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WELCOME/OPENING WORDS

(A short address by the minister to those gathered together.)

1. We'd like to welcome you friends and family to this celebration of the marriage of

2. Let your presence be welcome, let your hearts be glad. For everything there is a season, and a time and purpose for every matter under heaven. This is the time and the place to celebrate the wedding of

an occasion. To say words, to confirm this union, to recognize this event in the place of family, friends
and the human community. We have come to laugh and to cry, to sing and feast and dance. Above all, we have come to rejoice in love and its possibilities.
3. We have gathered together to celebrate with and the marriage in
which they are now to be united. Marriage is a relationship recognized by humankind from time
immemorial, solemnized by the observances of religion and consecrated by the men and women in all
ages who have brought its beauty to flower. It is not therefore to be entered upon inadvisedly or
lightly, but with deliberation and reverence.
The celebration in which we join today is the outward symbol of this inward relationship,
recognized by human society but made real and living only within the lives of those who share it. Into this sacred union these two persons desire to enter.

4. In marriage, two persons turn to each other in search of a greater fulfillment than either can achieve alone. Marriage is a going forth, a bold step into the future; it is risking what we are for the sake of what we yet can be. Only in giving oneself and sharing with another can the mysterious process of growth take place. Only in loyalty and devotion bestowed upon another can that which is eternal in life emerge and be known. Together we celebrate and who come now, in our presence, to declare their love and to be united in marriage. Love is a living thing, waiting within each one of us for an awakening touch. In this ceremony, we will celebrate love come to life. May this

5. Welcome friends and family to this celebration of the marriage of and George Eliot wrote this about marriage: "What greater thing is there for two human souls than to feel that they are joined together to strengthen each other in all labor, to minister to each other in all sorrow, to
share with each other in all gladness, to be one with each other in the silent unspoken memories?"
Today and will declare their love and commitment to each other. They have waited
for this moment, planned for this moment and grown toward this moment. Now I ask that we all simply
be in this moment. Let us take a moment to focus our thoughts not on yesterday or tomorrow, not ever
on the delicious dinner and dessert we will share later today, but on this very moment. In the silence
that follows, I ask each of you, in your own way to confer a silent prayer, blessing, wish or hope upon
this moment and this marriage. (moment of silence)

Additional Statements

a) Explanation of Religious Aspects

There are so many names for God—When we speak of God in this ceremony, we invite you to call on whatever name you call your Higher Power. We invite you to participate fully with your thoughts and prayers, asking for a blessing of this couple and their married life. You are here because this couple feels close to you and asks that you join with them in this dedication of sacred purpose. You represent symbolically all the people in the world who will be touched in any way by the life of this couple. You represent their friends and family, now and forever. They have chosen this act of marriage and this public, holy ceremony in which to proclaim it. Together, let us all give thanks and to hold the vision of universal love.

b) Remembering Loved Ones Who Have Died

I would like to take this moment to mention that there are those close to _____ and ____ who could not travel to be here today, but whose thoughts and blessings are with them; and there are loved ones who are no longer here in body, but who are here in spirit. Let us remember them now in a moment of silence.

c) Acknowledging the Couple's Traditions

Out of two different and distinct traditions, they have come together to learn the best of what each has to offer, appreciating their differences, and confirming that being together is far better than being apart from each other. As we bless this marriage under a chuppah (wedding canopy), the Jewish symbol of the new home being consummated here, we will later light the unity candle, a Christian symbol of two people becoming one in marriage.

READINGS

1. Walt Whitman

Listen! I will be honest with you. I do not offer the old smooth prizes, but offer rough new prizes. These are the days that must happen to you. You shall not heap up what is called riches, you shall scatter with lavish hand all that you earn or achieve. However sweet these laid-up stores, however convenient this dwelling, we cannot remain here. However shelter'd this port and however calm these waters, we must not anchor here. However welcome the hospitality that surrounds us, we are permitted to receive it but a little while. Come, I give you my hand! I give you my love more precious than money. I give you myself before preaching or law. Will you give me yourself? Will you come travel with me? Shall we stick by each other as long as we live?

2. Anne Morrow Lindberg

When you love someone, you do not love them all the time, in exactly the same way, from moment to moment. It is an impossibility, it is even a lie to pretend to. And yet this is exactly what most of us demand. We have so little faith in the ebb and flow of life, of love, of relationships. We leap at the flow of the tide and resist in terror its ebb. We are afraid it will never return. We insist on permanency, on duration, on continuity; when the only continuity possible in life, as in love, is in growth, in fluidity, in freedom, in the sense that the dancers are free, barely touching as they pass, but partners in the same pattern.

The only real security is not in owning or possessing, not in demanding or expecting, not in hoping even. Security in a relationship lies neither in looking back to what it was in nostalgia, nor forward to what it might be in dread or anticipation, but living in the present relationship and accepting it as it is now. For relationships too must be like islands. One must accept them for what they are here and now, within their limits. Islands, surrounded and interrupted by the sea, and continually visited and abandoned by the tides. One must accept the security of the winged life, of the ebb and flow, of intermittency.

PREFACE TO THE VOWS

1. The vows through which you accept each other as /husband and wife/spouses/married partners have no hidden power in themselves. Only to the extent that they express in words your continuing intention and commitment do they have meaning. In a world where the pressures pushing people apart may often seem stronger than those drawing people together, your commitment to each other will need to be re-expressed in many different ways in the coming days and years. The expression in today's vows is simply a visible milestone in your journey together. I invite you now to clasp hands as you repeat your vows. The hand offered by each of you is an extension of self, just as is your mutual love. Cherish the touch, for you touch not only your own, but another life. Be ever sensitive to its pulse. Seek always to understand and respect its rhythm. and , it is a great joy and pleasure for me to be standing here with 2. you on this momentous day, and witnessing to the life-long commitment you are making to one another. I must remind you that the vows you are about to say to one another belong entirely to you. The words I speak have no special powers, and nothing that I can say or do on this day can ultimately make your partnership endure with beauty, fidelity, and joy. Only you, by the integrity and diligence of your love, can make these vows last. So will you now please join a hand each to each, and repeat your vows after me? (Couple joins hands.) 3. The love which now binds you together makes your lives broader and fuller than they could be alone. The strength of this love now is that it is vibrant and new, but its triumph will be in its endurance over many years. As a 19th Century Unitarian minister, Theodore Parker, once wrote, "It takes years to marry completely two hearts, even of the most loving and well assorted. A happy wedlock is a long falling in love." In the years to come, may your life together be a long falling in love. Preserve the joy which now unites you. Add to it with your dreams. Strengthen it with determination, faith in one another and forgiveness. And you will be a blessing to each other, to all of us, and to the wider world. 4. OPTIONAL RITUALS AND CEREMONIES

WINE CUP CEREMONY (JEWISH/CHRISTIAN)

(The use of the wine cup at a wedding is an ancient Jewish tradition, and is particularly appropriate at a union where the background of one or both parties is in that tradition. The couple is asked to provide the wine, the glass, and a napkin if the glass is to be broken.)

- 1. This cup of wine is symbolic of the cup of life. As you share the cup of wine, you undertake to share all that the future may bring. All the sweetness life's cup may hold for you will be the sweeter because you drink it together. Whatever drops of bitterness it may contain will be less bitter because you share them. (*The partners drink from the cup.*)
- 2. The years of our lives are a cup of wine poured out for us to drink. The grapes when they are pressed give forth their good juices for the wine. Under the wine press of time our lives give forth their labour and honor and love. Many days you will sit at the same table and eat and drink together. Drink now, and may the cup of your lives be sweet and full to running over. (The partners drink from the cup.)

3. Friends, the breaking of bread and the drinking of wine are the symbols in many religions of ou

CANDLE LIGHTING CEREMONY (JEWISH/CHRISTIAN)
1. It has been said that "From every human being there rises a light that reaches straight to heaven. And when souls that are destined to be together find each other, their streams of light flow together and a single, brighter light goes forth from their united being." and, at the beginning of this ceremony, each of your mothers (or other family members or friends) lit a single candle to symbolize the families you have come from. I now invite you to light a candle that symbolizes your shared life together and the love that binds you together. May you keep this love that you share warm and bright with mutual concern. Replenish the source of its light with daily care, with gentleness and respect. Care for it, rejoice in it. May the light of your love be a source of blessing in your lives and in the larger life of which all of us are a part. And may this candle, which you will light on your wedding anniversary and on other special days, remind you of the sacred vows you have taken here today (Couple lights a single candle from two tapers.)
2. In the wedding liturgy, candlelight symbolizes the commitment of love these two people are declaring today. Before you, you see three special candles. The two smaller candles symbolize the lives of the couple. Until today, both have let their light shine as individuals in their respective communities. Now they have come to publicly proclaim their love in the new union of marriage. They do not lose their individuality. Yet, in marriage, they are united in so close a bond that they become one. Now, following the profession of their marriage vows, they will light the large center candle from the smaller candles to symbolize this new reality. In this way they are saying that henceforth their light must shine together for each other, for their families, and for the community.
3. From every human being there rises a light that reaches straight to heaven. And when two souls are destined to find one another, their two streams of light flow together and a single brighter light goes forth from their united being. These two individual flames, one representing each family, will be used to light the Unity Candle, symbolizing how out of these two families, a new family will be created and, together as you light this candle of unity, you symbolize the flame of your own individual selves joining to ignite the partnership of marriage. May the brightness of this light shine through your lives, giving you courage and reassurance in the darkness. May its warmth give you shelter from the cold, and may its energy fill your spirits with strength and joy.

(The couple may wish to choose special bread and/or that reflects their ethnic heritage or have special meaning for them, e.g. a favorite bread that a grandparent used to make, or the type of wine used at family celebrations.)

Seven blessings are said at Jewish weddings because the number seven echoes the seven days of creation. The number of creation is important for weddings because ---- and ---- are creating a home and a life together: The seven blessings are seven statements of gratitude to God, the Holy One known by many different names, and they speak of the beauty of the world and the joy and delight of creation, including the union that is being created today.

- 1. Blessed are you, God, who brings forth fruit from the vine.
- 2. Blessed are you, God who shapes the universe. All things created speak of your glory.
- 3. Blessed are you, Holy One, who fashions each person.
- 4. We bless you, God, for forming each person in your image. You have planted within us a vision of you and given us the means that we may flourish through time. Blessed are you, Creator of humanity.
- 5. May Israel, once lonely for her children, now delight as they gather together in joy. Blessed are you, God, who lets Zion rejoice with her children.
- 6. Let these two best friends taste of the bliss you gave to the first man and woman in the Garden of Eden in the days of old. Blessed are you, the Presence who dwells with bride and groom in delight.
- 7. Blessed are You, who lights the world with happiness and contentment, love and companionship, peace and friendship, bridegroom and bride. Let the mountains of dance! Let the gates of Jerusalem ring with the sounds of joy, song, and delight the voice of the groom and the voice of the bride and the laughter of their friends and companions. SAPTAPARDI (SEVEN STEPS TOGETHER) – HINDU

The bride and groom walk seven steps together to signify the beginning of their journey through life together. Each step represents a marital vow:

First step: To respect and honor each other

Second step: To share each other's joy and sorrow Third step: To trust and be loyal to each other

Fourth step: To cultivate appreciation for knowledge, values, sacrifice and service Fifth step: To reconfirm their vow of purity, love family duties and spiritual growth

Sixth step: To follow principles of Dharma (righteousness)

Seventh step: To nurture an eternal bond of friendship and love

HAND FASTING (CELTIC WEDDING TRADITION)

The ancient tradition of a symbolic hand-fasting ceremony is often performed at a Celtic wedding. To include this beautiful ceremony, a rope or length of fabric to wrap around the hands of the couple being joined by marriage will be needed. The "wrap" should be chosen as something that has meaning to both of you. It could be color-coordinated to compliment the colors of your wedding, it can be made up of remnants of your baby blankets, sentimental heirlooms, or a cherished scarf that your grandmother wore.

Some Irish families pass down a wrap from generation to generation. Whatever you choose your wrap to be, it should be significant to you because it will represent the two of you becoming united as one. This symbolic tradition is modernly referred to as "tying the knot". In the ceremony, the bride and groom face each other, join right hand to right hand, left hand to left hand, and the fabric will be wrapped around your interlocking hands by either the person performing your ceremony or a family member.

WATER PURIFICATION (NATIVE AMERICAN)

Water is used as a symbol of purification and cleansing. The bride and groom have a ceremonial washing of hands to wash away past wrongdoings and memories of past loves.

SAND CEREMONY (SECULAR)

The Sand Ceremony represents the joining of two lives into a new dimension of unity. It is similar to the Unity Candle ceremony. Instead of each partner having their own candle, each partner has a vial of sand which represents their childhood and life before marriage. During the ceremony, each partner pours his or her sand into a larger vial to represent their new status as a married couple. Some couples use two different colors of sand, which make a third color when joined. Partners may wish to use sand from a lake or ocean close to where they grew up, or where they spent meaningful vacations together. One interfaith couple, the bride from the east coast, and the groom from the west, brought together sands from the Pacific and Atlantic oceans, representing not only their union, but the union of two families, two histories and two traditions.

BREAKING OF THE GLASS (Jewish)

In a moment, _____ and____ will end their wedding ceremony with the Jewish tradition of smashing a glass. Explanations for this practice abound. Some say we break the glass in order that this marriage be as difficult to sunder as these shards of glass would be to make whole again. Some say it's to remind us that even in our moments of greatest joy, somewhere in the world there is

brokenness and sorrow. Some say it's to scare away evil spirits, or to start off the marriage with a bang! Regardless of the meaning, the appropriate response to the breaking glass is *mazal tov*, which means congratulations and good luck.

JUMPING THE BROOM (WICCAN) In a moment, and will end their wedding ceremony with the Wiccan tradition of "Jumping the Broom".
