massport approximately 10.2 acres of land on the so-called North Jetty and approximately 37.2 acres bounded by the West Jetty and the North Jetty, including all of the water acreage surrounding the five finger piers, which Massport will have the unlimited right to fill for maritime uses.

The lease also provides for Massport's right, in common with others, to use "C" Street and other existing roads and railways for access to the property leased by Massport and for any easements reasonably necessary to bring utilities to the property.

Massport agrees to sublease to EDIC as much of the property at the Boston Army Base as necessary to provide EDIC with replacement dockage for the berthing areas of the West and North Jetty. EDIC will remit to Massport 50% of the revenues generated by EDIC for the dockage fees from vessels berthed in this area.

The Massport lease will be 40 years with successive 25 year terms. However, Massport is required to obtain the necessary permits, licenses and approvals with respect to the filling of the water area in five years or the lease will expire.

Massport will make the necessary investment to develop a containerport and pay one dollar (\$1) in rent for the water area. Rent for the jetty area will be at the rate of \$360,000 annually until the permits for filling the water area have been obtained. Rent for the balance of the term will be determined by subsequent appraisals.

The City of Boston agrees that Massport may deduct the amount of \$100,000 annually from in-lieu-of-tax payments otherwise due the City.



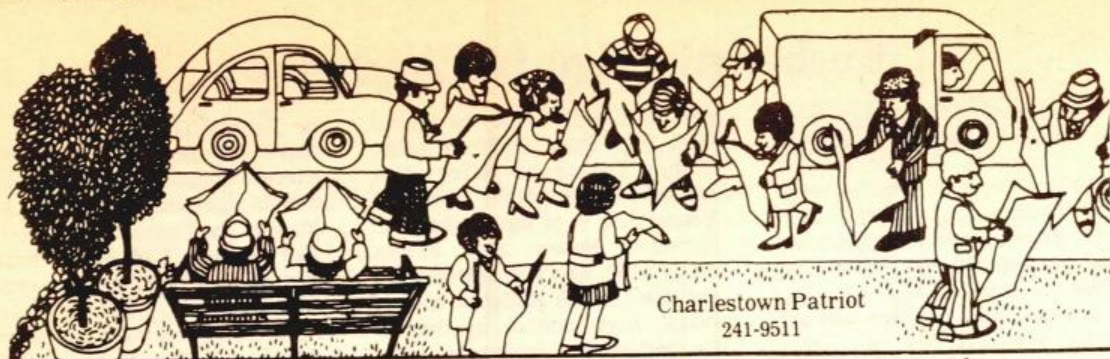
