


Named Most Valuable Player



Charlestown High School cooperative electrical course, during their recent visit to the Liberty Mutual Research Center in Hopkinton, Mass. under the CHS-Liberty Mutual Partnership Program.

Liberty Mutual's Russell W. Besser, Technical Director-Industrial, served as instructor for the safety class. Using tables of figures, he showed the eighteen freshmen and sophomores how electricity affects humans, and how these effects are amplified by moisture on the skin which increases its conductivity. He went on to describe several kinds of electrical safety equipment, and also listed a number of typical unsafe practices which the students, as "future electricians," should avoid.

Following Mr. Besser's presentation, the students were given a live demonstration of the "Boston Elbow," a batterypowered artificial limb for above-elbow amputees.

T. Walley Williams, Project Director-Mechanical Development at the Research Center, enlisted the aid of CHS freshman Shaun Monaghan to show how electrodes in the Elbow pick up electrical signals from the severed bicep and tricep muscles to control the device's movement.

Other CHS students attending the electrical safety class were Christopher Barber, Lenora Effee, Troy Galloway, Marlon Glanville, Weldon Gregory, James Harrington, Joseph Kendricken, Michael Kenyon, Michael Kilmartin, Robert Laskowski, Shawn O'Brien, Larry Pipkin, Michael Reid, Robert Simboli, John Suttles, William Sweet and Cynthia Willis. 
District 15 Softball


The District 15 Softball Team won last Sunday's game 7-1 against a fine young club, District 3, making District 15's record, 3 wins 0 losses for the season.





Is District Representation For Charlestown?

The Ward Two, Democratic Ward Committee issued several pledges to the Community in an article submitted to and appearing in last week's edition of the Patriot. Among steps proposed by the Committee as they "enter a new era of activism" include such proposals as to conduct candidates' nights and voter registration drives. Such proposals can only be commended.

There is one of the Ward Committee proposals in particular that should be carefully investigated before a commitment is made on behalf of the Charlestown community this involves an "organized effort to achieve district representation for the City Council and School Committee.'

Unless the Council and School Committee were enlarged to 22 members each (one for each ward in the City), which is unlikely, then it would be doubtful as to whether Charlestown would have the votes necessary to elect a district representative from our community. We would be once again lumped together with other sections of Boston (similar to the combined district for Representative) and would not only be vying for a seat, but also for city programs that would be alloted on a district basis, rather than a community basis.

The Ward Committee should move cautiously and deliberately in contemplating a plan for district representation on the City level. Public meetings should be planned to receive input from the community on this matter. The specifics of the size of a district, its relationship to the city as a whole, as well as a myriad of detail must be available to the residents so that a sound decision can be made.

Political expediency must take a "back seat" to the interests of the residents of Charlestown in any move toward district representation.

Bunker Hill Museum Notes


The Bunker Hill Museum has only been open for the season for a few weeks and already many visitors from near and far have come and enjoyed the many new and old exhibits on display this year.
