Raw wind and bonechilling rain cut through the crowd of family members, friends and former neighbors but failed to dampen the spirits of those who gathered on the knoll at the south of City Square to pay tribute to Maj. Gen. Michael Joseph Galvin, USAR, on May 13.

According to Galvin's daughter, Priscilla Galvin Watkins, her father was an amazing man who was a Townie who went from jumping off bridges into the river to the advisor of presidents.

Some 15 months ago, Attorney Bill Galvin was researching his family's
history when he came across some information that called for the dedication of a new low bridge across the Charles River in memory of Gen. Galvin. The bridge was never built, but when the knoll area came to be with the Mass. Highway Department (MHD) development adjacent to City Square, Galvin sought support from Sen. Thomas Birmingham. The senator then included language in Chapter 273 of the Acts of 1994 to have the area named in honor of Gen. Galvin.

Although 15 months seems to be a long time, it can be "faster than the

speed of light" in attempting to get a bill passed through the legislature, noted Birmingham.
Bill Galvin asked the assistance of Charlestown Neighborhood Council Veterans Committee Chairman Jim Conway, Past National Historian of the American Legion, and the support of state and local organizations to make the tribute to "Uncle Joe," as he was called by family members, or "Iron Mike" as he was known in the military, a reality. Conway served as master of ceremonies for the dedication.

The colors were posted by the USS Constitution Color Guard, and music was provided by the Coonel Band of Lawrence with soloist Kathleen Adams.

Offering the invocation and benediction was Rev. John Galvin, chairman, Theology Department, Catholic University in Washington, D.C., nephew of Maj. Gen. Galvin. He stated that Maj. Gen Galvin served his country and the commonwealth (continued on page 11)

## Citizen Flag Alliance Sponsors Flag Rally In Charlestown On Sunday

Three historical 90 -foot flags, part of the U.S. National Flag Exhibit collection, will be unfurled together for the first time at a Flag Rally at the Boston National Historical Park in the Charlestown Navy Yard on Sunday, May 21 This event comes a few days before the first hear ing on Capitol Hill to re view legislation to amend the Constitution to prohibit desecration of the U.S Flag.
The rally is sponsored by the Citizens Flag Alliance (CFA) in cooperation with the Department of Mass., The American Legion, which is one of its members. The rally will begin at 11 a.m. with an Ecumenical Service on board the USS Cassin Young on Pier One, adja cent to the USS Constitu tion.
It will include the participation of the USS Con stitution Color Guard, the Charlestown High School (CHS) MA-761, U.S. Air Force Jr ROTC, and Ame rican Legion color guards from Dedham Post 18 and Somerville Post 19
Presiding chaplains for the service will be Rev Daniel J. Mahoney, pastor of St. Francis de Sales Church and chaplain for the Boston Fire Department, and the Rev.. Carl Bergstrom, president, New England Chapter Military Chaplains and chaplain for
the Department of Mass. D.A.V.

Soloist will be Richard Kerry Thompson, Irish Lyric Tenor, and music will be provided by the Canton Post 24, American Legion Band.

The flag ceremony will follow immediately at 11:45 a.m., with Marc Val entine, caretaker of the U.S. National Flag Exhibit, directing the unfurling and joined by 30 sailors from the USS McInerney (FFG8), a guided missile frigate, sailors from the USS Constitution and the First Coast Guard District as well as cadets from the CHS USAF J. ROTC and Sea Cadets, among others

After the unfurling, the giant Mt. Rushmore flag will be raised on a crane.

At approximately 12:20 p.m., a parade of support ers, led by the USS Constitution Color Guard, the Canton Post 24, American Legion Band and pipers from the Kevin Barry Irish American Pipe Band, among others, will then march to the Bunker Hill Monument. On the monument grounds, CFA President Daniel S. Wheeler CFA Mass. Chairman John P. "Jake" Comer, Past National Commander, The American Legion and other invited elected officials and distinguished guests from CFA member organizations, such as the Knights of Columbus, the Moose
and other patriotic organizations will speak in support of a Constitutional amendment to prohibit the desecration of the flag.

The flags being used at the rally are part of the U.S. National Flag Exhibit, a historic collection of five 300 -pound, 90 -foot flags. The flags, which have traveled worldwide on the N ational Historic Truck, have been used in more than 400 official ceremonies. The National Historic Truck, based in Boston on the Freedom Trail, has been in existence through three White House administrations and has clocked more than 500,000 miles.

Each of the flags to be unfurled has a rich historical background. The Mt. Rushmore American Flag was first used to cover the Lincoln figure on Mt. Rushmore for the July 4 rededication in 1987. The World War II Commemorative Flag was the first American flag to travel through the English Channel Tunnel during the anniversary observance of DDay in June 1994. The third flag was originally made for the U.S. Coast Guard's 200th Anniversary and has flown over the North Pole.

Mass. is one of 49 states that have passed memorializing resolutions asking Congress for a flag protection amendment. A hearing

## Massport Begins Revere Sugar Demolition Project

In a effort to revitalize valuable property on the Mystic River, the Mass. Port Authority began demolition this week of the former Revere Sugar facility on Medford Street.

Massport Director of Seaport Planning and Development Daniel O'Connell said, "This 18 -month demolition project is being performed to eliminate a potential health and safety problem from the Charlestown area. It will also facilitate the future use of the site for water-dependent industrial uses, potentially bulk cargo shipping."

The Revere Sugar Demolition project, awarded to Modern Continental Construction Co. Inc. of Cambridge, includes the
demolition of several large uninhabited buildings, two wharves, cranes, conveyors and two piers on the old Revere Sugar industrial site on the Mystic River in Charlestown.

O'Connell said, "Modem Continental Construction Co. is utilizing traditional demolition methods which employ heavy equipment to knock down the structures and clean up the site, as opposed to explosion."

Massport has mitigation measures ready to minimize any impacts on the community and the environment. In order to reduce dust emissions, the building will be wet down periodically, and environmental dust monitors will
be in use at all times. Truck operators are instructed to utilize Medford Street to Sullivan Square, the most direct egress route from the residential community.

O'Connell said, "The result of the project will be overall positive long-term environmental benefits, because buildings and other structures which pose a fire hazard will be removed leaving a clear site suitable for development."

The former Revere Sugar Refinery is an 18 -acre site, composed of approximately 13 acres of uplands and five acres of tidelands. The site supports approximately 3.4 acres of buildings, 1.3 acres of dilapidated wood piers and 0.7
acres of concrete piers and mooring dolphins. Revere Sugar Company used these facilities to import partially treated refined sugar and completed the refining process at this plant until 1986. In 1988, Massport purchased the property for $\$ 6$ million for land-banking purposes and it has remained dormant ever since awaiting a viable maritime use.

Representatives from Massport and the Charlestown Neighborhood Council Environmental Committee will meet with the community at $7 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. on Wednesday, May 31, at the old refinery site, 333 Medford St., to discuss any concerns that may arise conceming the project.

Tom Cunha, new Courageous Sailing

Center Board member, said recently he was amazed that such a great program has evolved in the past year since Gould took the helm. "It's safe, it's free, it's wonderful!" Bob McGann of Charlestown Community Centers, also a board member, reports that the kids he sent to Courageous last year loved it. Last year, nearly one quarter of the 455 youth in the programs were from Charlestown. This year, Gould expanded the program's minimum goal to 540 children, with a maximum of 720 . The goal has been exceeded ( 566 ) already. The program has hired 10 senior instructors and five junior instructors, one third of whom are from Charlestown, they are: Shane Coleman, Chris Gallagher, Patrick Lacey, Eddie Prince and Heather Richard.
Hey kids, it's a great opportunity to learn to sail! The program is funded by adult memberships, private and corporate donations, and a big boost from Mayor Thomas Menino's office. This past year, the city provided the funds to paint, build new ramps, repair docks, replace the roof, and reglaze the windows.

The Boston Company/Mellon Bank has created a partnership with Courageous an: will donate $\$ 30,000$ this year. The first corporate challenge at Courageous will generate $\$ 25,000$, and the mayor, through the Boston Parks and Recreation Department, will grant $\$ 20,000$, in addition to many other improvements.

Adult membership is booming, and Charlestown residents who wish to leam how to sail at a great price, are encouraged to come to the open house. The program has become a strong, stable one in and for the Charlestown Community and its youth.

(continued from page 1) with "distinction." He asked those present to "recommit themselves to a free, just and sustainable society."

Bill Galvin thanked Gov. Weld, Lt. Gov. Cellucci, the MHD, Birmingham and Voke, who he noted "has been dedicated to the rejuvenation of City Square." He said that "when things got stalled, Birmingham was on the telephone to assist."

As for family, he said that his Aunt Ann Donley was here from Alexandria, Va., and Maj. Gen. Galvin's four daughters were present - Noreen Dunn, Gail Cadasay, Patricia DeSimone and Priscilla Watkins, who spoke on behalf of the family.

In introducing Birmingham, Conway said that he was born in Charlestown
and now resides in Chelsea. He spoke of his father being an "exponent of veterans rights and services." He added that Birmingham is "a good friend of Charlestown."
Birmingham credited the help of Voke, Weld, Cellucci, along with MHD Deputy Commissioner Kevin Sullivan. He stated that "Maj. Gen. Galvin has brought honor to his family and to his community. He was dedicated to his family, his neighborhood and to his country." He went on to say that "the values he so well personified are the core principals of Charlestown." Birmingham said that he "had to ask where the media is today?" He noted that Maj. Gen. Galvin personified the decent, hardworking, patriotic people of this community. He con-
cluded: "In celebrating Maj. Gen. Galvin today, we celebrate the entire community."

Maj. Gen. Peter W. Clegg, USAR, commanding officer, 94th U.S. Army Reserve Command, stated: "It was an inspiration to read the background of Gen. Galvin with his extraordinary success in civilian, military and political careers," noting that "it was rare to see this combination." He said that Maj. Gen. Galvin displayed "heroism in combat plus a number of successes in all endeavors of his life."
Priscilla Galvin Watkins expressed the appreciation of the Galvin family for the honor to them and to Charlestown. She said that for those who wanted to learn more about her father, the archives in the Truman

Library and the state level of the Senate contains much information.
Watkins described her father as "a man who was Irish, he was going to have a good time, he loved women and he dressed like a peacock."
She spoke about her grandmother who had her first child at 32 , her last at 46 and was left by the death of her husband when she was 47 to raise her children, with five being under the age of 10 .
Watkins told about her father working as a pin boy at 11. He graduated from elementary school at 13 and then "got his first job with Western Union where he wore a uniform and got tips."

He was asked to join a prestigious law firm in Boston he encountered while
working for Western Union and the senior partner became his mentor. He was encouraged to go on to school, graduating from the Charlestown Evening Commercial High School while he continued working. Watkins said it was instilled in him "to vote, get involved and know his responsibilities." She said he went to military training camp in 1928 and one of the proudest moments in his life was when he assumed command of the 94th in 1961. He had been motivated to go to law school and worked his was up in the law firm. He said that there is something so hopeful in seeing wasted land turned into something beautiful, such as this knoll . . . and by dedicating land to Galvin, you are reminding all who see this green that what a $\sin$ it is to waste an opportunity to make something grand." He went on to say that "when you glance over to this knoll from City Square, you can know what the American dream really means."

Voke spoke of the Galvin family and their contributions to the city, noting that the Galvin farnily continues to be active in the city.

(continued from page I) on the amendment - House Joint Resolution 79 - will be held on Wednesday, May 24 in the House Judiciary Committee's Subcommittee on the Constitution.

The amendment legislation, which has attracted more than 320 congressional co-sponsors, would enable the states and the federal government to enact flag protection legislation.

Chief sponsors of House Join Resolution 79 are U.S. Reps. Gerald Solomon (R-N.Y.) and Sonny Montgomery (D-Miss.). U.S. Sens. Orrin Hatch (RUtah) and Howell Heflin (D-Ala.) are chief co-sponsors of Senate Joint Resolution 31. In Mass., U.S. Reps. Peter Blute (R-3rd) and Peter G. Torkildsen ( R -6th) have signed on as
official co-sponsors.
CFA is a nonprofit, non-partisan coalition of 97 organizations representing a broad range of military, fraternal, civic, minority, business and labor groups leading the national grassroots campaign
for the passage of a Constitutional amendment to protect the flag from desecration.

## Smile!

The standard deduction is increased by $\$ 750$ for a married taxpayer age 65 or older or blind ( $\$ 1,500$ if both 65 and blind). It's increased by $\$ 950$ for single taxpayers age 65 or older or blind ( $\$ 1,900$ if both 65 and blind).
Other adjustments. In 1995, children under the age of 14 are allowed to have $\$ 1,300$ of unearned income before the kiddie tax applies. Also adjusted for inflation is the amount of income taxpayers can have before they begin to lose the taxfree exemption for college bond interest. The income levels for 1995 increased to $\$ 63,450$ for married taxpayers and to $\$ 42,300$ for singles.
The maximum contribution that taxpayers can make to $401(\mathrm{k})$ plans remains at $\$ 9,240$ for 1995 . The standard mileage rate for business travel increases to $30 c$ a mile.

New tax legislation in 1995 could change some or all of these numbers. Keep that likelihood in mind as you undertake your 1995 tax planning.

Doherty Park is the last remaining neighborhood park designed by Freder-
ick Law Olmsted for the city of Boston. Olmsted is recognized as the father of American landscape design and is the one person believed to be responsible for this country's park system as we know it. He designed parks in almost every major American city, including New York City's Central Park and the Capital grounds in Washington, D.C.

While he was working on the Emerald Necklace for Boston, he and his firm were asked to design five neighborhood parks. There are only two left, one at Copp's Hill in the North End, and ours here in Charlestown. It has only recently come to light that
ours is actually the last of Olmsted's parks for the city; Copp's Hill was designed by his sons.
Through the efforts of The Friends of Doherty Park, the Parks Department has completed a master plan for restoration of the park and work will begin on different areas of the park this spring. Final steps are being taken toward the park's being listed on the National Historic Register.
Doherty Park is on Bunker Hill Street near St. Francis de Sales Church and runs down to Medford Street. In case of rain, the clean-up will take place on Sunday, May 21.
