## KEEP AN EYE ON YOUR <br> IRA INVESTMENTS

Many people who have Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs) aren't getting the most out of them because they tend to just let them sit. Don't fall into this trap. You should continually monitor the returns on your IRA investments. If you aren't happy with the returns you're getting, you can easily move your IRA money.
There are two ways to move IRA funds from one account to another. You can use what is called a "rollover" in which the money is paid directly to you, or you can utilize a "direct transfer" whereby you never touch the funds. When moving money from one IRA to another in search of higher investment returns, a direct transfer between the two IRA trustees usually offers advantages over a rollover.
If you use a rollover, you are responsible for reinvesting the payout from your old IRA in a new IRA within 60 days. Failure to meet this deadline will cost you dearly. Amounts not rolled over within the 60 -day period won't qualify for the tax-free rollover treatment and therefore, must be included in your gross income and taxed accordingly. What's more, if you are under age $591 / 2$, you will be hit with an additional tax equal to 10 percent of the distribution - on top of any regular income tax that is due on the amount of the distribution. There's always a chance that an accident or error will cause you to miss the deadline, leaving the entire rollover to be taxed.

A direct transfer (from one trustee to another) preserves your options. Unlike a "rollover" in which the money is paid directly to you and you have a 60 -day time limit to put it into another IRA, a direct transfer doesn't have to be reported on your income tax form because the money technically never leaves a qualified account. Also, while you can rollover your IRA only once every 12 months, no limit is placed on the number of "transfers" you can make each year. TO SEE HOW THIS CAN AEFECT YOU, CALL TODAY:

Fifty-Three Charlestown Residents In Record-Breaking Massport Summer Jobs Program

The Massachusetts Port Authority (Massport) has hired 53 students from Charlestown to participate in its 1994 Summer Jobs Program. This year's program is dramatically expanded over the year before, funding 642 positions for Greater Boston students an increase of 71 percent over 1993's total of 374 jobs. Funding for the 1994 program will total over \$1.4 million, which represents a 76 percent increase over last year's funding level of $\$ 810,000$. The 1994 program establishes Massport as the area's largest single source of summer jobs for the second straight year.
"T'm a strong believer in summer jobs as one of the best ways to give young people the work experience they need to expand their horizons," said Massport Executive Director and CEO Stephen P. Tocco. "It makes sense to do as much as we can."

One distinctive feature of Massport's program is that more than half of the positions are outside the Authority. Since 1991, Massport has provided funds to more than 60 service programs throughout Greater Boston so that these
programs could hire additional staff for the summer.

In 1994, Massport is paying for 370 students to work in a wide range of social service programs, including peer counseling, day care, elderly assistance, community health centers, summer camps and recreation. In some cases, Massport's support will save programs that were being eliminated due to local budget cuts.

Massport's Community Surnmer Jobs Program is the only one of its kind in the nation that helps to mitigate the effect of airport operations on impacted communities.

Within the Authority, Massport has hired high school, college and graduate students for summer employment for the past 14 years. This year, Massport is supplying 272 jobs throughout its facilities as a means to help students finance their education. Whenever possible, students are placed in jobs related to their majors in school. Summer placements include positions in marketing, finance, aviation, computer science, business administration and human resource manage-
ment.
In total, the two components of Massport's summer jobs effort in 1994 add up to 642 jobs at a funding level of $\$ 1.65$ million.

The James Donovan Scholarship Committee raised $\$ 15,000$ from the toumament which will be distributed throughout the community in Jimmy's name.
James "Dunny" Donovan was a man who died far too soon, last April at the age of 23 . He was a lifelong Charlestown resident, a member of the Boys \& Girls Club, a member of St. Catherine's parish and a student at Bunker Hill Community College. He was also involved in many sports throughout his life including football, hockey and had started golfing. Jimmy left behind a lot of family and friends who wanted to cher-
ish his memory. Therefore, the James F. Donovan Scholarship Committee was established last October.
Jimmy's family and friends united to keep his spirit alive. Last year they sponsored the first annual Golf Toumament and the "Dunny Cup," which proved to be a coveted ball hockey crown that was sought after by 14 teams from Charlestown and other parts of Boston.

In addition, to these events the committee has given back to the community. Last year, eight children at Charlestown Catholic received scholarships for school. The committee donated money to the Bunker Hill Day Parade and spon-
sored the tee-ball team "Dunny's Pals."
This year, the committee plans to continue their scholarships to Charlestown Catholic, and they will also give out four scholarships to children entering high school. They have also given money to the Boys \& Girls Club and will sponsor Charlestown Youth Hockey In-house hockey team his season.
The eulogy of a famous doctor who died in 1927 reads: "When an ordinary man dies, his friends are grieved at the time, and then things go on about the same. Once in a while there occurs a rare spirit of such beauty and radiance that the loss is greater and more per
manent. [His] was such a spirit; the kindly touch of his hand, the obvious good will and friendliness that shone in his smile, marked him as a man entirely apart from the ordinary."

Many people who knew Jimmy could use these same words to describe him. It is this same sense of respect and dedication which have led the family and friends of James F. "Dunny" Donovan to pay tribute to his uniqueness and life. His spinit and smile will always be passed on and remembered.

## SJC Program Gives Youths <br> Their Day In Court

Yohan Germosen of Charlestown, a student at Charlestown High School, is among 32 Boston area high school students who are learning about the Mass. judicial system this summer from a unique perspective, inside the courthouse. The Judicial Youth Corps is the nation's first court-sponsored program to combine law-related education with paid summer internships in the courts for high school students.

Founded in 1990 by Supreme Judicial Court Chief Justice Paul J. Liacos, the 16 -week program is designed to expand young people's understanding of fundamental legal values and to foster an appreciation of the judicial system
through education and hands-on interaction with the courts.

This year, students from Boston Public Schools, parochial schools and Revere and Winthrop High Schools were selected to participate in the program, based on teacher recommendations and individual interviews with court personnel.

From a volunteer faculty of judges, lawyers and various court personnel who also act as mentors, the students learn about subjects that affect their lives, such as juvenile law, domestic violence and violence prevention, criminal justice, small claims and housing and family matters. Students are given the
opportunity to observe actual trials involving these subjects as well.

Following an eightweek orientation in the spring, students began working last week in the various courts throughout Suffolk County. The students are paid an average total of $\$ 1,200$ for their eight-week summer job, in which they are responsible for filing court documents, maintaining records and answering telephones.

The Judicial Youth Corps program has been recognized nationally with a merit award from the American Bar Association as an "outstanding community partnership program that promotes greater understanding of the justice system."

## Good News In Heavy Boston Traffic!

The honorable John F. Gilmore was a former State Representative from the Charlestown District of the city of Boston. He was also a Justice of the Municipal Court of the Charlestown District.
Perhaps the name Gilmore is familiar to you. If you listen to radio traffic reports, undoubtedly you've heard conditions described on the Gilmore Bridge.
The Gilmore Bridge was dedicated in the 70s. From the O'Brien Highway into Charlestown, spanning the railroad tracks, this is one of Boston's busiest bridges.
Five to six days a week, I approach the Gilmore Bridge from the north, taking the Sullivan Square exit off 93 south. I travel New Rutherford Avenue alongside the Hood Plant and reach the Gilmore Bridge at Bunker Hill Community College.
Having traveled over the Gilmore Bridge for the last 16 years, I conclude this is one of the friendliest places to drive in all of Boston. I've never had to struggle to join the flow of traffic on the Gilmore Bridge. Inevitably, in a short time, vehicles slow down to allow newcomers to join the flow. I find the same speedy courtesies extended to me and other drivers when it is necessary to make a lane change on the bridge.

One moming, while stopped on the Gilmore Bridge waiting for the traffic to move, I was startled by a knock on my door window. I cautiously rolled my window down part way and was greeted by a smile and a large collection of keys extended to me. "I saw these hanging from your trunk, thought you might need them." After closing my trunk early that morning at home in New Hampshire before leaving for work, I had forgotten to remove my keys from the lock.

Some momings, traffic backs up to the Hood Plant and beyond. Drivers struggle in stuttering stop and go efforts. When crawling up onto the Gilmore Bridge, patience and concem for others dominate.

The Honorable John F. Gilmore is honored indeed by the thoughtful, generous individuals who navigate his bridge during the busiest, most stressful time of the weekday commute.

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## The Issue Is Control

As it was in the era that forced prohibition down the throats of the American people, the only thing the fanatics of that dark period in our history succeeded in doing, was to create the largest criminal empire in United States history. It is still with us today.

If the American people fail to regain control of our govermment, all that our predecessors fought to protect will be lost, and America will be ruled by tyranny.

And, we better regain control fast before we turn over the best health care system in the world, to an intrusive bloated bureaucracy which will exact total control over our health needs.

To illustrate: Has the federal govermment ever entered into a policy that has been efficient and cost-effective?

The answer is all too clear.

## I Do Not Support Decriminalization Of Drugs

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## S.S. John W. Brown' Steams Into Boston Harbor Aug. $23-$ Charlestown W.W. II Merchant Marine Veterans To Be Honored

The S.S. John W. Brown, one of only two remaining World War II Liberty Ships, steams into the port of Boston for the first time. on Tuesday, Aug 23. This fully-restored floating memorial, dedicated to the men and women who builh, sailed and defended the World War II Liberty fleet, will dock at the Charlestown Navy Yard at approximately 8:30 am.
The ship will then be open to the public from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. through Friday, Aug. 26 and again on Sunday, Aug. 28 from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. Admission to the ship is free, with voluntary contributions strongly encouraged. During the early years of World War II, President Franklin D. Roosevelt organized an unprecedented emergency shipbuilding program. In order to build ships faster than the enemy could sink them, more than 2,700 Liberty ships were produced between 1941 and 1945. These were not warships, but merchant vessels that carried two-thirds of all the heavy equipment, weapons and supplies needed to launch the Allied offensive.

About 2,500 Liberty ships survived the war Now, only the John W. Brown and the Jeremiah $O^{\prime}$ 'Brien, berthed in San Francisco, remain intact and are fully-restored.
The remarkable restoration of the John W. Brown was undertaken by Project Liberty Ship Inc., a nonprofit, all-volunteer organi-
zation. In the past six year since Project Liberty Ship retrieved the Brown from the reserve fleet in Virginia more than 250,000 man hours and $\$ 2.8$ million have been spent to restore the ship to steaming condition, reactivating her as a mari time museum and memori al. In 1991, the John W Brown sailed under her own power for the first time since her seagoing career ended in 1946.

The crew serving aboard the John W. Brown is unique. Now in their 60s and 70 s, many of the volunteers were officers and crewmen on the Brown, or on other Liberty ships during the war. These veteran merchant mariners, shipyard workers and Naval Armed Guardsmen remain dedicated to keeping the history of the Liberty fleet alive. Visitors to the John W. Brown will survey a vessel restored to look as it did at the end of World War II and meet ori ginal Liberty ship crewmen at work.

A rare opportunity to sail aboard the John W Brown is offered on Saturday, Aug. 27 from 10 a.m to 4 p.m. A six-hour "Cruise Into History" will feature tours of the ship, displays of authentic period military gear, World War II aircraft fly-bys, dancing to 1940s music of a live Big Band, a continental breakfast and a buffet luncheon. Tickets for the cruise are $\$ 100$ per guest (tax deductible) and can be obtained by writing to Project Li -

Mobil, which supplied the lubricants needed for the engines of the John W. Brown, is also supporting the ship's voyage to Boston. Says Gerhard Kurz president of Mobil Shipping, the transportation company, "The restoration of the John W. Brown evokes a real sense of the tremendous effort required o maintain open sea lanes in time of war. During World War II, more than 50 ships in Mobil's fleet were either sunk or badly damaged in the line of duty.
"Being involved in the Liberty ship project allows us to underscore Mobil's significant contributions to the war effort. More importantly, however, we honor the heroic sacrifices made by the men and women who served, and remember their courage, determination and devotion to duty."
