Firefighter William J. Boyle Honored For Bravery

At the 108th Annual Boston Fire Department Ball and Awards Ceremony held last Friday evening at the Park Plaza Hotel, Mayor Raymond L. Flynn presented the Walter Scott Medal for Valor and The American Legion Award to Firefighter William J. Boyle of Engine Company 50, Charlestown.

Firefighter Boyle was honored for bravery for his actions during an early

morning call on October 9, 1986. At 12:18 a.m., Engine 50 responded to Fire Box 4146 at Bunker Hill and Lexington Streets where they were told a man had attempted to commit suicide by slashing his arms and thighs with a knife and had also stabbed his brother. The man was reported to be extremely violent and dangerous.

When members of the Engine Company entered the apartment, they found

the man on his feet, bleeding from both arms and thighs and wielding a six inch knife. As the men approached the victim, he made threatening gestures forcing them to leave the building.

Firefighter Boyle entered the apartment and made his way as close as possible to the victim and started talking to him in a calm and confident manner. All the while the man continued to

Two Hero Squares, honoring three Charlestown men who died in the Armed Forces during World War II, will be dedicated on Sunday, May 31st. The dedication is being sponsored by Bunker Hill Post 26, The American Legion, with the approval of the Charlestown Veterans Committee.

At 10:15 a.m., a Hero Square will be dedicated to Parade Committee To Meet

Persons interested in assisting in this year's parade, slated for Sunday, June 14th, are welcome to attend.

two brothers, Private Daniel A. Kelley, U.S.M.C., who was killed in action on March 3, 1945 in the Asiatic Pacific Theatre, and S/Sergeant James P. Kelley, U.S.M.C., who died on November 28, 1942 in the Boston V.A. Hospital. The Square will be located at the corner of North Mead and Bunker Hill Streets, adjacent to Saint Francis de Sales Convent.

Private John W. Powers, Sr. will be honored by a Hero Square dedication at the corner of Bunker Hill Court and Bunker Hill Street at 10:45 a.m. Private Powers was killed in action on February 27, 1945 in the European Theatre while serving in the 345th Infantry Division, under the command of General George Patton.

The Milton Post Band will provide music for these ceremonies.

At the conclusion of these memorializations, Bunker Hill Post 26, The American Legion will hold their Annual Memorial Day Mass at Saint Francis de Sales Church, 313 Bunker Hill Street at 11:30 a.m. This service will honor all departed members of Post 26 and deceased veterans of Charlestown, particularly the Kelley brothers, Private Powers, and Past Commander Lieutenant Colonel William F. Sullivan.

A collation will be held following the Mass in Bishop Lawton Hall of Saint Francis de Sales Church.

The public is cordially invited to attend these ceremonies.

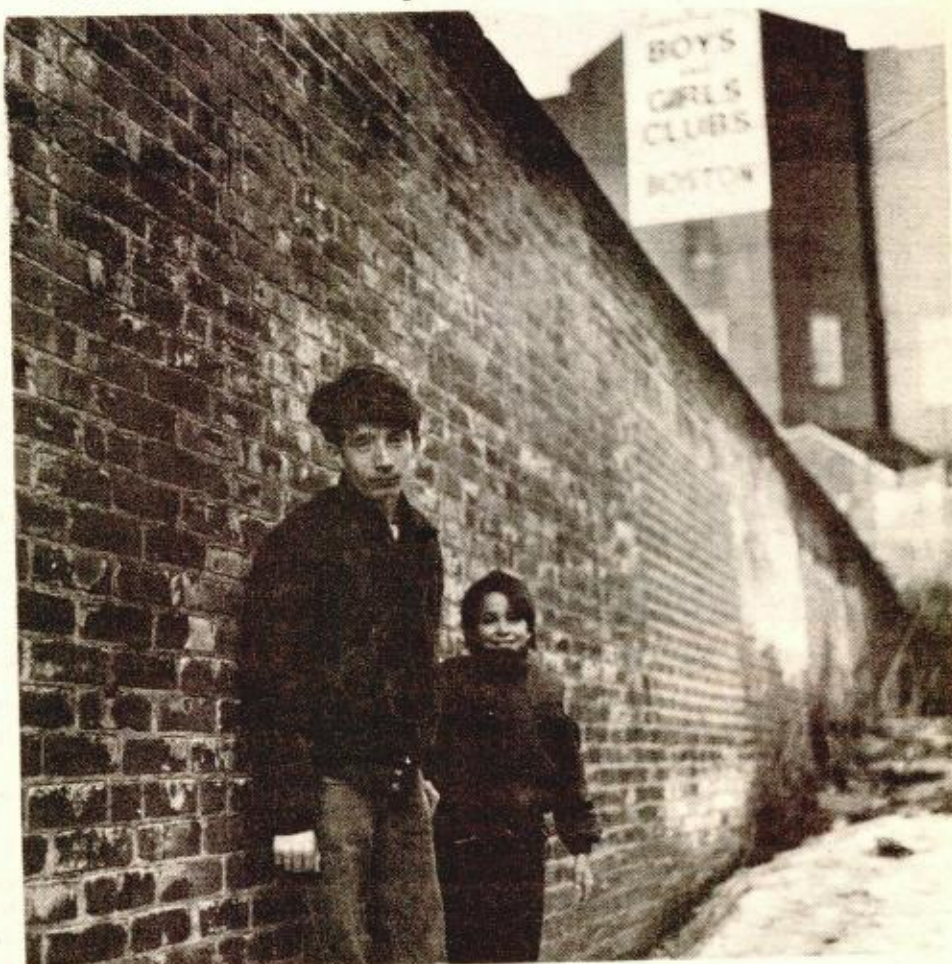

Main And Warren Streets Update

Road work is underway from Wood Street going toward Pleasant Street.

A rough course of asphalt has been installed over a crushed rock bed on the Main Street side of Thompson Square. The work is also continuing on the installation of the 12 foot water main on Warren Street from Pleasant Street to Thompson Square. This work will enable the tying of the rest of the buildings in the area into the temporary surface water line seen running along Warren Street so that the permanent line can be installed. There is a no parking ban in the Thompson Square area and along Pleasant and Warren Streets during construction. Cars will be towed!

Cement sidewalks are being poured at the Sullivan Square end of Main Street between Charles and Baldwin Streets on the odd side of the street.

Beginning next week, between Pleasant Street and Monument Avenue, a section of roadway will be rough graded. Also, the manhole at Pleasant and Main Street will be repaired.

All areas of the Parade Route currently under construction will be rough graded to enable the Parade to follow its normal route on June 14.

A decision on curbing between Wood and Sullivan Streets has not yet been determined.

Digging Into Charlestown

On Friday, June 5, from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m., the Charlestown Branch Library will sponsor a walking tour of the Charlestown site where the Public Archaeological Laboratories are currently working. The tour will be led by Ann Lembeck, Site Interpreter for the Public Archaeological Laboratories. After viewing the site, Lembeck will escort the party to 152 North Street in the North End where objects uncovered at various Charlestown sites are on display.

The Public Archaeological Laboratory of Providence, Rhode Island has been searching for clues to Charlestown's past prior to

the start of current work on the Central Artery Project. They have discovered, among other things, that Charlestown was a center for pottery production in early New England. It had been thought before this discovery that much of the pottery was imported from Europe during the 18th century to meet colonial needs.

Adults interested in the tour should meet at the Charlestown Branch Library, 179 Main Street, at 2:00 p.m. on June 5. Children may come if accompanied by a parent. A rain date of June 12 has been set.

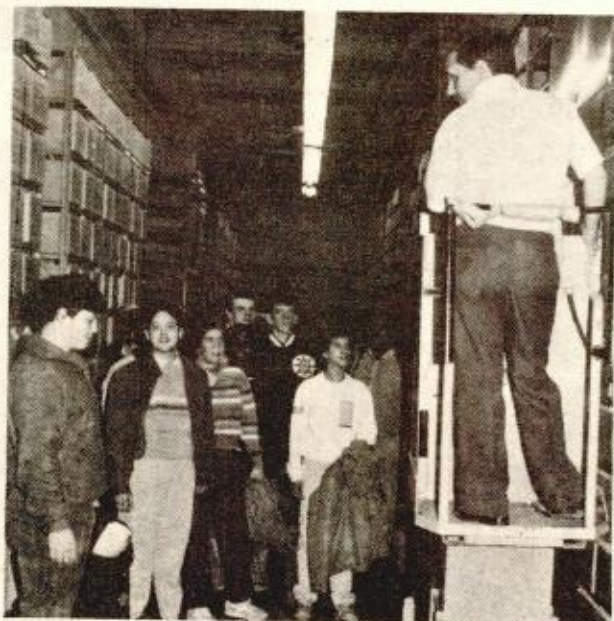

Wood, Manager of Stoughton records and supply, guided the students on the tour, and demonstrated how the Stoughton warehouse serves the needs of Liberty Mutual's 250 offices across the United States and Canada. The group visited the receiving and shipping dock, where they saw fork-lift trucks move large crates. They

learned how supplies are transported by a recessed track that pulls loaded cart-like "trucks" to pre-programmed areas of the warehouse. They saw how the supplies were organized, stored, packaged, weighed and shipped out.

Upstairs in the records storage area, Wood explained how the insurance company's claims records are organized and maintained for ten to 15 years before they are destroyed. He demonstrated how the Auto Master 500, commonly called the "narrow aisle picker" is used to lift warehouse workers up to reach supplies and files on topshelves, as high as 30 feet above the floor.

"It is always great exposure for the kids to see that there are jobs out there that they can do," Berkowitz said. "It gives them a goal to work towards."

The CHS-Liberty Mutual Partnership began in 1975. It provides students with career orientation through field trips and various Liberty Mutual offices and

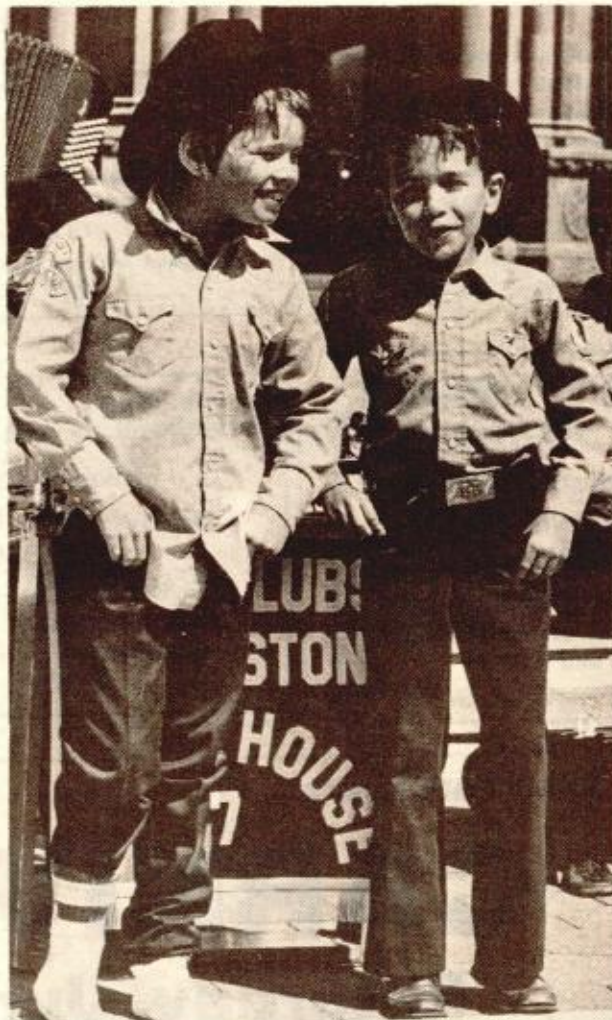
his guidance to make this unique activity a reality again and for the previous forty years of service to the youth of Charlestown.

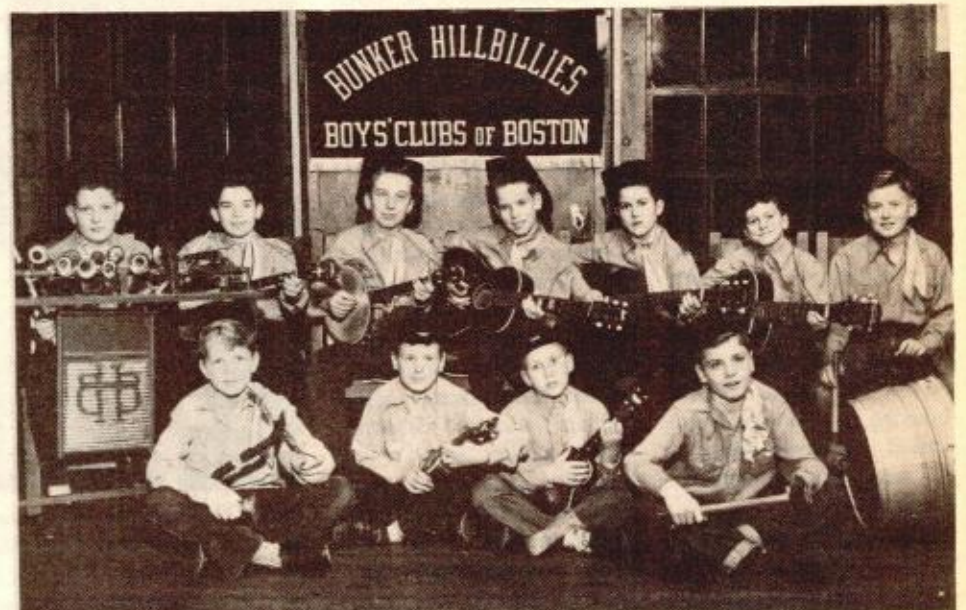

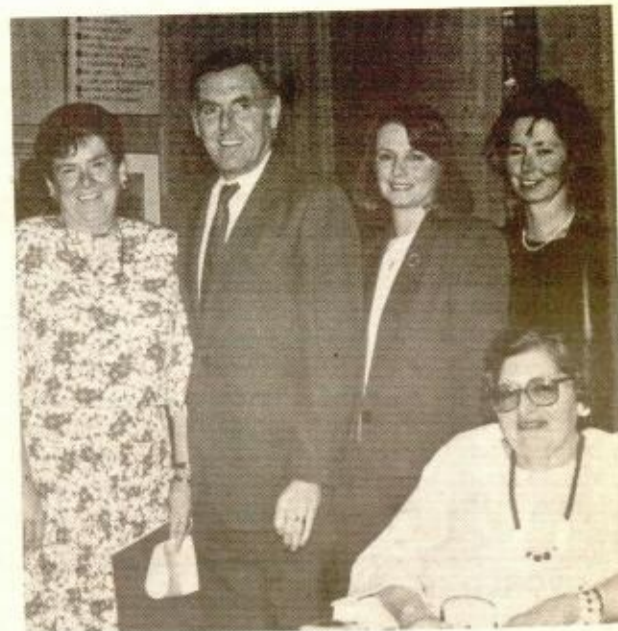

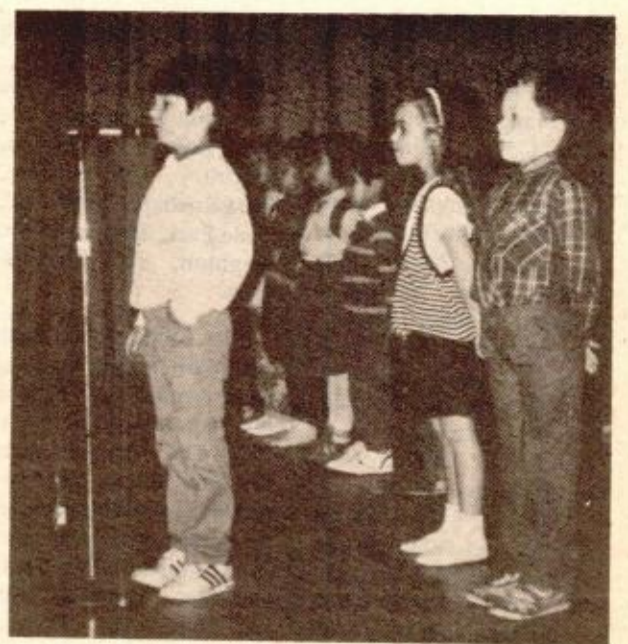
The program was produced and directed by the second grade classes of Mrs. O'Rourke, Mrs. Tibbetts and Miss Wensley.

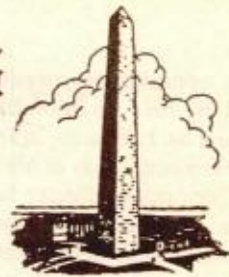
