Audi R10 Upstages Return Of Peugeot

LE MANS, FRANCE — The late Steve McQueen would have been proud. The movie actor and sometimes race driver dramatized the annual Le Mans 24 Hour endurance ______ classic in his 1971

fictional movie of

the same name.

This past week in the 76th running of the Sarthe event, the movie script was on display again, only this time it wasn't fiction and the players weren't Porsche or Ferrari, but Audi and Peugeot.

In the end, it was the Audi R10 wheeled by Allan McNish, Tom Kristensen and Rinaldo Capello that ended the twice-around-the-clock grind in victory lane.

Yet, after that it was hard to tell the real storyline from its Hollywood counterpart of so many years ago. The 2008 Le Mans race had been touted as a major showdown between the turbocharged diesels from the two manufacturers, with the Peugeot 908 contingent trying to wrest away the stranglehold Audi has had on the 24 Hour since 2000, initially with the gasoline R8 V-8, and for the previous two editions, its subsequent boosted R10 diesel.

In 2007, the 908 struck fear into its rival in its Le Mans debut, displaying a speed that the R10 brigade couldn't

necessarily match.

However, with that speed came fragility, and in the end, Peugeot was forced to accept second place overall and defeat as overheating and other mechanical issues derailed its march to victory. During this past winter, Peugeot worked to make its cars as reliable as possible while increasing their speed against that of the R10 design. The result has been a string of victories in the European-based Le Mans Series and the experts's pick as the favorite to win Le Mans.

That bet seemed sure after qualifying, following Stephane Sarrazin's pole time of 3:18.513, nearly six seconds better than the Audi of Capello, Kristensen and McNish, the best placed of the R10s at 3:24.105.

Ultimately, all three of the 908s wound up in front of their three R10 counterparts on the grid. With that as a basis, there weren't many putting their money down on the Audis. As far as the majority was concerned, the race would be a French coronation.

Here this weekend, the Peugeot camp had taken care of everything except the weather, and thus, watched the prize they so desperately sought slip away yet again. In this case, it was the very thing that made them so fast when compared to their opposition that did them in: their suspen-

Having found a love for the sport, Edison decided to give sprint-car ownership a try. Now 66 victories later, the ride is among the most coveted in Indiana racing circles.

"I just lost my mind," chuckled Edison of his decision to buy the team. "But really, we've just had so much fun since we bought the team and I think that is part of why we've been successful over the years." With veteran Gary Fisher

behind the wheel in the team's first season, they finished third in the point battle at Kokomo Speedway. What was to come later pleasantly surprised the soft-spoken Edison.

"In the beginning, we put the team together just to run at Kokomo and Gas City," said Edison. "But, in time we kind of branched out and tried some of the local USAC dirt stuff at other tracks as well."

Beginning in 1996 when second-generation driver Mike Mann took control of the car, the victories and track titles began to come in bunches. With Mann, the team captured

It came after an agonizing final few laps made even worse so by Sam Hornish, Jr.'s spin that put the race into green-white-checker overtime.

Concerned that he didn't have enough fuel for the 200 laps, Earnhardt nursed and saved every drop of fuel possible by coasting and running on the bottom of the track.

The moves paid off as Earnhardt held off Kasey Kahne and Matt Kenseth to end a victory drought of two years and 76 races

It was Earnhardt's first Cup victory at MIS and Chevrolet's first at MIS since 2001.



The time of caution periods created the usual fuel-mileage consternation that set up the final-lap histrionics. Earnhardt, running 10th with 15 laps to go, moved to the top spot as cars ahead of him went to pit road for fuel and tires

Earnhardt inherited the lead on lap 196 and was still there when Hornish spun off turn four.

From there to the end, neither Earnhardt nor crew chief Tony Eury, Jr. knew whether the fuel would last to the finish.

"We came in on that last stop (on lap 154) and knew we were six laps short (on fuel)," Earnhardt said. "So I saved six laps (of fuel). I have to hand it to Tony, Jr. for being a risk-taker. Normally, we wouldn't trade the top five for the chance to win, but we did the right thing today.'

For Eury, it was a no-brainer after the last stop "I told Dale if we kept going and were

a lap short, we'd finish 25th," Eury said.

Ex-NASCAR Official Alleges Discrimination In Lawsuit

Former Inspector Cites Racial, Sexual Discrimination, Wrongful Termination

HARRISBURG, N.C. — A former employee of NASCAR is suing the sanctioning body for \$225 million, alleging racial and sexual discrimination among other charges, while NASCAR Chairman Brian France maintains none

> of the incidents NASCAR

cited in the suit were reported. Mauricia Grant, a black technical inspector in the NASCAR Nationwide Series from Jan. 2005

through Oct. 2007 when she was fired, filed suit June 9 in U.S. District Court for the Southern District of New York. The suit lists multiple incidents of alleged sexual harassment and racial discrimination as well as wrongful termination.

Seventeen NASCAR officials, Grant's including superior Nationwide NASCAR Series Director Joe Balash, are named in the suit.

Grant claims she was told she worked on "colored-people time" and was routinely harassed by a fellow official who made Ku Klux Klan references

Among the many occurrences cited in the suit, she alleges that Balash asked Grant: "Does your workout include an urban obstacle course with a flat-screen TV on your back?"

As well, the suit claims Grant was forced to work outside in the sun more frequently than white officials because her supervisors believed she couldn't be sunburned because of her skin color.

The suit claims Grant reported the many instances of harassment to her supervisor, but NASCAR Chairman Brian France, who said NASCAR will investigate the charges, said the company has no record of any reports.

"The fact that it went on as she stated, Ms. Grant, for many months, but never bothered to tell anyone at management what was going on, which is what our policy says, is very disappointing, France said June 10. "We would have liked, if those types of things were in fact going on, we would have loved to have done an investigation and a review of such an allegation. We'll still do that because now she has

France: Investigation Into Claims Ongoing

BROOKLYN, Mich. — On Saturday at Michigan Int'l Speedway, NASCAR Chairman Brian France discussed NASCAR's investigation into the allegations made by former official Mauricia Grant, who filed suit against the sanctioning body last week, alleging racial and sexual discrimination.

The early stages of the investigation led to the suspension of two NASCAR Nationwide Series officials.

"We haven't completed our investigation. It's ongoing," France said. "Obviously, we found violations in our policy. I wouldn't jump to conclusions that all the allegations that were made over many months that the plaintiff has made against us are accurate. I'd be very cautious even if we take action on any official in this investigation. We might discover something entirely different that had nothing to do with the claim and this lawsuit, but still is a violation of our policy. That would get you in trouble with us. They were very detailed. We're bringing in everyone we can find to give us the information of what is going on, so we can be very clear in our findings.

France continues to maintain the sanctioning body knew nothing of the allegations prior to the suit being filed.

"We found out Tuesday via filing of the lawsuit. By Thursday, we were in full inves-tigative mode. We didn't wait a week," he said. "And some of these claims go back two years or longer. Here again, it would be very, very disappointing that was not brought to our attention if these claims actually happened, that they would have been brought to our attention right when they happened so we could have investigated right then and taken any action we needed, and it just didn't happen. She chose to make this about money and about a lawsuit and we'll deal with that. That's the nature of the court system.






A Problem Seeking An Answer *Races From Yesterday Now Sought By Fans*

eeling the pulse of today's race fan, we'd say the interest in and appeal of NASCAR's Car of Tomorrow is fading, and being replaced by a desire for "Races of Yesteryear." More than a few fans say today's NASCAR Sprint Cup races lack appeal and competition. This from those who avidly follow the stock-car sport. They blame drivers inability to handle the new Car of Tomorrow. A recent meeting between NASCAR and contestants on driver complaints on the car produced no report on its outcome. One attendee said the essence of the meeting was, "Shut up and race." What to do? And how to do it? These are the questions seeking meaningful answers.

A kick in the butt for those TV directors on Speed who go to great lengths to create

interesting and informative report pages during races, showing positions, car number, type car, etc., and then take down the page long before the data can be fully read — left to right, top to bottom. Fortunately, the Le Mans TV director avoided this. Hard-core fans watching races

often have a particular interest in a certain car or driver, and when the standings page appears with its wealth of data, it is then taken down long before the data can be absorbed. The same goes for the periodic standings offered during NASCAR races. Let me suggest the TV director read aloud the standings shown to him before taking down the page. We'll be watching TNT closely to see if it has a better understanding of viewer desires than Speed.

Congratulations to Scandinavian standout **Tom Kristensen** for his eighth overall twice-around-the-clock triumph at Le Mans. And bravo to his speedy co-drivers: gray-haired **Rinaldo Capello** of Italy, and the diminutive Limey **Allan McNish**, for wheeling their Audi roadster to victory over the Peugeot coupes in the 24-hour diesel duel. It was Le Mans win number-eight for Audi in the past nine outings on the French circuit. Class wins went to Porsche (in LMP-2); Aston-Martin (GT-1); and Ferrari (GT-2).

The recent unification of competing Indy Car sanctioning bodies resulted in \$1.2 million being raised for Champ Car creditors by the recent auction of its assets in Indianapolis. That money has been turned over to the U.S. bankruptcy court for distribution to creditors of Champ Car, which was in bankruptcy prior to the reunion. The auction, held at Champ Car's head-

quarters on the northwest side of Indianapolis, drew a large crowd, said observers. In addition to office and field equipment, pace cars and trucks were included in items offered at auction.

For years, USAC has stood alone in the U.S. world of autorace sanctioning: no longer. This coming weekend's Knoxville Midget Nationals at Iowa's Knoxville Raceway was a combined USAC, Badger and Southern Midget Racing Series event, paying \$1,650 to win on Friday night and \$3,350 to Saturday night's winner.

Want to finance your race tickets? That's what Homestead-Miami Speedway is proposing for its Nov. 14-16 Ford Championship weekend, offering front-stretch tickets until July 1 for 50-percent down with the balance due no later than Sept. 1.

With indications that NASCAR is against issuing a Sprint Cup date to Kentucky Speedway, recently optioned by Speedway Motorsports headman **Bruton Smith**, one wonders if he will back out of that purchase, which is supposed to close in the third

nited States Auto Club midget racing returned to the area recently with events at Illiana Motor Speedway in Schererville, Ind., and at Rockford (Ill.) Speedway. On May 28, three divi-sions of USAC midgets visited Illiana with Regional, Ford Focus and Kenyon classes seeing action. The event was also

to be the debut of USAC's new Regional Pavement Sprint Car Series, but only three cars showed for the scheduled inaugural event, which forced officials to cancel the division's races.

Auston Harris, along with Brian Olson and Dillon Welch, were feature winners during Illiana's Open Wheel Extravaganza. Harris was the winner of the 30-lap Ford Focus Midget Car Series main event, which was held on Illiana's quarter-mile paved oval. Harris, a 17-year-old Hayward, Calif., resident, became the first African-American to win a feature race in the history of the USAC organization, which has sanctioned thousands of races since its inception in 1956.

"It's an amazing opportunity to get to drive for Bob East," said Harris after his victory and only second time in a midget. "My guys couldn't have given me a better car. They worked on it all night. It was probably the

best race of my career. "It's a big honor," added Harris about being the first African-American winner in the annals of USAC. "It's kind of hard to say what it feel likes right now about being the first African-American to win.³

Olson was the winner of the USAC Regional Midget Car Series main event, co-sanctioned by the United Midget Auto Ass'n, holding off the challenges of Bobby East throughout the 30-lap event on Illiana's half-mile paved oval. Welch was awarded first place for the USAC Kenyon Midget Car Series 30 lapper on the Illiana quarter after apparent winner, 13-year-old Dalton Armstrong was disqualified follow-

first USAC midget feature held at Illiana with the Tinley Park Express, winning a 50 lapper on the then-dirt Illiana oval on Sept. 4, 1957.

Built for midget racing and holding its first event in 1948, the high-banked Rockford speed plant saw USAC midget racing return on May 18 with Olson, the Washington-state racer, winning the 50-lap USAC Mopar National Championship feature race. It was Olson's first "national" USAC win.

Olson guided his Esslinger Ford-powered Beast chassis midget to the victory. A fabricator at Beast, Olson has won a number of "regional" midget headliners during his career, including the UMARA-sanctioned Illinois State Midget Championship race at Grundy County Speedway in Morris in 2006. The paved Grundy oval was the scene of a hard crash for Olson last year, with Olson suffering a broken arm.

The quarter-mile paved Rockford oval hosted a USAC midget event for the first time since 1979 when Rich Vogler, an Illinois native, nailed down a USAC midget win on Aug. 29 of that year.

HARRISBURG, N.C. any moons ago, one of the first races we covered for National Speed Sport *News* was an ÂRCA RE/MAX Series event at Pocono Raceway. It was won by Bob Keselowski.

A journeyman veteran, who drove cars prepared by his brother Ron, Keselowski was an ARCA kingpin in the 1980s and

early '90s. Racing often on a smaller budget than the competition, Bob Keselowski won 24 ARCA events and 26 poles. He was the series champion in 1989.

During the final years of his racing career, he competed in the NASCAR Craftsman Truck Series and won once in that series.

Now, his sons are racing. Both Brian and Brad Keselowski had struggled, racing with underfunded teams until Brad landed with Dale Earnhardt, Jr.'s NASCAR Nationwide Series team last year. He's been a contender all year, and earned his first series victory at Nashville (Tenn.) Superspeedway.

With his parents, Bob and Kay on hand, Brad brought another highlight to one of racing's great families.

It was interesting watching Kyle Petty and Wally Dallenbach drive Petty Driving Experience cars alongside each other while explaining the intricacies of Pocono Raceway during the TNT coverage of the Sprint Cup event there. But, we couldn't help but wonder if Petty got claustrophobic being so close to another car.

But despite his speed on the track, Petty is the best analyst — by far — working NASCAR racing today.

■ Isn't it interesting that so many nations voting on Max Mosley's fate as president of the Federation Internationale de' l'Autombile, found nothing wrong with his behavior, yet FIA officials sanctioning the Canadian Grand Prix said it would investigate the accident by

events. Looks like they are asking for trouble to me. Was Hamilton going too fast for the con-ditions, yes, but did he intentionally hit Raikkonen? To me it appeared to be a driver who made a mistake attempting to avoid pending doom and Raikkonen was a victim of circumstances

■ It has been unfortunate that the last two IndyCar Series events have ended under the yellow flag, but it is certainly not time for a knee-jerk reaction that will lead to another crazy green-white-checkered finish rule.

While we do agree the fans should see a race end under the green flag, it seems nearly every NASCAR race ends in a green-white-checkered shootout. Yellow flags and restarts just lead to more crashing.

And overall, the IRL has had very few yellowflag finishes through its history. Yellow flag finishes are just part of racing. Nobody complains when a race is called early because of rain. Can't control that either.

■ Since the weather has gotten hot, so has two-time defending World of Outlaws champion Donny Schatz. Schatz started off the season a little slow, but had a streak of five victories in six races and had regained the series point lead from Jason Meyers, who has for the most part managed to keep pace with Schatz in the standings. Craig Dollansky won consecutive races this

ust a bit more than 50 years ago, Freeport Stadium opened its doors for the 1958 season. Even though I was only 13, I already was a six-year veteran fan. Freeport's agonizingly long seven-month off season had finally ended. My family and I took our familiar seats near starter Mvke Collins

The pits were full of non-Fords and novices ready for the first night of racing. With the first belch from promoter/announcer Duke Donaldson on the P.A., the season kicked off with the first non-Ford heat.

The 12 lapper was won by Freddie Stutz in his Hudson coupe. Fred always had to be different.


Now, it's 50 years later. Freeport is gone. All of its officials and many of the drivers have passed on. I'm the only one left in my family. The last

thing I would have thought of that night was the guy who won that first heat, would drive his last race, 50 years hence.

Freddie Stutz was never a star at Freeport. He did win some features and in 1961 set the modified 12-lap heat record. Things soon changed. A host of stock-car drivers began racing three-quarter midgets. Fred was one of them, driving Maxie Cohen's sometimes-cranky Triumph. They were a good team. Maxie never smiled and Freddie always was

cheerful. Indoor racing was big then. In 1963. Freddie "bearcatted" his way to the opener at Island Garden. It was the first race I covered for this paper.

Freddy continued to race TQs for vears. They had a neat little tenthmile track in Pine Brook, N.J. Freddie was a long-time favorite

there. Then the roof fell in. Pine Brook shut down and the ATQMRA nearly folded. There was nowhere to race

Freddie decided to pull up stakes and retired to Florida. He didn't stay idle too long. Fred got the good news that Charlotte Motorsport Park, near Orlando, featured TQs. Some transplanted northerners like Jack Duffy

were racing there. Fred got himself a TQ and raced there every week. It

was a four-hour tow each way. I discovered via Christmas cards that Fred lived just a couple of miles from my brother. I paid him a visit one year. I expected a somewhat older version of Freddie. He had hardly changed a bit. With his high energy, he gave me a grand tour of his place and beamingly showed off his race car.

He jokingly said he had so many major organs removed, he had few parts left. This didn't stop him. He raced every week. Every year he'd give me a progress report.

A few years ago, with no nearby track to practice on, Fred took his TQ to the streets. He had a crash and broke his neck. What would most guys in their 70s do after a wreck like that? Well. Freddie rebuilt the car

and raced again.

Last month, while running hot laps, his throttle jammed and Fred hit the wall hard. It was a bad one. His many injuries required surgery Unfortunately, he went into a coma and the doctors told his son, Jay, he'd

never recover. Jay had to make the ultimate tough decision. We all say we love racing, but com-

pared to Fred Stutz, we are all pretenders. Fred was 79 years old and wherever he is, he's either joking or bragging about probably being the oldest to die in a race car. Like anybody who ever knew him,

I'll miss him a lot.



It allowed him to control the start and the many restarts and, more importantly, to be in front of a multi-car accident on lap four that sent four cars flipping through turn one. The cars of Dave Darland. Brady Short, Darren Hagen and Mike Brecht were eliminated for the evening

No one was seriously injured, but Short was transported to the hospital in Coldwater, Ohio, for observation.

Hines varied his technique for each restart, keeping his oppo nents guessing on when he would start the race. On one, he jumped on the throttle midway through the third and fourth turns and on another he brought the field almost to the front straight before standing on the gas.

Hockett closed up on Hines late in the feature, but the leader found the horsepower necessary to pull away in the final laps. Hockett finished second. Chad Boat, Damion Gardner and Daron Clayton rounded out the top five.

With an eighth-place finish at Eldora and a second at Winchester Thursday, Cole Whitt won the USAC Border Wars championship. The 16 year old also leads the USAC standings

WINCHESTER, Ind. Darren perfect Hagen remained at Winchester Speedway this year, passing teammate Cole Whitt with a slide job on a restart and pulling away to

win the 30-night Thursday Night **USAC SPRINTS** Thunder feature at the half-mile

asphalt oval.

"I had faith in it (the car) to stick on that slide job," said Hagen, who has won both USAC National Sprint Car Series events at Winchester this season. "It was a little crazy but my teammate gave me enough room." Hagen praised his teammate.

"He is a heck of a race-car driver," said Hagen. "...I have learned stuff from him this year already and he has learned stuff from me. We drive a lot alike. We are on the gas. We try to get it done. It is a great opportunity to be his teammate.

Hagen, who chased the USAC points championships the last couple of years, told his crew when the season began he wanted to only chase victories

"If we win a championship, we win a championship," said Hagen. "Right now, I just want to win races and have that feeling of winning more and more.'

Whatever the case. Hagen has Winchester Speedway figured out. Part of that help came from NASCAR driver Ryan Newman, himself a good racer on the high banks. When Hagen first moved to the Midwest, he sought Newman's advice. "He told me to drive it up the hill,

turn it and drive it back down the hill," said Hagen. "If you do that, you will be fine. If you don't do that, you will be hanging on your whole life."

Part of Hagen's race strategy was to lav back and let others wear out their tires and equipment. When the race was halted for an accident and only nine laps remained, he decided it was time to make his move.

Whitt inherited the lead after USAC officials did not allow early leader Brian Gerster to restart following a red flag for an accident because he had oil leaking from his car's rear end

Whitt conceded he may have added a little to his tire-wear problem battling to pass Gerster, but noted also his car was loose throughout the race.

"I think that may have wore it out a little bit," said Whitt. "But as soon as it started getting loose, it just started getting worse and worse each lap. We were happy to hang on for second. Anything we can do to bring the team home one-two'

It was also the fourth-straight victory for the Kunz Motorsports team at Winchester.

The race was halted on the 22nd lap when Jacob Wilson and Tracy Hines got together on the frontstretch as they battled for fourth, causing Hines to flip his Tony Stewart Racing entry upside-down. He slid though the first turn with sparks flying and came to rest at the bottom of the track. The accident eliminated several cars, including Hines, Wilson, Damion Gardner, Dakoda Armstrong, Aaron Pierce and Brady Bacon.



The Merry Mailman Made A Killing Driving 'Old Bess'

By Gary London

Bruno Brackey was a legend in Long Island stock-car racing. Known as "The Merry Mailman," Brackey won tons of races with savvy and great driving.

In 1956, Freeport Stadium promoter Jake Kedenburg decided to add a third division, stock sedans, to give his drivers more work. Freeport ran three nights a week. Sedans shared Tuesdays and Fridays with the modifieds.

Brackey built a decidedly ugly '37 Ford sedan for the new class. He won the first five features of the season and the track title. In 1957, he set a new Freeport standard, winning eight races in a row with the black car with a whitewashed No. 71 called "Old Bess."

He was champion in 1958-59-60 with the car. In 1961, it started to show its age and Eddie Brunnhoelzl won the point title that year. In the season's penultimate race, a bad crash saw ole No. 71 tore up when it was hit by young driver Manny DeSane. Brackey patched it up and won the season finale.

DeSane felt bad that he wrecked his idol's prize car, so he gifted Brackey with a showroom-looking '37 Ford sedan. Brackey spent that winter building the new car. The original black paint was so good that he didn't even have to repaint it, and black was his signature color. No new parts went on the car. Old parts lying in his garage were used.

The new car debuted, and that June, Brackey turned in one of his grittiest driving jobs. In six years, only three times had a driver won both the modified and sedan features the same night. Brackey did it both times.

On this night, he won his sedan heat and swept the modified portion of the program in Johnny Hertle's No 50. Before he stepped into the sedan for the feature, he asked if anyone had ever clean swept both divisions in one night. Brackey was told that it had never been done. This gave him an extra incentive.

Taking the lead quickly, Brackey soon had his biggest rival, Les Ley, right behind him. On the sixth lap, the hood on Brackey's sedan flew open. For the last 19 laps, the tough little Brackey kept his flathead ahead of Ley's T-Bird powered '55 Ford with Ley banging him all the way.


Brackey also ran the car at Weissglass Speedway. In 1964, he realized winning with a Flathead wasn't possible and dumped a 312 Ford in it. He won 14 features that year.

He continued to campaign the car and win with it for many years. In 1974, Freeport went under the NASCAR banner and the old sedan was finally outclassed.

The car is still intact and race ready if there was a race suitable for it. It's a museum piece — 46 years after being a gift, the No. 71 holds a respected place in stock-car history.

BUCK BAKER

Buck Baker died in 2002 at age 83. Prior to his death, the South Carolina native's life was

fully devoted to stock-car racing. Baker ran his first race in 1939 and was one of NASCAR's founding drivers in 1949. He went on to score 46 victories in NASCAR's senior circuit (now Sprint Cup) and won the cham-

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and 1957. Later, Baker's two sons, Buddy and Randy, raced in NASCAR, with Buddy also becoming a frequent winner.

Born Elzie Wylie Baker, Sr., Baker made 682 NASCAR starts, with 372 top-10 finishes and 45 poles. He later created the Buck Baker Driving School, which helped train numerous drivers, including Jeff Gordon. He was named to NASCAR's 50 Greatest Drivers list in 1998 and was inducted into the Motorsports Hall of

Fame of America the same year. Creasy & Lagana Burn Up Maryland Strip

BUDDS CREEK, Md. – Last season, Funny Car driver Dale Creasy, Jr. was a regular visitor to the winner's circle at IHRA Nitro Jam events, winning six times and easily cruising to his second-consecutive world title.

This season, things have not come quite as easily for the Beecher, Ill., resident. Through three national events heading into the President's Cup Nationals, Creasy failed to find his way into the winner's circle. That all changed when he knocked off Todd Simpson in the final round to claim the Ironman Sunday at Maryland Int'l Raceway

'Todav was a dav we have been looking for," Creasy said. "This morning, I was wondering if this was going to be a 'go fast' kind of race track or if it was going to be tricky. Either way, we thought we had something for everyone else. It worked out well. We have a tune-up we run at Grand Bend for a hot race track that we've been working on for two years. All the tracks are good until it gets this hot. You can't do anything with a 140-degree race track."

Creasy's '08 Impala was the strongest car all weekend. He qualified on top of the qualifying sheet before marching through the rounds of eliminations. He defeated Mike Smith in the first round when Smith rolled through the beams and posted a -.217 red-light. Creasy then knocked off Andy Kelley in the semifinals with a 5.118/293.73 pass to Kelley's 5.323/280.14. He then marched past Todd Simpson in the final round, posting a 5.080 at 294.95 mph while Simpson shook the tires in the other lane.

Bobby Lagana, Jr. also found the winner's circle for the first time this season, defeating defending World Champion Bruce Litton to take home the Torco Pro Nitro Top Fuel Ironman. The victory was Lagana's fourth-career national event win. The win was special for Lagana because his father, Bobby Sr., was at MIR with him and his brother Domenick was tuning his car for the first time. Lagana clocked a 4.869/306.40 pass in the final to top Litton's 4.998/225.82.

"I have absolutely the best deal in life," Lagana said. "My family is great, I have an awesome girlfriend, my brother is unbelievable. Dom is the most incredible person in my entire life. I told him he was tuning the car this weekend and we never missed a beat. I have everything I could possibly want.'

Mike Castellana proved the nitrous Pro Modifieds are back with a vengeance. Castellana knocked off Ed Hoover in the final round by clocking a 6.097 at 238.93 mph. Earlier in the

weekend, he posted the fastest speed by a nitrous Pro Modified car in IHRA history, posting a 239.14 mph pass. Castellana knocked off Pat

Stoken, Kenny Lang and Mike Janis to reach the finals. Laurie Cannister continued her dominance in the Alcohol Funny Car class, winning for the third time in four national events. Cannister defeated Paul Noakes in the final round to repeat at MIR.

Frank Gugliotta was able to find the winner's circle for the first time this year, defeating Jason Collins in the Torco Pro Stock final for a victory at Gugliotta's home track.

Kings Royal Is July Tradition

FISHERS, IND.

t has become a July tradition, when the eyes of sprint-car racing turn toward a raucous celebration of speed at Ohio's Eldora Speedway.

The Kings Royal will see the 25th running this July 12, and it seems impossible that a quarter-century has passed since Earl Baltes shocked the sprint-car world with the promise of a race paying an unprecedented amount to the winner. In a special salute to the silver anniversary, Eldora officials hope to bring all the former winners back to the track to be honored at this year's race.

It's difficult today to describe the audacity of the 1984 Kings Royal. Baltes wanted to do something that would catch the imagination of both fans and racers, and he did it with a nice, round number: \$50,000. paid in cash to the winner. His announcement came a couple of months earlier, cre-

ating an amazing amount of buzz in the weeks leading up to the event. There was a tremendous amount of anticipation surrounding the race. and as everyone descended upon Eldora on that hot, muggy July evening, there was a genuine sense of excitement that we were going to see an event unlike anything we had seen before.

Steve Kinser won that race. driving Karl Kinser's famed No. 11. Kinser was in the early stages of building his legend in 1984, and this race was ultimately one more brick in the

I play through that night's race in my mind, reliving the sights and sounds, filing them away just ahead of last year's Kings Royal memories, soon to join all those dating back to 1984.

It is a great ritual in my life, one I can't imagine not continuing forever.

The Eldora officials are hopeful they can get all the former winners to return for this year's event, and will hold a special gathering on Saturday afternoon. It is impressive, that list: Steve Kinser, Doug Wolfgang, Don Kreitz, Jr., Jac Haudenschild, Bobby Davis, Jr., Sammy Swindell, Dave Blaney, Johnny Herrera, Dale Blaney, Mark Kinser, Joey Saldana, Jason Sides and Donny Schatz. Some, of course, will still be racing; others, I hope, will find their way to come home, at least for this one wonderful night.

It will be good to see this year's Kings Royal. It will be good to see the faces of today's racers, eager and excited and out to prove something. But it will also be good to see some faces from yesterday, perhaps just a bit older and maybe even a bit graver than we remember them.

On any July night, the Kings Royal is something special. But this one, this 25th, might be one we'll never forget.

NASCAR Tells Drivers To 'Shut Up And Drive'

BROOKLYN, Mich. NASCAR President Mike Helton summoned Sprint Cup drivers and other team principles to a meeting before Friday's practice session at Michigan Int'l Speedway. The purpose of the meeting

was essentially to tell the drivers to "shut

up **SPRINT CUP** race.

Although those weren't the exact words used by Helton, the message was clear that NASCAR officials are tired of hearing the constant criticism involving the new car, previously known as the "Car of Tomorrow."

"My interpretation was that the drivers should be thankful for the position they're in and should be more positive in where this car is going to be in a year or two," Dale Earn-hardt, Jr. said when quizzed about the context of the meet-"It reminds me a lot of ing. working with video game developers. The reason why the analogy works is because the public wants to know how good the game is. The public wants to know what's being fixed. Once the game is released, there's a lot of bugs and stuff, just like with this race car.

"And the public wants to know when is it going to be fixed and what's being worked on and what's going to be added. And a lot of companies are not eager to give that information out until it's done and finished.

"I see NASCAR with that same attitude."

Earnhardt said he got the message that was delivered by Helton, that the new car remains a work in progress and that, over time, it will get better. "I think that they do a lot of work behind the scenes and they probably agree with us more than we tend to believe,' Earnhardt said. "And they understand that the car is new and it's going to evolve and we're going to learn more.

"Maybe three years from now, we'll look back at what we have today and go, 'man, can you believe we had that car and that was the way we did it?' because they'll be some things we'll find that will be just like 'man, that's wav better. Let's go in that direction.' So I think they're doing more than we give them credit for. They're thinking and working and trying and wanting to improve; and that we drivers should do

less complaining." Helton gave a "forceful reminder" to the drivers that he is tired of hearing the constant complaints about the race car, which was designed to provide increased safety to the competitors while making

a more common chassis in an effort to contain costs.

While it has improved safety, critics say it has failed in containing costs and improving competition.

"I think it's always great to be reminded. In my experience with Mike Helton, if he ever says anything, it's been very valuable to me," Earnhardt said. "And every time that man has spoken, I've benefited from it. It gave me a whole lot clearer view of the situation than I had. And I appreciate Mike and NASCAR for thinking it was a good opportunity today to have that.

Earnhardt admitted he has been too vocal at times about the new car.

"I don't know what the other drivers think. I just know what I think and what it did for me,' Earnhardt said. "I was pretty critical and overly critical at times. And the only reason why the drivers are like that is because we feel like our best avenue is through the media because it's very effective.

"But at the same time, NASCAR reads those opinions and it's not good for the sport. If I enjoy what I do and I'm having fun and want to be here and want to be around for a while, I shouldn't tell people not to buy tickets. As a driver, you just pent up the anguish that you have about the situation and you misinterpret NASCAR's position and their approach and what they're really doing. Like I said, they're doing a lot with the car now. They are coming up with some new ideas and new ways to make the car not quite as sensitive in dirty air and they'll be testing that soon, hopefully. I think it's great that they feel like the car can evolve.'

Team owner Richard Petty was involved in the meeting.

"It was a chance to say, 'Look guys, we're all in this together. We've got to sell racing to them people up there," Petty said, pointing to the fans in the grandstands. "We have to make a positive spin on it, basically.

The car is part of the problem, but we have to make the new car work."

Not surprisingly, two-time champion Tony Stewart's take on the meeting was a little different.

"Ask Mike Helton — I don't know what we're allowed to say and what we're not,' Stewart said afer Sunday's race. "I'm just thankful we're allowed to be here and be a part of this. It's just a privilege for us to be here, and according to Friday, we've all got it a lot better than a lot of us think.

"We're not allowed to have opinions now. We've all got it made here. We've all got it great. At least, that is what we've all been told.'

Petty Enterprises Takes On Boston Ventures As Partner

CONCORD, N.C. — A new day dawned for Petty Enterprises June 11 at Lowe's Motor Speedway.

NASCAR's most historic and most successful racing team announced a new business partner, Chief Executive Officer and a contract extension with its signature driver, all of which are part of a multi-tiered effort to return the team, which has existed since Lee Petty competed in the first NASCAR race in 1949, to victory lane.

Boston Ventures, which has invested more than \$2.4 billion in more than 70 companies in recent years, agreed to a capital investment in both Petty Enterprises and the Richard Petty Driving Experience. Interestingly, Petty Enterprises and RPDE, which were separate entities, will now be run under a single umbrella.

Together, the Pettys and Boston Ventures have hired longtime entertainment executive David Zucker as CEO for Petty Enterprises. Zucker most recently was CEO of Midway Games, Inc., a developer of video games, and spent 11 years with Walt Disney Company, including eight years with ESPN.

Boston Ventures Managing Director Barry Baker will also serve as Chairman of Petty Enterprises.

Finally, 2000 Sprint Cup champion Bobby Labonte signed a four-year contract extension, which includes options, with the team that virtually guarantees he will complete his career driving Richard Petty's famed No. 43.

Zucker, Labonte and the Pettys were on hand, while Boston Ventures was represented by Managing Director Davis. NASCAR Andv Chairman Brian France was

also in attendance. "My daddy did the work and my mama kept up with the money," said Richard Petty, acknowledging that it was an emotional day for him. "Over the years, it really got away from us from a financial standpoint. We just got behind."

The Pettys believe the undisclosed investment from Boston Ventures will change all of that.

"This is something I have taken a great deal of time to think about and I'm comfortable with the decision I have made, and to have Boston Ventures as my partner in Petty Enterprises. Boston Ventures will provide us with the capital necessary to compete for wins and championships," Petty said.

Zucker said his business is running companies, but acknowledged that racing is not his expertise.

"My plans are to work with Richard and the Petty management team to build the business, and to leverage Boston Venture's expertise in areas like marketing relationships and financial management," said Zucker. "One of the reasons I'm comfortable coming into this role is that industry veteran Robbie Loomis is in

place leading the race team operations at Petty Enterprises. Robbie knows how to build a winning racing organization, and I'm looking forward to helping grow the organization.'

Labonte acknowledged he had offers from other teams, but said he wanted to stay at Petty Enterprises and the partnership with Boston Ventures helped to make that happen.

"I feel the decision I have made is the right one for a lot of reasons," Labonte said. "For me to want to be here will show sponsors and the people that work here and will work here in the future that Petty Enterprises is committed to improving our performance Kyle Petty, who has been "acting" CEO of the company for several years, said he will continue to drive for the team, but will now spend more time exploring other interests. With no primary sponsors in

place for next season, that is clearly the top priority for the operation, but Zucker and

Davis both said that Petty Enterprises will expand in the coming years.

"Our goals for the race team are to bring the 43 and the 45 back to victory lane and to bring a third car on line as soon as possible," Davis said. 'We are going to invest in people and equipment. People make things happen.

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Kevin Buckler Brings Business Savvy To Auto Racing Teams

THE TASTE OF RACING

trio of wine samples sat on Kevin Buckler's desk, an overnight arrival from Buckler's Adobe Road Winery in California's Sonoma Valley. FedEx, it seems, even delivers evidence of just how much NASCAR has changed since its early years, when Junior Johnson ran moonshine through the rolling hills of North Carolina.

Buckler, principal and CEO of The Racers' Group as well as Adobe Road,

handles his duties as BY JOHN CLAYTON wine taster a country STAFF WRITER away from his Sonoma

vineyards, but only a few yards away from TRG's bustling NASCAR Craftsman Truck Series garage.

TRG's foray into NASCAR began when the group bought Darrell Waltrip's former NCTS team at the end of last season. NASCAR may be new to Buckler and TRG, but racing isn't. Buckler spent 15 years creating one of Grand Am's premier teams along-side award-winning bottles of wine. Now, he's hoping to transfer that same formula to

NASCAR, beginning with TRG's truck-series effort, while still going full-speed with the winery and sports-car operation.

Over the past couple of years, we've run out of runway," said Buckler, not-ing TRG's five entries at the *"I decided to chase my heart, not my* Sahlen Six Hours of the wallet. The good news is, if you work "We're full. We're Glen. locked and loaded.

At once, Buckler speaks with the confidence of a driver who won his first professional race – – in 1995 at the California Grand Prix and went on to win back-to-

back titles at the Rolex 24 at Daytona and the 24 Hours of Le Mans and with the reservations of a team owner who knows there are momentous challenges ahead on and off the track with NASCAR.

We came out here and got our ass whupped. Then, we came out again the next week and got our ass whupped, but five positions better," Buckler said of the team's early Truck Series returns. That's what it's about to me, an upward trend. We're making everything a little bit better. I want to improve and I want to build an organization here that's solid and stable and put our foot in other waters.

Those other waters include plans already in place for a two-car ARCA program in 2009 to go with the team's two-truck team anchored by drivers Donnie Lia and Andy Lally.

That "upward trend" has already included a surprise victory by Lia, which came in a dramatic three-truck drag race to the checkered flag in the team's

seventh NCTS race at Mansfield, Ohio. The victory was validation for the understated Lia, last year's NASCAR Whelen Modified Series champion, the team and Buckler, who teamed Lia with sports-car specialist and fellow Long Islander Lally. Lally has spent the past four years with TRG, winning races in Porsches and now is growing with the team, he hopes, into a full-fledged, fender-rubbing NASCAR driver. Both Lally and Buckler are expending a lot of energy to make sure that hap-

pens. "One of the things you aspire for in racing is to have people who are working as hard or harder than you to achieve the same goal," Lally said of his time with Buckler and TRG. "Here, I have that and then some. Kevin is non-stop all day long, seven days a week. He's fully dedicated to the racing team. He's always trying to make TRG better every time we hit the track.

TRG's NASCAR plan is the same one Buckler used to build a successful Grand Am team in the 1990s. And in some ways, it is not unlike producing wine it all starts with roots back in the vineyard.

"We're starting here in trucks. The program next vear will involve multiple trucks and multiple ARCA cars. Some of them will have their own funding, but basically what I want to do here is the same as we did in Petaluma — build this thing with a real solid foundation for it to grow.

"I'm not coming here to put up one Hail Mary pass, to come in and spend all my money on one shot and then just go away.

But having strong root systems for grapes and great race teams are not the only similarities Buckler sees between his two diverse business interests.

"In some ways, they couldn't be more different. But in other ways, there are some scary similari-ties," he said. "Where else could you pick two businesses who are dominated by people who don't care about making a profit?

"As a small winery, your biggest competitors are people who are building trophies to themselves rich guys who made a lot of money in money markets or in business and are now charging \$35 a bot-

tle and getting the best and the best and the best, and there's no way, no how that he's ever going to make a profit. The same can be said in sports-car racing. "There's always going to be a rich guy to come in and try to outspend you, but we know that guy's going to come and go.

TRG's purple Porsche's carrying the Adobe Road livery heralded Buckler's wine interest with each success. Ironically, the tables have turned lately as Adobe Road has won some 25 awards, including eight gold medals, this year.

At TRG's California headquarters, the garage is adjacent to the wine-tasting room.

'Now, the wine community, which knows nothing about our race team, is coming into the winery because of our reputation with the awards and wondering what all the race cars are doing in there.'

There's no such confusion at the team's Mooresville shop, which is all about the business of NASCAR — with the recent exception of Buckler's desk

Buckler is "100 percent sure" that Lally has the talent and intangibles to be a racing "rock star."

Lia's No. 71 Chevrolet will run the balance of the NCTS schedule, while Lally's No. 7 Silverado will run as much as possible in 2008 and a full schedule in 2009.

We're not coming here to clip our coupons and run around in the back of the field," Buckler said. Buckler, who says the competitive fire he used to have as a driver is now fueled by the business side of the sport, believes the plan he has put in place could have TRG making its Sprint Cup debut in "one or two races" as early as next season.

"I've tried to stack the cards in our favor," he said. "I've seen all these teams take on partners to help them navigate the halls of Wall Street or wherever it is they need to be; we did it the other way. We started with the business partners. I went to my network of influential clients and friends and asked them if they wanted to help us start this NASCAR team. They all put their hands up and said, 'Let's do it.'

And that is how a bi-coastal business got started. It is part of the story as to how Lia drove a truck into victory lane in Ohio and just a small bit of how Buckler ended up with a nice Cabernet on his desk on a Tuesday afternoon.

"I decided to chase my heart, not my wallet," Buckler said. "The good news is if you work hard enough and make the right decisions, you can make your passions your businesses.





NASCAR Chief Disappointed By Allegations

BROOKLYN, MICH.

No company likes a lawsuit brought by an employee. When it involves \$225 million, the head man likes it even less. But when the boss's first inkling of it comes from the media, there is almost no way to measure the level of upset.

Such is the life, and the gist of last Saturday's message, in the current world of NASCAR Chairman Brian France.

France met with the media at Michigan Int'l Speedway and Kentucky Speedway last weekend to clarify NASCAR's position on the \$225 million harassment and discrimination suit

filed by former NASCAR

Nationwide series official Mauricia Grant.

"The most disappointing aspect of this suit is that we heard about it from the media," France said. Equally disap-

pointing, he indicated, was that the claims stemmed

from the fact that **N** many of the 57 allogations happened as

allegations happened a year or more prior to Grant's dismissal in October of last year.

"We would have investigated this two years ago if she had said anything," France said. "It just defies the imagination that she would have sat in multiple training sessions, in diversity training and would have gone through performance reviews.

"It just defies logic that she had all these opportunities and never made a formal complaint."

France went to great lengths to outline NASCAR's policy for reporting and dealing with employee claims and complaints, coming to what appears to be a logical conclusion.

"She chose to make this about money and about a lawsuit," he said, "and we will deal with that."

happen. Things fall through the cracks, bad-apple employees included.


Sometimes, the guilty parties are found out; sometimes, they escape detection.

The bottom line in all of this is that NASCAR will investigate the claims and respond to them. Both sides will hire attorneys and more discussion, investigations, charges and countercharges will be made.

It is possible that the lawsuit could wind up in court, and there is no guarantee the outcome will be a favorable one to either side.

The only guaranteed outcome is that NASCAR's reputation will be harmed, as will Mauricia Grant's. The extent of the damage remains to be seen.

Only time will tell.



Darnell gave credit to the handling characteristics of the trucks.

"The way you can side-draft with these trucks, especially with the air at a bigger track like Michigan, I knew he was going to be able to suck up to the side of me, pull off and get a run," Darnell said. "So, I had to do the same thing to him. Fortunately, I got it right at the start-finish line and was able to beat him by just a little bit."

That little bit was enough to qualify as the closest finish under electronic

timing in MIS history and the second closest in Craftsman Truck history. Butch Miller beat Mike Skinner by .001 second at Colorado National Speedway in 1995.

In the battle for third, Scott Speed edged Todd Bodine and Brendan Gaughan in another blanket finish. Adding to the final lap excitement and almost wiping it out — was Kyle Busch, who punted Ron Hornaday, Jr. into a spin. Hornaday got his truck off the track and kept the green flag flying to the finish.

Hornaday, the series point leader coming into the race, fell to third behind Benson and rookie Scott Speed, who finished third.

The photo-finish scenario came courtesy of a caution period six laps from the end with Darnell leading and Speed running second. The green came out with three laps remaining and Benson was able to get past Speed and pursue Darnell to the finish.





GAME OVER Logano Snags First Nationwide Victory In Third Start

SPARTA, Ky. — Joey Logano turned 18 May 24, making him eligible for NASCAR competition. A week later, he made one of the most hyped debuts in Nationwide Series history at Dover Int'l Speedway driving for Joe Gibbs Racing

On Saturday at Kentucky Speedway, in only his third series start, Logano lived up to the billing, winning the Meijer 300.

He became the youngest driver in Nationwide Series history to visit victory lane at 18 years and 21 days, besting Casey Atwood, who won at The Milwaukee Mile in 1999 at 18 years and 10 months.

"I expected to win Dover. It was cool to get our first win here in the third start. Obviously, I was getting in one of the best cars out there that has won seven races. I have to win races. It's not even an option," Logano said. "To get here and get our second pole and get our first win, now we can get rolling.'

This season, JGR has won 10 races, seven with the No. 20 Tovota, led by crew chief Dave Rogers. Logano is now the fourth driver to take that car to victory lane.

When asked his thoughts of the young phenom's talent, Rogers replied coyly, "Three starts, two poles, one win. He's OK.'

closest competition Logano's throughout the 300-mile event came from teammate Kyle Busch, who flew into Kentucky following a seventhplace finish in the Craftsman Truck Series race in Brooklyn, Mich.

Busch started at the rear of the field since he did not make it in time to qualify the No. 18 Toyota. By lap 40, he had worked his way through the field and into the lead. He led a race-high 85 laps. Logano led 76.

BLOOMINGTON, Minn. -After hinting in Canada that the teams could form their own F-1 series, Bernie Ecclestone sent a letter to the FIA member clubs saying that the teams want the FIA to remain as the regulator of the sport.

"The position of Formula One Management and the teams and the Formula One

promoters is very simple," Ecclestone wrote in the letter. "They would like a Concorde

Agreement signed in basically the same format as in the past agreements, which Formula One has been governed successfully by this type of document for over 25 years which helps to stabilize the Technical and Sporting Regulations.

"It follows the agreement reached with the European Commission where the FIA are the regulators of the sport and FOM are the commercial side of Formula One. We would hope that this can continue.'

While acknowledging again that a number of teams, sponsors and F-1 manufacturers want **Max Mosley** to quit, Ecclestone reiterated that they are not members of the FIA and therefore have no say in the matter.

■ British F3 team Ultimate Motorsport is negotiating with Red Bull to buy into the Toro Rosso team. Given the dubious future of customer cars in F-1. which will almost certainly be outlawed in 2010, Dietrich Mateschitz has been looking for the right buyer for his 50 per-

cent of Toro Rosso. Gerhard Berger, who owns the other 50 percent, said earlier this year that he has yet to decide if he will sell his shares.

■ June 9 marked the 40th anniversary of McLaren's first Grand Prix victory when team founder Bruce McLaren won the Belgian Grand Prix. McLarens have won 158 times in all, second only to Ferrari with 205 victories.

■ Jackie Stewart continues to insist that disgraced FIA President Max Mosley must resign.

"He is failing to recognize that a lot of companies do not want to see him in the paddock, nor do the royal families of Spain, Bahrain and Monaco," Stewart told *The Independent*. "It is extremely selfish of Max to sav that he can continue. At what cost to motorsport? If he doesn't care about the damage he is doing, he is not the quality of person that should be doing that job. I am simply bamboozled by the arrogance of that attitude. It is just totally selfserving.

■ Although **Robert Kubica** is now leading the World Championship, BMW Sauber will continue to give Nick Heidfeld equal treatment and equipment rather than focusing its efforts on a Kubica title bid.

■ McLaren's Martin Whitmarsh says BMW Sauber is a serious threat for the championship honors. "The reality is they have consistently scored points and done a good job," he said.

■ Melbourne will continue to host the Australian Grand Prix

until 2015. The Herald Sun reports that the Victorian state government has reached a verbal agreement with Bernie Ecclestone to extend the race's contract an additional five vears.

The race will not be held at night, which is something Ecclestone desperately wanted so that it could be televised in primetime back in Europe, but the start time may be moved back to 5 p.m.

■ Flavio Briatore's playboy days ended when he married model Elisabetta Gregoraci. 30 years his iunior, in Italy on June 14. Among the many high-profile guests was Fernando Alonso, who acted as the couple's chauffer.

■ All the teams except Force India went to their home away from home — Barcelona's Circuit de Catalunya — for three days of testing last week. Ferrari test driver Luca Badoer was quickest on the first two days while Renault's Nelson **Piquet** topped the times on day three.

■ Ferrari team principal Stefano Domenicali says his team needs to get back to its high points earning standards.

"BMW took a lot of points [in Montreall," he said. "McLaren not too many, but they are strong, they will be there. We need to keep on working."

■ While McLaren had a miserable race in Canada, Lewis Hamilton remains optimistic.

"Our overall pace was a great boost for the whole team," he said. "Last year, we lacked a little bit of pace in high-speed corners, but this year's car definitely seems to have overcome those shortcomings. We are in good shape.'

Dollansky Doubles His WoO Pleasure

EAGLE, Neb. — Craig Dollansky felt like he let a win slip away June 11 at Sedalia's State Fair Speedway while leading in traffic, and he made sure history did not repeat itself as he held off Steve Kinser to win the Eagle Nationals for the Advance Auto Parts World of Outlaws Sprint Car Series at Eagle Raceway Saturday night.

Dollansky started on the pole and dropped back to second behind Kinser at the start, but dove under Kinser exiting the fourth turn on the fifth lap to make the pass for the lead.

It was Dollansky's second-consecutive Advance Auto Parts World of Outlaws Sprint Car Series triumph and his fourth of the season.

"It was a great night," said the win-ner, who earned \$10,000 for the 25th victory of his World of Outlaws career. "I am very happy for Larry Woodward and everyone that stands behind this race team. The crew worked hard as always and I am very proud of them. We had a great car tonight.'

Lapped traffic was the story on Saturday night, as the event went 40 laps non-stop in nine minutes and 23 seconds on the high-banked thirdmile oval. A number of times over the course of the race, Dollansky pulled away from Kinser, as he was able to slice his way through the slower machines, eventually lapping all but the top-eight finishers.

"Typically, you don't see that happen very often, but that puts on a good show for the fans when you can keep going," said Dollansky. "We didn't get the lead at the start of the race and we had to work our way past Steve (Kinser) and the Snap-on car was working well tonight. We kept working on it all night and tried to keep up with the race track."

Kinser led the A-feature early on Saturday night and wound up second in the Q Oil Maxim.

"I got the gear a little bit high, but we had some motor problems in the dash and I went ahead and stuck a higher gear it in," said the 20-time World of Outlaws champion. "I don't know if it would have helped me or not. I got to rolling around a little bit better, but it was flopping around some. We're learning a little bit and just have to keep running and hope-fully, we'll get these cars working a little better.

Jason Meyers picked up his secondconsecutive third-place finish as he earned the final podium position. He has 17 top-five finishes in 20 starts. Point-leader Donny Schatz finished

fourth and has finished in the top 10 in all 20 events this year. Shane Stewart was fifth.

Huset's Is All Dollansky's

BRANDON. S.D. Speedway has always been a special place for Craig Dollansky. He won in his first start at the track back in 1995 and has had a great deal of success over the years at the highbanked three-eighths-mile oval.

Friday night he added to his success at the track, holding off Donny Schatz and Jason Meyers to bank the \$10,000 Advance Auto Parts World of Outlaws Sprint Car Series victory.

"It feels great to win here," said Dollansky, who has five-career wins at Huset's Speedway. "When I get asked what some of my favorite tracks are, Huset's is always one that I mention

"When the race track is prepared like this, there is always great racing. That is what the fans come out to see and there are some of the best fans in the country out here. I couldn't be happier."

Dollansky lined up third in the Auto Value Parts Stores/Snap-on Maxim and moved into second on the opening lap, charging past Danny Lasoski, Dollansky chased down leader Shane Stewart and the pair battled for two laps before Dollansky took control on lap six.

Schatz got around Stewart on the 11th circuit and began to track down Dollansky.

After clearing all of the lapped cars, Schatz chased Dollansky for a couple of laps, before diving under him coming off the fourth turn on the 17th lap to take the lead. He quickly opened a few-car-length lead as Dollansky got bottled up in traffic.

"I didn't feel like the race got away from us at that point," explained Dollansky. "I knew I could stay with them and lapped traffic can make or break you sometimes. We're glad we had another opportunity late in the race.'

After going non-stop for the first 23 laps, the caution flag waved on the 24th go-around. On the restart, Dollansky used a textbook slide job to inch ahead of Schatz. He quickly pulled out to an eight-car length lead. A Dusty Zomer flip set up a shootout among Dollansky, Schatz and Meyers, who was running third. Dollansky held on for his third victory of the season and the 24th of his World of Outlaws career.

Schatz and Meyers waged an epic battle late in the race, trading the runner-up spot four times.

'We had a really good car," said Schatz after his runner-up finish. 'We had a right-front torsion bar come out at the middle of the race. We were all right as long as we were in traffic, but we got the yellows and then I made a mistake going into the first corner and there was nothing I could do to keep it up. I slammed the frame rail down and got passed.'

Meyers picked up his series leading 16th top-five finish of the season as he wound up third in the GLR Investment KPC.

"It's kind of disappointing," said Meyers. "We have always raced Donny (Schatz) clean and tonight he decided not to do that. It was a great run for the team. I thought we had at least a second-place car. It's just unfortunate that they want to race that way. We'll just go on to the next race and keep doing what we are doing and keep beating that (No.) 15 car.'

Ohio drivers Jac Haudenschild and Chad Kemenah filled the top five.

WORLD OF OUTLAWS SPRINT SERIES RACE REWIND

Streaking Schatz Remains Hot At Sedalia

SEDALIA, Mo. — As a warm-up for the Advance Auto Parts World of Outlaws Sprint Car Series event June 10 at Sedalia's State Fair Speedway, Donny Schatz took part in a celebrity modified race to benefit the Michael Ross Memorial Foundation, filling in for his car owner Tony Stewart.

While it was Schatz's first time in a modified, that did not slow him down as he held off NASCAR star Clint Bowyer for the win. He followed that up by winning a thrilling dual with Joey Saldana to pick up his third-consecutive victory with the Advance Auto Parts World of Outlaws Sprint Car Series and his fifth triumph in the last six races.

After battling Saldana for several laps, Schatz dove under him exiting the second turn on the 22nd lap and ultimately took the \$10,000 win in the Ditzfeld Transfer Summer Nationals at the historic half-mile.

It was the 76th-career WoO triumph for the North Dakota native with the World of Outlaws and his second at Sedalia.

Schatz qualified second, but started sixth in the feature after finishing sixth in the dash.

"I learned a lot driving that modified," he acknowledged. "I ran the hot laps and they ran the dash for the sprint car, and then had some more laps in the modified feature before the

"It's a lot fun," Schatz said of the close racing. "This one and the one at Knoxville were certainly door bangers. It came down to the last couple of laps and he was good and we had a good car. We had to race in traffic and that is the fun part. We're glad to be in that position and those guys are running pretty consistent. We have to keep our game up and worry about what is going on with this (No.) 15 Armor All car."

Saldana led laps 17-21 as he again nearly picked up his first win of the season.

"I felt like in the lapped cars I did the right thing," said Saldana. "His car was working better than mine. When we were in traffic he could turn off the top and run on the bottom. I couldn't do it. He had a better car."

Craig Dollansky led the first 16 laps and finished third, with Jason Meyers collecting his series-leading 15th top-five finish in fourth. Kraig Kinser was fifth.

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
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
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


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Le Mans Win A Sweet One For Audi Team

LE MANS, France — As predicted, the 76th running of the 24 Hours of Le Mans came down to a battle of the diesels.

The No. 2 Audi of Tom Kristensen, Allan McNish and Dindo Capello ultimately brought home the victory ________ on the historic

Audi's victory was its eighth in the last nine years and firmly established Kristensen as the greatest driver in the history of the hallowed endurance classic as he extended his record Le Mans wins to eight.

For teammate McNish, it was the second Le Mans win for the heralded Scot, the first coming 10 years ago in a Porsche. The victory was Capello's third.

"It was one of the toughest races we have had here," said Dr. Wolfgang Ullrich, head of Audi Motorsport. "But we proved that we are a really strong team and have the technology. That's what we are here for."

McNish agreed. "This was probably one of the hardest races I've ever been involved in. The Peugeot guys put us under a lot of pressure. We put them under a lot of pressure. But finally we got it."

sions. With the power of the French and German prototypes about equal, the advantage for the 908s could be found in their stiffer spring; good for dry-weather running, but far less so in the wet. And rain was in the forecast, showing up just a little past the halfway mark at around quarter after four Sunday morning, neatly bisecting the event into two halves.

The first, the dry section, clearly belonged to Peugeot with the car of Marc Gene, Nicolas Minassian and Jacques Villeneuve holding sway for the most part by nearly a lap over Kristensen, McNish and Capello. The sister 908 of Frank Montagny, Ricardo Zonta and Christian Klien kept the R10 of Lucas Luhr, Mike Rockenfeller and Alexandre Premat at bay, as Sarrazin and his teammates Pedro Lamy and Alexander Wurz in their 908, along with Frank Biela. Emanuele Pirro and Marco Werner in their R10, trailed behind after encountering mechanical gremlins along the way.

In the end, Montagny and company would wind up third, with Rockenfeller and his fellows fourth, the Biela trio fifth and the pole-sitting Sarrazin and his cohorts sixth. That left everyone to focus on the war up front, and what a war it was. Within an hour after the rain came, that was followed by periods of relative dryness, McNish, Capello and Kristensen had pushed themselves into a lead that varied between more than a lap to just seconds, depending on how wet the track might be.

For the last stint, it was the best against the best as Kristensen got in the Audi and Minassian the Peugeot. The 908 driver, who was at one point more than a lap down, stormed back cutting huge chunks from the R10's advantage, the pressure showing on Kristensen who had not one, but two potentially disastrous brushes with other cars, fortunately escaping without any serious damage.

With less than a half an hour left and the course getting wetter, both men pitted for fuel and tires. However, within a lap, the Peugeot was back in to replace a flat right rear, and the war was over. Officially, the gap was measured at just over four minutes, both the winning Audi and the second-placed Peugeot having covered a record-setting 381 laps. For Kristensen, the results made him an eight time Le Mans winner, his closest rival in that department, while Audi has nine in a row. Porsche coming in second in the department with seven-straight overall triumphs.

For Porsche, this year's Le Mans brought both good and bad news. The good was the German manufacturer's one-two sweep of the smaller LMP2 prototype division with its RS Spyders; first going to the Van Merkstein Motorsport entry of Jos Verstappen, Jeroen Bleekemolen and team principal, Peter van Merkstein, with its Team Essex counterpart, driven by John Neilsen, Sascha

Maassen and Casper Elgaard, second. The bad news came in the GT2 assembly line category where Porsche was totally left out of the picture as Ferrari posted as a onethrough-five 430GT performance led by the American Risi trio of Mika Salo, Jaime Melo and Gianmaria Bruni.

In the top-rated GT-1 production car

arena, it was Aston Martin again, as it was in 2007, beating Corvette. The DBR9 of David Brabham, Antonio Garcia and Darren Turner just outrunning the Corvette of Jan Magnussen, Johnny O'Connell and Ron Fellows, with the somewhat troubled second Corvette of Olivier Beretta, Oliver Gavin and Max Papis third.

ionships at Gas City's I-69 Speedway. In addition, there was a track championship at Kokomo and 20 victories along the way.

Following three years with Mann, Mark Clark was pegged to take control of the car. Ironically, Clark's tenure with the team was short-lived after a violent accident down the frontstretch at Kokomo put Clark on the mend.

After recovering, Clark went back to his family car and Edison recruited another talented driver whose stock was on the rise, A.J. Anderson. During his time with the team, there was another track championship and nine more victories.

The most success for Edison's team was to come from 2002-2007, after Edison hired relatively unknown Shane Cottle to replace Anderson.

With Cottle, there were five more track championships (three at Kokomo and two at Gas City) and 37 A-main wins. Included among the total were a handful of USAC National Sprint Car Series triumphs and another victory in the prestigious Sheldon Kinser Memorial at Bloomington Speedway.

"With Shane, that was the longest we've ever had a driver," said Edison. "He's just one of those rare talents and a great person to work with. In our time together, we never had a cross word.

"There were times when we might miss the setup on the race car," Edison continued, "or the track would just surprise us, but he never complained. He'd just get in the car and drive it and adjust his style, or whatever, and try to win the race. I can't tell you how many times he'd come in following a race and be mad at himself because he didn't win, but he never, never said anything to the team about what we might have done differently. I respect him for that."

With Cottle's stock on the rise after six seasons with Edison, the Contos Racing team nabbed him to pilot its No. 4 car in the USAC National Sprint Car Series. In addition, Cottle gets the opportunity to drive the Contos Silver Crown ride as well.

Cottle's opportunity left Edison and his team with a vacancy that has been

filled by yet another exciting, raw talent in the form of Scotty Weir.

"We're excited about Scotty," Edison noted. "He's a gasser, but his driving style is a bit like Shane's in the way we set up the car. He's still a very young guy, but so far he's been a pleasure to work with."

With the team rapidly closing in on 100 victories in an era when the sport is as competitive as it has ever been, Edison is quick to point out the reason his squad has been so successful.

"Really, we try very hard to create an atmosphere that a person can do well," he stated. "If we do that, the driver is going to do well. We try to put a race car underneath him that is the same from week to week so he knows what to expect when he goes on the track. Once he gets that assurance that there is nothing crazy going on with the car, that builds his confidence which reflects what he does on the track."

Stability is another key factor with the Edison team, and not having a constant turnover in the pits from week to week and season to season.

"We've got a solid group of guys who do whatever it takes to help out," Edison said of his team. "My boys (Doug and Tim) have been involved from day one, although now they've gotten married and have kids, so things change and priorities change. I respect that and I'm glad they have their priorities straight and put first things first.

"I can't say enough about Wes Evans, Larry Sullivan, Craig Heathcoat, Stan Johnson, John Shepherd and Jason Oldfather," he continued. "They all have been such a great help. Also, Steve Allen is available anytime we're in a pinch. Same thing with Tony and Dan Scherger. Whenever we need help, all we have to do is pick up the phone. Wes (Evans), Craig (Heathcoat) and Stan (Johnson) all have been so instrumental since day one."

Edison laughed that no "finger pointing" is allowed at the track either.

"We have a golden rule with the team," he laughed. "That is that nobody is allowed to grumble or gripe around here but me. Truthfully, we have great guys on the team and they are all such a joy to be around. We're having fun. With the amount of money being spent, it should be fun." Having fun late in the year still can be a challenge, however.

"I'll admit, sometimes in the middle of August it can get tough," he said. "The trips to Bloomington begin to wear on you, but if you're running good it helps quite a bit. I was thinking the other day about Bob Darland winning 100 features and how impressive his doing that was on a relatively low-budget operation and realized that we are getting close.

"We'd probably already be there if we would have won all the races we ran second to (Jon) Stanbrough the last five years," he laughed.

With the motivation still in place and a solid team, it's not a matter of if the team will reach the 100-win plateau, but rather how quickly. Given Edison's penchant for finding diamonds in the rough, 150 or 200 victories wouldn't be out of the question. The final TV ratings for this year's Indy 500 are complete and confirm the writings of **John Clayton** in our June 4 edition. Speedway principal **Tony George** adds that the Indy 500 race-day spectator turnout was up 16,000 over 2007 and that the general admission (infield) turnout showed a 5,000 increase, he reported. Though unrelated, **Dr. Joseph Mattioli** reported two days after the Pocono 500 NASCAR race in Pennsylvania that attendance was up from last year. Good news all around.

Triumph in a recent Ford Focus midget race at Illiana Speedway in Schererville, Ind., by 17-year-old **Auston Harris** of Hayward, Calif., marked the first feature victory by a black driver in the 52-year history of the U.S. Auto Club. This makes one wonder what has become of **Willy T. Ribbs**, racing's first widely publicized black driver.

For NASCAR Red Bull driver **AJ. Allmendinger**, Father's Day reminded him of how much his race-driving

Even so, it appears a little crazy at first glance, this giving away money when you're taking out loans just to get back on the track. "It's really sobering to look at those

kids, and say, 'damn, it's just not fair,'' he said. "And it isn't." Jenny Parnis, CRP's de facto public relations manager and do-it-all specialist who happens to also be Short's fiancée, thought so when first told of her future husband's brainstorm — a "pay it forward" approach to racing.

"I believe in karma, I really do," said Parnis, who will also be volunteering at Wings of Eagles Ranch in the fall despite no real experience with horses. "You know, I think it has helped us feel better about what we're doing and made it easier to deal with our situation."

Some of those friends and business partners stepped up to help get CRP's Corvette back together, even if it took a bit longer than Short initially expected. Kubinski will be back on the track for the first time July 17-20 when the series heads to Mid-Ohio Sports Car Course. And when CRP Motorsports returns to action, it will carry St. Jude's Children's Hospital and Wings of Eagles Ranch as part of its livery. "We want to give back to the people

who have helped us 10-fold with sponsorships and whatever we can," Short said pointing to a large undecorated black toolbox that will be the team's new pit box. "We're going to use the pit box there for them and to get the message out about our charities...This is not going to be a oneyear thing. We want to do it from this year forward...I know a lot of people help St. Jude's, but every little bit can help."

In theology, St. Jude is the patron saint of the lost cause, which may or may not include burned-out race cars. At CRP Motorsports, there was certainly loss, but from that loss came a noble cause — making life a little better for someone else, which is a better reason to race than most. While everyone is competitive on the track, they're all friends in the pits. It is common to see drivers and crew from several teams helping out a car that had an unfortunate incident. I have seen parts loaned out of three trailers to get a car back on the track. Then, the repaired car goes out and wins the feature, beating all the teams who helped get the car going.

The old-school essence of open-air trailers, home-built cars, elbows-up racing and camaraderie is still alive and well here. They offer a great place for rookies of all ages to start midget racing (I was over 40 when I started) or veterans to continue their racing ambitions. Economical midget racing is not dead. 

Churchill worked in the insurance and auto-sales fields prior to finding his niche in the trucking industry, starting with a single tractor-trailer and building Churchill Transportation into an international transport business with more than 300 rigs on the road.
