



That's right, the .380 dates from before the first moving assembly line that Henry Ford installed. The .380 was a John Browning invention from 1908, and the Highland Park assembly plant, on Woodward Avenue in Highland Park, didn't get up and running until 1913.




and 45, finally to the .380, and now we have a pistol we can put them in and expect good things. The Walther CCP M2 .380.

The new Walther is named the same as its big brother, for the very good reason that they look alike. On top is a somewhat pyramidal in cross section slide, with cocking serrations front and back. The Walther logo interrupts the front left-die serrations, while the other three panels (one front and two in the rear) are left plain.

The Walther ejects to the left, as the vast majority of self-loading pistols do. There's a plenty big enough ejection port, and the spring-loaded extractor rides at the bottom line of the ejection port. The ejection port is also where all the required markings are applied. There are the required proof marks on slide and barrel, and serial number on the barrel and frame below the ejection port. One detail I find very interesting is that the frame serial number is applied directly into the polymer of the frame.

You might be wondering how Walther got away with marking the serial number in the polymer. Federal regulations are quite clear; the serial number must be stamped, etched, laser-marked or otherwise permanently marked, into metal, to a certain prescribed depth. Markings on plastic just won't do. The secret, if secret it be, is simple: what looks like the barrel, isn't. What it is is the frame portion that the fixed barrel is pressed into, and what you see as "barrel" is actually part of the frame. So, there's a serial number on the frame in two places, the barrel hoop and the polymer parts-holder. The sights are adjustable but low-profile, so you needn't worry about the sights snagging on that rayon floral-printed horror you elected to leave the house wearing. (Yes, I'm looking at you, Jim Tarr. At least

it wasn't made in China.) Walther ships the CCP M2 .380 with extra front sights, and the tools you'll need to remove and replace, should you wish or need to alter the point of impact. On the back of the slide we have the expected arrangement of panels that hold in the firing components of the slide, and a red-colored cocking indicator. If you see red, the mechanism is cocked. If you don't, it isn't. More on that later.

The serial number is on the polymer frame, as well as on the "barrel." Actually, that isn't the barrel you see there, it is the frame, and the barrel is press-fit into the frame in that area. So, the serial number is actually on the frame and the polymer shell.

The front sight can be changed, using the supplied tools, to alter point of impact.



On the frame, things get interesting. First of all, you will notice the swoopy lines of the frame and grip. Walther has continued to refine the lines, the feel, of their pistols, to make them as ergonomic as possible. Looking at the lines of the grip area, you'd almost swear the Walther grew it, not made it. The frontstrap is undercut, for a higher grip. The frontstrap has one bulge in it, below the trigger guard, and this is to give your second finger more locking when the trigger finger is doing its work. Not a series of finger grooves, just the one bulge to help. The curve of the backstrap fills your hand. The problem with pistols that have finger grooves, as in more than one bulge/lump/hook, is that they are never spaced at the distances of your fingers. Well, my fingers, anyway. That makes them anywhere from useless to uncomfortable. Not so on the Walther CCP .380. The grooves and swells of the sides of the grip give your fingers plenty of leverage for a non-slip grip. And all that is before Walther has even applied the stippling pattern.

Actually, it isn't stippling. It is a raised pattern of tiny arcs of material, organized so any section of it has arcs in multiple directions, so your hand will always find a frictional fit. The non-random random pattern ensures that there is always something (usually a lot of something's) resisting recoil forces, regardless of where your fingers fall on the frame and frontstrap.

The bottom of the backstrap extends slightly past the magazine opening, and this gives you an index point on reloads. The bottom of the backstrap extends until it is flush with the baseplate of the magazine. So, on reloads, you can index the magazine against the bottom edge of the backstrap, to make sure you are getting the magazine in the right place, but once it is locked home it's flush, and doesn't protrude any more than the frame does. This means fast reloads without excess material to snag on clothing or catch and print while carrying. Oh, and those reloads? The magazine release is a button behind the trigger guard, in the expected American place, and that's why this is the Walther CCP M2 .380. M2 is their designation for the American-location release, instead of the dual-paddle European release. Magazines have baseplates with a front lip on them, one that continues the curve of the frontstrap. So, if you have large hands, the magazine baseplate acts to

lock the frame not your grip. If your hand isn't large enough to ride on that baseplate lip, no problem, it isn't in the way. And should you need to rip the magazine out on a reload, the front lip gives you plenty of purchase for that.

The magazines are also interesting. The CCP M2 .380 uses a single-stack magazine, because, well, it is meant to be as concealable a pistol as possible, and a slim grip helps there. Each magazine holds eight rounds, and the magazine does not fight you to load it. The Walther method of making a solid tube for a magazine never ceases to amaze me. They take a sheet metal stamping, and then fold it into a tube, but here's the best part: the edges of the main part of the tube are stamped with small rectangular recesses in them. Then, when Walther presses the main part into shape and fits the tabs of a spine of steel into the rectangular recesses, they interlock and provide a rigid fit. The whole assembly is then permanently attached together, and thus the rear section of the tube is an interlocking, self-reinforcing length of two strips of steel. Oh, and then, for extra longevity and corrosion resistance, it is nickel-plated. I stand accused (and rightly so) of being snarky about German engineering in the past. (Actually, over-engineering, but let's not be too picky, shall we?) But I have to tell you, if I could get all my magazines made this robustly, I would. In-

between the grip and the slide, we have a collection of good parts, details and points of interest.

If you look closely, you'll see three holes in the polymer shell, each with a roll pin in them. These are the pins that attached the actual firearm, the serialnumbered part, to the polymer. The polymer shell is not the firearm, but the chassis inside is not meant to be user-serviceable. You do not take the chassis out to clean the pistol. It is not meant to be modular, and there are no other sized shells to swap the chassis into, should you even wrestle it out. Nor will there be. It was meant to be what it is, and the chassis and pinned polymer shell is just the best-engineered way to accomplish that. On the front of the shell, there is an accessory rail, where you can park the expected light, laser, whatever. The front accessory rail is now such a customary thing that I suppose in a short while we gun writers will simply assume it to exist. And we will not mention anything about rails, until we review a pistol that

lacks one. The use of a light or laser on an every-day carry pistol has become such an expected thing that the makers of lights and lasers make them compact enough to fit onto a pistol such as the Walther CCP .380. Picking one is simply a matter of selecting from an embarrassment of riches. The trigger guard is right out of the 1980s, with a curved and grooved front face, and a small hook at the bottom. The trigger guard then goes straight back until it has to curve up to meet the frontstrap, at the lifted part of the joint between trigger guard and frontstrap.






The magazine baseplate follows the contours of the frame. The backstrap of the frame protrudes below the mag well opening, and provides an indexing location for reloads.

.380 AUTO

The .380 Auto is a mild-pressure pistol cartridge that doesn't really require a locked breech to be handled by a pistol. The original Browning models all used straight blowback designs, and they worked just fine. But, they were all-steel (that was the only way you made pistol back then) and daily carry wasn't as common as it is today.

America was just transitioning to the automobile when the .380 was new in 1908. You could buy a .380 for maybe \$12, and an automobile for \$800. The price of the pistols edged up over time, but the price of automobiles actually came down, once Henry Ford had pioneered assembly-line production. Auto The original assembly line building is now a shell. The neighborhood is relatively safe, by local standards, but the surrounding Detroit neighborhoods are essentially freefire zones.



and truck chassis would be transported down a powered track, and assemblers would bolt on the parts they were assigned to install. Pistols, not so much. By 1923, the Model T base price was \$298.


Once autos became pretty much bullet-resistant, the .380 began a gradual decline. Replaced in police service by the .38 Special before WWII, and then the .357 Magnum, the .380 was relegated more and more to back-up gun status, or a ladies' gun. But the 21st century resurgence of daily carry has changed that. A lot of people now carry, some with a .380 as a prime, others with a .380 as a back-up. And they want modern ammo. Federal has just announced their Hydra-Shok Deep .380 load, which penetrates to and past the 12" minimum the FBI test calls for. It does this both in bare gel and heavy clothing tests. As soon as it is available, we'll be testing it. I had thought that the .380 Auto and the .38 spe-

cial were two popular defensive cartridges that could never be made to cross the FBI 12" threshold. So, I'm looking forward to that test.

The fate of the assembly line was not as kind. The original, Highland Park, is now a shuttered shell. One of the biggest ones in Detroit, the Packard plant only five miles away, has been closed for more than half



On the side of the polymer shell, you can see the three pins that hold the chassis inside the shell. They are not to be removed. The magazine button, behind the trigger guard, is the American location, and thus this is the M2 pistol. Above and behind those are the slide stop and safety.



The trigger is curved, and lacks an internal, or central, safety blade. Behind it is the slide hold-open lever, or button. You can use this to lock the slide open, or if it is open, press down to release the slide. And behind it, is wonder of wonders, a thumb safety. A right-handed-user-only thumb safety, but a thumb safety. When I first pulled the Walther CCP .380 out of the box, I looked at the safety location and angle and thought "This is going to be a problem." Once I've logged a firearm into the bound book, I will wipe it off and then leave it on the desk while I do my research, email the makers and designers, and plan my range trips. I'll periodically pick it up and handle it,

pushing the safety (if there is one) on and off, pop the magazine out and re-insert it, you know, get the feel of it.

Not once in my handling did I fail to properly push the safety lever off or back on. Hmmm, maybe the Walther designers do know a thing or two about pistols, you think?

The next wondrous detail that I noticed came when I test-fired it. I customarily do my chrono work first. This lets me know what velocities any firearm generates, but also does several other things as well. First, I see if it is going to work reliably. Second, I can check to see if it hits to the sights. And third, I get a feel for the recoil. On the first shot with the CCP M2 .380, I stopped. I pulled out the magazine and gingerly pulled the slide back, fully expecting to have an empty case fall onto the bench. Nope, a loaded round came out.

Well, interesting. I load it back up and shoot some more. As I'm working along, I think "This is the softest-shooting .380 I've ever handled," and now that I'm paying attention, the slide is really easy to retract, as well. And that is due to the gas system. Walther calls it their Softcoil gas technology.

The CCP uses a piston that is pinned to the slide, but the pinned interface has some play to it, it is hinged, essentially. The piston slides into a tunnel in

a century, and is now a subject of photographers "ruin porn" images. Imagine, if you will, of three-and-a-half million square feet of building that stretches for nine city blocks, that would be a perfect setting for a postapocalypse movie set, if it were not a post-apocalypse site itself. Too hazardous to actually enter, and too dangerous to get to, it is like Chernobyl with gunshots as a soundtrack. Sometimes it is just too depressing to contemplate.



Existing assembly lines now are more often found in countries where the prevailing wage is doggone it, pretty much like the pay of the original Highland Park assembly line in 1913: five dollars a day.



the frame (below the barrel) and there is a gas port in the barrel, ahead of the chamber. When you fire the CCP .380, the gas, venting through the port, pushes on the piston. The case thrust of the cartridge wants to hurl the slide to the rear. The gas pressure in the piston resists this pressure, keeping the slide closed until the gas bleeds out when the bullet exits the muzzle.

Once pressure drops, the inertia of the case-thrust drives the slide back, but so much has been soaked up by the pressure on the piston, the resulting recoil is very soft. And the recoil spring only has to handle the residual inertia, not all of it, and only needs enough inertia on return to strip off a cartridge and close up for firing. So, recoil is greatly diminished, and the force needed to retract the slide is also greatly diminished.

Those of you who own one, or remember it, will be going "Of course, just like the HK P7." Yes, but without the obnoxiously high slide velocity, and snappy felt recoil the HK had. Also, without the heavy weight of the all-steel P7. Part of the snappiness had to be the HK handling 9mm Parabellum, instead of .380 Auto, but there was also the difference in bore height. I pulled out my HK P7 and compared. Yep, the CCP M2 .380 has the bore closer to the hand. Not much, but add that to the soft-recoiling .380, and the difference is marked, especially given the disparity on weight. The P7 is all steel, and you'd expect it to be softer in recoil. You'd be disappointed. The ejection of empties from the CCP is to the right, but with a definite upwards component. On my gun clubs covered range, the empties rattled

around in the rafters of the roof before falling to the concrete floor.

The gas-delayed blowback system does have one drawback, or a potential drawback: lead bullets pose a potential cleaning problem. The base of a bullet is exposed to the full heat and pressure of the burning powder. Lead bullets can leave lead behind. This may or may not clog up the gas piston and tunnel in the CCP .380. However, I see this as more of a potential than actual problem. The vast majority of .380 shooters are going to be using factory ammo, and no-one that I know of makes an all-lead-bullet .380 load. Reloaders might, but the cost savings would be minimal. I did a short perusal of component prices, and the reloading difference between loading .380 with lead round-nose, versus plated round nose, came to \$18 per thousand rounds more expensive for plated. Really? For \$18 per thousand rounds, you're going to experiment with cleaning the lead out of the CCP .380 gas system? The decreased slide spring force makes the Walther CCP .380 attractive to those with diminished hand strength. Not everyone keeps in shape with fingertip pushups, and the force needed to retract the slide on a big-bore pistol, or a regular-sprung .380, can be too much. So, for them, the Walther CCP .380 is a boon. Another boon is the tool-less takedown. OK, I have a confession to make here. I usually don't bother with the owner's manuals of any of the firearms that pass through here. I've been taking firearms apart for more than half a century, and for more than two decades of that I worked as a gunsmith. Taking firearms apart is a puzzle long-solved. Well, the CCP .380 ended that

string. I looked at it, I pushed and pulled, I checked all the various parts that seemed like they would do the job, and nothing. Nada. Zippo.

So, with a sigh and expecting points deductions from my man-card, I opened the owner's manual and read the process.

First, make sure it is unloaded. Then dry-fire it. Remove the magazine. Now, with one hand press in the end cap that surrounds the cocking indicator, the gizmo I call the striker guide. See the serrated panel below that? Press that to the right side, and once it clears the engagement is has with the striker guide the guide is pushed out of the slide, and the whole slide is now free to be lifted up and removed from the frame.

Once you know, it is simply a matter of coordinating some fingertip pressures. Until then, it is a complete mystery.

Getting it back together is a bit more work. The dif-

.380 AUTO PERFORMANCE

Despite being depended on for generations now, the .380 Auto has never gotten much love. The basic ballistics of it, a 95- to 100-grain-FMJ-bullet, at something approaching 900 fps at most, don't exactly instill confidence.

The popularity of the round has for a long time been due more to the pistols it could be had in, than the horsepower it generated. The traditional FMJ round nose held on because it was what was used when the round was invented. When we went to JHPs, the first ones didn't expand, so no change, really.

When bullet designs began to actually expand, a problem arose: the work to expand the bullet had to come from somewhere. The end result was decreased penetration. As a result, some law enforcement agencies that allow .380s as back up or off-duty options, mandate FMJ ammunition. They'd rather have the assurance of penetration to and past the FBI 12-inch minimum, than expansion and shallow penetration.

An additional choice I'd suggest is to find the load that your pistol shoots most accurately. With the .380 (with any handgun cartridge, really) you need good, centered, hits, and the more accuracy you have from the start, the better.

ficult part here is getting the piston to slide back into the gas tunnel in the chassis, while at the same time fitting the slide over the barrel, and down onto the frame. I found that the easiest way was to point the muzzle up, and then let the piston hang down freely from its connection on the slide, so I could tip the slide and frame around until the piston lined up with the tunnel as I slid things together. As with all such things, the first few times were a bit of work, but once I learned the touch, it became pretty easy.

Test-firing, as explained, was a pretty enjoyable experience. Along with the soft recoil, the CCP .380 delivered excellent accuracy. That's something that all



and bigger frames to hold on to. I attribute this in part to the inherent accuracy of a fixed-barrel pistol, but also to the nice trigger and soft recoil. Don't let anyone kid you: recoil is a hindrance to good groups. A softer-shooting pistol, all other things being equal, is going to be easier to shoot accurately. The trigger, an ounce over five and a half pounds, is clean, and the trigger travel is just over a quarter-inch. If the trigger pull of the Walther CCP .380 is hindering your shooting, you are doing it wrong.

As far as holsters go, a quick check produced an overwhelming array of choices.

So, we have a light, compact, ergonomic .380 pistol, that is accurate, easy to shoot, doesn't bust the bank, and is easy to work due to the light recoil spring tension. And now, not just in black. You can have the CCP M2 .380 with polymer shells in colors such as

Angle Blue, Titanium and Tungsten, and slides either black, or bare stainless steel.

The Walther CCP M2 .380 does not disappoint.



SPRINGFIELD ARMORY HELLCAT? HELLUVA DEAL!

By Patrick Sweeney

e live in a golden age of daily carry options. Back in the prehistoric era of EDC (aka: Before anyone outside of Arkansas knew the name Clinton) daily carry was only for a few, and they had few options. There was the ever-popular 1911, in the full-sized and anvil-weight Government Model (I carried one until I could find something better, despite the backaches it produced) and only ever seen in .45 ACP.

Those with contacts, or lucky enough to score one could opt for a Lightweight Commander, also in .45 ACP. Those two pistols, in .38 Super were also somewhat popular down near the southern border, but the lightweight option was rarely found, indeed scarce, in .38 Super.

Then there were revolvers. You could choose a snubbie in .38 Special, five or six shots. You even had airweight options there. Those airweight options went away if you wanted more than a .38 Special. Go up to a .357 Magnum, and everything was steel. And if you wanted a bore bigger than .357, you had to get an even bigger revolver. The apex was the .44 Magnum or .45 Colt. In Detroit, mere .32s were sneered at on both sides of the LE divide. .38s were little guns, Magnums were what a man would carry, and if you could, you carried more. The exemplar here is a Detroit officer who was my customer and the first gunshot save by a Second Chance vest, Ron Jagielski, who carried on and off duty back when I knew him, a six-inch nickeled S&W

25-5 in .45 Colt. When he had need of a handgun, he wanted the others involved to know that he was using a big one, a not uncommon attitude at that time, and in that place.

Oh, there were numerous instances of people carrying war-surplus or imported .32s, .380s and other pocket pistols. But they were carried mostly because of extremely hot weather. Or carried in non-permissive environments. Most of those had magazine capacities that topped out at six or seven rounds. And we did not speak among ourselves of such things, as the thought of carrying a .32 was just not talked about in polite company.

With a pistol this small, you'd expect an earth-shattering roar. But for being a Hellcat, the Springfield pistol is quite civilized.

You'll notice the lack of 9mm options in the sparse offerings.

That's because the offerings were even more limited. Your choices were a Browning Hi Power, or an S&W M-39. The P35 was as big as a 1911, and while it held more ammo, the ammunition choices back then were even more limited than the sidearms. You carried round-nosed FMJ if you packed a pistol, and lead something-or-other if you used a revolver.

The M-39 was even more of a box of hammers. Not only was it as large as a 1911, it only held the same number of rounds, they were 9mm FMJs, and you had the double action trigger to deal with as well.

Oh, there was the S&W M-59, with its 14-round magazine, but it had a grip that was more like a 2x4 in its ergonomics than a pistol. No-one loved that one. Today?

You can hardly look in the display case of your local gun shop and find choices so sparse as what we had back then. Assuming, of course, that your shop is open, and there is inventory left. But that's a pandemic thing, not a potential firearms choice thing.

And chief among the modern choices is the Spring-field Armory Hellcat.

version of it, the XDm. For 1911 fans who wanted a more-compact version, they shrank the 1911 as much as they could, and then the developed the EMP, a true 9mm-scaled 1911.

But the world has more than just 1911 fans as handgun buyers, and so Springfield had their mad scientists locked in the secret lab in the bunkers in the hinterlands, where they worked up a new pistol.

And thus, we have the Hellcat.

The most succinct description I can give of the Hellcat is that it is a double stack, striker-fired micro compact 9mm pistol. Which is about like saying Marilyn Monroe was a woman with a nice figure.

And the Hellcat OSP is even better.

OK, from the top:

The slide is alloy steel, machined, deburred, inspected, tested, and given a Melonite treatment, which makes it harder than an auditor's heart and more resistant to staining than a Carthusian monk. The slide has cocking serrations fore and aft, and they are an interesting design. The slots are wide, flat-bottomed grooves, and the raised ribs in-between have a small gutter machined down them. So, you have both large and small spaces for your fingers to press into, and gain traction.

On top, the slide is flat, with rounded edges to the sides, and there is an iron sight set there to catch your eye. The front is a big glowing ball of tritium, with a white circle around it. The rear is a half-moon notch with a white half-circle that matches the notch. If this is a set not big enough for you, then we might have to consider getting you a new set of eyes. Springfield calls this their U-Dot system.

The rear of the barrel has a beveled hole in it, as a loaded chamber indicator. You need to see if you have [Cont. to page 32]



a loaded pistol? (Really, they are all loaded, aren't they? Isn't that Rule # 1?) Just look through the indicator hole. Forward of the chamber Springfield has roll-marked their logo into the flat top of the slide.

The cocking serrations are grooves in the slide, with

the tops of the grasping ridges themselves grooved.

The barrel, while short (that's part of the microcompact description) at three inches, has an integral feed ramp, so the path from magazine to chamber

MAGAZINE GIRTH

The very early 1990s were an interesting time. The .45 still held sway in many quarters, and if you were going to offer a hi-cap pistol, it had darned well be offered in .45 ACP. The late 1980s had seen the Para Ordnance arrive. In 1990, the .40 was invented, and suddenly 9mm pistols were not hot properties. The STI frame came along in 1993, and it used .45-sized magazines.

So, we had fat .45 magazines, and scaled-up 9mm magazines for the .40 pistols.

Then there was a seismic shift in USPSA/IPC, and Open guns went full .38 Super. To make the existing pistols work, designers crimped grooves into the tubes, along the sizes, to make the internals work properly with .38 Super, not .45 cartridges.

One manufacturer tried to do it right, Caspian. They made a hi-cap frame that used magazine tubes the right size for .38 Super, and those would not hold .45 ACP. Alas, the Assault Weapons Ban came along just in time to turn the cartons of magazine Caspian had into one-time products.

And so, it went for a couple of decades, until the .40 started slipping in popularity. If you are is smooth and assured. The barrel is cold hammerforged, with Enfield-type rifling, so it has no problems with lead bullets, unlike some other striker-fired polymer pistols. The barrel is also given a Melonite treatment, so it is good and hard, and good and smooth.

The back of the slide is flush, there's a plate that contains the striker assembly and its associated parts, such as the striker safety.

You'll notice on the OSP that there are a pair of hefty bolts on the top of the slide. Those hold on the filler plate, which fills the gap for an optic sight. Yes, you can unbolt the plate and remove it, and then install a red-dot optical sight. The Hellcat came with an RMSc on board, and this is a good choice.

The Hellcat sent here is the original, all-black version. New is a hellcat with a Desert FDE color in the polymer frame, and the slide is given a matching coating over the Melonite slide. The barrel, sights, and controls are left black.

Inside the slide, the Hellcat has a dual-spring recoil system, and a spring guide rod that is the full length of the system. The front end nestles into a recess machined into the rear of the slide nose spring retainer, and the rear slips into a notch machined into the lower lug of the barrel.

On the frame, the designers at Springfield went with a non-slip pattern they call Adaptive Grip Texture. A fine-grained pebbly-looking surface, the tighter you grip, the harder the texture resists movement. The





The rear blade has a U-shaped notch, to match the large, round, white-outlined front sight Tritium insert.

AGT is also applied to the frame below the slide, but forward of the trigger guard, as an indexing place for your trigger finger. A lot of people park their finger right there. Me, I practically wrap mine up over the top of the slide, but then I've been known to do some things to excess. The AGT wraps around the frame below the magazine release, 360 degrees with no break. Then there are two panels, one on each side, above the magazine release, as extra gripping real estate for your thumb or trigger finger knuckle joint.



You need to know what the name of your pistol is? Springfield has it right there.



going to make a micro-compact pistol, chambering it in .40 won't make you any friends. The loss of capacity, and the ferocious recoil made them slow sellers.

Which is now why we have 9mm-only hi-cap magazine tubes, again.

They are a must-have for capacity in really, really compact EDC pistols.

"Everything old is new again" is more than a song in "All That Jazz." It describes some aspects of the firearms industry.

Down on the bottom of the frame, on the left side, there is a small inset panel that has "Geneseo, IL." cut into the mold. That's the only break in the AGT wrap-around panel.

The front of the frame has a small accessory rail, but that rail is big enough to mount one of the ultracompact lights or lasers that are now common. The frame is also marked there, denoting it was made in Croatia. The serial number is in a metal panel on the underside of the dust cover, inside the accessory rail.

The frame controls are all on the left side of the frame. In the rear is the slide stop, or hold-open, depending on where you are in the shooting cycle. It is protected by a small fence that borders it on three sides. You will find it highly unlikely that your hand can bump the stop up and lock the slide back before you have run out of ammo.

Up in front of that is the takedown lever. We'll go over that when we discuss disassembly.

Below that, and behind the trigger is the magazine release. It is shielded by a raised portion of the frame, that meets the button from behind and also keeps your hand from inadvertently dropping the magazine.

The trigger has a trigger safety in the center of the straight trigger. OK, straight except for a small curve forward at the very bottom of the trigger. The safety prevents the trigger from moving fully to the rear unless your finger has pressed the safety blade and cammed it out of engagement with the frame.

Then there is the subject of magazines. OK, for many years until recently, 9mm pistols have been designed and shipped with magazines that were initially intended to hold .40 cartridges. To make them work with 9mm ammunition, not only did the feed

on your person before you invest in extra magazines.

The magazines have witness marks, and those are numbered, so you can keep track.

magazine tube, in essence making the interior smaller (to properly stack the 9mm rounds) but keep the tube externally the same size.

This was the common approach once everyone switched to the .40 back in the very early 1990s. What makers had found back then was, by using 9mm-pro-

ENDURANCE TESTING

Sounds like fun, right? Get a pistol, rifle or shotgun, and run as much ammo through it as you and your friends can? Guess again. I've done a bunch of these, and while I can get my test-crew volunteers to show up, getting a full day's work out of them can get problematic.

One of these, I managed to score enough magazines so each of the crew got a magazine, and could fill it and shoot. Line up, load, shoot, get in line again.

It gets old, fast.

We managed to put 6,800 rounds through that gun (not a Hellcat) in one afternoon. And then I was on my own. That one, I managed 15,000 rounds, with one malfunction. The extra shooting took me months after that afternoon.



When it comes time to do an endurance test, having friends is a big bonus. Of course, friends expect free ammo. Oh, and those with a sharp eye will notice the assistant, lower right. Yes, for good or bad, I got Jim Tarr into gun writing.

Another, I put 23,000 rounds through a pistol, for two malfunctions. That one was all me, and it took a year. (And that was in addition to all the shooting I was doing with other firearms. This job can get to be a chore at times. No, don't weep for me, that's not necessary.) I'm in the middle of yet another one, and each time I wrap one up I think to myself "Not doing *that* again!" until the next one comes along. The only time my test crew bailed on me was when I had to test an airweight .44 Magnum. Five rounds in, one of them put it down and said, "*I'm not shooting that thing again.*" Even those who claim to be recoil-insensitive find they have limits.

protioned magazine tubes in the new cartridge created 40 pistols that held 10-11-12 rounds *in a full-sized pis-tol*. No one wanted that. So, the engineers re-designed magazines to hold enough .40 rounds to make customers happy, and then compromised to make them hold 9mm for the 9mm versions of the same pistols.


Well, no one wants a .40 anymore.

So, Springfield made the magazines the right size to hold 9mms. There is never going to be a 40 Hellcat, so there is no point in using a compromise 40 magazine. That's what makes the Hellcat both so compact, and still holding so much ammo.

The magazines have witness holes on the back as well as having the holes marked for capacity. The tube also has dual magazine catch slots. On the front, they are stamped "9mm" but that strikes me as overkill. One, try at stuffing a .40 in there, and you'll realize that these are 9mm-only magazines. But, here's always someone who didn't get the memo, hence the marking.

The standard flush-fit magazine holds eleven rounds of 9mm, with one in the chamber. You can get a standard-length magazine with a small finger lip on it, also holding eleven rounds. Or you can jump up to the extended magazine (not extended by much) and that not only has a finger-swell baseplate, but it holds thirteen [Cont. to page 36]

rounds. The extended magazine also has the AGT panels on the sides of the baseplate, which is itself sized to continue the exterior shape of the frame. It is like having a full-sized (or at least, compact instead of microcompact) frame and a short barrel and slide.

If finger-swell basepads aren't your thing, Springfield includes a flat, flush basepad in the box with the Hellcat.

Now, the OSP. The standard Hellcat models are built with regular sight systems. They also have the rear slide serrations machined to run up and over the top of the slide. You can score a Hellcat with a fiber optic front blade, if that's what you want. On the OSP, the rear serrations are subdued where they run over the optics plate. There are two torx-head screws that hold the plate in place. Remove those and you can then install a red-dot optic.

Underneath the plate you'll find locating studs, to

One detail that I like is that the optics plate does not include the rear sight, that stays on the slide. So, swapping the plate for an optic doesn't change the rear sight, and the optics bed is machined low enough that you can still see the iron sights through the optics window.

The end result is an every-day carry pistol in 9mm that holds twelve or fourteen rounds, with a red dot. A pistol so compact you can easily carry it in comfort.

Now, the designers and shooters at Springfield were quite happy with the Hellcat (Mental video of assembled Springfield staff, holding up pre-production Hellcats, to the sound of trumpets announcing progress), but pre-production isn't real-world. So, one of the first production guns was hauled off to a nearby range over a weekend, and four of the staff (with some extra volunteers) spent their time running 10,000 rounds of American Eagle 115-grain FMJ They had four rounds fail to go off the first time the striker whacks into them, but they all went off the second time around. Four in ten-thousand? Works for me.

The grip circumference of the Hellcat is small, and I find it reminiscent of a 1911 with trim grips. The Hellcat is a little more square-ish, but not a problem. And not noticeable after a bit of shooting.

The trigger is interesting in feel. There's a bit of light take-up, and then the trigger pull gets heavier. Then it rolls, as if it were a very short double-action trigger, with an unpredictable let-off. The reset is short and brisk. In all, a very nice, and useable, trigger for a pistol that has a striker to ignite the primer.

Takedown is easy. Unload the pistol. Remove the magazine. Lock the slide to the rear. Rotate the front end of the takedown lever (that's the one forward of the trigger, on the left side) one-quarter turn up. Grab the slide, and release the slide lock, while easing the

take the jolt of recoil, and bolt-down holes that have been threaded for your red-dot. Now, the instructions for installing a red-dot are quite clear. First, you have to be using a metric-thread screw, specifically M4-0.7. That's the easy part, because your red-dot will in all likelihood come with these.

But, the slide only has so much room, or steel. The holes can only be so deep. So, you must measure the protrusion of the screws out of the bottom of your red-dot and ensure that they are no longer than 0.095" long. This should not be a problem, as everyone involved knows what the deal is, as far as getting red-dots bolted to pistols is concerned.





HISTORY OF RED-DOTS

The first red-dot sighting that moved the needle came at the 1990 USPSA Nationals. There, Jerry Barnhart used a red-dot optic (by today's standard, huge, with a narrow view and dim image) to thoroughly kick our butts. It made such an impression that within a few months, Doug Koenig had installed a red-dot on his pistol and used it to win the IPSC World Shoot. By the next season, if you didn't have a red-dot on your pistol, you were not going to win anything. The early years were... interesting. We basically had to fabricate mounts ourselves. Doug even went so far as to weld his together, to make it fit his pistol.





1991 was my last year with an iron-sighted pistol, and while I actually managed to place in the top ten in at least one stage at the Nationals that year, I was also building a pistol with a red-dot optic. By then we competitors had gone through two or three generations of optics, and had heinously modified them along the way. By the 1999 IPSC World Shoot, I was using a Modified Division gun that had the red-dot fitted into the slide, not on an external mount. I wrote soon after that that a red-dot optic would in the future be a daily carry, or duty, option on a pistol, just as it was becoming for rifles. If only my ability to pick lotto numbers matched my ability to predict firearms trends. the barrel and pull it down and backwards out of the slide.

The frame has the fire control parts assembled into a chassis that is pinned into the polymer shell. The chassis is not meant to be removed from the shell. This is not a modular design, so don't; go whacking on the pins with a punch and hammer, they aren't meant to come out. The various parts for the Hellcat can be cleaned by the usual methods, with the exception of the red-dot optic. If you have an OSP, and a red-dot on it, you won't be able to run the slide through your ultrasonic cleaner. That's a small price to pay, to have the speed and accuracy of the RDS.

Reassembly is easy. Put the slide, barrel and recoil spring back together. Make sure the takedown lever is still up. Line the slide up on the frame and run it back to full recoil position. Lock the slide back and lever the takedown lever back to horizontal. That's it.

The trigger of the Hellcat was a great aid in accuracy testing, along with the RSMc red-dot sight. Usually, with a pistol this small and light, accuracy testing is an ordeal, and tests the shooter as much as the pistol. The Hellcat gave excellent results.



Giving the American Market What It Wants and Needs

While not the subcompact that its name would imply, the HK VP9SK-B is a very viable CCW pistol that comes with three magazines and night sights. The 'B' version sports an Americanstyle magazine release.



eckler and Koch (properly pronounced 'Coke') introduced the VP9 in 2014. It was not their first striker-fired pistol, and far from their first polymer framed gun — for example, the HK VP70 machine pistol was produced in the 1970s and is a polymer-framed striker-fired gun.

HK has seen so much success with the VP9 that they are now offering a number of different versions, including one in .40 S&W (the VP40), an "optics ready" model, and a compact version, the VP9SK. They're also updating the design, for example upgrading the magazines for the full size model from 15 rounds to 17.

For this special CCW issue, I secured a sample of the new VP9SK-B, which is perhaps the version of this design most suited to concealed carry. Not only is it compact, but it comes with three different magazines and night sights, and an American-style pushbutton magazine release (which is the 'B' model). The full-size VP9 has a 4.09-inch barrel and flush magazines hold fifteen (soon to be 17) rounds of 9mm. It is roughly the size of a Glock 17, which means it is a bigger pistol than what most people are willing to carry. The VP9SK model, on the other hand, has been reduced in size for carry. The barrel has been shortened to 3.39-inches, and the grip shortened by nearly three-quarters of an inch so flush magazine capacity is ten rounds. Now for your brief German lesson. The VP stands for Volkspistole, literally 'people's pistol'. Which is ironic, considering the restrictive process in which

German citizens must go through in order to own handguns. (In Germany, this pistol is officially the SFP9.) The SK stands for "subkompakt" which I think even Antifa members wouldn't need me to translate into English, but I'll do it anyway - SK means "sorta compact." Because, apparently, Germany has a different idea about what constitutes a subcompact pistol than most Americans. The 'B' in the title means it has an American-style pushbutton magazine release instead of the VP9's original paddle magazine release. Knowing HK, I'm sure the 'B' stands for "bad Americans," but again I digress.





Overall, the SK-B is 6.61 inches long, 4.57 inches high, and 1.31 inches thick, weighing 23.07 ounces with an empty magazine in place. It's not the length and height which I think push this pistol out of the subcompact category (it is the same height as a S&W Shield and only half an inch longer) it is the thickness of the gun. For its size it is a very thick gun, which might make it harder to conceal than you might expect from a "subcompact."

Please, don't for a minute think this is a criticism. Small guns are easy to carry and hard to shoot, which is why I've always been a fan of carrying a big gun and dressing around it. Depending on which magazine you've got in this pistol (more on that in a second) the VP9SK-B is eminently concealable with the right holster/belt/covering garment combo, while shooting as well as many full-sized pistols.

The VP9SK-B is a limited production run of the VP9SK. All the B models fall into the "limited production" category, although HK is selling more of them in the US than the standard VP9 with its bilateral paddle magazine release. The polymer pushbutton magazine release of the B model is reversible. HK has a brief video on the product page for this





pistol showing how to reverse the magazine release, and it is simple — all you'll need is a flat-head screwdriver and a few seconds.

To HK's credit, they came out with a completely new gun when they designed the VP9. Yes, it does look a lot like their P30, but how many people even know what an HK P30 looks like? HK historically has done a mediocre job of selling themselves to the U.S. consumer market, but that seems to be changing with HK USA.

First to clarify — the VP9 is not a (hammer-fired) P30 that has been retrofitted into a striker-fired gun (cough*SIG P250=P320*cough). While it shares a lot of the design points, and the P30 magazine, the VP9 is an all new design, one that takes full advantage of the striker-fired trigger system which allows for a much lower bore than you'll find on any other HK pistol.

The 3.39-inch hammer forged barrel and the slide sport HK's corrosion-resistant "hostile environment finish." As this pistol is made in Germany, you'll see the serial number on the frame, the slide, and the barrel, along with the proof house markings.

There are nicely aggressive flat-bottomed serrations front and back on the slide. They cover a lot of real estate, but the engineers at HK weren't that easily satisfied, they also equipped the pistol with "charging supports." These are polymer ridges that stick out from the very rear of the slide under the rear sight, behind the rear slide serrations, and provide for the ultimate in traction for people wearing gloves or with reduced hand strength. From behind they make the slide look rather fat, but from the side you might not even notice them.

When cocked the rear of the striker is visible through a hole in the back of the slide, and there is a small red dot on it. It does not protrude from the slide at any time. The barrel has polygonal rifling which should be very familiar to anyone who has ever looked down a Glock barrel.

Unique to this pistol variant are the TruDot night sights, made by Meprolight. These are steel sights, and the tritium inserts have white outlines.



With the pistol you get three different magazines, three sizes of backstraps, three grip inserts for each side, a magazine loader, and a lockable case.



SEISMIC "HIGH MASS" 9mm AMMUNITION



Seismic Ammunition is a new brand with an extremely heavy-for-caliber 185-grain 9mm round. They are promoting it as high-mass ammunition.

d been hearing of Seismic "High Mass" Ammunition (SeismicAmmo.com) for quite some time, and after being subjected to a lengthy video featuring a well-known bearded tactical trainer espousing the merits of their 9mm load without providing any factual data (cough*undeclared paid endorsement?*cough) I purchased some to test it.

Seismic's heavy 9mm load features a 185grain bullet loaded as fast as possible to keep it still subsonic, an advertised 900–1050 feet per second depending on whether you're shooting it out of a pistol or PCC. It is loaded to 9mm NATO pressures, which equate to a light +P load. Such a heavy bullet in the 9mm cartridge isn't unheard of, I've read about Navy SEALs in the 1980s experimenting with 170-grain bullets in 9mm to maximize the performance while still keeping them subsonic for their suppressors. This ammo is designed to work best in larger (4-inch+ barreled) handguns.

The bullets are hollowpoints and have a black nitride coating. They are loaded into Shellshock NAS3 hybrid two-piece cases, which have a steel base and an aluminum body. These cases are lighter than traditional brass cases while advertised as being able to handle higher pressures. Seismic's slogan is "Heavier hits harder." In fact, rifles hit harder than pistols, and it's not because their bullets are heavier, it's because they're travelling significantly faster. However, you simply can't get that kind of velocity out of pistols, which is why Seismic's advertising for this round is all about the mass. *[Cont. to page 46]*

More interesting than the sights, however, is the modularity of the grip. Like the P30, the HK VP9 offers both interchangeable backstraps and side panel grip inserts. Medium-size panels and backstrap were installed on my pistol from the factory, but the small and large ones were in the case in their own foam cutouts. All the backstraps and grip panels are marked S, M or L, and the grip panels are also helpfully marked Left or Right. The HK VP9's grip panels slide out to the rear after you've removed the backstrap. To get the backstrap off, all you have to do is push out what most of us would call a roll pin, but HK's engineers term a "clamping sleeve." I was curious if mixing and matching the different sizes would result in sharp edges or steps between panels and backstraps of differing sizes, but that's not the case. So, if you want a large right grip panel,

small backstrap, and medium left grip panel, go for it.

More important to your performance than the sights or the grip, however (at least in my opinion), are the magazines provided with the pistol. HK provides three — a flush-fitting ten-round magazine, a ten-round magazine with an extended fingerhook basepad, and an extended 13-round magazine with a grip extension. The front of the frame has two finger grooves, and most people will find two fingers are all they can get on the frame. Their pinkie will most likely be hooked around the baseplate of the magazine. This doesn't provide you with as much control as you might like, but of course carried this way the pistol is more concealable.

With the 10-round magazine with extended fingerhook you can get your entire hand on the pistol,

but I don't see very many people using this magazine. Why? Because it is the same length as the extended 13-round magazine, and why go with 10 when you can have 13?

This pistol will of course accept the magazines meant for the full-size VP9. The original full-length magazines hold fifteen rounds, and new for 2020 are 17-round magazines. Personally, the 13-round magazine with grip extension makes this feel like a completely different gun, and even though it isn't as concealable that is the magazine I'd have in this pistol if I was carrying it. It vastly improves handling and controllability while shooting. In the "just because you say something a lot doesn't make it true" category of firearms hyperbole, HK continues to tout that the VP9 has a trigger pull that is "best in class." Now, admittedly, "best" is a subjective term, which makes it nearly disprovable by lawyers. The trigger pull on the VP9 series of pistols is very acceptable — just about as crisp as a striker-fired trigger pull gets, while not being too heavy.

I had to dig through the German HK website to find the official trigger pull specs for the VP9. The standard TR trigger pull is 30-35 Newtons, and their SF (Special Forces) trigger pull is 20–25 Newtons. For those of you still rejecting the Metric system, in addition to whatever the heck measuring system uses Newtons (Martian?), let me translate that into English for you: the standard trigger pull is 6.7-7.8 pounds, and the SF trigger is 4.5–5.6 pounds. Considering every VP9 or VP40 trigger pull I've tested has been under 5.6 pounds, it appears that HK has equipped the pistols heading to the US consumer market with their lighter SF trigger, which both surprises and pleases me. That makes them not quite as good as the Walther PPQ, but better than every Glock except, maybe, the Gen 5s. Trigger pull on my sample SK-B was 5.25 pounds.



Tarr fired the Seismic 9mm ammo through a pistol (Beretta 92) and a Ruger PCC (from left to right) into both bare gel, and gel covered with heavy clothing. The bullets expanded in bare gel (much more so when fired out of the PCC), but did not expand when fired through gel blocks covered in clothing, although they did penetrate deeply.

This 185-grainer is called their Quakemaker +M (mass) bullet. I understand the love of heavy bullets. Heavy bullets usually mean deeper penetration, and you can't convince the bad guy to stop what he's doing if the bullets you're firing at him aren't reaching any of his vital organs. That is why a number of serious gun toters that I know choose 9mm defensive loads with heavy-forcaliber 147-grain bullets.

My experience has shown me, however, that by choosing 147-grain bullets you're almost guaranteeing your bullets won't expand, because of a lack of velocity. Even the best and most modern 9mm bullets in this weight only expand some of the time.

For this evaluation I chronographed and did ballistic gel-block testing with both a pistol and a PCC — in this case a Beretta 92 Elite LTT with a 4.7-inch barrel (which is a duty-sized handgun), and a Ruger PC Carbine with a 16.12" barrel.

Using an Oehler Model 35P chrono, out of the Beretta's 4.7-inch barrel the 185-grain bullet posted 894 fps. Out of the longer barrel of the Ruger PCC it did 992 fps. It remained subsonic even out of the longer barrel, and felt recoil was on par with most 9mm rounds. Velocities were very consistent between rounds, with standard deviations in the teens, showing good QC.

For gel block testing I used blocks from Clear Ballistics. Unlike true FBI-spec 10% ballistic

The trigger itself is polymer and curved, with a safety lever in the center. The trigger face has some tiny ridges to either side of the safety lever, which itself has a groove in it, so the trigger feels serrated gelatin these blocks are polymer, but provide similar results. Extensive testing by me in concert with the Black Hills Ammunition's ballistics lab, echoed by information I've received from Federal Ammunition, are that bullets expand the same in these Clear Ballistics blocks as FBI-spec gel blocks, however they will penetrate roughly 10% deeper than when fired into actual gel blocks, so keep that in mind.

I fired bullets from both the handgun and carbine into both bare blocks and blocks covered [Cont. to page 48]

with the FBI's "heavy clothing" barrier, which consists of two layers of cotton shirt material under a layer of cotton-poly sweatshirt under a layer of denim.

In bare gel the bullet fired from the Beretta penetrated 13.25-inches and expanded to .60", with 100% weight retention. Only the very front of the hollow point expanded. When fired through the carbine the bullet penetrated an even 16inches while expanding to .70", with again 100% weight retention. This is very good performance and honestly better than what I was expecting.

The FBI heavy clothing test is good because not only do bad guys usually wear clothes, but layers of fabric tend to slow down or prevent the expansion of hollowpoints, and that's what I found with this ammo. When fired out of the Beretta through the heavy clothing barrier, the bullet penetrated 21.25-inches and did not expand at all. When fired from the Ruger PCC through heavy clothing, the bullet penetrated the block 23.25inches and again did not expand.

Once you do the conversion from polymer to gel blocks even with the impressively heavy bullets these 9mms just barely exceeded the FBI's recommendation of 18 inches of penetration.

ing" barrier the Seismic bullets didn't expand at all. I am unsurprised, this is very common with bullets that are "heavy for caliber." They're just not moving fast enough for their weight to diameter ratio.

If you have studied ballistic testing at all you know a standard 9mm NATO 124-grain FMJ round will penetrate ballistic gel 20- to 25inches, so if you're only concerned with penetration, buy some FMJ ammo. It's a heck of a lot cheaper than hollowpoints that probably won't expand.

flat, which is a good thing.

When I hit the range my goal unique to this pistol was to determine how much the different magazines (and their available gripping surfaces) affected shootability. I timed myself running a plate rack as well as timed strings of fire on an IDPA target, all at realistic defensive distances (7–10 yards).

What I discovered was that I could shoot as accurately with the flush ten-round magazine in place as I could with the larger magazines, just not as fast. If I shot as fast with the flush magazine in place when compared to the mags with the extended basepads, my accuracy suffered.

expected, no more than a ten percent spread, and usually less. The difference was in how much control I felt I had over the gun — the extended mags made my hands happier, but didn't produce as much difference downrange as I expected. I think this is due in large part to how controllable this pistol is. Because it is not, in fact, a subcompact, and that matters when shooting. Even with a flush magazine in place recoil is not abusive, the sights are prominent and set a decent distance apart, the dual recoil springs to absorb recoil, the wider gun which spreads recoil over a larger backstrap area — all of these things contributed. 

I loaded up each of the three magazines with ten rounds apiece (in this case with Winchester's USA Ready 115-grain FMJ FP load) and at ten yards shot them at the center zone of an IDPA target, going as fast as I could while still keeping the hits inside the zone. It was not tough. In the accompanying photo you'll see the vertical stringing expected when you're pushing unfamiliar equipment hard and not quite timing your muzzle bounce right. However, the short flush magazine didn't produce the high and low rounds, my accuracy with it in place was just as good, I just had to shoot a tiny bit slower.

Personally, I like the way the 13-round magazine feels in my hand the best, and even though I barely perform any better with it, sometimes confidence is what you

need. Also, those three extra rounds. Sometimes three extra rounds are what you need ... and a reload on your off-side, using a full-length 17-round magazine, just in case you find yourself in the middle of a police-free "peaceful protest" that goes off the rails

The VP9SK-B is a newer pistol, and not that common. It will, however, fit into any holster designed for the standard SK, and there are a number of those out there. Actually, it will fit into any holster designed for the full-size VP9 as well, although it will be a little short. DeSantis Gunhide (DesantisHolster.com) is just one of many quality holstermakers which offers IWB and OWB holsters for this pistol, in both leather and polymer. They sent me one of their Mini Scabbards for the SK-B, which is a minimalist leather belt holster that tucks the butt of the pistol in tight to the body, and allows it to just disappear under a loose shirt. This is not a pocket pistol, so you will need both a quality holster and a belt to hang it on.

The Ultra Custom holster from 1791 Gunleather is leather over a layer of thermoplastic polymer, which can be molded to your specific firearm after heating. These tools help form channels for your front sight

when molding the holster to your gun.

Another intriguing option is the Ultra Custom IWB holster from 1791 Gunleather (1791gunleather.com). Offered in several different sizes, depending on the general size of your pistol, this is a "user customizable" holster with an exterior leather layer over a thermoplastic sheet inside. What does "thermoplastic" mean? It means you can heat up this holster and then form-fit it to your specific pistol, and when it cools it stays that shape. It provides you a hybrid holster that looks leather but performs (nearly) like a polymer/Kydex holster.

To close out this article, here's another brief German lesson, this one about history — traditionally, HK has just not offered true semi-auto versions of many of

Tarr experimented using the three different magazines, and while he wasn't able to shoot the pistol quite as fast with the flush magazine in place as the extended magazines, the pistol was eminently shootable with all three.

The short flush 10-round magazine slowed him down very slightly when compared to the extended fingerhook 10-round mag, and the extended 13-round magazine, but the pistol shot well with all three and was very controllable.

their storied military long guns, such as the UMP and G36 (don't you dare tell me the USC and SL8 count). This isn't because the German HK brass doesn't understand and doesn't like the US commercial market. Well, it's not just because of that, it is mainly because the German government restricts the commercial availability of firearms designed originally for their military.

When I first reviewed the VP9, I wrote how HK needed to offer a model with an American-style pushbutton magazine release, not because such a magazine release is superior, but because that's what American consumers want. However, the unofficial official HK customer service motto is, "You suck, and we hate you," so I sincerely doubted that would ever happen. I am happy to have been proven wrong.

I was told by an American employee on the US side of HK that things were changing and that they were making inroads against the stiff German leadership in regard to products for America, which is the single largest firearms market in the world. I am pleased to see this is more than just hyperbole. Between the American-style mag release buttons on the VP9 and the introduction of the SP5, so that we finally have semi-auto MP5 option made by HK, at a competitive price no less, they now seem to be producing the firearms American consumers want as opposed to the firearms they think the consumers should want. With HK now having production facilities in the US whose products will not be strangled by German law I am eagerly anticipating what comes next.

There are several versions of the VP9SK-B. The base model comes with one 10- and one 13-round magazine, and retails for \$740. This deluxe model with three magazines and night sights has an MSRP of \$849.

ithout a doubt, more people than ever are thinking about self-protection, and looking to obtain both a pistol and a permit to carry. The question I've heard from many, especially those entirely new to firearms is: which pistol is best? Unfortunately, there is no blanket answer to this question. There is only which pistol best meets your particular needs and requirements, which are likely very different than mine. Now, that said one contender worth serious consideration is the SIG Sauer P365.


Why SIG Sauer's P365? Simply due to the fact that it meets so many requirements for concealed carry. It is small and fairly narrow making it very easy to conceal. Plus, it is light so you can carry it all day without noticing it. Better still, it is chambered for the 9mm cartridge, so it has the performance of a service pistol, but in a smaller package. For peace of mind, it has a capacity of 10+1, 12+1 or 15+1 depending upon which size magazine you select. What I like best though, is it puts all of these features into a pistol which is very easy to shoot well.

Before I delve further into the SIG Sauer P365 though, let's consider what you should look for in a pistol intended for concealed carry. There are some basic, but vitally important points you must take into consideration:

- 1. It must be 100% reliable.
- 2. It must be small and light enough so you will have it when you need it.
- 3. It must be accurate and ergonomic enough for you to be able to make rapid multiple hits at realistic distances with it.
- 4. It must be of heavy enough caliber to be effective in a life and death struggle.



This all sounds relatively straightforward. To a novice though, especially standing in front of a crowded display case at a gun store, it can be a bit overwhelming. There are just so many different makes, models, calibers and options. Trying to figure out which one is "best" can seem like a daunting task when all you have to go on is a bit of online research and what the guy at the gun store recommends.

Two common mistakes when selecting a carry pistol are going either too big/heavy or too small. Of the two, I think going too big/heavy is by far the worst choice. If you choose a pistol which turns out to be too large, bulky or heavy for your particular needs, you will probably not carry it day in and day out. Remember rule number one of a gunfight, have a gun. All too often though, someone selects a carry piece which is physically too large and heavy for them to realistically carry on a daily basis, like they should. Once their short love affair is over, it ends up living in their safe, or on their nightstand. Key point to remember, you don't know the day or hour of an attack, so you and unfortunately poor terminal performance. While quite "lethal", these small calibers may not have the immediate desired effect on your attacker.

Then there is what many consider to be the "ideal" class of pistols for concealed carry. These are compact single-stack 9mm autos such as the Glock 43,

compact .380 ACPs, and J-frame, and similar size, .38 Special snub nose revolvers. This group is small, light, and easy to conceal while having acceptable terminal performance. Their downside is they can be hard to shoot well and the limited amount of ammunition they carry. [Cont. to page 58]



must always be ready. A carry pistol isn't a fashion statement; it's a way of life.

The flip side of this is choosing something tiny and "cute" in a poor performing caliber such as .22 LR, .22 Magnum, .25 ACP (6.35mm Browning) or .32 ACP (7.65mm Browning). Ultra-compact pocket pistols have long been popular, despite their underpowered nature. Due to their small size they are easily carried, so you are more likely to actually have it when you need it. Being easily concealed, even in summer attire, is their great virtue. This is what makes them great back-up guns. Due to their tiny nature they can be difficult to shoot well, often have hard to see sights,


This last point, their limited ammunition capacity, has recently led many to re-evaluate their suitability for concealed carry in light of current events seen on social media and the news. Five to seven rounds seems plenty for a typical self-defense situation involving one or two assailants. But, what if, rather than one or two, you are faced with an angry violent mob? A mass of violent people which makes you fear for your life, and the lives of your loved ones.

The news is filled with outbreaks of civil unrest showing how quickly certain areas can descend into utter chaos. In such situations large groups typically roam in packs. They often block roadways attacking any who happen to drive by. In such situations you are likely to face a large number of armed and unarmed attackers, who will move quickly to surround and overwhelm you. It's not the ones in front of you that are the greatest threat, but the ones circling behind you, watching, waiting for their chance to blind-side you. Once you are off your feet and the mob descends on, well, you know what happens next. In such a situfired, and so dampens a bit of the felt recoil. Size-wise it is slightly shorter in the slide and the butt than a Glock 43 single-stack pistol. The first thing I thought when I took it from its box was, wow this is small.

The next thing that came to mind was how good it felt in my hand. While this is very subjective, the curve of the backstrap, texturing, undercut trigger guard and general contour of the frame fit my hand very well. It's important to find a pistol which fits you well, and the P365 just seems to fit a lot of people. This is a real plus.

Next, I noted the X-RAY3 day/night sights on top of the slide. These are bold, easy to see yet contoured to not snag during your draw. The front sight features a green donut with a Tritium insert for lowlight use. The robust rear sight features two Tritium inserts. The sights are dove-tailed into the slide, and are a real aid to getting the most out of the P365 on the range. Controls consist of a push-button magazine release, slide release and take-down lever. The magazine is triangular in shape and well placed. The slide release is fairly small and unobtrusive.

Then there is the trigger. I have spent decades carrying a Glock, and have gotten used to a generic, nothing-to-write-home-about, but serviceable trigger. The P365 though is different. It is blessed with a very good out-of-the-box trigger, which is definitely an aid to making accurate and quick hits on target. The trigger pull is very smooth, and breaks cleanly. While not



ation a 5-shot snub nose revolver or .380 Auto isn't a real confidence builder.

While it's true there are certain situations where you simply can't win, I suggest carrying a handgun which will let you solve any problem that can be solved with a pistol. For daily concealed carry one such option is SIG Sauer's P365 9mm pistol. So, let's take a closer look at this interesting and popular design.


SIG Sauer describes their P365 as a Micro-Compact pistol sized for everyday carry. That pretty well sums it up. It is a polymer frame striker-fired design with a stainless steel slide assembly. The polymer frame reduces weight, and it flexes a bit when the pistol is

a match trigger regarding pull weight, it is quite good for its intended purpose. The trigger blade is a curved design, which may not be as attractive as the current in-vogue straight blade to some, but it is quite comfortable. I like the factory trigger a lot.

Barrel length is a short 3.1 inches. Operation is via short-recoil with a tilting barrel. Beneath the barrel is a metal guide-rod assembly with captured dual springs. Overall length is 5.8 inches with a height of 4.3 inches and width of just 1.06 inches. Size-wise the P365 dropped right into my Glock 43 DeSantis polymer holster. The SIG Sauer P365 carries very well, and I do not even notice it is there. This is partly due to its light weight, which is only 17.8 ounces unloaded. Adding a loaded magazine will add a bit of weight, and this is an important topic I will cover next. The one thing many do like about the various single-stack compact 9mm pistols on the market is their limited magazine capacity. SIG Sauer addressed this with their P365. You can choose a flush fit 10round magazine, a slightly extended 12-round magazine or a noticeably extended 15 rounder. So, capacity is not an issue with the P365. This provides a bit of peace of mind. Some will opt to carry with the flush fit 10-round magazine and carry a 12-round magazine as a spare. I carry with the 12-round magazine locked in place giving me 13 rounds on tap, and carry a spare 15-round magazine. That is 28 rounds total, in a very small package. This is a huge selling point to many

people, and a feature that really attracted me to the design.

While SIG Sauer's P365 has a real advantage over, say Glock's popular 43, on paper, what about on the range? Does the P365 offer a real advantage over the Glock 43? This was easy enough for me to find out. I have been carrying a Glock 43 for a couple years, and know what it is capable of. So, I began with some informal range testing as soon as the P365 arrived. Frankly, I was excited to get it out onto the range and to put some rounds through it.

Starting at 15 yards I fired a few rounds slow-fire to get a feel for the P365 after firing my Glock 43. Then I began shooting steel silhouettes and plates. My initial impressions were entirely positive. For me, I found the P365 easier to shoot then my Glock 43. I have to work much harder with the Glock 43, just due to the dynamics of the design. The P365 just seemed much easier to hit with. So, I did a basic "Walk Back" drill starting at 15 yards. My target was a steel silhouette. Rules were simple, fire one shot, and if it was a hit walk back away from the target to a different yard line and fire another shot offhand. The goal was to work my way back until I missed. Keep in mind, this is advertised as a Micro-Compact pistol. I went from 15 yards and slowly made my way back to 50 yards, then 75 yards, and found myself on the 100 yard line. Carefully pressing the trigger I was rewarded with a hit, and continued back. I was surprised to find myself on

the 135 yard line when I finally missed. I came away extremely impressed by how well this little 9mm pistol performed. It is simply easy to shoot well.

Next, I moved to the bench to do the boring part of testing. Here I fired four five-shot groups with four different loads at 25 yards. Velocity was measured at the muzzle with a LabRadar Doppler Chronograph. Groups were fired off a sandbag, nothing fancy. Keeping in mind just how small the P365 is, it did very well off the bench. The trigger is good for a concealed carry pistol, the sights are bold and easy to see and the recoil is quite controllable.

I can remember testing a Kel-Tec PF-9 and found the recoil to be very snappy, and it was not a particularly pleasant pistol to shoot. The P365 has none of the PF-9's bite, and I enjoyed my time on the range with it. Best accuracy was obtained using Black Hills 124-grain +P JHP load which averaged 2.5 inches at 25 yards. Average velocity of this load was 1,114 fps. Moving from the bench I ran the P365 through a variety of drills from two to 15 yards. Here I found it to be quick into action. Practical accuracy is very good and it's an easy pistol to run. Due to its small size and relatively light weight you can expect more muzzle jump than a larger and heavy 9mm. This does slow down follow-up shots a tad. But, in my opinion it performs very well for its size, and I greatly preferred it over my Glock 43.

During drills I noticed that due to the shortness of the grip, my hand could prevent the magazine from falling free. I have medium-size hands and my pinky comes to the bottom of the extension on the 12-round magazine. If I move the pistol slightly in my hand to release pressure on the magazine baseplate, then it ejects cleanly. The recoil springs are on the heavy side and retracting the slide is slightly harder than on my Glock 43. With the short 10round magazine in place the grip is rather short making the SIG easier to conceal but slightly harder to shoot well. There is simply less to hang onto. The 12-round magazine adds a bit of length to the butt; however, it gives you just enough more to hang onto to make it well worth it. Plus, you get another two

rounds.

I suppose the real test is how well the SIG Sauer P365 actually carries. So, I carried it for six months before writing this review. The answer to this is simple, it carries very well. Its small size allows it to be tucked easily away. I found it comfortable for AIWB (Apendix Inside the Waist Band), even when seated in a vehicle. Its light weight lets you not even notice it's there as you go about your day.

OK, the SIG Sauer P365 has a lot going for it, but what about its cons? What don't I like about it? Well, let's be blunt, the design has had some reliability issues, especially when first released. Some customers reported problems with the slide not returning to battery. All of these gave me pause about considering the P365 as a carry pistol. This P365 has been



intentionally. I finally requested a review pistol in August of 2019 and guess what; it couldn't make it through a magazine. It frequently failed to return to battery with any 9mm load I tried, including SIG Sauer's own ammunition. So, I sent it in for repair. It was turned around very quickly, arrived back and has functioned perfectly ever since. But, it did have problems out of the box. I tried two more P365s. One obtained directly from SIG Sauer, and another a friend purchased locally. Both of them ran flawlessly with zero issues. Keep in mind I received my first pistol in August of 2019. Once it came back it has run flawlessly ever since, for almost a year now. But, I waited and continued putting rounds on this gun waiting to see if any problems would crop up. They haven't, it runs fine, but this is what I experienced. My only other negative comment concerns the price of spare magazines. They are not

inexpensive. I like to have a fair supply of magazines for any pistol I own, so this just adds to the cost of ownership.

My final thoughts? I never liked my Glock 43 the way I like my old Glock 23 or 19. It carried well, went bang when it was supposed to and that was it. I didn't particularly like shooting it. It was nothing more than a tool to me. The SIG Sauer P365 is different. I really enjoy shooting it; it's a fun gun on the range. I like its features and especially its trigger. For me, it is an ideal carry gun. A 12-round magazine in the gun and a spare 15-round mag and I'm good. I see no need to go back to a five-shot J-frame, or single-stack 9mm ever again. If you have been troubled by current events, and thinking about replacing your current carry gun with something offering increased capacity but without the size and weight, I'd suggest considering a SIG Sauer P365.

Reliable Reasonably-Priced Personal Protection

The SCCY CPX is an economical concealed carry pistol that was well ahead of its time.



The SCCY CPX is the concealed carry pistol for the common man. A quality inexpensive defensive arm, the CPX comes in a plain cardboard box with everything you need for basic personal defense and safe storage, and that includes three magazines!

he Springfield Armory Hellcat and SIG SAUER P365 have shaken the concealed carry world to its core with their compact geometry and impressive double stack magazine capacity. These two guns, rarefied though they undoubtedly are, remain quite expensive. However, it seems a gun company based out of Daytona Beach, Florida, introduced its own compact double stack 9mm concealed carry pistol years ago. The SCCY CPX is a time-tested, reasonably-priced deep cover defensive handgun that is good enough to save your life.

War Story

The young man worked in a local minimart and had never before squeezed a trigger. He watched the news

as do we all and felt burdened to protect himself in the face of life's many-splendored chaos. On his 21st birthday, his dad gave him an inexpensive SCCY CPX 9mm pistol.

The man applied for a concealed carry permit and was awaiting its approval. He then planned to get some firearms training and pack the little gun for real. On the day, he picked the pistol up at the gun shop he bought a box of 9mm ammunition and stored the lot in his book bag before reporting to work at the Quik-Stop. Unwilling to carry the gun without training and the permit, he stashed his bag in the break room at the store and got to work behind the cash register.

The bad guy was, as is so typically the case, a shortsighted opportunist. He barged into the minimart brandishing a weapon and relocated the young man and his coworker to the break room before securing them in place with duct tape. He then explained in unambiguous terms his intent to empty the cash register and then come back to kill them both. When the villain left the room to pilfer the till the young man knew he had minutes at best.

He wrenched himself free from his bonds and got to his book bag. Retrieving his new unfired SCCY handgun he quickly thumbed a few rounds into the magazine. Thusly equipped, he left the break room and confronted the aspiring murderer.

In the ensuing frenetic gunfight this young man fired four rounds, the first four of his life. Two of them connected. When the cops arrived shortly thereafter [Cont. to page 68]

they found the terrified clerk performing CPR on the man who had just recently planned to kill him.

The police seized the young man's weapon as evidence. His father contacted the company to thank them for producing the tool that had undeniably saved his son's life. SCCY in return flew the young man and his dad to Daytona Beach to tour the factory, meet the employees who made the gun, and accept a replacement weapon free of charge. That was an incontrovertibly dark and horrible experience for the poor kid in that minimart. However, that, my friends, is what it's all about. A responsible citizen forced to face the darkness has the tools to transform himself from prey to predator. The good guy lives on as a productive citizen. The bad guy, not so much.

The Gun

SCCY is a reliably different sort of company. Where most gun manufacturers offer a cluttered catalog of sundry sizes, barrel lengths, and disparate designs, SCCY builds a single gun very, very well. That one gun is now available in either 9mm or .380ACP and features either a double action only or striker fired trigger, but the designs of both pistols are similar. This allows the good folks at SCCY to perfect their product.

The gun we reviewed for this project is the traditional CPX-2 DAO variant. The 9mm CPX-1 has the thumb safety. The 9mm CPX-2 does not. The CPX-3 is the .380ACP version without an external safety. The CPX-4 is the same .380ACP gun with the external

manual safety. The DVG-1 is the 9mm version with a striker-fired trigger.

I am diagnosably paranoid about handgun safety, but I am comfortable carrying the CPX without the manual safety. The long heavy DAO trigger is smooth and consistent from start to finish and mimics that of

a nice double action revolver. Firing the gun requires no extraneous thought, but it does necessitate some intentionality.

The indestructible polymer frame resists wear and abuse and features pleasant pebbling in the spaces that interface with flesh along with some smooth generic

finger grooves. The trigger guard is undercut to drop the bore axis as low as possible. The magazine release is a modest left-sided button in the expected spot.

Every SCCY CPX comes with two stubby tenround box magazines along with both flat and finger rest floorplates. These mags look like miniaturized versions of the sorts that feed your full-sized combat pistols. The flat floorplates minimize the gun's footprint, while the finger rest sort offer a spot to park your fifth finger and subsequently enhance control.

The tapered steel slide is built like a main battle tank with deep and aggressive charging grooves. All the edges are nicely beveled for a smooth easy draw.







The polymer frame is stubby enough to hide while filling the hand adequately to dissipate recoil.

The CPX's compact double stack magazine carries ten rounds of 9mm Parabellum.

The extractor is wildly overbuilt, and the top of the slide is laser grooved to reduce glare. The sights include three prominent white dots, and the rear sight is drift adjustable for windage. There is a left-sided slide release that is just the right size for easy access without snagging.


The safety is a pivoting thumb lever that features a modest protective ridge at the bottom to minimize the risk of inadvertent deactivation. The lever is oriented in reverse of that of the 1911. The pivot is at the front, and the lever bit points back at the shooter. Deactivation is intuitive and instantaneous. However, I find the protective ridge to be a bit uncomfortable for my tastes. I preferred the version not thusly adorned.

The SCCY CPX is as simple an autoloading handgun as mankind might contrive. The gun has all the [Cont. to page 72]





The left-sided controls are the perfect size and location.





stuff you need without the fluff you don't, and the mechanical interfaces are perfect. Simple in the world of combat pistols equals uncompromising reliability. The unique recoil-driven action is described as the Roebuck Quad-Lock. This feature is named after the CEO of SCCY and designer of the CPX, Joe Roebuck. Joe is one undeniably fascinating guy.

If you've ever had eyeglass lenses ground while you wait Joe's machine did that. He also built a device that emplaces heart stents during coronary angioplasties. With several companies birthed, built, and spun off under his belt, Joe Roebuck focused his not inconsiderable mechanical and managerial talents on building the world's simplest, most reliable handguns. Joe told me that a passion for quality starts at the top, and SCCY is a reflection top to bottom of Joe's drive and gifts. Unlike literally every other gun company on the planet, SCCY builds every piece of their gun in-house. From the molded polymer frame to the machined steel slide to the magazines and individual small components, SCCY does it all underneath one really big roof. Joe told me that this was the only way he felt that he could control every piece of a machine upon which people's lives might ride. I guarantee you that young man in the minimart is a most fervent fan. The earliest SCCY pistols many years ago developed a reputation for problems. Joe had never built a

gun before, and there is an inevitable learning curve. Over time he got the details worked out and the design polished.

How refined is the CPX nowadays, might you wonder? In 2016 SCCY sold 160,000 copies. In 2017, the first year of the Trump administration when the gun market was in a slump that number fell to 150,278.

Today, SCCY has the best warranty in the gun business. If your SCCY firearm fails, breaks, malfunctions, or hiccups for any reason SCCY will repair or replace it for free. That in and of itself is not terribly remarkable. However, if your gun is stolen send them a copy of the police report and SCCY will send you a new pistol. With all those hundreds of thousands of weapons in circulation the SCCY return department is one guy. I met him back when I toured the plant. He told me he was bored a lot.

How Does She Run?


The SCCY CPX is like the Russian T34 tank. It is designed for a single mission. The CPX is intended to be easy to carry, easy to shoot, tactically accurate, and unflinchingly reliable. The CPX delivers on all points.

This gun falls comfortably in the palm of your hand. There is enough breadth to accommodate a standard set of human fingers without any extraneous ditzels or protrusions. The slide on my copy locks back reliably on the last round fired, and the empty magazines jump out of the butt like Leftist politicians fleeing responsibility. The overall chassis is compact enough for pocket carry if you are partial to baggy cargo pants. *[Cont. to page 76]*

The gun fits the hand well and points naturally. The trigger pull is a smooth and predictable nine pounds, while the payload is 10+1 of 9mm Parabellum. The SCCY CPX is not a range toy. Given the gun's modest dimensions it jumps around a bit. The experience isn't painful or particularly unpleasant, but it isn't recreational.

If you want a pistol to use for plinking or keeping the burgeoning discarded beverage can population under control, then pick up a Ruger MK IV or a Walther P22. If you want a packable, powerful defensive tool that shoots straight, is easily concealed, and remains just dead nuts reliable then the CPX is your iron.

Denouement

When Joe set out to design the CPX he made an assessment of the gun market. The country was awash in expensive high-end plastic guns that cost half a grand or more. These combat handguns were undeniably effective but remained out of financial reach of the typical working stiff paying for a mortgage and diapers. At the other end of the spectrum were the cheap pot-metal gangster guns that didn't cost anything but were not packable and could fail in the crunch. Joe's gun was going to bring better quality than the Big Guys at a price within reach of the Common Man. Every single piece of Joe's CPX is built in one Florida facility by folks who know how to build guns. Joe backs up his baby with the best warranty in the industry. The SCCY CPX is easy to carry and conceal via a variety of platforms. At reasonable defensive ranges the CPX will drop its rounds right where you want them. All this and the MSRP for the CPX is about \$270. The street price is typically lower.

CONGRESSMEN QUESTION ATF BRACE RESTRICTION PLANS

G ongressman Matt Gaetz announced... the ATF is crafting secret rules restricting the possession of certain pistol braces by American citizens, and that he has sent them a letter demanding they stop," a June 16 Hot Take Press Room release reported. The letter, addressed to Attorney General William Barr and ATF Acting Director Regina Lombardo, was co-signed by Republican Reps. Neal P. Dunn, Bill Posey, W. Gregory Steube, John Rutherford, Ted S. Yoho, and Daniel Webster.

"We understand that ATF is currently considering restricting one arm brace model owned by over 700,000 Americans [and] strongly urge ATF to cease taking any actions and reconsider or rescind any secret determinations which call into question the legality of firearms owned by millions of law-abiding Americans."

ATF making and then changing its mind on rules that result in further infringements, not to mention economic losses for manufacturers and product owners — or loss of freedom for noncompliance — has turned out to be another way to enact bans that bypasses the representatives of the people. It does things by diktat that keep changing with the political winds.

Cases in point on braces:

as an SBR," ATF's Firearms Technology Branch Chief replied. "Generally speaking, we <u>do not</u> classify weapons based on how an individual uses a weapon. FTB has previously determined that the firing of a weapon from a particular position,

such as placing the receiver extension of an AR-15 type pistol on the user's shoulder, does not change the classification of a weapon. Further, certain firearm accessories such as the SIG Stability Brace have not been classified by FTB as shoulder stocks and, therefore, using the brace improperly does not constitute a design change." [Emphasis in original.]

So, no problem, right? Come and get 'em!

Then in 2015, NRA-ILA reported on ATFs "Open Letter on the Redesign of 'Stabilizing Braces'."

"Any person who intends to use a handgun stabilizing brace as a shoulder stock on a pistol (having a rifled barrel under 16 inches in length or a smooth bore firearm with a barrel under 18 inches in length) must first file an ATF Form 1 and pay the applicable tax because the resulting firearm will be subject to all provisions of the NFA," the reversed position stated.

Suddenly we had a problem. A huge problem, with life-destroying felony implications for anyone innocently caught up in a ridiculous bureaucratic net cast by people who either can't make up their minds or have their minds made up for them by hidden, politically-motivated string pullers. Fast forward to 2017 and it appeared everyone was happy again. Per a press release from SB TacticalTM: "An NFA firearm has not necessarily been made when the device is not reconfigured for use as a shoulder stock — even if the attached firearm happens to be fired from the shoulder," the reversed (yet again rule) assured everyone. "To the extent that the January 2015 Open Letter implied or has been construed to hold that incidental, sporadic, or situational 'use' of an arm-brace (in its original approved configuration)

equipped firearm from a firing position at or near the shoulder was sufficient to constitute 'redesign,' such interpretations are incorrect and not consistent with ATF's interpretation of the statute or the manner in which it has historically been enforced.""

Then in 2019, rumors were flying that ATF was once more on a reversal tear. This latest development seems to confirm the concerns were well-founded.

So, what's the issue this time around?

"Unbeknownst to the general public, ATF has ordained in private determination letters that it considers 'any firearm with a length of pull over 13-1/2 inches to be designed to be fired from the shoulder,' thereby making it a short-barreled rifle," the Gaetz letter observes. "However, ATF has also privately proclaimed that even firearms under this length of pull can be classified as a short-barreled rifle, if ATF identifies other (and often unspecified) applicable 'indicators.""

And the upshot of that?

"Even more troubling are reports that these non-

The Gaetz letter noted, "ATF initially welcomed the advent of pistol arm braces. In 2012, ATF correctly determined that the attachment of arm braces to large pistol platforms does not constitute the manufacture of a short-barreled rifle...subject to registration requirements under the National Firearms Act..."

In 2014, as Guns and Ammo reported, ATF advised a Colorado Police Department that had asked if "firing an AR-15 type pistol from the shoulder, specifically, if doing so would cause the pistol to be reclassified as a Short Barreled Rifle (SBR)."

"[W]e have determined that firing a pistol from the shoulder would **not** cause the pistol to be reclassified

public standards are being used to criminally prosecute unsuspecting gun owners. Given ATF's refusal to explain these standards, it is impossible for the public to comply with ATF's ever-changing body of secret law," Gaetz and company note. "To criminally charge an individual or threaten a company based on one ATF employee's opinion of whether an arm brace shares enough unpublished 'design features' with a shoulder stock is an appalling abuse of power and shows a blatant disregard for due process." Yeah, it's what they do. This business of conflicting rules is no surprise to those of us who have been

watching such things over the years.

In 2005, the Congressional Research Service published a memorandum regarding ATF firearms testing procedures. Among other things, it revealed that the ATF has "over 300 cubic feet of classification letters stored in file cabinets." The Bureau hasn't scanned any of these documents into a searchable database to assure consistency of interpretation, to identify and resolve regulatory conflicts. The extent to which this inconsistency has grown and compounded in intervening years is unknown and unknowable without a major organization and review effort.

The damn thing probably looks like the warehouse in *Indiana Jones* by now.

And it's not just the rules that are a crap shoot, so is the punishment for running afoul of them. We've seen Adverse Actions in the past where ATF was violating dealer license revocation rules in defiance of policy and law. That the situation was ultimately "happily" resolved had less to do with fixing internal problems than they picked a target (Brinks) with the resources, will and legal savvy to defend itself. Good luck to the little guy.

"[E]ven during very conservative administrations, like President Trump's, some do 'try to make it more difficult to acquire things that shooters need and gun owners need, for safety and for the unique circumstances that an individual may have," Gaetz continues. He's being unduly generous.

The president is who gave the green light to the "bump stock" ban (talk about legal, then illegal, then legal and now illegal again!), which has since been used to produce a court finding equating semiautos with machineguns. His "take the guns first, due process later" kneejerk raised red flags none of us who voted for him had counted on. He appointed gun ban-supporting William Barr as attorney general. He nominated former National Fraternal Order of Police President Kenneth Canterbury, a supporter of Eric Holder and Sonia Sotomayor, to be director of ATF. It's increasingly hard to champion a man who at times seems set on blowing it "bigly" and the only thing keeping some of us going is the prospect of Joe Biden and all that implies.


What would be very helpful to have at this point would be copies of the private letters Gaetz mentions, and to that end, *Firearms News* has contacted his office via email because those answering the phone are caught up in the COVID-19 shutdown. "What I am looking for are the 'private letters' listing 'objective design features," I wrote to the congressman's aide. "Realizing that recipients may not want their names made public, I'm wondering if you could provide copies with names and other identifiers redacted so that the firearms community could be informed of the specifics, and of who they came from. I would also be very interested in any for-the-record quote from the congressman in addition to what was stated in the letter and release."

That was a few days ago, and no response has been received at this writing.
