

### Firefighter William J. Boyle Honored For Bravery

At the 108th Annual Boston Fire Department Ball and Awards Ceremony held last Friday evening at the Park Plaza Hotel, Mayor Raymond L. Flynn presented the Walter Scott Medal for Valor and The American Legion Award to Firefighter William J. Boyle of Engine Company 50, Charlestown.

Firefighter Boyle was honored for bravery for his actions during an early

morning call on October 9, 1986. At 12:18 a.m., Engine 50 responded to Fire Box 4146 at Bunker Hill and Lexington Streets where they were told a man had attempted to commit suicide by slashing his arms and thighs with a knife and had also stabbed his brother. The man was reported to be extremely violent and dangerous.

When members of the Engine Company entered the apartment, they found

the man on his feet, bleeding from both arms and thighs and wielding a six inch knife. As the men approached the victim, he made threatening gestures forcing them to leave the building

Firefighter Boyle entered the apartment and made his way as close as possible to the victim and started talking to him in a calm and confident manner. All the while the man continued to (continued on page 11)

#### Main And Warren Streets Update by Judie Dunphy

Road work is underway from Wood Street going toward Pleasant Street.

A rough course of asphalt has been installed over a crushed rock bed on the Main Street side of Thompson Square. ### Registry Announces Low Number License Plate Lottery

Entries are now being accepted for the Bay State's first low number license plate lottery to be drawn at Registry of Motor Vehicles' headquarters on 100 Nashua Street at 10:00 a.m. on Friday, June 19.

Plates in the lottery include six with three numbers, 68 with four numbers, 11 with one letter and one number, and 54 with one letter and two numbers.

Contestants have from now to midnight, June 4 to submit postal card entries specifying name, address, driver's license number (if applicable), and the license plate number of eligible passenger vehicles.

One entry may be submitted for each passenger vehicle owned by an individual and currently registered with a passenger plate. Vehicles owned by corporations, companies, or businesses are ineligible.

The 139 plates will be awarded in numerical order as the postcards are drawn, beginning with three number plates, then four numbers, a letter and one number followed by a letter and two numbers.

Entries will be checked for duplication and all duplicate entries discarded.

To be considered eligible for the drawing, all entries must be:

- · submitted on a U.S. Postal card and mailed to: Registry of Motor Vehicles, Low Number License Plate Lottery, P.O. Box 853, Boston, MA 02103-0853 and specify name, address, license number (if applicable), and license plate number.
- postmarked no later than midnight June 4, 1987.
- typed or clearly printed and free from errors.
- based on a vehicle owned by an individual or individuals, not by a business or corporation.
- assigned to a vehicle with an active and renewable registration (i.e. currently insured and without outstanding parking fines, unpaid excise tax bills, etc.)

All fees, which may consist of a one-time plate transfer charge of \$5 and an additional annual \$10 registration fee, are the responsibility of the winners. Registration for reserv-



Runners then turn right onto First Street and out Gate Four. Then it's right to Chelsea Street, left to Vine at Bunker Hill Street to the circle at Saint Catherine's, right to Lowney Way to Park Street, right on to Main Street, right up Monument Avenue. Then it's right, around the Monument, right on to High Street, left on Green and on to the finish line on Austin Street. Runners will enter the finish chute and channel onto West School Street.

Some historic landmarks passed along the route include the newly renovated Austin House, an 1822 building of fieldstone from Outer Brewster Island in Boston Harbor and once the home of the **Bunker Hill Aurora**, one of the first



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
