### Charlestown Democrats To Caucus On Saturday

Registered Democrats in Charlestown will be holding a caucus on Saturday, March 2, 1996 at 12:15 p.m. to elect delegates to the 1996 Massachusetts Democratic Convention. Doors open at 10 a.m.

Charlestown, Ward 2 will be electing 12 delegates and four alternates, equally divided between men and women, to send to the Convention. The apportioned number of delegates has been allocated on the basis of a formula giving equal weight to

the Democratic Party registration and the average vote for Democratic candidates in the last general elections for Governor and President for which figures were available at the time delegate tabulations were prepared.



Kelly received a Master of Science degree in Business Administration from Lowell Technological Institute in 1974 and was a 1988 graduate of the Industrial College of the Armed Forces, Washington, DC. Kelly served as legislative assistant to the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Kelly's awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal, the Legion of Merit, the Purple Heart, the Meritorious Service Medal with three gold stars, the Navy Commendation Medal with combat V, the Navy Achievement Medal and Combat Action Ribbon.

Kelly is married to the former Linda Ann Crocetti of Haverhill and they are the parents of two children.

### Newest Charter School Recruiting Students

Boston's newest "charter school" - the Academy of the Pacific Rim - will host a meeting for parents of students entering grades 6, 7 and 8 this fall on Thursday, March 7 at 7 p.m. at the Kent Community Center, 50 Bunker Hill St., Charlestown.

Charter schools are tuition-free, state approved public schools that are free to develop their own curriculum and rules of operation. Twenty-five charters are to be awarded throughout the state. Only five of those charter schools will be in Boston, and of those, only two will serve middle school students.

The curriculum of the Academy of the Pacific Rim will emphasize basic

social studies. The school will have a special focus on Pacific Rim cultures and also emphasize discipline and community involvement.

"We'll be old-fashioned in one sense," says one of the founders Robert Guen, a former member of the Boston School Committee, "but in another sense, we'll be the cutting edge using technology and the expertise of our partners, Emerson College, Tufts University and the New England Medical Center, to prepare kids for the job opportunities in the new world economy."

The academy is billing itself as "a more contemporary alternative to Boston's examination schools." It will be located in downtown Boston. School officials are currently negotiating for space.

The school is seeking a diverse student body and is now accepting applications for enrollment. The only requirements for admission to the academy are that students show an interest in this multicultural approach to education and that students and parents sign a contract committing them to participate fully in the life of the school. As with all charter schools, eligible students will be selected by lottery, with preference given to Boston residents.





### Committee Hears Plans For Main Street Bistro

The Basic Services Committee of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council will recommend on March 7 that the council support the upcoming Duckworth Lane Bistro and Wine Bar operating license request from the city with two conditions.

Abutters to the incoming 73-83 Main St. restaurant and committee members agreed at a Feb. 22 public meeting to support the owners' request to transfer the existing license of the now-closed Comella's eatery, providing that scheduled trash pickup be after 9 a.m. in consideration of neighbors and that there be continued

community involvement as the business establishes itself in Charlestown. Neighbors said they are concerned about efficient air-conditioning and ventilation systems based on complaints they had when Comella's occupied the space.

Barbara Russell and David Chase presented their plans for an "interesting neighborhood bistro and wine bar that offers a warm and friendly alternative" to residents and committee members. Charlestown will be the site of the third operation for Russell and Chase, who also own Chanterelle on Newbury Street and Soleil in Harvard Square.

Duckworth Lane will

retain the existing hours of operation as Comella's, from 5 p.m. to midnight every night. The seating area will also remain the same with two small dining rooms and a cafe for 95 people. Russell said noise will be minimal, garbage will be kept indoors until the scheduled pick up and there will be no deep frying or open grilling.

"This will be a glass-ofwine-and-a-bite-to-eat business," Chase said.

The wine bar will feature more than 20 different snacks and light meals ranging from \$4 to \$8. The full-service dining room will accept reservations and offer main courses from \$9 to \$15. There will be neither takeout nor valet-parking services, unless the community would decide that neighborhood impacts could be lessened.

Most abutters said they were excited to have an active business coming to Charlestown. One neighbor, however, said she would personally request that the licensing board close the restaurant at 10:30 p.m. because of noise.

Renovations to the air conditioning and exhaust system are scheduled to begin in April, with Duckworth Lane opening approximately the first week of May. The licensing hearing is expected to be set within the next month.

keep more of your money. · Review your filing status. Joint filing results in the lowest tax for many married couples. However, if one spouse had most of the deduction, sepa-

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rate filing may save money. If you have children under age 13 and you and your spouse work or go to school, find out if you're eligible to claim the credit for qualified child-care

· Carefully check Forms 1099. Make sure that you report income properly, and be careful not to include tax exempt interest on Schedule B. If you claimed the standard deduction in 1994, do not re-

port your 1994 state tax refund as 1995 income. · Don't overlook local and state income taxes. If you itemize, deduct the amount shown on Forms W-2, and estimated payments, and any payments that you sent with your 1994 state return. While auto license fees are not deductible, you should deduct any personal property tax that is included in the cost of your license plates. Check brokerage and mutual fund statements for any foreign taxes paid.

· Consider allocating some of last year's tax preparation fee to business or rental activities, instead of taking an itemized deduction that may be subject to limitation.

 If neither you nor your spouse participates in a pension plan, you could reap significant benefit from an IRA contribution made by April 15, 1996. Self-employed taxpayers can establish and contribute to a SEP-IRA until the due date of your return. Also, you can make a 1995 Keogh contribution in 1996 up to the filing of your 1995 return, as long as the Keogh existed before January 1, 1996.

 If you are self-employed, own rental property, or have high income, consider seeking professional tax guidance. Complicated tax law makes expert help essential!
