There is power in perseverance.

"STEP UP AND STEP OUT. GET OUT THERE, SAY YOU'RE GOING TO DO IT, AND KEEP TRYING UNTIL YOU DO DO IT."

"THE HARDEST THING I HAVE EVER DONE IS FINDING MY VOICE IN A SITUATION WHERE I AM THE ONLY PERSON WITH AN OPPOSITE POINT OF VIEW (WHICH HAPPENED TO BE ALL MEN)."

"THERE ARE PLENTY OF TIMES THAT I'VE FAILED. WHEN I DO, I TRY TO SIT BACK AND TAKE SOMETHING FROM IT. HOPEFULLY, I DON'T DO IT AGAIN. FAILURE IS TRULY NOT A BAD THING."

-Rhonda Curry. Vice President of Human Resources at Hornets Sports & Entertainment on the perception that women have to be perfect and that they can't make mistakes—and why some of the president lessors come from failure.

Risk-taking is a muscle you need to exercise.

"WHAT WOULD YOU DO IF YOU WEREN'T AFRAID?"

-Lisa Skeets Tatum, Founder and CEO of Landit, hung a sign with these words in her kitchen for her kids to read every time they come in for a snack. Tatum reflects that "taking risks is a mindiest," and shares her guiding philosophy: to take "microbites," little steps after setbacks that help you dust yourself of and set you up for success.

Failure is all about perspective: It can be a big mistake or the biggest opportunity of your life,
