The parade is being dedicated in honor of the Boston National Historical Park and its mission of "preserving the past for future generations."

## Charlestown Chorale Celebrates Bunker Hill Day

The Charlestown Chorale will present a program of traditional and contemporary music, including patriotic songs in celebration of Bunker Hill Day The event will be held at the USS Constitution Museum in the Charlestown Navy Yard, at 3 p.m. on Saturday, June 13.

Sponsored by the Charlestown Working Theater and led by Music Director Christina Wilhelm, this will be the premier performance or the 20 -member Charlestown Chorale. The program features songs from the early settlers, reading of The Grandmother's Story of The Battle of Bunker Hill" by Oliver Wendell Holmes (he is best known or the 1831 poem "Old Ironsides"), and singing patriotic songs with some audience participation.
The USS Constitution Museum is located in the historic Charlestown Navy Yard and offers the largest gift shop on the Freedom Trail. The museum is a nonprofit, educational instiution dedicated to preserving the heritage of USS Constitution--widely known as "Old Ironsides" and to teaching about the

## Antique Auto Show Celebrates

## 25th Anniversary Of Bunker Hill Community College

Bunker Hill Community College, marking its 25 th Anniversary Celebra tion, presents The Antique All-Wheel Show-n-Shine Auto Show and Es corted Cruise through historic Charlestown. This, the first antique auto show held in the greater Boston area will take place on Saturday, June 13 (rain date June 20), from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., at the college's Charlestown campus, 250 New Rutherford Ave.

The Antique All-Wheel Show-n Shine Auto Show has been designated a qualifying event by Cruisin' New England Magazine, the area's largest read antique auto magazine. Participants will be judged, and trophies will be awarded, in five categories: The President's Choice, The Best of the Show, The People's Choice, Best Car Club Display, and Car Club Participation Award. The first 200 registrants will receive car plaques and a T-shirt.

The day-long family event will feature prizes, food, music and an opportunity for spectators to choose their favorite entry. Gates will open to the general public at $9 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. Spectator viewing will take place between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.

Registration for participants in the show will take place between 9 and 11 a.m. Judging will be held between noon and 1 p.m., with the awarding ceremony to begin at 1 p.m. All antique auto entrants participating in the event will be invited to join the escorted cruise, scheduled to begin at 3 p.m.

The Escorted Cruise through Charlestown, which will take place between 3 and 4 p.m., will parade along the following route: Austin Street. Main Street to the firehouse, Bunker Hill Street to Chelsea Street, enter Gate 5 to the Charlestown Navy Yard, First Avenue to the USS Constitution,
um-around and leave the Navy Yard at Gate 4 onto Chelsea Street, Warren Street to Thompson Square, Austin Street to the BHCC campus.

Sithe Energies New England presented the council with its future plans for the Mystic Power Plant on Alford Street. Representing Sithe were Marcia MacClary, Doug Smith, Mike Crough and Jim McGowan. Sithe Energies recently purchased the power plant from Boston Edison.
Jim McGowan, vice president of Development, provided a brief description of the company's history, stating that Sithe Energies has been in business for 14 years and it is the third largest independent power producer in the world. He continued to stress
that the company has a reputation for being environmentally clean and being reliable. McGowan stated that it is important to Sithe to have a good relationship with the Charlestown community and that it looks forward to an open dialogue with the residents.

McGowan went on to discuss plans for the site. At present, the site will continue to operate as usual. However, Sithe does see the need for diversity in its fuel base. McGowan stated that they are still surveying the plant to determine the cost of switching to natural gas, but they do foresee a time when the plant will be running on both oil and natural gas. They will continue to bum fuel (oil) until it is economically feasible to bum natural gas only. However, there is no definite timetable as to when they will stop burning oil and run natural gas only.

Council members expressed their frustration over the environmental impact the Mystic Plant has had on the community and urged Sithe representatives to provide more information on future plans. The represen-

tatives could not provide a specific timetable and promised to come back to the council as soon as plans are more defined. They reiterated that the plant would run as usual for the near term and stated that prudent utility planning would call for the plant to maintain the capacity to bum oil in extreme circumstances in the future.
Bill McCabe expressed his skepticism of the deregulated industry as the motivation for profit may come at the expense of health and safety of residents. He cited examples of the catastrophes associated with the deregulation of the trucking and the airline industries.
McGowan informed the council that the company will be going through an environmental review process with MEPA (Mass. Environmental Protection Agency), the Energy Facility Siting Board, and the DEP (Department of Environmental Protection) at which time the community can offer its input. Tom Cunha asked that Sithe Energies assign a member of its staff to attend CNC meetings on a regular basis to keep the community apprised of the regulatory process. McGowan stated that he would be happy to send a representative to CNC meetings.

Rep. Gene O'Flaherty, Councillor Paul Scapicchio, and Eighth Congressional Candidate John O'Connor were on hand to listen to community concems and offer their support to the community,

Residents informed Sithe Energies that they were deeply concemed about the impact the plant has on the health of the community. Residents stated that the high rate of asthma and other respiratory problems in
the community are the result of the pollution generated in the town. They pointed out that the power plant is one of the major contributors to pollution

A meeting of the CNC's Environmental Committee will be scheduled to discuss this matter further.

Melissa Doherty addressed the council relative to her concems about the Boston Redevelopment Authority's Request For Proposal (RFP) for 10 Chestnut St. Council members were concerned as well because they were not informed that the RFP for that site was released, because the community process that has been established to design RFP's was not used. The Council members voted to ask the BRA to stop the process until the community can comment on the RFP.

Ivy St. John discussed the plans for the Austin Street Beautification Project. She stated that a community meeting, or "charette," was held to finalize plans to close the entrance to the MDC Rink parking lot at Union Street and open the entrance on Austin Street. This plan will create about $30-40$ parking spaces at the rink and will make available land for passive park space. St. John asked the CNC to endorse the proposal and send a support letter to the Boston Transportation Department (BTD). Jim Mansfield informed the council that the BTD agrees with the plan, but was uncomfortable recommending the proposal without CNC support. The council voted to send a support letter to the BTD.

The council voted to dispense with the July and August meetings and will reconvene in September.


# The 2 Street String Band To Appear In Concert At The Bunker Hill Monument On Saturday, June 13 

Making its second appearance in Charlestown in celebration of Bunker Hill Day, the 2 Street String (Mummers) Band will present a foot-tapping, hand-clapping good time for residents and visitors on Saturday, June 13, beginning at $5 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. This string band from Philadelphia will present a concert on Monument Square in front of the Bunker Hill Museum.

This concert is part of the celebration planned by the Bunker Hill Day Commemorative committee, marking the 223rd anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill, and is dedicated in honor of the Boston National Historical Park and its mission of "preserving the past for future generations."

A mummer is defined as "one who goes merrymaking in disguise during festivals." Mummery can be traced back to medieval Europe when men and women would lead festal rites during the Christmas holiday season. History records that when the pioneer Swedes came to this country, they settled in an area known as Tinicum, bringing with them many customs of the old country. Important among them was the age-old habit of visiting friends the day after Christmas through the first day of the new year. They would travel in bands of men through South Philadelphia engaging in a series of festivities. This informal celebration continued until Jan. 1, 1901 when the first organized parade was established, and hence, tradition was set.

On Jan. 5, 1995, the 2 Street String Band was formed, based on what are the core values of Philadelphia Mummers: to perform for people, have fun and share in the excitement that a string band brings to all.

At that 1995 meeting, 17 men decided that it was an idea worth striving for and by Jan. 1, 1996, the 2 Street String Band performed in its first Philadelphia New Year's Day Parade with a band of 64 musicians and over 40 band assistants, known as marshalls. Obviously the band's message of civic-minded fun and excitement grew very quickly.

In the early summer of 1996, the band purchased its own clubhouse, not an easy proposition for a non-profit organization. However, with the support of the entire board, this very big step to solidify the membership as an up and coming string band was made possible. The clubhouse is located in the heart of Mummery on Second Street in South Philadelphia, hence the name the 2 Street String Band.

On Jan. 1 of this year, the band participated in its third New Year's Day Parade brought to Broad Street the theme "And Now ... The Weather!" All forms of weather went to

the parade this year , including a 15 -foot tornado and a 30 foot wide rainbow. The judges were very impressed by the band's very entertaining prize-winning presentation.

Over the past four years, the band has become known worldwide. They have been invited to perform in Ireland, Germany, Califormia and Louisiana. It will also travel to Canton, Ohio this August to perform in the National Football League Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony Parade. All of this, along with a cruise to Canada will keep the band very busy throughout 1998.
It's clear to see that this organization is on the way to being one of the fastest growing and most successful string bands in Mummer's history and they are looking forward to returning to Charlestown this weekend..
The costumes for a string band average between $\$ 50,000$ to $\$ 70,000$ a year. The fierce competition in the New Year's Day Parade requires the outstanding costumes, and parade rules require that new costumes be presented to the judges each year. The over 23 string bands participate annually in the parade, along with a multitude of nonmusical brigades and clubs. Unlike the Rose Parade and other famous marches, the Mummers' Parade is not commercially sponsored.

## U.S. Navy Announces USS Constitution To Stay Close To Its Homeport

The Chief of Naval Operations, Admiral Jay L. Johnson, took action on June 9 to guarantee USS Constitution is safely protected for future generations. His decision is based on the preliminary results of the recent sea trials as well as an operational risk assessment.
"After weighing the benefits and associated risks of taking this priceless national treasure back to the
sea, I decided that the nation is best served by conducting any future operation of Old Ironsides in close proximity to the Boston Harbor sea buoy in the sheltered waters of Massachusetts Bay," Admiral Johnson said.
When contacted, Charlestown resident, Commander Robert L. Gillen, USN (ret.), former commanding officer of USS Constitu-
tion, commented that Admiral Johnson "made exactly the correct decision." Gillen also noted that USS Constitution will continue her two periodic turnaround cruises, which are typically part of Bunker Hill week in mid-June and the celebration surrounding Fourth of July.
Although the results of the recent sea trials indicated that the ship is in a good

state of repair, the risk of unprecedented weather conditions and the subsequent requirement to transit at higher speeds for weather avoidance require USS Constitution to remain close to her berth at the Charlestown Navy Yard where her support and crew facilities are located.

According to a Navy spokesperson, USS Constitution has been berthed safely in Boston Harbor for more than one hundred
years and is host to approximately one million visitors annually. The CNO's decision will ensure this irreplaceable national icon can continue to host visitors year round.
"As much as we would all like to see Old Ironsides under sail on the high seas, I have a responsibility to protect the ship," Johnson said. "I simply cannot justify the risk of unexpected weather harming this national treasure."

## Suffolk County D.A. Martin Monument Orator At Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Exercises on June 17

The Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Exercises, sponsored by Bunker Hill Post 26, The American Legion, under the auspices of the city of Boston, will be held on Wednesday morning, June 17. These ceremonies will mark the 223rd anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill.

The program, according to Standing Committee Chairman James W. Conway, past commander of Post 26 and past National Historian of The American Legion, will begin with an Ecumenical Service at St. Francis de Sales Church, 313 Burker Hill St. at 9 a.m.

Following the service, the veteran, military, militia and patriotic organizations will assemble outside the church and form a procession. The participants will march to the Bunker Hill Monument grounds to the music of the Pipes \& Drums of Bunker Hill for the Patriotic Exercises, commencing at $10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$.

The Monument Orator on this, the 223rd anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill, will be the Honorable Ralph C. Martin II, Suffolk County District Attomey.

Martin was appointed to the office in September 1992 and won election to the office in November 1994, receiving 60 percent of the vote. He is the first African-American and Re publican district attorney in Suffolk County history.

He is the chief law enforcement officer for Boston, Chelsea, Revere and Winthrop and he oversees an office of 265 people, including 125 prosecutors.

His office is the largest and busiest district attorney's office in New England.

Under Martin's tenure, the district attomey's office has formed numerous crime-fighting partnerships with local, state and federal law enforcement agencies. Projects such as the Safe Neighborhood Initiative and the Community-Based Juvenile Justice Program have been praised by President Clinton, Attomey General Reno and many national news publications.

In 1993, Martin was one of the first to assist in creating the state's initial Safe Neighborhood Initiative (SNI) in Dorchester and has since formed SNIs in East Boston and Chelsea. In 1996, reported crimes dropped by more than 20 percent in each SNI.

In the fall of 1994, Martin set up the Commu-nity-Based Juvenile Justice Program and the Juvenile Priority Prosecution Program, which gather officials from the D.A.'s office, police, school, and probation departments, the state Department of Youth Services and other agencies to prioritize the prosecution of juvenile offenders and obtain services for troubled youth. The program is in place in various high and middle schools in Boston, Chelsea and Revere.

In 1993, Martin began work on the Children's Advocacy Center (CAC) of Suffolk County, a multiagency project designed to help children who are crime victims or witnesses. The CAC, the first project of its type in New England,

is expected to open its doors later this year.
Martin has emphasized several themes since becoming District Attomey. He has prioritized efforts to protect battered women and abused children. He reorganized the Child Abuse Unit and quickly eliminated a backlog of more than 500 cases. In 1996. Martin created the state's first superior court Domestic Violence Unit to coordinate the prosecution of domestic violence cases involving aggravated offenses and repeat offenders.
Martin has also been active in pursuing law enforcement issues in the Mass. Legislature. In January 1996, Gov. Weld signed a bill written by Martin filed by him and former state Rep. Jim Brett that targets gun use among juveniles. The new law, known
as the Juvenile Bartley-Fox Act, sets a six-month mandatory sentence in a juvenile facility for juveniles caught with guns. He was among the core group of legislators and law enforcement officials who created the 1996 legislation that reformed the state's juvenile justice system.
In his most recent leg. islative action, Martin wrote and filed a bill that would add an automobile insurance surcharge to any one convicted of possessing drugs while in their vehicle.
Martin served as an Assistant District Attomey in Middlesex County from 1983 to 1985, and as an Assistant United States Attorney in Boston from 1985 to 1992 . He prosecuted major heroin and cocaine cases and specialized in complex white collar
crime cases. These includ ed bank fraud and embezzlement, investment fraud and fraud against the federal government.

Martin is the son of a former New York City police officer. A graduate of Brandeis University and Northeastern University School of Law, he lives in Jamaica Plain with his wife, Dr. Deborah Scott, and their three children.

At the conclusion of the formal ceremonies, a wreath will be placed at the base of the statue of Col William Prescott on the Monument grounds.

Conway and the committee extend a warm welcome to all residents, organizations from within and outside the community to join with them on the morning of the 17th of June - the 223rd anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill, at both the Ecumenical Services at St. Francis de Sales Church at 9 a.m. and the Patriotic Exercises at the Monument at $10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$.

With the cooperation and attendance of all, these commemorative exercises will truly be a fitting tribute o our fallen heroes of Bunker Hill.

Father Patrick F. Healy, O. M. I. Bunker Hill Day in Charlestown was always more important and bigger to Townies than the Fourth of July. Growing up in Charlestown in the Thirties was special. It was before the American Diaspora occasioned by World War II.

Charlestown was an insular, closeknit community. Each side of Monument Square had its coterie of entrepreneurs. They began at age six and continued until fourteen or fifteen. These enterprising youngsters boarded the Grey Line sightseeing buses and mesmerized the tourists with their narration of the History of Bunker Hill.

Their spiel was given in an oratorical style that even Daniel Webster would envy. There were a few inaccuracies here and there, but overall, the audience went away with a deeper knowledge and awe of what transpired on this spot 17 June 1775.

These junior Townies included statistics such as, "This monument stands 221 feet high, it has 294 winding stairs and no elevator. The only way up is to climb up. The shortest way down is to fall down. The granite in this monument was taken from quarries in Quincy, Mass., and was brought here on the first horse-drawn railway in the United States. This is not Bunker Hill. Bunker Hill lies a quarter of a mile in that direction (dramatic gesture with forearm). This is Breed's Hill. There were three attempts by the Red Coats to take the hill. The first two were repulsed. The

third drove the Patriots from the hill because they ran out of ammunition. Colonel William Prescott gave the order 'Hold your fire. Do not fire till you see the whites of their eyes. Aim low and pick off the officers first.' Doctor Joseph Warren was killed in the battle." The youthful orators then passed among the buses and received donations from the visitors to Bunker Hill.

There haven't been any amateur orators narrating the story of 17 June 1775 until this year when, on June 17th, students from the C.R. Edwards Middle School will recite this traditional story of the Battle of Bunker Hill, at the Commemorative Service on the Monument grounds.
In recent years there have been bro-

hures and Park Rangers to guide and form the visitors. They present the fol,wing facts. The British Generals in ioston were Gage, Clinton, Howe and argoyne. The Patriots were led by Genral Putnam, Colonel William Prescott nd General Joseph Warren, MD. The hoice of Breed's Hill was a poor one milarily. Four British battleships stood off1ore, the Lively, Glasgow, Symmetry and alcon. In addition to these ships with leir heavy ordinance and crews, General lowe had 2,250 Infantry and Artillery. efore the assault, Howe ordered the urning of Charlestown. The Red Coats, - Hessian Infantry, were not English but erman mercenaries who were recruited om the German state of Hesse which icludes Frankfurt and Wiesbaden.

Headquarters for the Patriots was in Cambridge. Nine regiments had been sent to Bunker Hill, but only five arrived. There were many deserters among the ranks. A large number marched as far as the Neck, but refused to go any further They played no part in the battle. The casualty list is as follows:

General Burgoyne said of the retreat, "It was covered with bravery and military skill."
There were many immigrants and children of immigrants who fought at Bunker Hill and in the Revolution. It is interesting to the writer that there were five "Healys" involved in the Revolution and three took part in the Battle of Bunker Hill. They were all born of Irish immigrant parents. Despite the large number of Irish soldiers who fought in the Revolution, there was still prejudice and bigotry leveled at the Irish and Catholics in Charlestown and Boston into the late 1800s.

The men who fought at Bunker Hill were men of courage, patriotism, loyalty and ideals. One-hundred and forty men believed in the cause so deeply that they died for it. From their vision, sacrifice and ideals, there merged a nation far greater than they ever imagined. If we are to protect this nation and our way of life, we too must be men and women of courage, patriotism, loyalty and ideals.

The Step Program Offered At Bunker Hill Community College

Bunker Hill Community College (BHCC) will provide free training to recipients of Transitional Aid to Families with Dependent Children (TAFDC). The STEP Program, also known as the Successful Transition to Employment Program, is an eight-week course providing free training as a security officer. The program is supported through a grant from the Mass. Department of Transitional Assistance.
The STEP Program will begin on July 13 and run through Sept 4. Classes will take place at BHCC's Charlestown Campus, 250 New Rutherford Ave, Monday through Thursday, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. During training, students will have an op-
portunity to work as interms for some of Boston's most established employers. Upon completion of the program, students are provided with job placement assistance. ## An Open Letter From JOHN O'CONNOR <br> To The People Of Charlestown On The Mystic Power Plant

Dear Friends,
Like many of you, I am deeply concerned by the presence of a polluter in our midst.
Thanks to loopholes in laws made by people who don't have to live with the consequences, the Mystic Power Plant, one of the five dirtiest power plants in the state, continues to threaten our health.
When an orange-brown haze visible across Boston oozed out of the plant last summer, there was little doubt as to the identity of the culprits. Plant officials have chosen to save money by using cheap, low-grade oil and can get away with it because the plant is exempt from current emissions standards. Thanks to this loophole the Mystic Plant is free to produce the same level of pollution as 50,000 cars and add to soaring asthma rates, especially among low-income households.
I demand that our elected officials and the plant's owners, New York-based Sithe Energies, Inc., take immediate action on the following points: Switch to Natural Gas
The plant must stop burning cheap oil and switch to natural gas, a much cleaner technology.
Limit Energy Production
Sithe must put a cap on the level of energy produced at the plant.
Respect Local Democracy
Officials must implement a Good Neighbor Agreement to ensure good faith bargaining with residents impacted by the plant. Residents must be given veto power and plant workers must be protected.
Repeal Deregulation Law
The problems at the plant would not have arisen had a more consumerfriendly deregulation bill been enacted which puts more money back into families' pockets.

Together we can protect our environment and safeguard our communities.

Officially, Bunker Hill Day doesn' really get celebrated in Boston and Suffolk County until Wednesday, June 17 , the actual date of the holiday. The annual parade was once held on the 17th of June, no matter the day of the week, but now it is held on the Sunday prior to the 17 th to allow more folks the chance of either watching or marching in this annual communal rite.
Over the years I have watched - God knows - how many parades. I may not have grown up in Town, but my mother did and her Townie roots brought us back yearly to renew her neighborhood ties. She grew up near the Mary Colbert Apartments back when it was the Harvard School. I can remember back in the ' 50 s attending many a house party and meeting my mother's old friends from her childhood.
Little did I know then that eventually Ma would convince my father to returm to the old sod of Charlestown in 1968. Charlestown had changed and continues to change. Old families have either died out or moved away. My parents are gone. All my Irish uncles are also gone. Often as I drive across the Gilmore, or Prison Point Bridge as I still call it, I can remember my uncle Jim's potato shed. I swear that I can still smell the smoke from the terrible fire at the sheds back in 1964 that filled the skies over Charlestown.

My mother was a Townie. She was
bom, raised, educated and spent most of her life in St. Mary's parish. She was baptized there in 1909 and buried there in 1992. I'm not a Townie and never will be, but I was handed respect for this community as a child and I be came a part of it for nearly 12 years as a young adult. I enjoyed my Charles town years and though I have lived on the South Shore since 1984, a part of me will always remain back in Char lestown.

My thoughts on Charlestown return especially around this time in June because of the parade. As a child, 1 remember lining up across the street from Station 15 in City Square. The square looks totally different today but the old police station building is still there. As I look at it I can still see the spot where I once stood, watching the pols and clowns, bands and soldiers march by. I remember James Michael Curley riding in that old black Caddy. I remember the cheers he received. Back then, Curley was up there with Pope Pious XII and Ike.
Usually when I think of Bunker Hill Day and Charlestown, I think of my mother and her Charlestown chutzpah. I remember her chasing after her father one Bunker Hill Day. Grandpa tried unsuccessfully to elude her by ducking into a City Square watering hole, but he lost the battle. The sign may have said "no women allowed," but signs couldn't stop Ma.

She was as spunky as they came just like Grandpa Harrington was.
My best memory on Bunker Hil Day was back in 1981 when I marched with the Peoples Firehouse Committee that had successfully forced the city to reactivate Engine 50 at the Winthrop Street Firehouse. It was bright and sunny and people were cheering the contingent of the neighborhood folks who fought the city and won.

My scariest memory was back, I think, in 1953, while watching the parade in, of course, City Square, eating my free Hoodsie the cops would pass out at Station 15. As I stood there excited, a clown came out of nowhere, picked me up and started acting clownish. I almost hyperventilated right there. My mother didn't think anything was funny and gave that clown a few words in Charlestown speak.
It's so hard to block out Charlestown. There isn't a sunblock made that can do it. I still get back as often as I can. I still keep up old friendships. I still stick my nose into Charlestown issues. Charlestown, after all, isn't just a piece of real estate, it's a state of mind. You can travel a thousand miles or move to Quincy and never leave it. I'll be here this year I'll always show up. As the old town seal states, "A Trust to be transmitted to Posterity." What more needs to be said, eh???

House Passes Expansion Of 'Good Samaritan Law'

State Rep. Eugene L O'Flaherty announced that the House has passed legislation to expand the current "Good Samaritan Law" to include semi-automatic and automatic heart defibrillators. The bill, filed on behalf of the American Heart Association, gamered immediate support from 35 members of the Legislature, the American Red Cross of Mass. Bay, Boston Emergency Medical Services, and others.

According to O'Flaherty, Senate Bill 2164 , called "An Act Relative to Cardiopulmonary Resuscita-tion/Semi- or Automatic-

External Defibrillation," expands the "Good Samaritan Law" to protect people performing cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and using those types of defibrillator devices to save lives. The legislation also amends existing liability protection to police, firefighters and emergency personnel who use defibrillation devices in the course of their regular duties.

Semi-automatic and automatic extemal defibrillator devices, or AEDs are used to revive a person who has suffered cardiac arrest. AEDs are small, portable, easy to use and contain sev-
eral built-in safety devices preventing premature discharge. The American Heart Association estimates that some 350,000 people suffer from sudden cardiac arrest every year.
"Getting faster access to these machines is critical," said O'Flaherty. "The experts have told us a person's chances of survival drops 10 percent each minute after a sudden cardiac arrest. This really is a life-or-death issue."

The bill was moved back to the Senate for enactment before being sent to the Govemor's office for his signature.

The Board of Directors, staff and volunteers of the USS Constitution Museum, congratulate the town of Charlestown on this special occasion. Easter Seals Now Accepting Camp Referrals

The Massachusetts Easter Seal Society is now accepting referrals for its residential summer camp program for youngsters with physical disabilities.
The society will fill 150 openings at Camp Agassiz Village in Maine. Four 10day sessions have been planned for boys and girls with physical disabilities, between the ages of 6 and 14. A trained counseling and nursing staff is designed to provide campers with individual attention. Surroundings are accessible even for campers in wheelchairs.

Camp activities include swimming, archery, arts and crafts, overnight campouts, wheelchair sports and field games. A high counselor-to-camper ratio gives each
camper, no matter how severely disabled the opportunity to participate to the fullest extent of his or her ability.
Because the Easter Seal camping unit is part of a larger camp for able-bodied children, campers with disabilities can participate in activities with able-bodied campers their own age.

Transportation is provided to and from Maine each session. Scholarships are available for all qualifying youngsters.

The society also conducts a program for young adults with physical disabilities, ages 16 to 30 years, at Camp Hemlocks in Conn. For more information, call Easter Seals at 1-800-244-2756, ext. 343.

A two-year effort to commemorate the 150 th anniversary of the Irish Famine culminates on Saturday, June 28, as Bostonians unveil a $\$ 1$ million Irish Famine Memorial along the City's Freedom Trail.

The event, open to the public, takes place from 12:30 to $1: 30$ p.m. at the comer of Washington and School streets, near Downtown Crossing. Ireland's Minister of State Seamus Brennan, TD, will represent the Irish government, and will be joined by local officials and Irish-American leaders, including Thomas J. Flatley, chairman of the Famine Memorial Committee.

Twin sculptures by artist Robert Shure portray an anguished, starving family on the shores of Ireland,
and another more hopeful family landing in Boston.

The statues depict the odyssey of the Irish immigrant from tragedy to triumph over the past century and a half. Organizers hope the memorial will symbolize the plight of all immigrants, especially newcomers who face similar adversities today.

In addition to the sculptures, eight narrative plaques that tell the story of the Irish Famine will also be unveiled, read by representatives of Boston's Irish, Asian, African and Jewish communities
The 45 -member committee consists of Bostonians from all walks of life, including clergy, business leaders, writers, scholars, and representatives of the major Irish-American

The Boston Guide to Youth Services, an annual, comprehensive listing of programs and services for the city's youth, has secured corporate sponsorship for the fourth year in a row, thereby allowing for an improved booklet and a printing of 15,000 copies.

Compiled by Boston Community Centers, the guide serves as a resource for the city's parents and youth, letting them know about the variety of programs and services available to young people in the city.

organizations in New Eng land. In addition to raising the $\$ 1$ million needed to build the 6,000 -square-foot Famine Memorial Park, the committee raised an additional \$1 million to establish a Famine Institute that will work with relief agencies to fight hunger around the world today.
According to Thomas O'Connor, professor of History at Boston College, the Irish Famine, which lasted from 1845 to 1850 ,
had a major impact not only on Ireland, but on Boston, too. During a five-year period, over 100,000 Irish refugees landed in Boston, forever changing the social fabric of the city.

Over 26 percent of Mass. residents claim Irish ancestry, the highest percentage in the United States, according to the 1990 U.S. Census. Boston is often referred to as the capital of Irish America.

United Families Teen Parent Program Is Underway In Charlestown

The United Families Teen Parent Program is a comprehensive home visiting program for first-time teen parents under 20 living in Charlestown, Chelsea, Revere, East Boston and Winthrop. Funded by the Department of Public Health and the Children's Trust Fund, this program gives first-time teen parents the support and education they need.
While many home visiting programs accept only "high risk" families, the United Families Teen Parent Program is open to all teens who meet the age and residency requirements and are either pregnant or have a child under 1 .

The United Families Teen Parent Program focuses on the development of the younger parent, giving them the confidence and skills necessary to be not only strong parents, but also pro-
ductive adults. Each family receives a home visitor who will support the teen through the first three years of their baby's life. The home visitor will develop a personalized service plan with the teen and help them accomplish their goals. Whether the teen wants to go back to school, get their GED, get off welfare or find day care, the United Families Teen Parent Program works with the teen so they can achieve at their fullest potential.
The program's main focus is on parent-child interaction and ensuring that teen parents are knowledgeable about their child's health and development. The program works closely with Mass. General Hospital and its Charlestown HealthCare Center, along with Harbor Area Early Intervention.
The home visitor spends a lot of time educating the new parents
around infant and toddler development, immunizations and child safety. The home visitors regularly review the child's immunization blue books, and maintains regular contact with the child's health care provider.
The United Families Teen Parent Program also offers teen prenatal and parenting support and education groups, which meet weekly and are offered in English and Spanish. These groups are a wonderful way to meet other teen parents and learn about various parenting and adolescence topics. There is transportation and childcare provided during group time.

If you are pregnant for the first time or a new parent, live in Charlestown and are under 20 , then please call Stephanie Cohen at (617) $889-5210$ ext. 213. This is a voluntary and free program.

Stone Honored: Receives City Transportation Award

Stone is the chairman of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council's Central Artery Tunnel Committee. As such, he is the community's lead liaison to the CA/T project. As a neighborhood resident, Stone is concerned with traffic and its impact on the quality of life in Charlestown. As a result, he has worked tirelessly over the years on issues and projects such as the Z Scheme, the Rutherford Avenue Corridor Study and the Austin Street Beautification, and has been a member of the North Area Task Force for many years. ## Mayor Menino Includes 13 Projects <br> For Charlestown In 1999-2004 Capital Plan

Mayor Thomas M. Menino has unveiled the annual budget for the city of Boston which for the first time ever combines the operating and capital budgets into one budget document to promote better fiscal management. Menino's budget calls for $\$ 8$ million in capital spending for 13 differe. projects in Charlestown.
All projects in the capital budge support existing facilities and strategies, and improve the city's overall infrastructure in the future,
Menino said, "This is the first budget of my second term. For the first time ever I have created one unified budget document to improve our accountability and efficiency so we can better serve the people in our neighborhoods. The budget outlines my priorities to continue the success we have seen in my first term by taking the words of my Inauguration and putting them into action. All the money to be spent addresses real life issues that effect Charlestown residents everyday."
In the FY99 budget overall, public education, which received the largest amount of money, remains Menino's budget priority. The money will support the five-year plan, called "A

Focus on Children," now underway in the Boston Public Schools by funding a number of things, including school technology upgrades, the Boston Schoolyards Initiative, tougher curriculum standards, accreditation issues and work to libraries and community centers across the city. Basic services and public safety are Menino's two other main budget priorities.

The plan will upgrade or build city facilities, roadways and other infrastructure. Charlestown will benefit from capital spending on the following projects:

- Charlestown Tennis Court cover for three courts;
- Rehabilitate the Alford Street Bridge;
- Rutherford Avenue play area expansion with new hockey and tennis courts, improved landscaping and passive areas;
- Harvard Mall - new play equipment, curbing and pavement repairs;
- Landscaping improvements to Sullivan Square, including trees and fencing;
-Winthrop Square - repairs to ornamental fencing, granite bases and monument and provide water fountains, benches, flagpoles and bollards,
also create a master plan, new perimeter fence and landscaping as part of a separate project for Winthrop Square;
- Install new Clougherty Pool water treatment system;
- Replace Roof on the Edwards School;
- Improve ballfield at Barry Playground;
- Repairs to Cambridge Street Bridge; and
- Complete Bunker Hill Street reconstruction.
Menino's new initiative, Neighborhood Improvements through Capital Expenditures (NICE) will also use \$2 million in funding for improving city properties identified as in need of repair by community committees to be named.
General Obligation Bonds issued by the city of Boston generate most of the funding behind 613 projects in the plan. Funding from the state and federal governments and the many trust funds administered by the city are also included in funding the projects in the plan.
The city of Boston now has its highest bond rating ever. The rating will save the city millions of dollars in interest payments.

## HOW TO CUT YOUR INCOME

TO QUALIFY FOR TAX BREAKS
Many of the tax breaks from last year's tax law are available only if your adjusted gross income (AGI) is below certain levels. For example, the new child tax credit, the education tax credits and IRA, the student loan interest deduction, the Roth IRA, and the Roth IRA conversion begin to phase out at joint adjusted gross income (AGI) levels ranging from $\$ 60,000$ to $\$ 150,000$, depending on the specific item.

If you expect your 1998 AGI to be close to the limit for a particular tax break, there may be immediate steps you can take to reduce it. If you're an employee, are you contributing the maximum allowed to your $401(\mathrm{k})$ plan? If you're self-employed, consider increasing your contribution to your Keogh or SIMPLE retirement plan. And don't overlook the possibility of making a deductible IRA contribution for you and your spouse. If you're covered by a cafeteria-type benefits plan, use the plan's pretax flexible spending accounts to pay for health and dependent care costs.

To reduce taxable interest and dividend income, consider keeping money in a tax-exempt money market fund instead of a taxable one. Depending on your tax bracket, your after-tax return may be the same but your AGI will be lower. Consider moving savings into Series EEsavings bonds, where tax on the interest is deferred. Or invest in longer-term CDs which pay interest in the next tax year. Use losses in your investment portfolio to offset capital gains, or better still, defer taking gains until next year and use the losses to offset ordinary income ( $\$ 3,000$ per year limit).

There are many ways to reduce 1998 AGI. But remember, the sooner you take action the more impact you will have. Contact our office if you'd like assistance with this and other tax planning strategies.
