## 'Old Charlestown Houses' To Be Featured At Library Program

Often called "The Mother of Boston," owing to its prior settlement, Charlestown lost all her houses to flames following the Battle of Bunker Hill. Not long after, however, stalwarts of the town began the rebuilding that would bring the population to 45,000 by the beginning of the century.

Your guides will be three past presidents of the Charlestown Branch Li-

brary Friends: Mary Kay Donovan, David Donovan and Oren McCleary. David Donovan is a teacher who has restored two Charlestown houses. His wife, Mary Kay, is a real estate agent whose business is Charlestown houses. McCleary is the writer of two documentary films about Charlestown life and a founder and former president of the Charlestown Preservation Society.

The late Rev. Wolcott Cutler was rector of St. John's Episcopal Church on Devens Street from 1924 through 1960. Among his many Charlestown activities, one that gave him special pleasure, was his hobby of taking photographs of the town and its people. In 1959, he presented a bountiful and very valuable gift to the Charlestown Branch Library of his collection of some 1,400 slides of town life. It is from these that the slides for the evening's program are drawn.

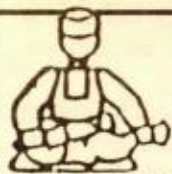

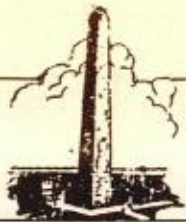

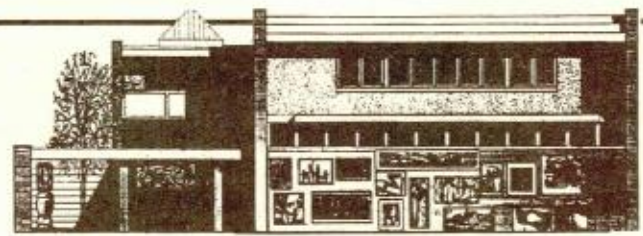
### ★ Impostor Poses As Cablevision Technician . . .

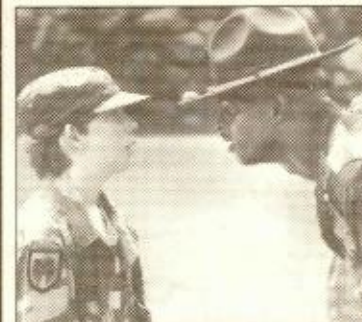

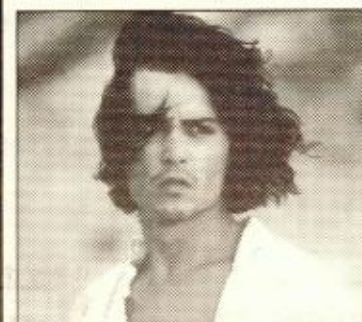

### USS Constitution Museum Welcomes New Executive Director

Burt Logan, a West Point graduate and maritime history expert, will head up the USS Constitution Museum as it sets the stage for "Old Ironsides" Bicentennial.

"The next two years offer us a rare opportunity to ready both the museum and USS Constitution for the future while at the same time we pause to commemorate the ship's illustrious 200-year history," said Logan, who took over on Oct. 2.

The USS Constitution

Museum is in the midst of a three-stage expansion and renovation project timed to celebrate USS Constitution's Bicentennial in 1997. Phase II, which is slated for completion in the spring of 1996, will double the museum's exhibit space with the addition of a newly restored historic building located behind the present museum complex.

## USS Constitution Museum Guests Will Recount Tales Of Fact And Fancy

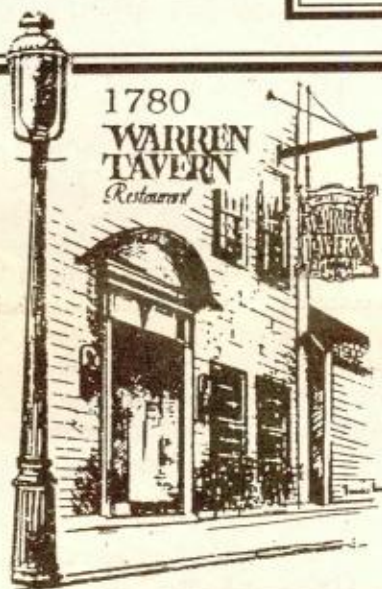

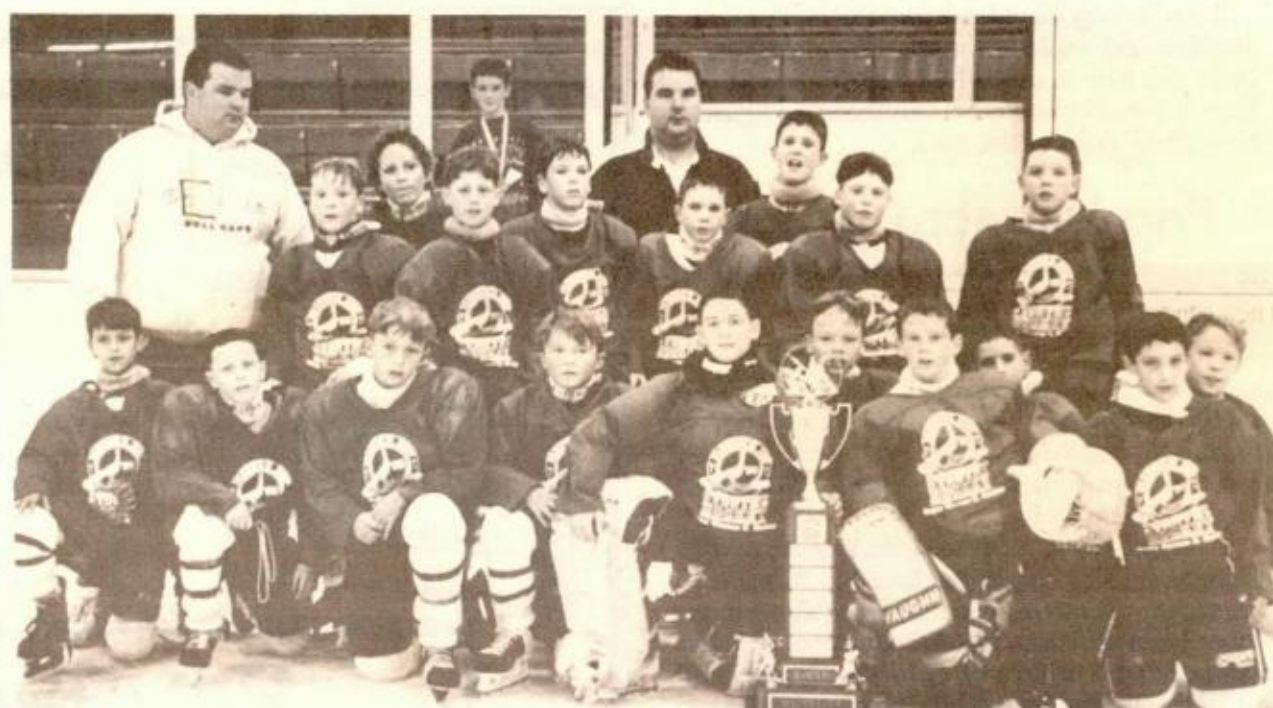

## Massport's Tobin Bridge Concrete Project To Begin In Charlestown Residential Areas

The Massachusetts Port Authority Tobin Bridge Concrete Repair Project is scheduled to begin in the Bunker Hill Housing Development residential area and move toward Lowney Way in Charlestown starting Monday, Oct. 23.

The \$3.5 million, 1 1/2 year contract between Massport and Boston Building and Bridge, general contractor, is underway already in areas not abutting residences. The purpose of the project is to repair deteriorating concrete in the Tobin Bridge uprights to delay possible structural damage in the future.

The concrete piers will first have areas of deteriorating concrete removed by hand-held power chiseling tools and then will be power-washed. Wood forms will then be built around the work sites and new concrete will be poured and allowed to dry within the forms. Once all concrete areas are repaired, they will be covered with a sealant to prevent deterioration.

The staging facility will provide for containment and collection of concrete debris, which will be removed after each day's work. Although existing and new concrete does not contain hazardous materials, Massport is taking environmental precautions to ensure the safety of the travelling public and residential communities where the work is being per-

formed.

All contracts are being performed by local union workers. In order to minimize disruption within the residential communities, the set-up, staging and storage areas will be directly on Massport property near Moran Terminal. Area residents will be informed of the project's specific schedule through flyers.

The 30-pound hand-held tools, self-equipped with air compressors, will be used at a maximum of four tools at one time. The noise levels will be less than 90 decibels, which is less than a jackhammer at 50 feet.

The project will be in operation five days a week, Monday through Friday, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.

The project will necessitate a lane closure on Lowney Way for three weeks, which is estimated to begin the week of Oct. 30. The street will be open to two-way traffic flow. A uniformed police officer will be on site to control traffic and ensure the safety of the public.

### AVOID THE MOST COMMON MUTUAL FUND MISTAKES

If you own mutual funds, you've already taken an important step toward diversifying and managing your investments. To be even more successful as a mutual fund investor, you should also try to avoid some of the most common mistakes.

- Don't automatically buy the hottest funds. If you're considering a mutual fund that has performed exceptionally well during the past few months, take a closer look before you invest. Check out the fund's performance for the past three to five years. If the fund has consistently performed in the top half of its peer group, that's a good sign. But if the fund hasn't been around that long, or it has consistently trailed the pack, its current hot streak may not mean much.

- Don't be too quick to sell. Like most investments, mutual funds go through up and down cycles. If you did your research before you invested, and you were comfortable with your fund when you bought it, don't rush to sell if recent performance has been off. Even the best mutual fund may need 12 to 18 months to get back on track.

- Don't hold on forever. This may seem inconsistent with the advice above, but it's just the other side of the coin. No matter how patient you are, some mutual funds never get back on track. Perhaps there's been a change in top management, or the fund has changed its investment style, or maybe the fund has simply gotten too large.
