Charlestown Voters - Where Were You?

The city of Boston Primary Election of Sept. 23 may well go down in the record books as the lowest turnout in history. While numerous Charlestown political followers rationalized that this section of the city had one of the highest voter turnouts, the fact is that some 6,900 registered voters in this town did not vote on Tuesday.

There were 8,843 Charlestown residents listed as being eligible to vote in the primary and only 1,930, or 22% cast their ballot in the contests for At-Large and District One City Coun-

The District One City Council race was possibly first try for public office.

Modica topped the ticket in Charlestown, while Scapicchio posted a plurality in the North End/Waterfront/West End and East Boston districts, coming

World War II Memorial To Be Rededicated At City Square Park

Just one day less than 51 years, four people who grew up in the town, who shared the common grief of a loved one having been

lost in the war and who, at very young ages, were selected to represent the families of the men and women who served in the

war, some of whom never returned to their home-

On Sept. 28, 1946, a War Memorial was unveiled in a grassy fenced-in park in City Square. Thousands were reported to have gathered in the square as Grace Ann Powers, 4, Edward Daly, 9, James Curran, 14, and Louise Salvato, 15, pulled the cord and uncovered the memorial that honored those who had served their country and particularly those who made the supreme sacrifice.

Through the years, traffic in the town increased and took its toll on City Square. The center of the square became somewhat shabby and the fencing and grass deteriorated. Then came the Central Artery/ North Area (CANA) project which included excavating for historical arti-

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World War II Memorial To Be Rededicated At City Square Park

(continued from page 1) facts in the City Square. James W. Conway, chairman of the Charlestown Veterans Committee, opposed a proposal to put the memorial in storage while the excavation and highway construction was going on. He feared the loss of the memorial much like the honor roll at Thompson Square which was stored during construction of One Thompson Square years ago and was never recovered.

A site was secured for

the memorial in the Harvard Mall, right inside the City Square entrance. There it sat in view of all until the new City Square Park was proposed by a dedicated group of Charlestown residents, funded with the guidance and tireless support of former House Majority Leader Richard Voke, designed and created by The Halvorson Company and subsequently became a realty.

The park now includes a permanent place of honor for this memorial that is

deserving of the respect of each and every individual.

While this memorial honors those who served in World War II, it also became a special place for the families of those who never came home - buried in foreign countries or missing in action.

Grace Ann Powers Walsh was just 3 when her father, John W. Powers Sr., was killed in combat in Germany in 1945. He was buried in Belgium and, through the years, she and her mother would visit the memorial with flowers in his memory.

Louise Salvato Lampassi lost two brothers in 1944. Francis J. Salvato was killed in a training accident in Texas early that year. In November of 1944, Candeloro J. Salvato was reported shot down over the Kurile Islands, and his body was never recovered.

Edward Daly's sister, Lola M. Daly, died in a training accident in California during the war.

James P. Curran, father of Brother James Curran, was killed over Germany in April 1944.

These four will once again represent the families of the Charlestown men and women who served in

World War II as the memorial is once again unveiled.

The rededication will begin at 11 a.m. with an Ecumenical Service at the USS Cassin Young, a World War II Fletcher Class Destroyer, at Pier One in the National Historical Park section of the Charlestown Navy Yard. The pastors of all five Charlestown churches and Brother Curran will offer prayers and readings. Music will be offered by the Pipes & Drums of Bunker Hill, the Colonial Band of Lawrence with soloist Kathleen Adams, and the Marquis of Granby Junior Ancient Fyfe & Drum Corps of Connecticut.

At the conclusion of the service a memorial wreath will be tossed from the deck of the ship into Boston Harbor in memory of those who served and lost their lives in World War II.

At approximately 11:40 a.m., the gathering will assemble on Pier One to march to City Square Park, accompanied by the three musical units and with the flags of 10 color guards leading the way. The procession will march to First Avenue, through Gate 4 and onto Chelsea Street. It will then proceed to Vine Street, Bunker Hill Street

and onto to Lexington Street to Monument Square, where it will continue down Winthrop Street to Main Street to City Square Park. Transportation will be provided for those who would like to join the procession but are not able to walk the

The ceremony at City Square Park will get underway at approximately noon with brief remarks from invited guests and musical selections from the three units. At the conclusion of the program and following. the unveiling of the monument, a representative of the family of each Charlestown man and woman who died in World War II will lay a flower at the base of the memorial.

Many hours of research has gone into identifying Charlestown men and women who died in World War II. Some records do not list sections of the city and it is possible that there are men and women that were missed in these files.

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FREE FLU SHOTS

The "flu" season will soon be here and it is important to get vaccinated with the flu shot in the early fall in order to prevent catching the flu once the yearly epidemic begins.

This year the health center plans to set aside several periods of time during which you will be able to get your free flu shot. If you are over 65 and/or have a chronic medical problem, you should consider getting a flu shot.

Influenza or flu is a disease caused by a virus that leads to the sudden onset of fever (usually at least 101 degrees), sore throat, cough, runny nose, tiredness and aches and pains. These symptoms last for several days.

Everyone feels sick with influenza, but some people, especially older people, go on to get pneumonia and become seriously ill. In addition, people with chronic illnesses such as diabetes, heart disease or emphysema, may find that these diseases get out of control when they have the flu. The result is that as many as 10,000 Americans die each year during the flu epidemic. To try to prevent serious illness, hospitalization and death, the Center for Disease Control recommends that anyone with heart or lung disease receive a flu

shot. Ninety percent of the deaths caused by the complications of influenza are in people 65 or older.

The flu vaccine enables your body to make protective antibodies against the type of influenza virus, and a new vaccine is made each year because different strains of the virus spread each flu season. Therefore, it is necessary to receive a yearly flu shot.

The vaccines used in the past few years have been associated with only a few reactions. The most common reaction, which affects less than a third of people vaccinated, is soreness and redness of the arm at the site of the shot. Occasionally, people will develop mild flu-like symptoms for one or two days, starting within hours of getting the shot. This happens mainly in people who have never had influenza Most people who get sick a day or two after getting a shot, have gotten an unrelated illness; not something caused by the vaccine. Very rarely, people have an allergic reaction to the shot. Thus, anyone with a history of allergies to eggs, which are used in the preparation of the vaccine, should not get the flu shot.

Charlestown soccer captains are Claudy Paul, Jose Garcia and Townie Kevin Morris.




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POP WARNER CORNER

CAPITAL GAINS SUBJECT TO NEW RATES AND RULES

The <u>Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997</u> cuts the top rate on long-term capital gains from 28% to 20%, and it allows a large exclusion for home-sale gains. But, as you might expect, the new law isn't as simple as that. Here are some details.

 The new capital gains rate of 20% applies to taxpayers in all but the lowest tax bracket. Taxpayers who pay 15% on their regular income will pay 10% tax on their long-term capital gains.

 The new rates do not apply to gains from art, antiques and other "collectibles." Otherwise, the new rates apply retroactively to sales made after May 6, 1997.

 Under the old law, an asset was considered "long-term" if it was held for at least 12 months. Under the new law, assets sold after July 28, 1997, will be considered long-term only if they have been held for at least 18 months. Assets sold after July 28 and held for between 12 and 18 months will be taxed at capital gain rates from the prior law (either 28% or 15%).

 To further complicate matters, assets sold from May 7 through July 28 will still be considered long-term if they were held for just 12 months.

· Married taxpayers of any age who meet certain eligibility requirements may now exclude up to \$500,000 of home-sale profits. (The exclusion amount for singles is \$250,000.) This provision is generally effective for home sales after May 6, 1997, although transitional rules apply to some sales. To qualify, you must have owned the residence and occupied it as your principal residence for at least two of the five years preceding the sale. In general, you may take advantage of this tax break as many times as you like, but you must wait at least two years between sales. This new provision replaces the rollover provision that allowed deferral of home-sale gains and the once-in-a-lifetime \$125,000 exclusion of gain on a home sale for taxpayers 55 and older.

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
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Older Participates In AIDS Ride

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
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
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
