Charlestown House Tour Set For May 14

The annual Charlestown Historical House Tour, set for this Saturday, May 14, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., will showcase 11 homes ranging from historic period structures to revitalized buildings, most of them located within a few blocks of the Monument. A free trolley will be provided to the two wonderful buildings that are farther away from the Monument area.

"Charlestown is filled with history, from homes built at the turn of the century, to artfully preserved buildings," said Jan Mastrocola, co-chairperson of the tour. "Examples of architectural styles on display run the gamut of Edwardian, Greek Revival, Victorian, Italian and Queen Anne."

"The tour is an important aspect of the Charlestown community as we highlight our historical heritage and work together to raise funds to preserve our parks and landmarks," said Nancy Soisson, co-chairperson of the tour.

The house tour is part of a week of activities, sponsored by the Charlestown Preservation Society, developed to raise funds for a variety of projects including the restoration of Doherty Park and improvements in Thompson Square.

The house tour, part of Charlestown's Preservation week, begins at the old Charlestown High School at 30 Monument Square and ends there with a reception, where many preservation items will be on sale, including the coloring book on architecture that the society produced this year, posters

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New Plans And Proposals Come Before The Neighborhood Council

A varied agenda occupied the attention of the members of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC) at its monthly meeting on May 3. Topics ranged from the soon-to-open Dennis McLaughlin House, a proposed Farmer's Market, to community impacts of the Central Artery/Tunnel (CA/T) project.

Peter Looney chaired the meeting, and present were Tom Cunha, first vice chairman; Mel Stillman, second vice chairman; Jim Mansfield, secretary; and Nancy Keyes, treasurer. Members in attendance were Dan Kovacevic, Jim Conway, Moe Gillen, Bill Galvin, Kay Whelan, Bob Scalli, John Dillon, John Iacoi, Kate McDonough, Judy Brennan, Bill McCabe, Edna Kelly, Jeanne Davis and Marty O'Brien.

Dennis McLaughlin House The Dennis McLaughlin

The Dennis McLaughlin House, a transitional housing program for women in recovery from drugs and alcohol, has been almost two years in the planning and fund-raising stage and now an executive director has been hired and the facility is very near opening. The executive director, Cathy Qualitz, came before the CNC to update the members.

She explained that the facility, located at the Armed Services YMCA in the Charlestown Navy Yard, will house 10 women in recovery, some with and some without children. The housing will be available to them for up to 18 months during which time they will receive case management, advocacy and support services. Qualitz noted that in this transitional program, the object is to allow the women to make their own decisions without jeopardizing their recovery.

Children's Films

The Film Program for Children will be presented at the Charlestown Branch Library, 179 Main St., on Tuesday, May 17 at 10:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.

The features will be "Charlie Needs A Cloak," in which Charlie and the sheep show how wool becomes cloth; "Sprigs and Twigs," is the tale of how Fingermouse and Flash collect twigs; and "Wheel of the Chimney," is the story of how storks build nests on the roofs of farmhouses.

"Miss Nelson is Missing," in which Miss Nelson disappears from Room 207, will be shown only at 3:30

Suggested good books to read are Season of the White Stork by Heiderose Fischer-Nagel and The Weaver's Gift by Kathryn Lasky.

Qualitz said that it is the intent of the program to utilize local programs and social service agencies whenever possible, adding that referrals to the program must come through a health or social service agency.

Conway, who is president of the board, noted that a priority would be given to Charlestown women, adding that the Bunker Hill Health Center, Bunker Hill Community College, the Kennedy Center and other social service agencies should be aware of its availability and make appropriate referrals. Looney, who is also on the board, added that the Dennis McLaughlin House offers a place for a woman to get back on her feet in an environment away from drugs and alcohol. He added that she will have to take responsibility for herself and, hopefully, when she leaves will be well on her way to a secure future.

Qualitz told the members that she may be reached at 242-0251.

Farmers' Market

Laura Perille and Hugh Joseph of the Greater Boston Food Bank have been in Charlestown for the past few weeks talking with a number of groups, including the Kennedy Center, the Charlestown Business Association and the Charlestown Preservation Society regarding the possibility of establishing a Farmers' Market in the community.

For the past several years, a
City Farmstand has been located in Hayes Square outside
the Head Start facility and
offered a limited selection of
fresh produce one moming a
week from early summer
through October, and they
accepted WIC coupons for the

produce. Perille explained that this type of stand will be phased out in 1995, thus the group is looking toward a Farmers' Market that would bring three or four farmers with produce, fresh from Mass. farms. Perille said that Food Bank would provide start-up funds for the endeavor.

There are several issues currently under discussion, including a local sponsor, a location in the town and a day and time each week that it would be open. The proposal at the present time calls for the market to be operational from mid-to-late July through October, and they have been looking at a Wednesdays from 3 to 7 p.m.

Perille stated that a location has not yet been determined, but some of the sites mentioned have been the sidewalk in front of One Thompson Square, the parking lot to the rear of the liquor store in Thompson Square, the dead end of Old Rutherford Avenue adjacent to the skating rink as well as the Training Field. According to Perille, the day, hours and site will be determined by the people involved locally.

Conway spoke in favor of the Training Field where a Farmers' Market was set up each Saturday for many years. Scalli suggested the new City Square Park, and Davis questioned why no site in the Hayes Square area was mentioned. Brennan asked if the site could be rotated.

As to the price of the produce, Joseph said that some items will be higher and some lower than supermarket prices, adding that the produce will not be "discounted." He pointed out that it will be an opportunity to get produce picked that day.

It was also noted that a market manager would be hired to oversee the setup and close of the market who would help with signs, collect stall fees from farmers, enforce market guidelines and make sure the area is kept clean during and after market bours.

Courageous Sailing Center

Kathy Kelliher, youth program coordinator for the Courageous Sailing Center, came to introduce herself to the CNC members and encourage people to come down to Pier 4 in the Charlestown Navy Yard to see what is happening. An open house was held on May 7, and another is planned from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, May 21.

Kelliher stated that the center has a "whole new staff" this summer who are looking forward to teaching some 850 young people between the ages of 8 and 20 how to sail at no charge. The program starts on July 5 and continues through Sept. 2. She said that each youngster would be enrolled in a well-supervised one-week program that teaches them skills as well as sailing. She said that the staff would like to establish a relationship with the young people so they want to come back.

While Kelliher urged members to encourage young people to come down to the pier and enroll for the free program, she said that adult memberships are available and that the fee allows adults to take advantage of the sail-

Recommendations to grant the request were presented by the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services and the Boston Redevelopment Authority. The board agreed and approved the petition.

John Sitton was granted approval for 8 Allston St. following a resolving of concerns expressed by abutters. Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, had conducted an abutters meeting on March 24 to resolve area issues. The board granted approval.

* "In Valor There Is Hope" . . . These words are inscribed on the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington, D.C. Each year in our country, some 62,000 law enforcement officers are assaulted, more than 20,000 officers are injured and 179 of these brave men and women are killed in the line of duty. The national memorial was dedicated in October 1991 as a longoverdue tribute to these very special people.

This past Sunday, some 20 officers of the Boston Police Department, including Area A Community Service Officer Joe McNulty, left Boston by bicycle to travel to Washington where the names of fellow officers, Officer Tom Rose and Detective John Mulligan, will be inscribed along with many officers nationwide who were killed in he line of duty dur-

While traveling to Washington, at the epected rate of 80 miles per day, these local officers will be adding the names of slain officers to a scroll which will be left at the memorial. They expect to arrive in Washington toтогом, Мау 13.

* Street Reconstruction Update . . . Work on the first phase of the current Boston Redevelopment Authority street reconstruction project is proceeding on schedule. Construction activities presently are concentrated on Winthrop and Tremont streets.

During the past week, most of the concrete bases for the new gas streetlights have been installed on Winthrop Street. Installation of the gas piping to feed the lights is now proceeding well. Other ongoing work on Winthrop Street includes the completion of roof drain connections and the replacement of the last few remaining lead water services.

On Tremont Street, work continues on the drainage improvements and roof drain connections. The main drain line connecting the upper portion of Tremont Street to Monument Square is now being installed. All the drainage work is expected to be completed within the next two weeks.

Also on Tremont Street, work crews continue to make steady progress on rebuilding the stone wall at the Lowney Way end of the street. Boston Gas Company crews have extended the gas main in this area in order to provide service for the new gas streetlights. Bases for the lights are presently being installed and this week will be followed by underground service pipe connections.

A green circle with a "T" in it indicates the proposed location for a new tree. 

Boston To Receive An \$18.5 Million Increase In Local Aid

Sen. Thomas F. Birmingham and Rep. Richard A. Voke announced that Boston will receive \$14.9 million in additional education aid and \$3.6 million in new lottery aid for the fiscal year that begins this coming July, under a resolution the legislature hammered out last week. Boston students who attend regional schools also receive state funds, which are appropriated to the regional school district, rather than to the city under the final local aid resolution.

"This is good news for Boston," said Birmingham. "The numbers reflect my continuing commitment to education reform and a significant expansion of local aid for other municipal services."

"These will be the final

'cherry sheet' numbers," said Voke. "I am thrilled that Boston once again tops the list of those cities receiving the most aid."

The numbers reflect statewide increases of \$189 million in education aid and \$40 million in unrestricted lottery aid. Birmingham explained that the lottery aid includes \$20 million in municipal stabilization aid that was appropriated last year, in addition to the \$40 million increase. Lottery aid is "unrestricted" in that municipalities, not the state, determine how it will be

The legislators said that the Department of Revenue is expected to mail the socalled cherry sheets that detail local aid within the next two weeks.

7th Annual Knights Of Columbus Cribbage Tournament

On April 16, 128 men, representing some 32 councils from across the state, gathered at Bunker Hill Council No. 62 to vie for the 1994 Knights of Columbus Statewide Cribbage Championship. Jack Pierce of Bunker Hill, the tournament's founder and chairman, was on hand to oversee the proceedings.

In looking for a way to bring members statewide together for a day of socializing, Pierce noticed that in most every council he visited, cribbage boards seemed a part of the furniture. In 1988, he proposed a statewide tournament and, since that first year, the event has grown in popularity to the point where it is now an anticipated event.

Pierce's tireless efforts over the years have provided the general statewide membership with an arena in which to do friendly battle, and he is to be congratulated for those efforts.

Hooper, O'Brien, Parsons and Ryan pegged their way into the "final four," with Hooper and Parsons reaching the finals. In a close, well-played, final game, Hooper managed to capture the crown for his Wilmington Council.

In what may have been a fitting victory, ousted finalist John Parsons of Winchester, won the door prize, a bottle of cheer.

The consolation tournament, made up of all of the players defeated in the first round, was won by Julian Sokolinski of Mount Pleasant Council No. 98.

For the seventh consecutive year, Dale Newbanks of Bunker Hill provided those in attendance with a delicious roast beef dinner.

While the tournament's founder and former chairman, Jack Pierce, is stepping down after a highly successful seven-year term, new tournament chairman, Bob O'Leary, is already looking forward to next year's action.

WHEN RENTING TO RELATIVES, BOTH YOU AND YOUR TENANTS GET A BREAK

If you currently rent to relatives or are considering renting a house to a relative, you should be aware that you must charge them a reasonable rent or the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) may step in and deny much of the rental deduction. Nevertheless, property owners can often provide shelter to relatives at a reduced rent, yet continue to legally nail down a full rental deduction on their federal tax returns.

Ordinarily, the IRS considers the fair rental value to be the amount you could reasonably expect to receive from a stranger. When renting to relatives, however, both you and your tenants get a break. The IRS used to take the position that relatives had to pay the same amount of rent that others renting an identical property would be required to pay. That's no longer the case. Today, relatives may pay up to 20 percent less rent - and the home owner may still be able to take full rental write-offs.

The reason for allowing the property owner to ask for a lesser rent from a relative is that, quite frankly, relatives usually make better tenants. Not only are fees to property managers or real estate agents normally avoided when renting to relatives, but the property owner usually saves on other upkeep and cleanup costs as well. Simply put, owners usually incur less costs when renting to family members.

Still, in the event that you are challenged by the IRS as not charging fair rent to a relative, it will be up to you to prove that your relatives are paying at least 80 percent of the prevailing rent in your locality. To back up your position, it might be wise to save local newspaper advertisements listing rental values of comparable properties in your neighborhood. For further documentation, you may want to check the local real estate professionals and maybe even consider paying for an appraisal.

Galvin In The Race For Secretary Of State

Former State Rep. William F. Galvin of Boston has announced his candidacy for the office of secretary of state.

Galvin cited the new and increased responsibilities of the office, specifically in the areas of voter registration and securities regulation, as being particularly consistent with his public and professional experience. Galvin said, "More than ever before, the secretary of state's role as the chief information officer of Mass. is critical to public participation in policy decisions. As secretary of state, I will insist that the citizens be notified about and have the opportunity to participate in decisions that affect their daily lives."

Galvin served for 15 years in the Mass. House of Representatives, rising to the chairmanship of the Government Relations Committee. In 1990, he won the Democratic nomination for state treasurer and has remained active in party affairs. He said the political support he gained in that contest would give him an advantage in the upcoming race.

Galvin said he would enhance the secretary of state's role as the first official point of encounter for new businesses seeking to open up in the state. He said the office would provide "one-stop shopping" for new entrepreneurs to help them cut through bureaucratic red tape.

He also stressed the re-

sponsibilities of the secretary of state in regulating the sale of stocks and mutual funds. Elderly or unsophisticated investors are too often subject to highpressure sales techniques, which fail to provide them with adequate information, he said.

In the legislature, Galvin was a constant supporter of legislation designed to address social problems. He was the principal sponsor of the Mass. Civil Rights Law.

Other measures upon which he took leadership positions included comprehensive health care, affordable housing and equal mortgage and lending opportunities. He also voted to improve the tenant-eviction process.

Galvin first entered the House of Representatives in 1975, the year he earned his law degree from Suffolk University. He graduated from Boston College with a degree in political science in 1972. Since leaving the House in 1990, he has been practicing law.

(continued from page 3) ing and social activities while, at the same time, it provides funds to offset the cost of the free program for the youngsters. She quoted the price of one of the membership plans as \$499 from May 1 to Oct. 31, with a 15 percent discount at the open house.

Kelliher said that persons interested in the program should call her at 242-3821.

Gen. Michael Galvin

Conway left the council table to address the members and ask their support in naming a parcel of open space adjacent to City Square, for which landscaping plans are presently being made, in honor of the late Major General, Senator and Undersecretary of Labor, Michael Joseph Galvin, a native son of Charlestown. When Galvin died in 1963, the legislature voted to name a bridge to be built from City Square to Boston in his name. The proposed bridge was never built, so nothing was ever done to honor him.

Conway stated that Bunker Hill Post and the Charlestown Veterans Committee have endorsed the naming of the land in Galvin's honor, and he will be asking the county and state American Legion for their endorsement. Under new business, the CNC voted unanimously to send a letter of endorsement.

Public Safety

Dillon reported on the April Public Safety meeting which turned into a round table discussion since no police officer was present. He said that the increasing number of housebreaks has raised concern, with three reported in Mishawum Park and five on Monument Square in a short period of time.

Another concern was the double parking on Main Street in the vicinity of Fig's restaurant and, he said, the upcoming opening of a new restaurant, Comella's, just a few doors down, has the potential of impacting the same area further.

Cunha questioned the process a business must follow to obtain proper licenses. He added that the CNC has requested that the city's Inspectional Services Department (ISD) notify the council when someone applies for a license, and apparently this is not being done.

Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, told the CNC that she spoke to the ISD on 73-83 Main St. (Comella's) and was told that they have a 34 (retail) and 37 (sit-down restaurant) license but not a 36-A for take-out. It was noted by several members that they were not opposed to a restaurant, per se, but they were opposed to the process.

Looney stated that he wanted information on the history of how these licenses were obtained and how it got to this point. He said: "It is not fair that someone just walks into town and gets a

license while others, such as Bob Scalli and Kevin Smith (both planning food establishments on Bunker Hill Street), have to walk a tightrope." He added that anything such as this going on in the town should come to the CNC.

Benefits Committee

Keyes related that applications for the third \$50,000 grant from the Mass. Water Resources Authority mitigation agreement with the city will be available for Charlestown non-profit organizations. She said that they would be at the Patriot office, One Thompson Square, and must be returned to her by Friday, May 20. The committee will meet on Monday, May 23 at 7 p.m. at the Kent Community Center, 50 Bunker Hill St., to review the applications.

Mitigation Committee

Gillen reported on a new committee that has been formed consisting of representatives of Charlestown, the North End, Waterfront, West End, South End, East Boston and Cambridge, all areas heavily impacted by the Central Artery/Tunnel (CA/T) project, which has met twice under the chairmanship of Rep. Sal DiMasi. Beside Gillen, who represents the CNC, Charlestown members include Ken Stone from the North Area Task Force and Tom King from the Citizens for a Livable Charlestown. Among the elected officials and/or their representatives who have attended are District One City Councillor Diane Modica, Sen. Robert Travaglini and Sen. Thomas Birmingham, and, Gillen stated, staff from Rep. Richard Voke's office would also be a part of the committee. The CNC voted to ratify Gillen as its representative.

According to Gillen, the committee is looking at the impacts the project may have and devising mitigation measures. One of the first tasks is for each community to submit a draft list of community impacts by a May 6 deadline. Dorothy Conway, legislative aide to Travaglini, has been charged with integrating the list prepared by each community and preparing a draft on CA/T impacts and include mitigation measures the committee will strive for by the end of the month.

Gillen handed out a copy of the draft on Charles River Crossing impacts on Charlestown for the CNC members to review. He noted that there had been insufficient time since the committee's April 26 meeting to hold a public meeting in the community. Galvin expressed concern that the draft didn't include public input, and Looney asked whether consolidation with other neighborhoods. gave them an advantage, since the North Area Task Force had been so successful in working out problems on the CANA project.

According to Gillen, other areas have received funds for a study group, and they would ask for an environmental consultant for Charlestown. Looney questioned him as to whether joining this committee would be signing on to a law suit since some of the people on the committee would prefer having nothing built. Both Gillen and Brennan said that the law suit is an entirely different issue, with Gillen adding that the three Charlestown members are just trying to "stake out a claim" for Charlestown and share the community's concerns with the elected offiThe CNC voted to accept the draft because of the time limitations, with the provision that this be an exception. Looney asked Gillen to obtain a schedule of the committee meetings so that there can be a public process on upcoming issues.

New Business

Under new business, Dillon brought up the fact that questions have arisen about activities at the Armed Services YMCA and suggested a meeting with the Y's Executive Director Paul Harvey, following up on an October meeting on the subject. Conway said he would set up a meeting with Harvey and a delegation from the CNC.

Mansfield reminded the members that teens 14-17 must call the HOPE line by May 20 in order to be eligible for a summer job. The line is open between 3 and 6 p.m. daily, and the teens must call themselves. The number is 635-HOPE.

Davis brought up the issue of the field house at Ryan Field and that a month ago, reports out of the Boston Parks Department were that renovations would be completed in two weeks. It was suggested that CNC members call the Parks Department to inquire when the field house will be open.

Looney asked that the June meeting of the CNC be changed from June 7 to June 14 because of Charlestown Pride Week activities. It was voted that the meeting will be held at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, June 14 at the American Legion Hall, 23 Adams St.

"It is while we are young that the habit of industry is formed. If not then, it never is afterwards. The fortune of our lives, therefore, depends on employing well the short period of youth.

As testimony to their concurrence with Thomas Jefferson's philosophy, students at Charlestown Catholic Elementary School have been employing themselves quite "industriously" as they involved themselves in a science fair and as they participated in the Law Day program at the Charlestown District Court.

On April 29, all students at Charlestown Catholic presented the fruits of weeks of research via dioramas, posters, scale models, videos and reports as the school held its annual Science Fair. On April 28, students at Charlestown Catholic Elementary School participated in a interactive teleconference with four congressmen - Peter Torkildsen (R-MA), Calvin Dooley (D-CA), Dan Miller (R-FL) and Richard Lehman (D-CA). During the conference, which was broadcast live from Washington D.C., the students discussed their views about President Clinton's health care plan with the congressmen. It gave students from around the country a chance to voice their opinions, and gave the congressmen a chance to hear from those who will be affected by the choices that they make.

The 6th grade class of Anne Teague gave up their study period to join students from Calif., Kan., Fla. and other Mass. schools in the teleconference. The students were given a brief description of the Clinton plan and its alternatives. Then they picked the plan which they thought would be best for the country. The three proposals they had to chose from were: The Clinton Plan, the Market-Oriented Approach and Single Payer Proposals

The Clinton Plan would attempt to have health plans lower prices while maintaining quality. Its main goal is to "balance equality of access to health care with market competition through consumer choice."

The Market-Oriented approach would only fix the parts of the health care system that need fixing. This plan would also avoid the use of the government.

The final choice was the Single Payer Proposal which would guarantee universal coverage for all Americans. All doctor and hospital payments would be determined by and channeled through the government. The insurance industry would no longer be involved in health care.

After each school selected the plan which they felt would be best, they were allowed one minute to give their "testimony" to the congressmen by use of a phone. The students at Charlestown Catholic selected 7th grader Lynn Huynh, 12, of Dorchester to relate their testimony to the forum of congressmen.

The students selected the Single Payer Proposal and gave their reasons in Lynn's testimony: "I would pick the Single Payer Proposal because it would guarantee people a better health care system and [they] would not be charged a lot. Some doctors would charge more than the insurance company may pay. People who do not have a lot of money would still get a good

health care system." The congressmen then responded by statements and questions, which the students were given a chance to think about before responding. Unfortunately, time ran out before they could return to Mrs. Teague's class to hear more of the students' ideas.

The teleconference was the third in a five-part series entitled "Learning to Lead"which focuses on the issue of health care reform. It was broadcast on the Mass LearnPike satellite network, which is operated by the Mass. Corporation for Educational Telecommunications (MCET). It was the first session that students from Charlestown Catholic participated in.

Congressman Torkildsen said "I strongly support any program that includes students in important issues and helps them realize the role they can play in our government."

Today, students are able to interact in the learning process with individuals from around the country and participate in the issues that are going to affect their lives. It is programs such as MCET that have made it possible for the education of our children to expand beyond the four walls of a classroom and use the technology available today to instruct our future leaders.

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

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
