## Board Of Appeal Approves

## Requested Variances For Clubhouse Expansion

Over 100 people supporting the Boys \& Girls Club's proposed expansion plans attended the Zoning Board of Appeals hearing on June 3. In addition, 155 letters of endorsement and a petition containing the names of 2,014 residents requesting the approval of the variances in the city's zoning code necessary to erect a two-story rear addition and install a swimming pool at the Charlestown Boys \& Girls Club facility at 60 High St. were presented to the board.

Attomey Raymond Murphy of the law firm of Palmer \& Dodge opened the presentation on behalf of the Boys \& Girls Clubs of

Boston. Jerry Steimel, director of the Charlestown clubhouse told the 104 -year-old history of the club that calls 60 percent of school-age children in the town as members and hosts some 250 of these members each day in various programs.

Steimel explained that the High Street building was the Trinity Methodist Church from 1867 until the building was purchased by the Boys Club in 1925.

He said that maintaining both the High and Green street buildings, connected by a tunnel under Wood Street, has become a drain on funds allocated to the club and poses a problem
moving the youngsters between the two sites. Steimel stated that neither site is handicap accessible, a condition that will be corrected with the renovation of the High Street building. Steimel went on to say that over 80 percent of the members walk to the club. This, he said, necessitates a central location for the clubhouse which the existing site provides. He added that possible sites investigated for new construction were at either end of the town, and consultants called in on the planning stages recommended renovating the High Street facility.

(continued from page 1) club were to consolidate in the Green Street facility, there would be an inadequate gym and pool. Murphy told the board that the Green Street building will eventually be sold.

Andrea Leers from the club's architectural firm of Leers Weinzapfel Associates Inc. presented an overview of the planned expansion and renovation to the board using photographs, sketches and a model of the addition. She explained that the original footprint for the expansion was decreased by locating the pool in the basement and compacting other program areas.

Leers stated that the addition will be lower than the building's existing roof as there is a drop at the back of the building of about three stories. She added that the present plan is in response to stated height and light concerns, and it maintains the historic quality of the building.

Charlestown club advisory board member Pat Sweeney outlined the history of the plans to renovate the clubhouse. He said the clubhouse board decided in 1991 that "something" had to be done with the club, and in 1995, the Boys \& Girls Clubs of Boston committed $\$ 4$ million.

Sweeney stated that in the fall of 1995 , over 200 residents heard the preliminary plans for renovation of the High Street building along with the commitment that there would community involvement in the design of the facility as well as in the eventual sale of the Green Street building.

He told the board that 1996 was spent in fund raising and shortly after the first of this year, meetings were facilitated by the Development Committee of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC) and meetings were also sponsored by the Design Review Committee of the Charlestown Preservation Society. In addition, Sweeney said, abutters meetings were held, each drawing $25-30$ area residents. "Legitimate issues" came up and the team worked to address these issues.

Some of the issues Sweeney said the club's development team addressed included: parking, two off-street spaces would be secured for the vans; damage to area foundations, the club would have engineers examine these foundations before the start of construction; traffic study, which was conducted on Green and High streets, with findings that included no significant traffic impacts expected on High Street and an improvement in traffic on Green Street; a Main Street entrance, which will be provided directly into Little Patriots; and a light and shadow study, the results of which showed "increased shade in short periods of time in the summer."
Sweeney said the development team had every intention of continuing to meet with abutters and the community. He told the board, "We are willing to work with anyone who wants to work with us," adding, "We hope we can work with all."

An engineer for Beacon

Skanska Construction, hired by the club on Jan. 1, explained to the board their plan from the start to go through a careful design process so that construction could begin in the summer of 1997. He said the site had been tested by a geotechnology firm and test pits and borings had been done and they showed "excellent bearing material" and there would be "no problem" installing a pool in the basement.

The board called on persons in the audience testifying against the requested variances to speak first. Board member James Farmer did note that about 15 letters in opposition to the variances had been submitted.
Attorney George Hall opened the testimony in opposition to the plan, representing High Street neighbors. He told the board the plan was ill-conceived and would affect the abutters and their properties.
High Street resident Peter McGill spoke of his family living in Charlestown since the 1900 s and his membership in the club. However, the height and mass of the plan was of concern to him. He added that he would not be in opposition if it were just a renovation.

Margaret Smyth of High Street brought diagrams and explained the relationship of the club to the health center, also on High Street. She said the plan'will block views, light and sun and will be a burden to a residential street.

Michael O'Keefe, also of
High Street, was concerned
about increased vehicular and pedestrian traffic, while Wood Street resident Sandra Fahey expressed concerm about the building's "mass," blocking light and air.
The owner of 66-68 High St. said he would welcome renovation to the club as it is run down. He complained that his drive is used by vendors for the health center and "club people."

Bill King of Hathon Square told the board that he addition is "too big to plunk down in a residential area." It was noted to the board that this area is zoned for commercial use.

Wood Street resident Simon Fahey showed the board a photo of a sunset aken from his house, the view of which he said would be blocked. He spoke of the parking and congestion on High Street. He said he never has had a problem with Charlestown children but he does have a problem with basketball games and weekend rentals. He added that he thought he plan "asks too much from a few residents.
Carl Zellner of Elm Street told the board that he "admires the club's mission" but has "tolerated inconvenience for the past 23 years." He spoke of the parking demands by employees and visitors, adding hat there would be a great increase in traffic.
Judy Evers, regional coordinator from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, was the first to speak in support of the plan and gave the full support of that office.

## MGH Community Benefit Program

 Kicks Off Substance Abuse Initiative In CharlestownThe MGH Community Benefit Program, in conjunction with two long-standing neighborhood organizations - the Healthy Charlestown Coalition and CHarlestown Against Drugs (CHAD) - has formally unveiled a multi-year initiative to help the community fight substance abuse. The announcement marks the formalization of an ongoing process to work with the residents to identify and address important health issues affecting the well-being of the community.
"During the past 12 months, MGH has formed a partnership with community leaders, health and human services providers and Charlestown residents to identify the health issues that most affect the community," says Joan Quinlan, director of the MGH Community Benefit Program. "Through this partnership we identified the issue of substance abuse as the number one health risk to Charlestown residents."

According to a 1996 city of Boston report, Charlestown ranked first out of the 16 Boston neighborhoods in drug-related deaths. This substance abuse initiative community awareness campaign will provide ongoing support and seed money for new programs and initiatives that address the risks of drug and alcohol abuse.

As part of the MGH•Charlestown

HealthCare Center's annual Health Awareness Day, representatives from MGH, the health center's community advisory board, the Healthy Charlestown Coalition and other community organization leaders announced grants to three local agencies serving Charlestown - the John F. Kennedy Family Service Center, Bunker Hill Community College and the Charlestown Boys \& Girls Club.

The grants are aimed at supporting efforts addressing substance abuse prevention. The agencies have created programs designed to keep Charlestown High School students in school; launch a program designed to interest young adults in furthering their education; and assist families particularly those with young children - in coping with the effects of drug or alcohol addiction. The agencies will work in conjunction with the Healthy Charlestown Coalition, which is coordinating the initiative.

The Charlestown Boys \& Girls Club has created the Excell Program, a support program aimed at keeping youth in school. Based on a similar program at the Clarence R. Edwards Middle School, Excell works with the local high school to identify and monitor students who may be at risk of low academic achievement related to poor attendance, which in turn, can put them at
risk for substance abuse. In addition to educational counseling and after-school tutoring services, the program offers selfesteem and life-skills building activities, including the Baby-Think-It-Over program, a pregnancy prevention curriculum, and guest speakers on such topics as domestic violence, substance abuse prevention and health and wellness issues.
Bunker Hill Community College has offered Mentoring Young Adults for Success, a program designed to introduce community young adults to higher education. This 15 -week program, which provides a semester of free tuition, offers four specific credited courses in writing skills, computer application and career planning, as well as a course designed to provide a basic understanding of the effects of drug and alcohol abuse.

Families who have members struggling with drug or alcohol addiction typically need support, particularly those families with younger children. The Kennedy Center now provides a series of 10 -week group sessions designed to educate parents and children about the effects of substance abuse on the entire family. Thee program also will help family members develop. practical skills for coping with the issues involved with living in a family affected by
substance abuse.
"Awareness and education are the most important answers to the question of how to prevent substance abuse," says Peter Looney, chairman of CHAD, and a member of the health center's community advisory committee. "People in this community recognized the reality of substance abuse and are working together to make others aware of the consequences. These grants give the community the opportunity to provide its residents the tools they need to make informed decisions about drug and alcohol use.

Each program was assessed using criteria by the Community Benefit Advisory Committee, which is comprised of MGH representatives, individuals with expertise in community-based substance abuse prevention and community residents. The agencies and programs that received awards have agreed to work closely with the Healthy Charlestown Coalition to develop a comprehensive, multi-faceted, multi-year plan for the community.

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## D. A. Helps Drug Dealers <br> Give Back To The Community

Over $\$ 35,000$ will be available to local non-profit organizations working to keep adolescents off drugs and off crime, according to Suffolk County District Attomey Ralph C. Martin, II. Applications now available are due by July 31 .

The money is disbursed from the DA's Forfeiture Reinvestment Program which takes cash and assets seized from drug dealers and turns them into grants Suffolk County organizations can use to fight child drug use and crime.
"Directing forfeiture
monies toward programs that turn young people away from drugs is part of my ongoing plan to prioritize youth crime prevention and juvenile justice," said Martin. "The reinvestment grants will help our young people fight the invasion of drugs in their schools and neighborhoods."
Applications can be picked up at the Suffolk County District Attomey's Office, sixth floor of the New Courthouse, or by calling $725-8600$ to request mailing. Questions should be directed to Community

Relations Director Deborah McDonagh at 725-8760. Proposals are reviewed by a seven-member residents' selection committee appointed by Martin.
The grant funds are a percentage of money and property seized from drug dealers by the DA's office State law allows up to 10 percent of money from auctions of drug dealers property and confiscated funds to be returned to the community.

(continued from page 8 ) Looney submitted a letter of support from that organiza tion. He also spoke as the chairman of CHarlestown Against Drugs, noting that "the club is the best thing we have in Charlestown." He stated: "Children are more important than shadows."

Jim Conway of Belmont Street told the board he was in full support of the proposal. He stated that he had feelings for the abutters, but noted that when they moved into the neighborhood, the club was there.

He addressed several is-
sues, including the safety hazards of Green Street, the fact that the club has a right to develop its land, the club's mission and its dealing with one of the town's biggest problems - drugs, and the reality that the club is now $30-35$ percent minority and the importance of this being a place for all children to work together.
City Councillor Diane Modica spoke in favor of the club's petition. She said that everyone is not going to be happy, but the club "has gone miles." She added that in urban areas, compromises
have to be made. Also testifying in favor of the plan were City Councillors Albert O'Neil, Mickey Roache, Steve Murphy, Brian Honan and a representative of Peggy Davis-Mullen. Board Chairman Richard Dennis called for all others present to support the petition to stand.

Farmer stated that the club had conducted the best outreach program with neighbors he had seen in his 13 years on the board.
The board voted unanimously to approve the petition, subject to design review.

GETTING MARRIED AGAIN?
GET TAX ADVICE!
June has long been the favorite month for weddings. If there's a wedding in your future, taxes are probably the last thing on your mind. But if this is a second marriage for either of you, a trip to your accountant before the wedding could be well worthwhile.
At the very least, you can see how you'll be affected by the "marriage penalty" and by changes in earnings or deductions that could put you in a different tax bracket. For example, if one of you is covered by a retirement plan at work, marriage could affect the deductibility of the other's IRA contribution. And if you're retired, the taxability of your joint social security benefits could change.

If one or both of you owns a house, tax advice on timing the sale or the purchase of a new home is critical. For example, the one-time exclusion of $\$ 125,000$ of capital gain for owners 55 and older can only be used once by a married couple. However, each of you could use the full exclusion if you sold your homes before the marriage, effectively doubling the exclusion. Capital gain on a home sale can also be deferred if you invest in a replacement residence within the required time. Here again, good tax advice on when and how to buy the replacement home can save you thousands of dollars in taxes.

Often a person marrying for the second time will have significant personal wealth, perhaps from a business he or she owns. In this case a prenuptial agreement may be needed. And if either of you has children from an earlier marriage, a second marriage can change their inheritance rights, so sound estate planning is advisable.

To The Editor:
I am writing in response to the article in The Patriot of May 29 , "I Am the Boys and Girls Club - I NEED YOUR HELP." I am not an abutter, and have not attended any of the public meetings about the club's building proposal, so I have no personal knowledge of the issues described in the article. However, I believe the author, in his zeal to support this fine institution, has lost sight of some important issues that apply to any major building proposal.

There is a civic and legal process that any building proposal of this size must go through, whether by a private developer who wants to maximize profit, or a venerable community asset such as the Boys and Girls Club. It can be slow and frustrating for the projects' supporters, particularly since abutters are likely to feel strongly about its effect on their homes.

Their concems about such things as building height blocking the sun may be real, and legitimate. Even though studies of the impact of these issues commissioned by the developer may minimize or even contradict these concerns,

abutters may honestly disagree with their conclusions. In fact, my impression has been that studies commissioned by developers invariably favor the developer's proposal and do need to be looked at carefully, rather than accepted at face value.

Above all, however, it is important to the community that this civic process, burdensome as it may seem to those convinced of a proposal's merits, be carried out with civility. Accusations that those who oppose the project are motivated by a desire to get rid of the club entirely, exhortations that they should be ashamed, and threats to publish their names in the newspaper may be effective, but poison the air.

There must be a better way to promote a project than by intimidating those who raise objections. I wish that the writer of the article had, after venting his frustration at the typewriter, shelved the manuscript rather than publishing it in The Patriot.
