OPENING WORDS

George Eliot wrote this about marriage: "What greater thing is there for two human souls than						
to feel that they are joined together to strengthen each other in all labor, to minister to each						
other in all sorrow, to share with each other in all gladness, to be one with each other in the						
silent unspoken memories?"						
Today and will declare their love and commitment to each other. They have

WINE CUP CEREMONY

A wedding is a ritual that signifies the transition from a single life into married life. Like most rituals, a wedding involves many symbolic elements, each bearing a significant meaning in the formation of the new marriage and the new family that the marriage creates. ____ and ____ have chosen several different ways to symbolize the sacred union they desire to enter. The first is a wine cup ceremony.

In Judaism, the sharing of the wine is known as the Kiddush, a ritual that is accompanied with the Hebrew blessing: Baruch Atah Adonai Eloheynu Melech Ha-olam Bo'rei

	P'ri Hagefen; Blessed are you, LORD our God, King of the Universe, who has created the fruit of the vine.
	and, drinking from a wine cup together is a reminder that from this moment on, you will share everything, doubling your joys and dividing your sorrows. It also symbolizes the many days that you will sit at the same table and eat and drink together as each other's family. As you share this glass of wine, so may you share all that the future may bring. May all of your joys be sweeter because you drink together. May whatever drops of bitterness life may contain be less bitter because you share them.
MESSA	(and drink from the cup.)
UNITY	Another symbolic ritual that and have chosen is the lighting of a unity candle. During the processional at the beginning of the ceremony, 's mother,, and 's mother,, each lit a taper next to the Unity Candle. These two individual flames, one representing each family, will be used to light the Unity Candle, symbolizing how out of these two families, a new family will be created.
	and, together as you light this candle of unity, you symbolize the flame of your own individual selves joining to ignite the partnership of marriage.

It is not the words that you speak today which will unite you together as one, but the inner sense of love and commitment that each of you feels within your soul.
	So I call upon them now to state their promise before this group: the pledges that will bind them together, which will begin their journey together.

RING (CEREMONY

The ring is an ancient symbol, so perfect and simple, an endless circle, the symbol of Infinity. It has neither a beginning nor an end - It is complete in itself. A ring is a fitting symbol for a wedding promise. These wedding rings are the symbols of the unending love and friendship that you share. As you exchange these rings with one another, know that they will always be

	and, because you have desired each other in marriage, pledged your love to one another, sealed your vows in the giving and receiving of rings, and witnessed this before our gathering, it is my distinct honor and pleasure to pronounce you wed!
	You may now seal your marriage with a kiss.

BREAK	ING OF THE GLASS
	In a moment, and will end their wedding ceremony with the Jewish tradition of breaking a glass. Explanations for this practice abound.
	Breaking a glass indicates that marriage is a transforming and irrevocable experience, one that leaves two people changed forever.
	It reminds us that love, like glass, is fragile and must be protected.
	It symbolizes the breaking down of barriers between people of different cultures and faiths.
	It implies the blessings: "As this glass shatters, so may your marriage never break." And "May your bond of love be as difficult to break, as it would be to put back together the pieces of broken glass."
	It teaches us that in times of joy we must not forget that life can also bring sadness and sorrow.
	Some even say it's to scare away evil spirits, or to start off the marriage with a bang!
	Regardless of the meaning, the appropriate response to the breaking of the glass is mazal tov, which means congratulations and good luck.
	and, may you have happiness, and may you find it making one another happy. May you have love, and may you find it loving one another.
