Swimming Pool To Be Open

The swimming pool at the Kent/Charlestown Community Schools will be open this winter. A tentative schedule of open hours has been set for the next three weeks. After October 1st a more detailed schedule will be announced.

For the period Tuesday, September 14th, through Friday, October 1st, the following schedule will be in force. Free recreational swim will be offered for all to the age of 18 each weekday from 3:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. A Supper Club including adult lap swim and access to the weightroom and its equipment will be offered each weekday. Supper Club hours are Monday, Wednesday and Friday 5:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. and Tuesday and Thursday 6:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.

Charlestown residents will find the pool open an average of twenty-five hours a week after October 1st. In addition to recreational swim and a Supper Club, the pool will be used to develop a competitive swim program for local teenagers and advanced lifesaving courses. During the next few weeks a schedule of all Community School Programs offered at both the High School and Kent facilities will be advertised in the Patriot.



CDBG Final Statement Open For Citizen Review

The City of Boston's Neighborhood Development and Employment Agency announces that the "Final Statement of Objectives and Proposed Use of Funds for the Year VIII Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program," as approved by the Boston City Council, is

available for citizen review.

Recent City Council action has authorized the City to apply for Boston's anticipated Year VIII (July 1, 1982-June 30, 1983) formula funding of \$23,285,000. To date, Council action has not authorized the City to expend these funds.

The CDBG Program is administered by the Neighborhood Development and Employment Agency (NDEA). Among the programs planned by NDEA this year are commercial revitalization and housing improvement

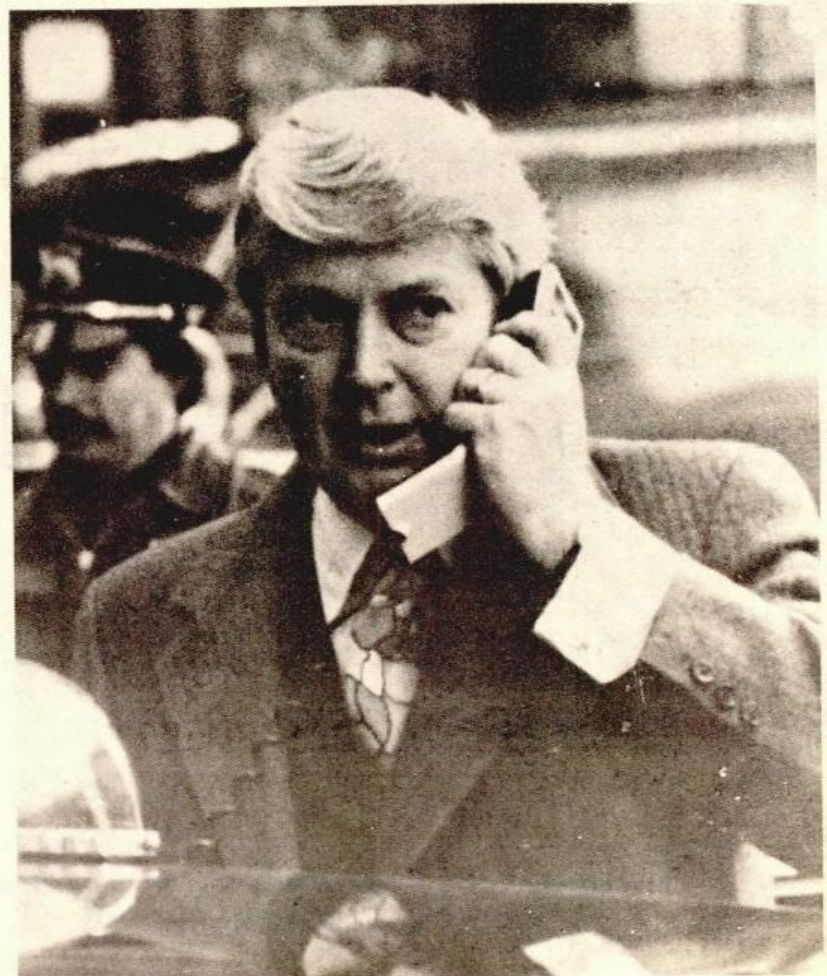

Keating Seeks Re-Election As Clerk of Superior Court

Attorney Edward V. Keating of Boston, is a candidate for re-election to the Office of Clerk of the Superior Court Department of the Trial Court for Criminal Business in Suffolk County.

Keating, who has devoted his professional

career to the service of the citizens of Suffolk County and the Superior Court, was first appointed by the Justices of the Superior Court in recognition of his legal and administrative qualifications which he had exhibited over many years of service as both an at-

Rotondi Seeks Lt. Governor's Seat

State Senator Sam Rotondi (D-Winchester) is a candidate for the office of Lieutenant Governor. Rotondi has stated, "Massachusetts State Government is facing crucial challenges in the 1980's as it attempts to maintain a quality of life for its people in a time of limited resources. I would like, as Lt. Governor, to advise and assist the Governor in formulating policies to meet those challenges."

Senator Rotondi, a third term Legislator, is the leading proponent of victim rights, jury reform, and civil service reform legislation in the State Senate. He presently serves as Chairman of the Public Service Committee, and Vice Chairman of the Taxation Committee. Prior to his tenure in the Legislature, Rotondi worked as Director of Legislation for the Massachusetts Bar Association.

Rotondi noted that although the 1982 race for

Lt. Governor appears as crowded as this year's Boston Marathon, he was confident that he would be set apart from the other contenders by virtue of his sound legislative record, personal background, and experience.

"I offer more than an expertise in one area. I offer knowledge and understanding of all the major issues before us. Because I have been an active participant in debating them. This resource could be a true asset to any administration."

Rotondi stressed that he was running for Lt. Governor to work with a governor. He outlined specific roles in which the chief executive could utilize him as Lt. Governor to benefit his administration. In addition to the role of advisor, he sees the Lt. Governor as helping to implement reform legislation enacted by the Legislature in order to reassert the control of the Executive Branch in this area.

Thirdly, Rotondi stated that as a Lt. Governor with recent legislative service, he could provide a link between the executive branch and the Legislature. Rotondi said as a liaison, he would be able to assist in advancing the administration's programs.

Sen. Rotondi is from an Italian-Irish family of 13 children. He and his wife, Diane, reside in Winchester with their four children. He is a graduate of Brown University and Suffolk University Law School.

In conclusion, Rotondi stated, "I was brought up to understand that anything worth having is not only worth working for, but sometimes requires giving up something in return. I would not give up my Senate seat, which I have truly enjoyed, if I did not believe that I could make the office of Lt. Governor a job worth having."

Langone Seeks Re-Election To Governor's Council

Sixth District Governor's Councillor Joseph A. Langone, III has formally announced his candidacy for re-election, citing his knowledge and experience of how State Government works.

Langone has brought to the Governor's Council his vast experience as a State Representative having served four terms in the House where he was the sponsor and supporter of legislation to improve the quality of life for residents of the Commonwealth. Langone was floor leader during House debate which designated Columbus Day as a full, legal holiday in Massachusetts, and sponsored legislation which provided State funds for the construction of recreational complexes for area children and elderly citizens.

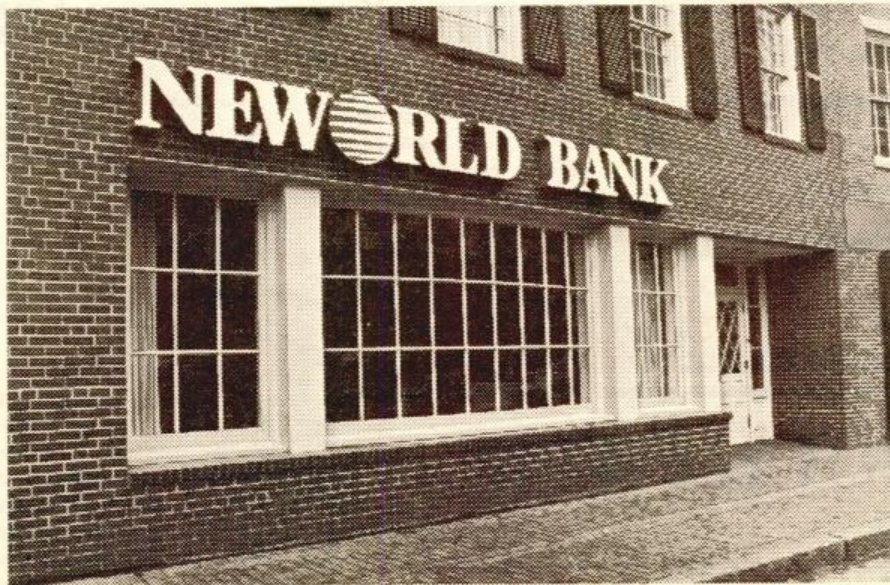
SOLIDARITY DAY 2

Thousands of Massachusetts trade unionists and public employee union members marched in Boston for a Labor Day parade on August 29. The parade, and assembly on the Boston Common climaxed a week long celebration of organized labor.

State AFL-CIO president Arthur Osborn said the events served two purposes. "It was a celebration of the gains of working people...over the years and a chance to reflect on those achievements," he said. "It also served notice that organized labor intends to be a force in this state."

Some organizers dubbed it Solidarity Day 2, referring to the massive Solidarity Day march on Washington last September.

The parade began at 1 p.m. and some 40,000 unionists and friends participated in the Labor Day parade, a turnout that was greater than expected.

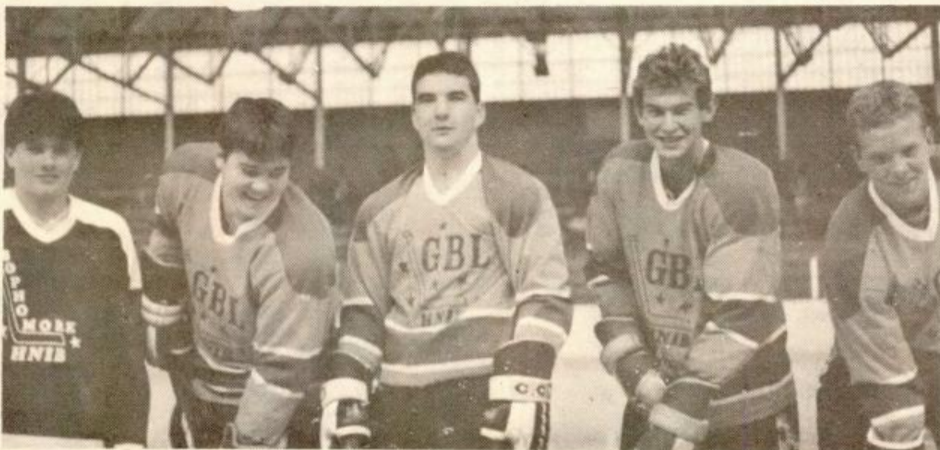
Jim Vessey, a junior,

WHY A GOLD CROWN?

You normally associate gold crowns with kings or queens. But the average person can have a gold crown also - not on his head but in his mouth. And it will probably be a lot more practical than the King's head piece.

Cast gold crowns cover the cusps (chewing surface) of back teeth entirely as well as three or more other surfaces. They fit over the remaining portion of a prepared tooth. Crowns are used to restore proper tooth form and contours for the correct biting function when much of the tooth is extensively damaged.

Gold is an ideal restorative material for use in reforming the shape and function of a tooth. In fact, of all restorative materials, gold is the strongest and most long-lasting. There are other reasons for the use of gold as well as long-life.

Gold can provide maximum resistance against the forces of chewing on tooth surfaces. Fluids in the mouth cannot affect gold. Gold will not shrink or expand once it has been cemented into the prepared surface. Breakage of the restoration is less likely.

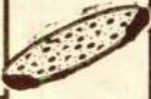

Edward Middle School Begins 50th Year

On November 10, 1932, Charlestown's Edward Middle School was dedicated by then Mayor James Michael Curley and Army General Edward L. Logan. The school is named after General Clarence R. Edwards, World War I hero and organizer of the famous 26th "Yankee Division." Fifty years later both the 26th Division and the Edwards Middle School are still strong and active organizations, serving the community and the nation.

The Edwards School has a long, illustrious, and sometimes stressful history. Its graduates, particularly Charlestown residents, number in the thousands. The school population still has many Charlestown children at-

tending along with a large number of Chinese bilingual students as well as black and hispanic students. Despite the intense emotions of school desegregation and budget and staffing cuts in Boston schools the Edwards school is today a solid educational institution.

According to many reliable reports, the last school year at Edwards in particular, saw a dramatic upswing in discipline and education. Much of the change is credited to the organizational and educational approach implemented by the Principal, Dr. Daniel E. O'Connell, who arrived last year. An experienced no nonsense educator, Dr. O'Connell quickly established three major priorities for

staff and students: strong school discipline, strong educational programs, and high staff and student spirit. The result has been Edwards rapidly reaching the reputation of really being one of the best schools in the school system. Parents and visitors to the school are impressed with the cleanliness of the school's interior, the old, but attractive, classrooms, and the quiet educational environment while classes are in session. As one teacher said, "This school has to be the best kept secret in the city." The current staff at Edwards, who make it all work, agree unanimously.

When school opened on September 8th, Edwards is offering a new class for academically talented 7th

graders called "Project Primus." This intense academic program also requires students to take Latin as a subject. A new course in Computer Education has been established and a Computer Lab created. A tutorial program for Edwards students, run by Edwards School, Harvard University and the Charlestown Boys and Girls Club will be in place. This program is designed to prepare students for scholarships to Harvard, after high school. It is hoped that Project Primus will be expanded to other grades in following years and that an exploratory electronics program be established in the school. But, as Dr. O'Connell related, the first priorities still will be dis-

cipline and the teaching of basic skills. Where other schools are losing students the Edwards school population increased this year.

Moving into its 50th year the Edwards school, to quote from an old and

famous Army song, "will keep rolling along." General Edwards would have been proud of that and proud that Charlestown's Edwards school has added to the history of this community.

KNOW THE NEW DRUNKEN DRIVING LAW THAT IS NOW IN EFFECT

Boston's Faneuil Hall served as the backdrop setting when Governor Edward J. King signed into law Massachusetts new Drunk-Driving Bill on Thursday, August 12, 1982. More than 400 people including many high ranking police officials were in attendance to witness the Governor's signing.

It was indeed an honor for me to serve as Chairman of the Governor's Task Force on Alcohol Abuse and Highway Safety. We held hearings across the state in order to get a cross section of what the citizens of the Commonwealth felt regarding the issue of the drunken driver, — they spoke out loud and clear—GET TOUGH.

We took that information and gave it to the Governor who in turn presented it to the Legislature but they failed to pass that bill the first time around.

However, a re-draft and unanimous approval was given in a special two day session of the Legislature—this cleared the way for the Governor's signature.

THE MAJOR POINTS

A first offender involved in an accident causing personal injury could face a jail term of up to two years, and fines of up to \$1,000.00, and loss of license for one year. The defendant may be placed on probation; however, a special condition of which will require attending an alcohol education program; — pay a fee of \$400 and have their license or right to operate suspended for 30 days. This provision not available if serious personal injury or death is caused to another person.

A SECOND OFFENDER is subject to mandatory confinement, either for seven days in jail or for 14 days in a residential alcohol treatment center. The defendant may be placed on probation, — a special condition of which will require such defendant to be confined for no less than 14

days in a residential alcohol treatment program. After one year of conviction, the second offender may be granted a hearing on requesting a new license, because of hardship this will be done at the Registrar's discretion.

If a driver is convicted of a THIRD OFFENSE there will be mandatory 60 day jail sentence and a loss of license for 5 years and a fine of from \$500 to \$1,000. After 2 years of date of conviction the driver may apply for a hearing before the Registrar to request a new license on a limited basis on grounds of hardship by showing that the causes of the present and past violations have been dealt with or brought under control. The Registrar may then issue a license at

Barnstead Seeks Republican Nod In Eighth District

William A. Barnstead of Arlington has entered the Eighth District Congressional race in order to challenge Speaker of the House Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill for the fourth consecutive time. In next Tuesday's Primary, Barnstead will face Beacon Hill attorney Frank L. McNamara.

If elected, Barnstead has stated that he wants to serve only one term. He is opposed to "career politicians" and would introduce legislation to limit the terms of congressmen to four two year terms, senators to two six year terms, and one four year term for the president. He says that "far too many persons in the House and Senate, as election day draws near, vote on bills not with the national interest at heart, but with their own careers in mind."

Barnstead backs the balanced budget and the flat tax concept. He supports a "strong, but more efficient defense." He is opposed to the nuclear freeze concept.

A moderate conservative, Barnstead says he is "for the poor" but would look for more efficiency in government. He questions

why the government is building the new GSA (General Services Administration) Building near North Station while at the same time it is cutting back on employees.

Barnstead denounces what he calls "Tip" O'Neill's support of forced busing and O'Neill's refusal to sign a discharge petition to put HR12365 - an anti-busing bill - on the Congressional floor for consideration. "O'Neill's reply to the parents of Charlestown is that busing is 'the law of the land'. Actually it is the law of 'Tip' O'Neill and his liberal pals in Congress", stated Barnstead.

William "Battlin' Bill" Barnstead is the president and treasurer of three small businesses in Allston. He has chaired the Arlington Republican Town Committee for fifteen years, and has been a Town Committee member as well as president of the Town Meeting Association of Arlington. He is a delegate to the Republican National Convention and a member of the Republican State Committee in addition to holding membership in several civic and charitable organizations.

his discretion.

NEW OFFENSES

In addition to the above sentences — there are two new offenses — one pertains to **Vehicular Homicide While Driving Under The Influence**. This offense provides a one year mandatory sentence, and the judge may sentence a defendant up to 10 years in prison.

The second new offense is operating of a motor vehicle while drinking alcoholic beverages — this offense provides a fine of from \$100 to \$500.

ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS

Operation of a motor vehicle after having a license revoked for driving under the influence or committing vehicular homicide provides a term of imprisonment from 7 days to 2-1/2 years with a mandatory sentence of 7 days. Prior to sentencing for driving under the influence - all information as to where the defendant was served the alcohol will be transmitted to the Attorney General as well as the District Attorney in the district where the establishments are located.

In all establishments which sell alcohol not to be drunk on the premises (package stores) - a copy shall be posted of all penalties for drunken driving violations.

A LOOK AT THE FUTURE

Although there has been much discussion as to where we are going to house all the drunken driver offenders, I feel confident that room will be found, and that hopefully Massachusetts will lead the nation in decreasing the carnage on our streets and highways caused by the drunken driver. Remember if you value the right to drive your car in the Commonwealth take heed now of the new drunken driving bill that went into effect September 1, 1982.

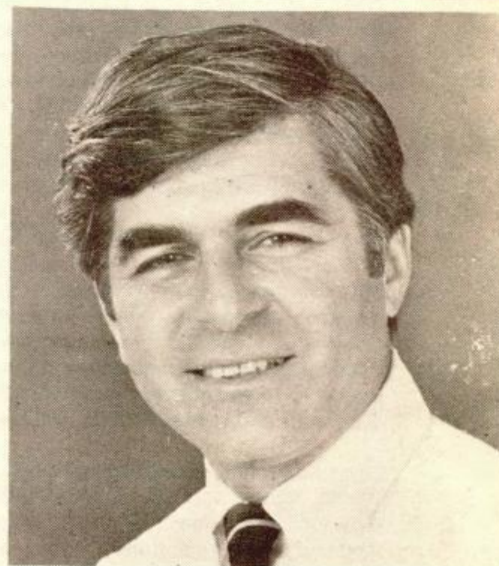

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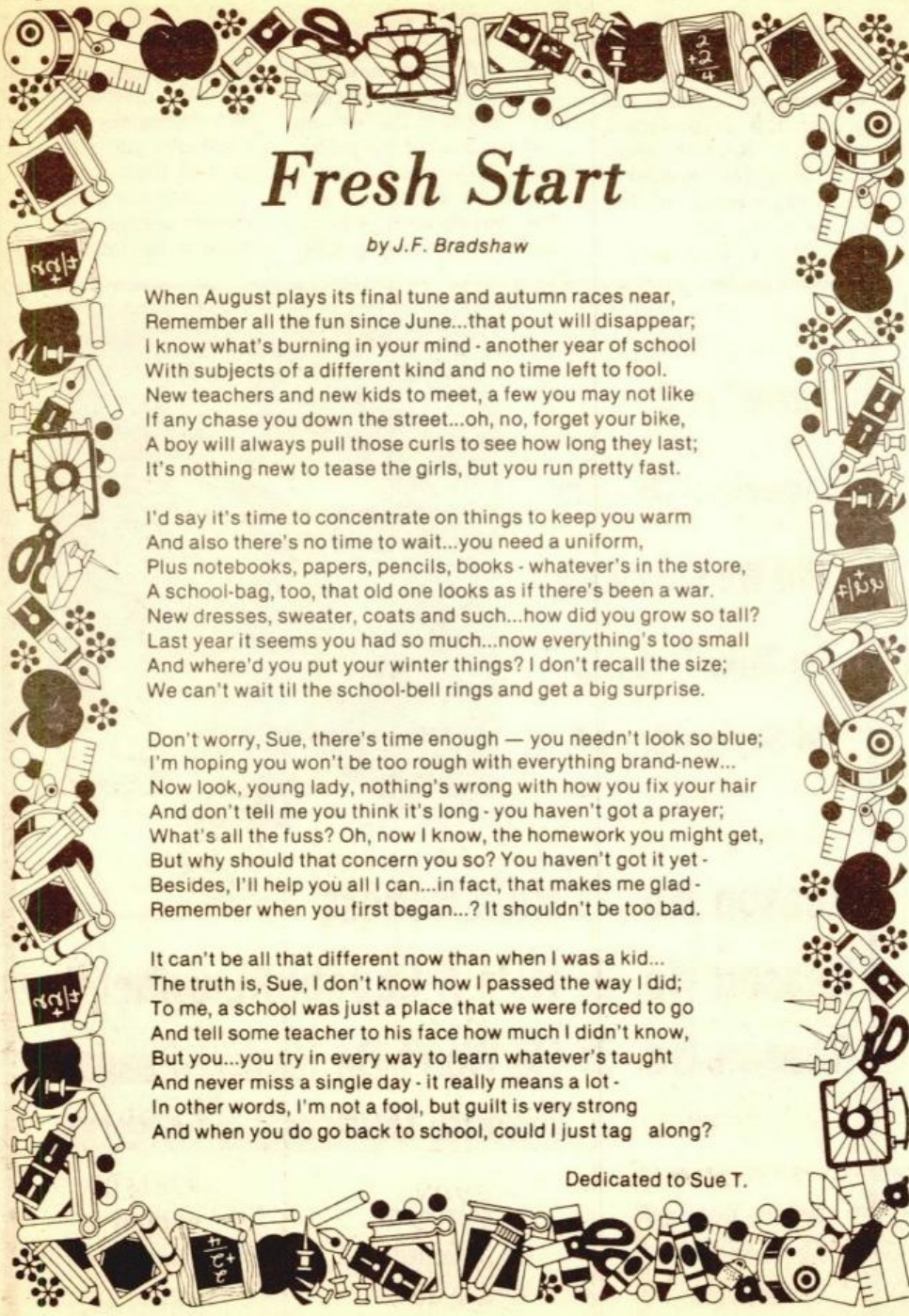
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Fresh Start

MORE COURT-PASSED "LAW"

Thanks to a continuing exchange of information with the National Association for Neighborhood Schools, Inc., it was brought to our attention that Missouri State Supreme Court Justice Robert T. Donnolly, a man of rare candor, has proposed a constitutional amendment whereby U.S. Supreme Court decisions would not become law unless two-thirds of the Court or two-thirds of Congress agreed, and the decision was then ratified by three fourths of the states.

Judge Donnolly and U.S. Senator Thomas F. Eagleton (D-Mo.) met recently in an unusual debate sponsored by the Missouri Bar. While Eagleton hysterically spewed the usual liberal pap that such "attacks" on the Court would be "a dangerous blow to the foundations of a free society (a euphemism for advocating government by judiciary in what is supposed to be representative system)," Judge Donnolly calmly pointed out that the U.S. Supreme Court has "extended the Bill of Rights to the states, which was not intended by the writers of the Bill of Rights" and that "the Supreme Court doesn't have the right to declare the supreme law of the land." After the debate, fellow Missouri jurist Albert L. Rendlen remarked that Donnolly's arguments were "carefully documented" while Eagleton "gave a political answer."

The Bill of Rights, as most people should know (but don't), was intended to preclude federal intrusion into certain state and local prerogatives. The first article (the First Amendment), for example, says simply - and this is precisely what it means - that "Congress shall make no law ... abridging the freedom of speech ..."

In case you didn't notice, on June 25th the U.S. Supreme Court, in another of its continuing bizarre perversions of the Constitution, refused to give local school boards the authority to remove books "educationally inappropriate for the school children" on the grounds that such local action violates childrens' "rights" of speech and expression. This despite the fact that Congress (see the First Amendment) has taken no such action - a Long Island School Board did.

As is the custom, this court-passed "law" will now stifle the prerogatives of the more than 16,000 "locally-controlled" school boards across the nation. The banging noise you hear is the hammer of the federal judiciary driving another nail into the coffin of "public" education.

Are you listening, Judge Garryty?

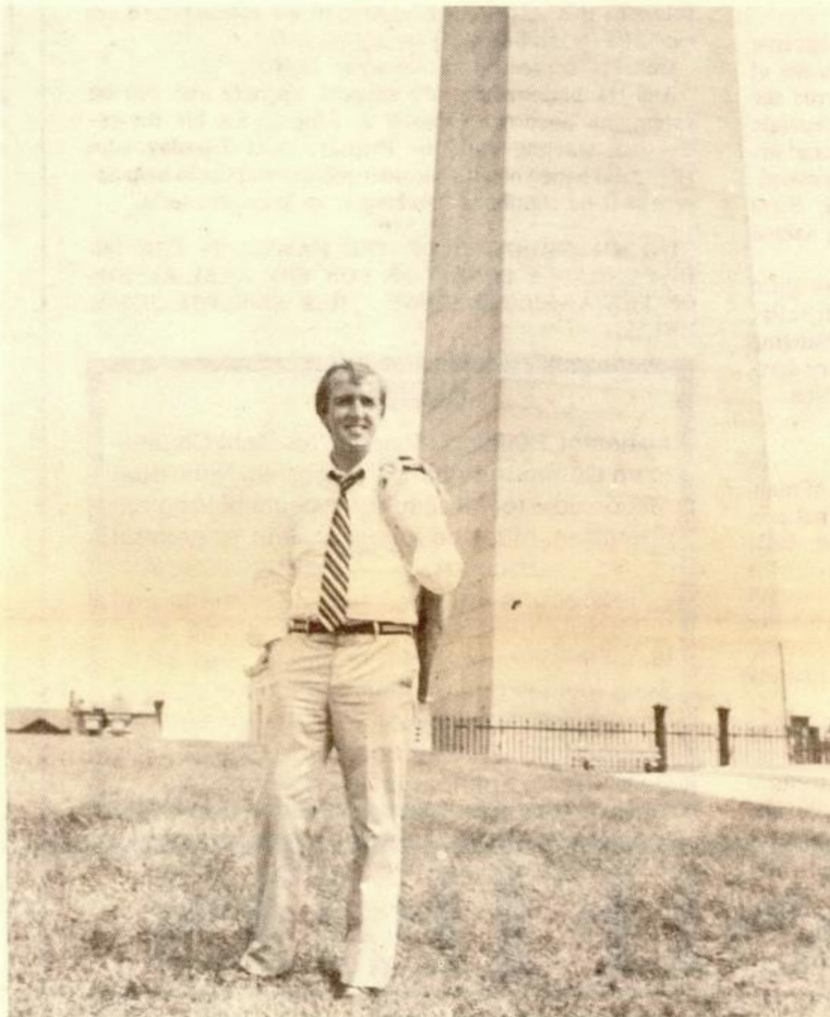
