Additional Unsightly Ramps And Dangerous Roadways In New City Square Plans

The members of the Charlestown North Area Task Force have appealed to Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill for assistance in reversing the recent decision of the Federal Highway Administration to eliminate most of the funding for the Central Artery North Area Project. The North Area Project involves the replacement of existing overhead structures through City Square with tunnels connecting I-93 and the Mystic River Bridge. The Task Force has written to Rep. O'Neill and is asking other Charlestown residents and organizations to contact Rep. O'Neill and other State and Federal representatives to enlist their help in overturning the Federal Highway Administration's recent decision.

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) proposes to limit funding on the project to include upgrading work of I-93 from the existing viaduct to the proposed tunnels under City Square. This work includes the building of additional overhead ramps from Rutherford Avenue over the B & M Rail Yards to connect to the existing overhead ramps to City Square. Work on existing ramps between US 1 and I 93 would be limited to work necessary to connect them to the newly proposed overhead ramps. The proposed tunnels under City Square would be completely eliminated.

The Charlestown North Area Task Force stated in their letter to Rep. O'Neill that the proposed funding

for the Central Artery North Area Project will result in the continued existence of the Mystic Tobin Bridge S-curve, which is one of the most dangerous pieces of interstate highway in New England. The project was initially proposed to eliminate this S-curve. The Task Force also stated that the proposed project still allows the continued blight of an historical area and eliminates \$62 million in potential private development in Charlestown and the jobs associated with that development. The presently proposed project will add more unsightly ramps without re-establishing the connection between Charlestown and the waterfront or the visual sight line between Charlestown and downtown Boston.

The Task Force, which includes members of the Charlestown Community,

has been working with the Dept. of Public Works and their consultants for over five years on the development of the Central Artery Project. The recent abrupt decision of the FHWA to reduce funding to the project is seen as a breach of community trust by the Task Force and an abandonment of the community planning process. The Charlestown Community has long been a victim of insensitive regional highway planning and the Task Force, along with the community, was looking forward to an exciting project that would have liberated it from much of the devastation wrought on it by the Mystic River Bridge. To only construct the overhead connection, which the FHWA proposes, would subject Charlestown to years of construction-related disruption and environmental degradation

ORTHODONTICS

For the treatment of crooked or overcrowded teeth, for spaces that can be closed, for bites (occlusion) that do not properly mesh, for health reasons to preserve the dentition, and for esthetics to make the teeth conform to the facial structure.

There are about 4,000,000 dental patients being treated with orthodontics in the United States at this time. One fifth (20%) of these patients are adults, twenty years of age or older. The increase in adult patients is primarily due to the technical developments in orthodontics making braces less noticeable and more acceptable to many adults. Patients have become more educated in what orthodontics can do. We realize that serious dental disease, like gum disease or tooth loss, may be prevented by orthodontic treatment. Also many adults are just dissatisfied with the appearance of their teeth and wish to do something about it. Perhaps it is status to be under treatment; perhaps it is desire from childhood; or perhaps it is an opportunity to be the center of attention. Whatever the reason, adults are being treated.

One other reason could be that financially orthodontics is not a terribly expensive procedure and a very good value because of the benefits that may be derived. Furthermore, dental insurances may help to reduce the cost and newer methods do not show the stainless steel bands that used to be so unsightly. And if there are many people having orthodontics done, it is a comfort for the new patient to go along with the treatment. What a subject to talk about!

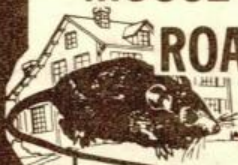

Re: Central Artery North Area Project

Dear Speaker O'Neill:

We, residents of your district and members of the Charlestown North Area Task Force (CNATF) appeal for your assistance in reversing the recent decision by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) eliminating most of the funding for an interstate project of great importance to our community. We refer to the proposed replacement of existing overhead structures with tunnels between I-93 and the Mystic River Bridge (the Central Artery North Area Project).

The elimination of the funding will:

- continue a dangerous traffic situation which the project was intended to correct;
- preclude further regional and local traffic improvements;
- continue degradation of an historic area including the Charlestown Navy Yard, Bunker Hill, and Paul Revere's Landing;
- deprive the community of \$62 million in direct private development and adversely affect \$325 million in additional private investment; and
- violate the community trust by abandoning the community planning process.

For over five years, members of the Charlestown community have been meeting regularly with the Massachusetts Department of Public Works (MDPW) and its consultants to study and recommend a design for the Central Artery North Area Project. Two years ago, the community organized CNATF as a formal body to represent it in the planning process. In accordance with the established review procedures of FHWA and MDPW, including design review and environmental impact, we reviewed over 25 design alternatives, each of which provided for tunnel connections beneath City Square to replace the existing overhead structure. In early 1982 MDPW approved the design which the Charlestown community had endorsed unanimously. On March 9, 1982, MDPW presented the final design selection at a public hearing. Public comment confirmed community support, as well as the official support of the City of Boston, for both the tunnel concept and the specific design selected by MDPW.

Charlestown, long a victim of insensitive regional highway planning, looked forward to an exciting project that would liberate the community from much of the devastation wrought on it by the Mystic River Bridge. A list of the benefits of the project to the community and the region is attached as Appendix.

However, on March 25, 1982, N.J. Van Ness, Region One Division Administrator of the FHWA, advised MDPW in a letter that the proposed tunnels and surface street improvements at City Square would not be eligible for Interstate funds. As a practical matter, MDPW will not be

able to proceed with these critical portions of the project without Interstate funds. FHWA apparently believes that the project can proceed without tunnels; we believe that it cannot.

The FHWA pronouncement came as a shock to us, and presumably to MDPW as well. Since 1980, MDPW has included this project in its Interstate Cost Estimate to FHWA. To the best of our knowledge, FHWA had been aware of the details of this project and consistently had supported MDPW's plans to replace the existing overhead structures with tunnels. Mr. Van Ness's letter apparently represents a recent reversal of FHWA's position.

We strenuously protest FHWA's action. Not only does scrapping of MDPW's tunnel-oriented design eliminate most, if not all, of the advantages referred to above, and make future traffic improvements structurally impossible, but it makes a mockery of the public planning process in which Charlestown residents have participated in good faith for over five years. To merely reconstruct the existing overhead connection would subject Charlestown to years of construction-related disruption and environmental degradation without resulting in a single benefit to the community. Once again Charlestown is falling victim to callous, insensitive highway planning.

In Mr. Van Ness's letter of March 25, 1982, FHWA relies on the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1981 as the basis of its decision. However, Section 4 of that Act specifically provides for the funding of those projects included in the 1981 Interstate Cost Estimate. Since Mr. Van Ness's letter acknowledges that this project is included in the 1981 Interstate Cost Estimate, we believed that FHWA erred in its judgment and is obligated to fund the project.

We turn to you, as our Representative and as Speaker of the House, for assistance in convincing FHWA that its interpretation of the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1981 is in error and that to abandon the Central Artery North Area Projects at this advanced stage would be a travesty.

We would appreciate the opportunity to discuss this urgent matter with you or members of your staff, either in Boston or in Washington.

Thank you for your anticipated cooperation.

Michael, My Son

This story began for me more than a decade ago. For Michael Peters and his father George, Sr. It began the day Michael was born, more than thirty years ago. It is being told with Mike's permission, and for very good reason.

"Looking back," he told me in a recent phone conversation. "I knew I was screwing myself up royally, but it took many years to realize what I was doing to my family, especially my father. I dragged him through courts, jails, hospitals, rehabilitation centers, through hell, and all in full view of relatives, neighbors, and friends. I was a source of extreme embarrassment to my father — I was his cross.

"Through no fault of his own, he was forced to share my less than glorious activities with others, but things are a bit different now, and I think in fairness to him, he should be able to tell people what I've come to be. There were many years when he could have, and rightfully so, washed his hands of me, but he didn't.

"I want, more than anything else, to know that my father can look anybody right in the eye and say, with pride, 'This is Mike, my son!'"

It was a warm spring night in 1970 or maybe 1971 when Dave Jackson and I were leaving the Boys Club after an evening of work. On Greet Street, up near High, we witnessed a young man knocking an elderly woman to the ground and stealing her purse. Shortly thereafter, the man was arrested, and because Dave and I had seen the assault and robbery, we were summoned to appear in court the next morning to testify against him. The young man was Michael Peters, a member of my 1967 typing class at Charlestown High School. I can remember very well wishing I did not know him. Testifying against somebody you know in a court of law can be quite uncomfortable.

At the hearing, and on subsequent visits to the court, I learned that Michael had served in Viet Nam, and like many others, came home drug addicted. Because this

country's feeling for Viet Nam reached out even to those who fought the war, Mike came home to no hero's welcome, to no sympathetic ears. What started in Viet Nam grew worse at home.

While out on bail on the Assault and Robbery Charge, he was arrested for more serious crimes. By his own admission his very presence infected the streets of Charlestown during 1970 and 1971.

For a while he was able to escape incarceration by pleading Drug Dependence and taking part in Rehabilitation Programs offered by the Veteran's Administration. The programs always seemed to work for Michael, that is until the people running the program felt he was well enough to visit home for a day. Michael's first and foremost objective upon these occasions was to make a connection, buy some Heroin, and inject it into his veins with a hypodermic syringe. Naturally, money was needed to feed this habit, naturally Michael stole that money.

Finally the courts had their fill of him, and during the years 1972 through 1974, he served sentences for various offenses at both Deer Island and Walpole State Prison.

Sometime during these years a transformation of enormous proportions began to take place. Whether it was a single event or a simple realization that his life had become a dead end street before his twenty-fifth birthday, is not too clear, but the fact that Michael Peters was making a concerted effort to bring his head above water for the first time in many years became evident to him and to those, especially his father, who had suffered with him.

Michael's intelligence is superior, of that there is no doubt, but during his drug filled years, he did his absolute best to toss a blanket over that intelligence, hiding it even from himself.

After being drug free for a while, and tasting the bitterness of reality at Walpole, his abilities began to surface. He knew what he had been, and seeing others suffering from the same sickness which was once his own, set out to help.

In 1975 Michael's life took an abrupt "U" turn when he

was appointed Director of Admissions for the Washingtonian Center for Addictions in Jamaica Plain.

During the years 1976 through 1980 he served as a Rehabilitation Counselor at the Alcohol and Drug Center of the Veteran's Administration. In 1977 he fielded drug related questions on a late night talk show broadcast on a local radio station.

In 1976, the fog of drug abuse now cleared from his mind, he enrolled at Mass Bay Community College, and by 1980, had studied both there and at Northeastern University. His ability to comprehend came to the forefront, and he was selected as a member of the Honor Society at each Institution.

Presently he is the assistant Director of Veteran's Affairs and counseling at the University of Massachusetts in Amherst, and perhaps more impressive, a full time Pre-Med student sporting a lofty 3.6 cumulative grade average out of a possible 4.0.

His home now is a forty acre farm in Western Massachusetts near the college, his goal, a career in the medical profession.

Thirteen years have passed since Michael Peters first set foot in Viet Nam. Twelve years have passed since the United States Government decorated him with two Purple Hearts and the Bronze Star for Valor, but most important to him is the ten years that have passed since he rid himself of his once constant companion, Heroin, a companion he met on the battlefields of Viet Nam, a companion who would not leave him for nearly three years.

Yes, Mr. George Peters, Sr., you had a right to be embarrassed by your son's actions those many years ago. What he did was no secret, but unfortunately, what he has become, what he is now doing, is quite probably a secret to many of those people who saw Mike sink to the depths of depravity, but did not witness his painful and courageous struggle to climb from those depths.

Yes, Mr. George Peters, Sr., you have every right now to stand tall and declare to the world, "This is Michael Peters, my son!"

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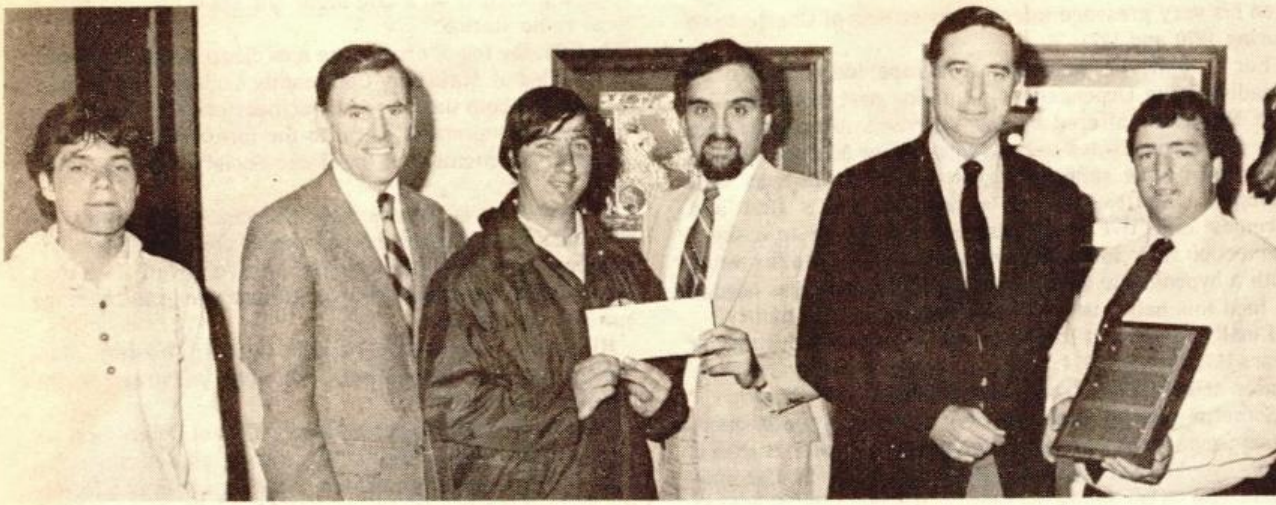

Duel At Wonderland Like Title Bout

The anticipated showdown between Unruly, the top money winner in greyhound racing with more than \$187,000 in career purse earnings, and Ijusplanowinner, Wonderland record holder with 10 consecutive victories over the 7/16ths-of-a-mile course, in the championship final of the 30th \$135,000 Huestis Marathon Championship on Friday, May 21 is being compared to the Larry Holmes - Gerry Cooney heavyweight championship fight.

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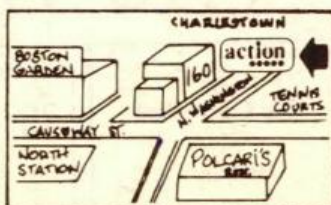

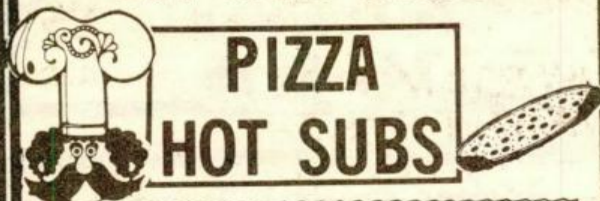
