The year was 1911. Trucks and fire engines were pulled noisily over cobblestone streets, the Bunker Hill Housing Project was on a distant horizon some thirty years in the future, the daily newspaper cost a penny or two, and the first shot from World War I had not yet been fired. The year was 1911, the month was February, and it was the time when my mother was born. It was, also, less than four months after my father was born.

Oftentimes I like to reflect upon my earlier days as a youngster in Charlestown, but when I do, I am reminded that my parents' earlier days preceded my own by some thirty years. Memories of those long ago days are not part of my being, but the reflections of my Ma and Dad somehow have made me feel that they are, and very much so.

For years I have listened, listened to all that meant so much to both of them as they grew up down on Decatur Street, then known as the "Point." Ma was a Walsh, one of seven children, and Dad was the youngest of ten McGonagles.

One day, some sixty years ago, fate heart is aching brought the two of them together, and there are four of us now who never fail to bless the dreams that you dreamed came true . . . that very same fate, for we are not only fortunate, but rare, indeed.

We are fortunate to have been blessed with very special parents, for one does not get to choose his or her own Ma and Dad, and we are rare because they are still with us today helping to shape memories for the years to come.

Ma and Dad are on Elm Street today, living in the same house in which all of us grew up. Although we are all regular visitors to that house, it is usually during the holiday season when all of us return together. It is during these times when the dining room is miraculously transformed into a bedroom, when the old black cast-iron stove reassumes birthday. it rightful place in the kitchen, when a set tub occupies a corner of the same room, and when voices from The Shadow, Green Hor-



net, Inner Sanctum and Boston Blackie float from an imagined old Philco radio. It is also a time when the words from the songs of another era fill the air. And because we have heard and enjoyed them so many times before, they are familiar to us.

In harmony, still beautiful, we listen to: I count them all apart, and as the tear drops start, I find a broken heart among my

Boy of mine, boy of mine, how my poor

When your old wedding ring was new, and I love you as I never loved before, when

first I met you on the village green . Let me call you sweetheart, I'm in love with you, Let me hear you whisper that you

love me too . . We grew up on those songs of long ago, and on each New Year's Eve of our young lives, we would lie in bed listening as they were sung by my parents and their friends, for then that is what parties were.

It was with the memories of those precious years that the four of us decided to bring much of the "old gang" together for another

We did it to help celebrate Ma's eightieth

We were there, the children, the spouses, the grandchildren, but we were not the party. We were, as it was those many years ago,

the observers. They were the party, and the day was theirs.

Around the table sat Ma's sisters and brothers, the Walsh clan. They had finished dinner now, and it was evident to all in attendance that it would be but a short time before John would lead the rest in song. Sister Leontine, Mary Williams, Katy McCue and her husband Frank, Jim (Pa), John's wife Mae, Ma's close friend Rose Stevens and, of course, Helen and Charlie, our Ma and Dad, awaited that which was inevitable.


It was about five-thirty when it began with Santa Lucia, and not until Show Me the Way to Go Home at a quarter to eleven did it end.

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

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Car Break-ins And Public Drinking Continue To Plague The Town

Council Public Safety Committee/Police Community Relations meeting on March 12 that auto breakins are on the rise across the city. "Here in Charlestown," he stated, "the majority of break-ins are done by young teen-agers who spot items left in the car."

McNulty informed those in attendance that auto alarms tend not to be a deterrent to thieves. "They can break into a car in 20 seconds, take what they want and disappear before the owner responds to the alarm," he said. Although, he added, cars that are not protected by an alarm allow the thief more time to ransack the vehicle and remove such items as radios and tape decks.

The officer advised car owners not to leave anything visible in their vehicles. "Put it in the trunk," he said. "Items such as leather coats, ice skates, briefcases and pocketbooks have been stolen from autos

in Charlestown recently."

Mt. Vernon Street resident Bob Wallace requested that flyers be made up and placed on every car windshield notifying car owners to be more aware and take precautions. McNulty informed the group that this could be done and he would look further into having organizations such as the Boys & Girls Club get involved to help distribute the

McNulty asked the residents to "please dial 911 when you hear a car alarm. We will respond and many times catch the thief in the general area with the merchandise he has just taken from the vehicle."

Mel Stillman, chairman of the Public Safety Committee, requested an update on the Walk and Talk program and the possibility of having the Community Policing program in the town.

McNulty stated that the Walk and Talk program

continues to function in the community and will be expanded to cover other areas in the near future.

The Community Policing program, he said, would involve finding a storefront location and setting specific hours of operation. He stated that the Community Schools could be used as a visitation site for residents to come and talk to a police officer about problems or complaints. "The main objective of these programs is for the police to become more involved with the community and find out its problem," McNulty said.

Charlestown District Court Chief Probation Officer Barbara Burke spoke to the gathering on the dangerous attitude in the community on public drinking, especially by young people. She said: "The statement that I hear over and over again is 'If they're over there on the corner not bothering anyone, leave them alone.' This can't be accepted anymore. Public drinking is against the law for all ages."

Burke said that she is working hand-in-hand with the police to enforce this law, stating: "Violators will be hit with a fine, week after week, until their families get fed up with paying for it." Fines, she said, range between \$50 and \$75.

Peter Looney, chairman of the Basic Services Committee, asked Burke and McNulty to describe what would happen to youngsters when they were arrested for public drinking. McNulty replied: "First they are put in the police cruiser and taken to the station. Once there, they are put in the holding area while their parents are called." He added that at the same time, the police will call Burke to inform her of the arrest.

Burke added: "The youngster is then either placed on bail (\$15) and turned over to the parents to appear in court the next day or is held overnight if the person is too intoxicated." She said that sentencing is the same for juveniles and adults - three months probation and a fine of between \$50 and \$75. She added that the more times a person is arrested for public drinking, the higher the fines.

Looney informed the gathering that CHarlestown Against Drugs (CHAD) has plans for an informative and enjoyable afternoon for teen-agers 13 to 19 on Sunday, May 5 from 1 to 6 p.m. at St. Catherine Hall.

According to Looney, Brother Joe, formerly of Christopher Columbus High School, will speak to the teens "about drugs, sexually transmitted diseases and self-esteem." The discussions will be followed by a dance with a D.J., pizzas and homemade sundaes. He added: "We want the kids to tell us what's good for them. We don't know what the kids are thinking about on these and other issues."

CHAD is also planning a Family Picnic Day, Looney said, for Sunday, May 19 at the Charlestown High School Field. "There will be no talk on drugs," he said, "just fun for the entire family." More details on this picnic will be made available in the near future.

Stephen Collins, community liaison for the Central Artery/Third Harbor Tunnel and Central Artery/ North Area projects, was on hand to update the community on changes in traffic and pedestrian routes in City Square.

Collins stated that the City Square pedestrain walkway would receive additional lighting this week and the Freedom Trail red line will be redirected so that fewer pedestrians would be walking through the square. Additional jersey barriers would also be installed, he said, separating vehicles from the walkways

Collins advised pedestrians who walk between Boston and Charlestown to stay under the North Washington Street Bridge and go to the Gray Street overpass to get to Park Street. "It's the safest route at this time," he

The next Public Safety/ Police Community Relations meeting will be held on Tuesday, April 9.

Convinces Governor To Restore Funds To Home Care

In response to overwhelming criticism from Sen. Thomas Birmingham, other key members of the General Court and the Home Care Advocates, Gov. William Weld has restored most of the money he proposed cutting from home health care programs. The original cut of a devastating \$4 million has been reduced to only \$1.3 million.

In a letter dated Feb. 12, 1991, Birmingham, a member of the Committee on Human Services and Elderly Affairs, stated that the proposed cut would not only "represent a false economy, it would also constitute poor social policy. Balancing the budget on the backs of the needy and deserving seniors is not the answer to our state's problems."

Al Norman, executive director of Mass Home Care, thanked Birmingham for his efforts. Norman stated:
"Without the support of
Tom and the other members
of the legislature, our lobbying efforts to the governor
would not have been so successful."

After receiving the news that the governor had restored the funds, Birmingham said, "I am enormously pleased at the governor's reversal on this issue. I appreciate his willingness to listen on important issues and to recognize when he has made a mistake. His proposed cut was a disaster for the truly needy and deserving seniors in our Commonwealth. We will continue to press for full restoration of all funds to this worthy program." The senator went on to thank all of the concerned constituents who contacted his office to express their views.

The Director of the city of Boston Public Facilities Department, Lisa Chapnick, presented the city's plan to establish a Neighborhood Chamber of Commerce to members of the Charlestown Kiwanis Club and the Charlestown Business Association at a recent luncheon at Barrett's on Boston Harbour.

Chapnick informed the groups that the Neighborhood Chamber of Commerce would combine the energies, talents, experiences and wisdom of over 2,200 businesses in Boston. She stated: "In these numbers, there's power, support and strength." She added: "The number of businesses in Boston totals 25 percent

of the entire economic output in Massachusetts. There are 30 business organizations across the city representing 40 percent of all Boston residents." Chapnick told the gathering: "You have created most of the jobs in your neighborhood. A total of 80 percent of all jobs created by a local merchants or businesses go to residents of the neighborhood where that business is located.

Speaking about another business plan for the city, Judith Bracken, business manager for the Public Facilities' Enterprise Division, stated that neighborhood business districts are the most visible symbols of the success or failure of a "What is seen," she

said, "is important to the entire community. If it is not pleasing to the eye, businesses will not do well." Explaining the purpose behind the initiative to form a business partnership between city hall and the neighborhoods, she stated: "We can share ideas, develop market strategies and sales incentives and work closely with the police on crime-related problems of businesses and the concept of community policing."

Bracken also told the groups, "As a collective body, the Neighborhood Chamber of Commerce can make lending institutions step forward to do more for neighborhood businesses."

Deputy Director of Neighborhood Enterprises Ed Lee stated: "We are not trying to tell you what to do, but give you a window to look through to see where things are at, such as programs, guest speakers, financial information - issues that would benefit all."

Lee informed those at the meeting that four target areas of the city, yet to be determined, will be chosen to take part in the Enterprising Neighborhood Initiative, a program that will

Dorchester Man Pleads Guilty In Death Of Charlestown Woman

William A. Hook, 42, of Dorchester, pled guilty on Feb. 7 in Suffolk Superior Court to manslaughter in the stabbing death of a Charlestown woman.

The Boston Police reported that on May 9, 1990, the defendant stabbed and killed Patricia Dodd, 36, at her apartment located on 118 Medford St., Charlestown. Hook and the victim had known each other for 15

years. He surrendered

himself to police on the same day and made admissions to the incident.

Superior Court Judge Sandra Hamlin sentenced Hook to 12 to 20 years at M.C.I. Cedar Junction. Assistant District Attorney Paul Connolly represented the Commonwealth.

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
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
