Scheme Z Connection To Central Artery Killed

A replacement design scheme has been unanimously endorsed by the Bridge Design Review Committee that ultimately killed the controversial Scheme Z connection to the Central Artery/Tunnel (CA/T) Project from the Central Artery North Area (CANA) roadway construction project at City Square and from Route I-93.

After a year of deliberation, the 42-member committee, consisting of business, environmental and community leaders, voted in favor of Scheme 8.1D. The new design features a 10-lane single deck cablestayed bridge that will carry the I-93 traffic over the Charles River. It will also include a single tunnel connection between Storrow Drive and Route 1.

Secretary of Transportation Richard Taylor stated: "This endorsement is critical to the resolution of the Charles River Crossing. This bridge will be the northern gateway to the city of Boston for generations to come."

"The new design strikes a fine balance between many interests," said Stanley H. Durlacher, assistant Secretary of Transportation and Construction. "It's also more function and aesthetically appealing," he stated.

According to Tom King, a Charlestown resident who was a member of the committee and a spokesman for Citizens for a Livable Charlestown, "the new interchange is a tremendous improvement over Scheme Z.

"The 8.1D plan reduces the bridge crossing over the Charles River by eight highway lanes," he stated, "and 100 feet of bridge width." King also pointed out: "It eliminates most of the loop ramps, leaving those remaining smaller and lower."

King stated that the new scheme will eliminate nearly a million vehicles per week in the City Square area by removing the confusing double crossing movement of Scheme Z.

Other committee members from Charlestown included Richard Johnston and Bill Lamb of the North Area Task Force, and Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services.

The Bridge Design Review Committee will continue to monitor the design as it progresses, and the state Executive Office of Transportation will begin the process of securing approvals.

Boston Transportation
Department Commissioner
Richard Dimino stated:
"The recent vote of the
Bridge Design Review
Committee sends a signal to
the Charles River Crossing
planners that their proposed design is on the right
track and that they should
keep working."

Dimino added: "While 8.1D offers a number of improvements to the Charles River Crossing, there are still outstanding issues that need to be reviewed and resolved. These include the design of the on/off ramp connection on Rutherford Avenue, effects on Beacon Hill and concerns raised by the Massachusetts General Hospital."

He concluded: "The city plans to continue to work to represent Charlestown as well as other areas affected by the Charles River Crossing. We'll make every effort to ensure that all issues are resolved before it goes forward."

Stephen Collins, community liaison for the CA/T project, stated that the Massachusetts Department of





State Seeks To Return \$50 Million In Unclaimed Funds

State Treasurer Joe Malone has released the names of over 31,000 individuals and businesses that are due more than \$50 million from abandoned accounts.

Under the State's Unclaimed Money Law, bank accounts, insurance proceeds, payroll checks, stock certificates and the like that have been inactive for at least five years are deemed abandoned. All such accounts must be reported to the Treasury, which then attempts to notify the rightful owners or legal heirs.

"Currently, there are over \$50 million in unclaimed accounts. We will make every effort, using every means at our disposal, to make sure that this money is returned. This money belongs to these people and I want them to have it," said Malone.

The Treasurer noted one important aspect of the Unclaimed Money Law which requires that until claimed, all funds are kept in the

State's General Fund where they are invested for the benefit of all residents and taxpayers here in Massachusetts.



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



Commissioner Roache Pledges Support To Families Of Murder Victims

On a recent Sunday evening, Boston Police Commissioner Francis "Mickey" Roache, accompanied by Deputy Superintendent Robert Hayden and Lt. Herb Nolan of Area A, came to Charlestown to speak with families and friends of murder victims. The police officials brought a message of hope to these men, women and young people who gather weekly under the name of CH-A-M-P - Charlestown After Murder Program.

CH-A-M-P, which meets on Sunday nights at St. Catherine's lower rectory to offer support to the families and friends affected by the murder of someone close, has been working on issues that members believe led to many of the murders in this community.

As one participant stated, residents feel Charlestown is the forgotten community and she was glad to see the lines of communication opened with the police.

Roache told the gathering that he came to Charlestown particularly because he was impressed with the efforts of Sandy King and Pam Enos. He noted that he would never know the pain that a mother goes through following the loss of her child, and he could only offer support.

Public safety is what brought him to Charlestown, stated Roache. He said he knew the group's concern about drugs, alcohol and the people walking the streets who have committed murder and are not incarcerated or even arres-

Roache sympathized with the frustration of the group regarding the unsolved murders in the community. One resident pointed out that witnesses frequently suffer a loss of memory and the murderer walks the streets free. Roache added that he thought a way could be found to get to a murder scene quickly before people get scared and witnesses disappear.

Hayden said that representatives of CH-A-M-P should hold regular meetings with himself and a liaison named by him to respond to the people of Charlestown. He stated that this liaison would route calls from members to the proper person so that problems could be addressed immediately. Havden later named Community Service Officer Joe McNulty as the liaison.

One issue that has been of concern to CH-A-M-P participants is the failure of the police to arrest persons on outstanding warrants. It was expressed at the meeting that if individuals had been arrested on warrants, they might not have been on the streets to carry out other crimes.

Hayden said that he would set up a system where the officers assigned to the area get a list of people who are troublemakers, dealing drugs, involved with housebreaks, etc. He added: "If there is a warrant on him, he will be arrested."

McNulty later reported that each sector car has a list of individuals with outstanding warrants who reside in the area. There is a concentrated effort by the officers to arrest such individuals and by assigning officers to the same area on a regular basis, they will become familiar with these persons.

Hayden also advised the group to monitor court action on these warrants, adding that they should let the court know they are concerned.

Another area of concern involves public drinking. Several of those in attendance pointed out that problems resulting from drinking occur regularly in certain areas - and violent crimes seem to stem from

drug and alcohol use. Havden asked that a list of areas that residents perceive as trouble spots be submitted

Hayden said that the officers will note what street corners need more attention. He stressed that the police don't want to hassle good kids, the objective is to make the area safer. He said police will go to corners where there is drinking and where drugs are being sold, and they will go in with motorcycles and by other means.

According to Hayden, Nolan is starting up a small anti-gang squad. He said that officers will write down the names of young people who are gathering, adding that it will be difficult for the officers to separate the good kids from the bad at first. He did caution that persons drinking or doing drugs will be arrested and there will be no warning.

Nolan added that the police saturated the area for two- to three-hours a night last summer, but they are not going to wait until summer, they would begin immediately. He noted that persons have to know that no drinking will be allowed in public. Residents have reported that units have been visible in the town on a regular basis since the beginning of the month.

Residents were also advised that if they see public drinking, they should call police to report it and if the problem isn't resolved in a reasonable time, they should call again.

Hayden added that if police identified the 10 worst corners and continued making arrests, those people wouldn't be out shooting at midnight. He added that he could provide a visible police presence and respond to concerns.







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USS Constitution Museum Offers Unusual Apprenticeship Program For Youth

As tuition costs continue to rise and the recession drags on, more and more businesses and organizations have begun to implement in-house systems to help would-be college students learn a vocation.

These apprenticeship programs are gaining popularity because they give students a chance to learn a marketable skill and get paid at the same time.

The USS Constitution Museum in Charlestown, in keeping with this trend, has begun a one-of-a-kind apprenticeship program which teaches young students the "forgotten crafts" of the early 1800s.

Upon graduation in August 1992, the first group of apprentices will have learned woodworking, the use of power and hand tools from the 19th century, shipbuilding techniques and repair and maintenance tasks performed on USS Constitu-

tion. These students will be

qualified to work in a number of fields including home/furniture repair, stage and museum set building, ship building and the repair of the USS Constitution.

The program is divided into three components. The vocational portion will be the hands-on teaching of 19th and 20th century maritime carpentry skills. The academic portion will explore the days when these trades developed in the Uni-

ted States (the Federal Period 1789-1829). The employment portion provides
students with part- or fulltime jobs. Employment



Voke Claims Victory On Home Care

Jubilantly calling it the "best news home care has heard in a long time," Rep. Richard Voke was very pleased with the 18-member panel that turned down a recommendation to consolidate the state's 27 home care corporations into 20. Voke, who during testimony at the State House called the consolidation plan "inadequate to meet the needs of our elder population," says the decision means home care delivery will continue uninterrupted.

"The panel's review confirms what I have said all along about our system of home care: If it's not broken, don't fix it! Home care has weathered the storm of budget cuts and continues to provide top service to seniors in need. To change the delivery of service, just for the sake of shaking things up, made no sense and could have caused our elders undo heartache," said Voke.

Now that they have succeeded in defeating the consolidation proposal, Voke and his colleagues will be concentrating on ways of expanding service delivery in the areas of home care and other elder services. "We have several bills in the early stages of review at the State House to enhance the programs our seniors are offered. Along with upcoming budget debates, we will focus on these pieces of legislation for adoption," Voke noted.

"Our seniors are our most valuable resource. We owe it to them, therefore, to be as aggressive as possible in supporting the services they need to enjoy life to its fullest," concluded Voke.
