Come up with your PICO question and Search Terms



1. Resident-focused EBM Sessions

2. Patient-focused EBM Sessions

3. Residents' development of critical appraisal skills

1) Resident-focused EBM Sessions

- A. Residents choose clinical scenarios
- B. Residents choose papers
- C. Residents critically appraise papers

2) Patient-focused EBM Sessions

- A. Emphasis on patients' health issues through clinical scenarios
- B. Emphasis on contextualizing primary care research to Calgary's patients

3) Residents' development of critical appraisal skills

- By appraising and discussing journal articles, residents learn what's relevant for making clinical decisions.
- Clinical faculty provide perspective on residents' clinical scenarios.
- If presentations need improving, residents may be required to repeat presentations at a later EBM session or date.
