



Charlestown Piers As Transfer Site On Agenda For MWRA Hearing

On Monday, June 15 from 3 to 5 p.m., the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) will hold a public hearing in the Gardner Auditorium at the State House for the purpose of discussing the On-Island and On-Shore Water Transporation Plan.

This hearing concerns the Facilities Plan and Environmental Impact Report for the construction of dock facilities at Deer Island and Nut Island and the location of On-Shore Facilities to provide access to these islands for construction equipment, materials and operations supplies to support the MWRA proposed wastewater treatment facilities improvement to Boston Harbor.

Charlestown Piers 48-49-50 and the General Dynamic Shipyard in Quincy are the two MWRA choices for transfer facilities as bases for the transportation of equipment and materials for the construction of the new waste treatment facilities to be built on Deer and Nut Islands.

In addition to the night meetings held in the concerned communities, this day meeting is "geared to state agencies and officials" so that they may comment and hear other opinions, according to Elisa Speranza from the Public Affairs Of-

fice of MWRA.

She added that the general public is also invited to

The Charlestown Piers and the Quincy Shipyard were chosen by the MWRA Board on April 29 by a 7-3 vote. Original site considerations had also included Pier 6 and the MBTA power plant in South Boston.

Prior to this decision, an April 2 meeting was held between the MWRA and the Charlestown community with all the Charlestown residents speaking against the proposal.

Much opposition to using Piers 48-49-50 as a transfer facility has surfaced among Charlestown residents including a recent petition collecting signatures protesting the selection.

Speranza said that some changes have been made in the project plans due to concerns of Charlestown residents. Originally, the number of trucks scheduled to travel down Chelsea Street everyday, once the

project begins in the early 1990s, totaled 190.

MWRA's latest estimates for daily round trips are: 17 per day in 1990-93; 46 per day in 1993-97; and 17 per day for 1997-99.

She added that the Central Artery/North Area project is scheduled to be completed in 1991 and that the On-Shore Water Transportation project will not begin until after CANA ends. "This would allow for easier and direct access for the trucks" onto the completed expressway on-ramp she

said.

In addition to the lower numbers of trucks used, "rail-line transportation into the pier area" is being investigated, according to Paul DiNatale, Manager of Media Relations for MWRA.

The MWRA is working under a federal court mandate to clean up the Boston Harbor over the next 12 years.

Speranza said that another hearing will be held in early August.

Navy Yard Development To Be Subject Of Neighborhood Council Meeting

A special meeting of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council has been called for Tuesday evening, June 23 at 7:00 p.m. at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School Street.

According to Chairman John Tobin, the focus of the meeting will be the development plans for the Charlestown Navy Yard. Reports of the three committees that have been established to deal with Navy Yard issues will be presented. Also, there will be a discussion on a proposal for the Navy

Yard submitted by Boston Redevelopment Authority Director Stephen Coyle.

CHECKING THE MARGINS FOR "ARMS"

When you're shopping for Adjustable Rate Mortgages (ARMs), the "margin" is almost as important as the initial rate. The margin is the percentage point above the average yields for Treasury notes on which future rate adjustments will be calculated.

Let's compare two hypothetical one-year ARMs. The first may have an initial interest rate of 8% with a 2.5 margin, while the second begins at 7 7/8% with a 2.75 margin. Both loans have rate caps of 2%. Let's say that at the end of the first year of the loan, the average of the one-year Treasury note yield has been 61/2%. For each loan, the lenders will add the margin to that 61/2% average yield. Thus, the interest rate for the first loan would increase from 8% to 9%, and the second would go from 7 7/8% to 91/4%. While the first had a slightly higher initial rate, it will have lower rates in subsequent years unless the Treasury note rates increase enough to activate the annual caps on the amount of the increase. There is a wide variance among margins in ARMs offered by competing lenders, and this should be a factor when you decide which loan to select.

with twenty-two deeded parking spaces.

The four-story, 44 foot high structure will extend between Main and Warren Streets with two parking entrances on the Warren Street side and two professional-type offices located on Main Street.

LoPresti stated that the building will be constructed of brick veneer with wood trim and have a slate Mansard sloping roof. It will have a Victorian, nineteenth century appearance to conform with the abutting buildings. Each unit will consist of two bedrooms and one bath. Additional features include bay windows, a working fireplace, trash compactor and central air conditioning. The building will be serviced by an elevator and a laundry facility will be located on the first floor for the tenants convenience. A roof terrace will also be added for the availability of the occu-

There are no set-backs on either Warren or Main Street, with the structure right to the sidewalk. A twelve foot space between the new building and the liquor store and a three foot space between the existing structure on Main Street is planned. The construction of a one story addition being added on Main Street beside the law offices of McCullough, Stievator and Polvere was discussed as a possibility in the future.

The units will range between 850 and 1,000 square feet in size and the estimated cost for each unit, according to Held, will be "just under \$200,000." The parking garage will contain six spaces on the ground level and the remaining spaces will be located one level underground. The center of the building on Main Street will have bow windows and the main entrance will be centered and set back. Wrought iron grating will be placed at both ends of the building at the liquor store side to help dress up this area and hide the dumpster that will be placed there to service both the complex and store.

Concerns were raised as to the height of the proposed structure on Warren Street, where existing buildings are only three stories high. Also mentioned was the twelve foot space allocation in the plans behind the liquor store for deliveries and dumpster removal. It was felt that this space would not be sufficient and would cause traffic tie-ups on Main Street when large trailer trucks must make deliveries and pickups at the store. Held and his development partner, Paul Kelly, were confident that this would not create a problem, but were reminded that the sidewalks on Main Street will be widened and roadway narrowed when the reconstruction of Main Street is completed, thus creating a reduced area for large trucks to park for any length of time.

The Warren Street side of the building created much concern from those in attendance because of its appearance. This was taken under consideration by the developer who assured the committee that new plans would be designed with their suggestions in mind and be presented at a public meeting before the Charles-Neighborhood Council.

The meeting will take place with the Development and Housing Committee on Wednesday, June 17 at 7:30 p.m. at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School Street.

The Board of Appeals will hear the developer's plans on Tuesday, June 23 at 11:00 a.m. in Room 801 at City Hall.



Kennedy Center Revitalizes **Employment And Training Program**

Katherine McDonough, Executive Director, of the J.F. Kennedy Center of Charlestown, announces the revitalization of the Center's Employment and Training program.

The services provided include assessment, counseling, information and referral, job development and job placement. The objective is to match the abilities and interests of job seekers with the needs of employers.

Job applications will be assessed to determine their individual needs. Some applicants, for example, may not know what kind of job they want, how best to go about looking for one, or how to prepare for an interview. Counseling should be helpful in these cases. Others may not have the requisite skills for the job they want. They can be referred to one of the many training programs in the Boston area, including those at ABCD in Boston, the Community Schools of Charlestown, and Bunker Hill Community College. Finally, for those applicants assessed to be "job ready," placement services are available.

Ted Murphy, who holds an M.A. in labor economics from Boston University, has been appointed to coordinate the Kennedy Center's Employment and Training program. In addition to working with job seekers, he plans to establish contacts with local employers to develop a continuous flow of job listings for Charlestown residents. Murphy hopes to work closely with other community agencies as well as employers to determine the need for new training programs based in Charlestown. Later this summer, Murphy expects to supervise the Charlestown portion of Boston-wide survey of Community needs regarding unemployment and under-employment.



Immediately following the welcoming ceremonies for the Courageous, the



Charlestown Militia Company Readies For The Historical Demonstration Of The Battle Of Bunker Hill



History will once again come alive on Saturday, June 13th on the grounds of the Bunker Hill Monument, as the Charlestown Militia Company 1775, in cooperation with the National Park Service, step back 212 years

Bunker Hill, The Charlestown Militia, along with various militia companies, will re-enact the three assaults made by the British on the colonists

on June 17, 1775. This bat-

tory in the fight for inde-

to present an historical de-

monstration of the Battle of

pendence from England, as the untrained colonists repelled the first two assaults by the British, considered the best trained forces in the world at that time, only to be forced to retreat following the third attack as the ammunition of the colonists was exhausted.

According to Charlestown Militia Captain Frank Maggelet, the weekend activities will begin on Friday evening as an 18th century encampment, complete with marquis (officers' tents), tents, kitchen and a medical tent, are set up in the National Park Service portion of the Charlestown Navy Yard, near Gate Four. The Militia plans to recreate the normal routine of an 18th century campsite with officers' call, inspections and drills.

Maggelet stated that at approximately 10:30 p.m. on Friday night, the Militia will begin building the redoubt on the Bunker Hill Monument Grounds.

On Saturday, the campsite will be open to visitors from 9.00 a.m. until the Militia companies depart for the Monument Grounds at 11:00 a.m. Maggelet said that the procession to the Monument will travel from Chelsea Street to Vine Street to Bunker Hill Street, then travel up Lexington Street to the Monument.

Maggelet stated that upon arrival at the Monument, weapons will be inspected and final preparations will be made for the Battle, with the first assault by the British slated to approach the colonists on the hill at 1:30 p.m.

The Battle will be narrated by Bernie Kelly so that visitors may have some sense of the intensity of this battle scene.

Maggelet also stated that a new dimension will be added to the Battle this year as the Glad Tidings, a replica of an 18th century vessel, will fire from its berth in the Navy Yard prior to and during the Battle, simulating the firing on Charlestown by British vessels 212 years ago.

Following the battle, the troops will pass in review,

returning to their encampment in the Navy Yard,

Maggelet noted that the Monument Grounds will be secured by Park Service personnel and that no one will be allowed on the Grounds Saturday until after the battle. He also pointed out that parking will be prohibited during the day on Saturday on the Monument Avenue side of the Grounds.

The Charlestown Militia extends a welcome to all to view this historical demonstration of the Battle of Bunker Hill.

CENTRAL ARTERY NORTH AREA ROADWAY RECONSTRUCTION UPDATE

The left lane of Route 1 south, before merge of I-93 south will remain closed until the temporary detour structure for the CANA project is completed.

The jersey barriers that were installed during the weekend will remain and the ramp has been repainted to accommodate two lanes of traffic. As usual, the ramp will operate with one lane between 6:30 and 9:30 a.m. to facilitate an easier merge with two lanes of I-93 south traffic.

The \$16 million temporary detour structure will be built along the northbound Tobin Bridge approach. The structure to be completed in the spring of 1988 will permit traffic to go to and from the Mystic Tobin Bridge throughout the later stages of the CANA project.





Open Fire Hydrants Can Be Lethal

Opening a fire hydrant can be lethal, the Boston Water and Sewer Commission said in a warning to Charlestown residents.

'Opening hydrants may have been an apparently playful way to beat the summer heat, but the dangers involved are real - and they can be fatal," said Ron Catena, spokesman.

Several things take place when one of the city's 14,300 hydrants is opened illegally, and none of them are good. Water pressure is reduced, making fire fighting difficult and sometimes impossible."

"In addition, the enormous volume of water emptying onto a street from an open hydrant can cause a vehicle driving on that street to lose control and injure a bystander," Catena added.

The flow of water from one hydrant for one minute - 1,100 gallons - is enough water to provide 17,600 glasses of drinking water, the Commission noted.

'The cost of turning off illegally tapped hydrants can run into hundreds of dollars a day. In addition to committing manpower to this costly task, it reduces the number of people we have to handle emergencies as they arise in our water distribution system." Catena said, "And many times, hydrants are broken when they are illegally opened. The cost to replace one is nearly \$1,000, Catena added.







The Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Exercises. sponsored by Bunker Hill Post 26. The American Legion under the auspices of the City of Boston, will be held on Wednesday morning. June 17.

The program, according to Standing Committee Chairman James W. Con-

way. Commander of Post 26. will begin with an Ecumenical Service at Saint Francis de Sales Church. 313 Bunker Hill Street at 10:00 a.m.

Following the service. the veteran, military, militia, and patriotic organizations will assemble outside the church and form a procession to march to the Bunker Hill Monument Grounds for the Patriotic Exercises, commencing at II:00 a.m.

The Monument Orator on this, the 212th Anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill, will be Doctor Thomas H. O'Connor, Professor of History at Boston

College and a member of the Commission on the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution.

A graduate of Boston Latin School, Dr. O'Connor entered Boston College in 1942. He left for three year's service in the United States Army, serving in the China-Burma-India Thea-

ter. He returned to Boston College where he received his AB and MA degrees and later received his PhD degree in American History from Boston University.

Dr. O'Connor began teaching at Boston College in 1950 and currently holds the rank of Professor of History. He was chairman of the History Department at Boston College from 1962 to 1970; was elected vice-president of the University Academic Senate from 1968 to 1971; and served as faculty assistant to the President of Boston College from 1970 to 1972.

An expert on the Civil War period of American History, Dr. O'Connor is the author of several history textbooks and numerous historical articles. He has also written such specialized studies as Lords of the Loom: The Disunited States: The Era of the Civil War and Reconstruction: Religion in American Society; Bibles, Brahmins and Bosses; and Fitzpatrick's Boston, 1846-1866.

Dr. O'Connor, a resident of Braintree, is past president of the South Shore Association for Retarded Citizens; a former member of the Board of Directors of the Massachusetts Association for Retarded Citizens; and is currently a member of the Board of Trustees of the Braintree Society for Handicapped Citizens. He

was a member of the Civil War Centennial Commission; an historical consultant for the BOSTON 200 program; and project director for FORUM 350 which commemorated the 350th anniversary of Boston.


Dr. O'Connor was one of only 24 persons named by President Ronald Reagan to serve on the Commission on the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution.

This year, the Bunker Hill Day Parade has been dedicated to the Bicentennial of the Constitution.


At the conclusion of the formal ceremonies, a wreath will be placed at the base of the statue of Colonel William Prescott on the Monument Grounds.







BRA And National Park Service Announce Walking Tours Of The Navy Yard





USS Constitution Marches On Bunker Hill Day

The USS Constitution's marching unit, the Pikemen, will be part of the United States military presence marching in the annual Bunker Hill Day Parade that begins at 12:30 p.m., Sunday, June 14. This year's parade will be dedi-

cated to the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution


According to Commander Robert L. Gillen, USN, (Retired), "This year's event will be the biggest in recent history." Gillen is the chief marshal of the parade and a former commanding officer of the USS Constitution.

The parade will include marching units including the 35 member Northeast Navy Band, the USS Constitution Pikemen, the 18th Army Band, the Parris Island Marine Corps Band and the Heritage Hall 50 flag marching unit from Fort Devens. Commander Joseph Z. Brown, USN, 6lst commanding officer of USS Constitution, is the Military Liaison for the parade.

In observance of Flag Day, also celebrated Sunday, June 14, a giant American flag, currently stored on board USS Constitution, will be drawn along the parade route by horse-drawn caisson.

It will take a crane and 20 sailors to raise this 45 feet by 85 feet five inch flag at a 5:00 p.m. ceremony in observance of Flag Day, to take place in front of USS Constitution. The ceremony's highlights will include the 75 member Lexington Pops Chorus and a salute from the USS Constitution's cannons when the flag reaches its full extension.

The flag will be used later by the National Park Service to rededicate the Lincoln figure on Mount Rushmore, South Dakota on the occasion of its 50th anniversary.
