## Mayor Outraged At Planning And Execution Of MBTA Meeting

Dear Mr. Moynihan:
The MBTA held a community meeting in Charlestown on Aug. 20, 1996 at the Bunker Hill Community College. The purpose of this meeting was to get input from Charlestown residents on several issues regarding bus service in Charlestown. Many of the residents rely on the buses to travel to work, hospitals, doctor's appointments and errands. As Mayor, I am outraged at the way that this meeting was planned and executed because neither the City, nor the residents of Charlestown, were given advance notice of this important meeting.

For several reasons, only a small number of Charlestown residents were able to attend the meeting. The site of the meeting, Bunker Hill Community College, is not easily accessible for the elderly and the handicapped. Additionally, there was no notification posted in the local newspapers, including The Charlestown Patriot, announcing the date, time or place of the MBTA community meeting on Aug. 20th.

In addition to the fact that the residents were not notified about the meeting, the City was not notified either. The Transportation Department is a member of the MBTA Advisory Board and is, therefore, supposed to be notified about any meetings. Because we were not notified of the meeting, we were thus unable to attend and make our position known. The planning and execution of this meeting was done in a way which disregards the proper processes for holding such meetings.
Certainly the meeting was planned with the good intention of hearing directly from the community residents who will be most affected by any changes in bus service. However, residents must be given adequate notice and an accessible location if the meeting is to truly be representative of the population of Charlestown. I urge you to reschedule the community meeting at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School St., so that all of the residents, and the City, will have the opportunity to be heard. I also urge you to post notifications of the meeting in the local newspapers. I expect that proper notification will also be given to the City's Transportation Department.

This is an important issue to our residents and they have a right to participate in the process.

## ELECTRONIC TAX PAYMENTS

 REQUIREDDid your business make federal tax deposits of more than $\$ 50,000$ during 1995 ? If so, you must start making such payments by electronic funds transfer beginning January 1, 1997.

You may use either of two deposit methods - the ACH (Automated Clearing House) "debit" method or the ACH "credit" method. The initial step for either method is to file IRS Form 9779 to set up your account.

Under the "debit" method, a taxpayer contacts the Treasury, either by telephone or computer, and gives instructions to withdraw and apply to the appropriate tax liabilities specified amounts from the taxpayer's bank account. This may be done at any time between one and thirty banking days before the due date of the payment. The withdrawal will be made on the due date. A "threshold" withdrawal amount may be established when the taxpayer sets up his account to help prevent erroneous overdraws. Taxpayers who timely notify the Treasury to withdraw, and have adequate funds, will be deemed to have paid their liabilities on time.

Under the "credit" method, taxpayers instruct their financial institution to transfer funds to the Treasury's account at the Federal Reserve Bank. Taxpayers remain liable for late payment penalties if their bank fails to make a transfer.
Business taxpayers subject to the new requirements already should have received an enrollment form from the IRS. If you didn't receive Form 9779 with instructions, and you think that the requirements might apply to you, call 1-800-945-8400 for an enrollment packet. (You may also choose to participate voluntarily.) Allow yourself enough time to set up your account before year-end and to begin working with the new system.
