


Charlestown Youths To Meet Mo Vaughn


Dear Mr. Moynihan:

The MBTA held a community meeting in Charlestown on Aug. 20, 1996 at the Bunker Hill Community College. The purpose of this meeting was to get input from Charlestown residents on several issues regarding bus service in Charlestown. Many of the residents rely on the buses to travel to work, hospitals, doctor's appointments and errands. As Mayor, I am outraged at the way that this meeting was planned and executed because neither the City, nor the residents of Charlestown, were given advance notice of this important meeting.

For several reasons, only a small number of Charlestown residents were able to attend the meeting. The site of the meeting, Bunker Hill Community College, is not easily accessible for the elderly and the handicapped. Additionally, there was no notification posted in the local newspapers, including *The Charlestown Patriot*, announcing the date, time or place of the MBTA community meeting on Aug. 20th.







ELECTRONIC TAX PAYMENTS REQUIRED

Did your business make federal tax deposits of more than \$50,000 during 1995? If so, you must start making such payments by electronic funds transfer beginning January 1, 1997.

You may use either of two deposit methods - the ACH (Automated Clearing House) "debit" method or the ACH "credit" method. The initial step for either method is to file IRS Form 9779 to set up your account.

Under the "debit" method, a taxpayer contacts the Treasury, either by telephone or computer, and gives instructions to withdraw and apply to the appropriate tax liabilities specified amounts from the taxpayer's bank account. This may be done at any time between one and thirty banking days before the due date of the payment. The withdrawal will be made on the due date. A "threshold" withdrawal amount may be established when the taxpayer sets up his account to help prevent erroneous overdraws. Taxpayers who timely notify the Treasury to withdraw, and have adequate funds, will be deemed to have paid their liabilities on time.

Under the "credit" method, taxpayers instruct their financial institution to transfer funds to the Treasury's account at the Federal Reserve Bank. Taxpayers remain liable for late payment penalties if their bank fails to make a transfer.

Business taxpayers subject to the new requirements already should have received an enrollment form from the IRS. If you didn't receive Form 9779 with instructions, and you think that the requirements might apply to you, call 1-800-945-8400 for an enrollment packet. (You may also choose to participate voluntarily.) Allow yourself enough time to set up your account before year-end and to begin working with the new system. 





A Grandfather is a man grandmother. He goes for walks with the boys and they talk about fishing and tractors and things like that.






