Walk-A-Thon Benefits St. Francis de Sales School









Evers To Be Recognized At ABCD Community Awards Dinner

Judy Evers, community liaison of the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, has been selected as this year's recipient of Action for Boston Community Development's Annual Community Service Award by the John F. Kennedy Family Service Center in Charlestown. A native of Charlestown, Evers works to facilitate the delivery of basic services to neighborhood residents.

Among her many affiliations and civic activities are Camp Bunker Hill, St. Catherine's Fund-Raising Committee, and the Bunker Hill Health Center Cardiac Advisory Committee. She is also a member of the Charlestown Community Schools Council, the Bunker Hill Day Parade Committee and works closely with the Spina Bifida and Hydrocephalus organization.

Evers' commitment doesn't end with her professional and community involvements. She has a large family, consisting of husband Bernie, five children and a granddaughter. Over the years, Evers has also been a mother to over 50 foster children.

Evers embodies the kind of dedication that makes a strong community and as an individual is truly a force of good within her community. She is a woman truly dedicated to securing the opportunity for a brighter future for everyone she encounters.

More than 1,500 people will share in the festivities by attending ABCD's 15th Annual Community Awards Dinner on Oct. 27 at the Sheraton Boston Hotel.

He currently serves as a member of the Senate Agriculture and Appropriations Committee, HUD and Independent Agencies, Nutrition and Investigations, among other committee assignments.

The evening will begin with a special reception honoring the Head Table guests and members of the ABCD Friends Committee, chaired this year by Larry Moulter, chairman and president of the Boston Garden Corp. In addition to the dinner and guest speakers, the evening includes entertainment and dancing in the Sheraton's Grand Ballroom.

The Holden School Seeks Labels To Obtain Free Equipment





Door To The Future Opens For Life Focus Center Graduates

Recently, three people graduated from the one-year Supportive Work Program at the Life Focus Center in Charlestown and two others received post-graduate honors.

The graduates were Anselmo Aviles, Melinda Cheever and Roger Stone. The post-graduates were Kelly Doe of Charlestown, who was unable to be present for the evening ceremonies, and Richard "Dickie" Sexton who was recently appointed to the LFC Board of Directors.

At the conclusion of the ceremonies, Student Training Certificates were awarded to Sarah Fernandez, Denise Giuggio, Teresa Oliva and Tony Bonfiglio, who was not present.

Families, students, previous graduates, LFC staff and Boston City Councillor Robert E. Travaglini attended the ceremonies, and all were impressed with the enthusiasm that pervaded the room and the obvious genuine care and affection displayed by the LFC staff toward their students.

"The program offers the disabled person so much more meaning in their goals for employment," says Linda Azevedo, director of vocational services at LFC. "They learn about themselves, develop self-confidence and feel good about themselves by accomplishing and seeing the results of what they produce."

By learning self-sufficiency through computer-based employment skills, graduates of the program work on LFC contracts for local businesses.

The Supportive Work Program students prepare billings, mailing lists, la-

bels, and even menus for local restaurants. While the students benefit personally and professionally, LFC keeps the program fueled through the contracts it brings in from businesses in Charlestown and surrounding communities.

Work is done at the pace of the individual, equipment is adapted for many types of disabilities and all students have the individual support they need to learn and achieve through LFC staff members. Students' disabilities include cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy, brain injuries, quadriplegia and paraplegia. All are in wheelchairs with severe mobility imparities, and adaptive equipment gives every student a chance to perform on the computers. One man uses a switch at his knee to use his terminal, while another woman activates her computer with a mouth wand.

In the original graduating class, four of the five students work in competitive jobs. Two are employed at LFC in administrative computer operations. Another one works as a receptionist and keeps books and enters data for a business firm in Boston. One man has been working at Boston University for a year, having had three promotions and has mastered his electric wheelchair on public transportation.

The Supportive Work Program students are trained under the direction of Azevedo, Charlestown resident Ed Codair and Steve Rubin. Students attend classes Monday through Thursday from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. These training sessions provide remedial academics appropriate to the

business world, acquisition of computer skills and social skills typical of a working environment.

What started as an unfunded brain child of LFC Executive Director Jack Millerick three years ago has steadily grown stronger with state grant money and in-house enthusiasm and support. While the Supportive Work Program continues in its success, disabled people are seeing the results of some new-found skills and accomplishments.

"Each one (of the students) has his or her own special stories about success," Azevedo says, and what could be more rewarding?



Boston National Historical Park To Host World War II Photographic Exhibit

The Boston National Historical Park at the Charlestown Navy Yard will be host to "Steichen and His Men: A Photographic Portrait of World War II." The photo exhibit of 60 black-and-white and color photographs by renowned photographer Edward Steichen (1879-1973) and seven of his men who documented the war effort of the U.S. Navy will open Oct. 24, in the Preble Room at the Visitor Information Center in Building 5 at the Charlestown Navy Yard. The exhibit will continue through Nov. 12 and will be on display from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily. There is no admission charge.

The photographs, made from original negatives in the Navy archives, include color works previously published only in black and white.

Steichen was 62 years old when he joined the war effort in 1942, a highly decorated veteran of World War I and well-known for his commercial and portrait photography. After the Ar-

my refused to recall him to active duty, Steichen convinced the Navy that he could tell the story of naval aviation and was awarded a Navy Commission.

As a specially commissioned lieutenant commander in the U.S. Naval Reserve, Steichen was able to

personally select professional photographers to participate in his Naval Aviation Unit. The Navy, in turn, granted his corps free rein to travel on carriers and submarines, in airplanes, and into factories to ensure comprehensive coverage.

In addition to documen-

ting the facts, Steichen wanted to prove that photography could be a powerful instrument for showing the human side of complex events. Open orders allowed the photographers to go where they wanted, recording the war from several points of view.

Steichen never gave his men detailed shooting scripts but encouraged them to use their instincts. "Don't photograph the

war," he said, "photograph the man, the little guy — the struggle, the heartaches, plus the dreams of this guy. Photograph the sailor."

Steichen personally supervised the printing of his special unit's photographs and took an active role in the war zone area. He was on board the **Lexington** when it was torpedoed during the battle for the Gilbert and Marshall Islands. On his second tour, he witness-


ed the invasion of Guam and Iwo Jima.

During the last six months of the war, Steichen was placed in command of all Navy combat photography. His final contribution was editing U.S. Navy War Photographs, which sold over six million copies in slightly less than six months, a record for a photography book. Steichen was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal.

CANA Project Continues To Change City Square

The rebirth of City Square is truly a laborious process. While tunnel construction and new pipe-jacking takes place under 20- to 50-foot depths, only two landmarks remain that tell the passer-by that this is, indeed, the oldest intersection in the community. The eye can only discern Roughan's Hall and the Charlestown Courthouse building as landmarks in this once densely populated square.

As cars and trucks pass through this connection of intersecting roadways and overpasses, work continues undisturbed all around them. Traffic is helped along by police details and posted signs, but at rush hour periods, delays are causing most intelligent motorists to seek an alternate route to get to their intended destination.

The first phase of the Central Artery/North Area (CANA) southern section of tunnel construction is progressing without much delay due to the use of a 150-foot tower crane that allows the construction crew the use of its 200-foot radius swing to move heavy equipment to any point within the construction pit by rolling back and forth on a bed of tracks. The crane can be seen in operation at the former site of the Y.M.C.A. building, located next to the North Washington Street Bridge, where the cement roadway is being poured for the entrance portion of the tunnel.

The utility line work un-

Rutherford Avenue, as part of the overall CANA project. Work will be gradual, doing one side of the bridge at a time, and is estimated to be completed within three years. Pedestrians using the walkway across the MDC dam will not be hampered by this phase of the

PW) personnel associated with the CANA project met with community residents on Tuesday, Oct. 17 to discuss the project's progress and the upcoming construction work schedule. David Flanagan, CANA community liaison; Ed Barr, CANA coordinator; and Horace DelGrosso, CANA administrator, were on hand to inform residents of immediate changes in the City Square area due to the project, and answer questions and concerns.

The recommendation to reopen Lowney Way to two-way traffic was raised by residents at the meeting who questioned public safety and access to Hayes Square. Residents argued that the roadway should be reopened to alleviate traffic delays caused by gridlock situations occurring on Water and Chelsea streets when large vehicles try to negotiate the turn outside the area of

ney Way closed to two-way traffic. "If you reopen it you could alleviate some of the traffic from Main and Bunker Hill streets. It's crazy trying to get around Charlestown any time of the day, but it is especially bad at rush-hour periods," he concluded. Cunha told CANA personnel that at the present time the Winthrop Street firetruck has to go all around the community to get to Hayes Square, losing valuable time getting to a fire.


Barr and DelGrosso informed residents that traffic engineers will inspect the area, and if they determine that Lowney Way could be opened, it would be done on a trial basis with continuous monitoring to ensure traffic and pedestrian safety in the area. Barr also informed those wanting to reopen the roadway, that it would only remain open until mid-1990 when the next portion of the project begins at Tremont Street. Residents agreed that opening the roadway, even for a few months, would be beneficial to the community.

Flanagan stated that Chambers Street has been reopened at the end of the North Washington Street Bridge. He said, "The reopening of this street takes trucks away from the impacted area onto the Water Street connector and truck route." This, he states, will keep some of the truck traffic out of residential areas.

Residents informed CANA personnel of their concerns with inadequate lighting at the end of the newly constructed pedestrian ramp off the North Washington Street Bridge, a damaged sewer line at the end of Elwood Street, lights being positioned on the top of the newly constructed retaining wall on Chelsea Street causing too much illumination in the area at night and debris left on the vacant land under the Tobin Bridge outside Gate 4 of the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Barr informed residents that new lighting was currently being installed in the area of Water and Chambers streets that will better illuminate the area; the newly installed sewer line at

der Park Street is nearing completion. Water, sewer, telephone, cable and electrical connections have been relaid by construction crews working at depths reaching to 28 feet, surrounded by reinforced earth support systems. This section of the project is expected to be completed in November, allowing Park Street to be reopened to traffic and readied for use

as a detour road to the Tobin Bridge from City Square. This new detour around the construction area will see the closure of Chelsea Street to traffic to allow the next portion of the tunnel work to begin.

The closure of Chelsea Street will necessitate the construction of a bridge that will carry traffic and pedestrians across the tunnel construction that will reach an



NORTH WASHINGTON STREET BRIDGE end of October causing many delays during rush hour periods. Traffic will be forced into four lanes by the

80-foot depth in some areas. The bridge will connect Gray Street to Park Street and carry traffic that exits the Tobin Bridge off-ramp with destinations to Warren and Henley streets. Chelsea Street will not be closed until the bridge construction is completed.

The most immediate impact felt by motorists attempting to weave through the construction area is occurring as a result of lane reductions on the North Washington Street Bridge. Six lanes of traffic will be squeezed into four lanes by jersey barriers as work begins on the reconstruction of this gateway to downtown Boston. The newly reconfigured bridge will have a straighter alignment with

project and boats using the dam to enter the Charles River will be allowed water access at all times.

CANA's reconstruction of City Square will forever change the design and all-but-forgotten atmosphere of this once populated area. The construction continues at a gradual pace causing, at times, overnight changes in traffic patterns. Signs, traffic lights and police details are visible to alert motorists and pedestrians who must travel through this intersection. Caution is advised to all those who dare cross the construction paths. The wisest of them all are those who stay out of the area all together.

Massachusetts Department of Public Works (MD-

Gate 2 in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Elm Street resident Joe Kent stated that two tractor trailers trying to negotiate this narrow bend of the road often cause a bottleneck, backing up traffic in both directions. Kent also stated that by reopening Lowney Way, fire apparatus approaching Charlestown from Boston would be given an alternate route away from Water Street for a more rapid response to emergencies in Hayes Square and beyond.



Neighbors Win Street Changes On Perkins, Parker And Caldwell

The Boston Transportation Department will change the traffic pattern along three Charlestown streets, based on community-driven petitions to alleviate congestion on residential streets near the Sullivan Square area.

Within the next two or three weeks, Caldwell Street will become one way from Perkins Street to Broadway; Perkins Street will be one way from the Somerville line to Caldwell Street; and there will be no right turn from Perkins onto Parker Street. Perkins



IN ADDITION to the changes noted above, there is no right turn onto Parker Street from Perkins Street, and Perkins Street in Charlestown will be clearly posted as a dead end.

Street will also be clearly posted as a dead end.

Neighbors have been complaining about heavy morning traffic from Broadway using their streets to avoid Sullivan Square, and about afternoon traffic from Washington Street avoiding the square by cutting through the local streets to get to Mount Vernon Street in Somerville for I-93 access.

Commuters will not be able to travel Caldwell Street from Broadway, nor will they be able to travel

from Perkins Street in Charlestown through to Perkins in Somerville. Traffic on Perkins Street in Charlestown will be forced to take a left turn on Parker Street and back onto Washington Street, or to take a right turn on Caldwell Street onto Broadway, which feeds directly to Sullivan Square. Perkins Street in Charlestown will offer no access to Mount Vernon Street.

BTD representative Donald Kehoe and Commissioner Richard Dimino an-

nounced the upcoming changes to neighbors at a Monday night meeting at the Jesuit Center in Sullivan Square. This week's meeting ended a series of three neighborhood discussions, sponsored by BTD and City Councillor Robert Travaglini, to address residents' concerns with heavy commuter traffic in their area.

Kehoe said there will be a 60-day trial period to allow for adjustments, and Area A Boston Police Community Relations Officer Joe McNulty said the police will enforce and direct the traffic changes for the first two or three weeks. Somerville is also expected to cooperate with its own com-

plementary traffic changes and police enforcement.

"We said we'd do something and we have," Dimino said. "Now just have some confidence in the police department that all will go smoothly."

Neighbors seemed satisfied with the traffic changes, but certain that other no parking and speed limit regulations also need to be enforced to truly ensure safer streets in the area.

Travaglini, who has moderated the meetings since April, seemed confident that with initial patience, neighbors will be happy with the results.

Charlestown High School Introduces New Headmaster

Charlestown High School has a new headmaster this year, and Stacy Johnson has plans to enrich and broaden the curriculum for some 960 students.

Appointed to CHS by Superintendent Laval Wilson in August after changes in the school system closed Jamaica Plain High School, where Johnson was headmaster for nine years, CHS gets a seasoned professional with a soft-spoken, yet decisive approach to education. Having also taught at English High School and serving as assistant headmaster at Boston Latin, 50-year-old Johnson is off and running at CHS.

His major goal is to broaden the course offerings at the high school, and he has already started work on ROTC, theater arts, journalism and an expanded computer program for students at CHS. Starting with this year's seniors, Johnson hopes to increase the number of college-bound students.

He says more students

will approach the application process with more individualized direction, more clearly and thoroughly communicated option packages for students and their parents and with informational workshops in place. Johnson has since invited Simmons College as an education partner and plans to continue the relationship with Bunker Hill

Community College.

"We could help students hook into the supports and show them that they can indeed accomplish these things in a short period of time," Johnson says.

In the meantime, Johnson says he will spend time on stabilizing the educational strengths already in place at the high school and to move forward and enrich them.

The Midwest native believes that academics could be better for CHS students. He would like to see the drop-out rate go down and attendance go up.

"Overall it's a good school," Johnson says. "The potential is overwhelming."

Help For First-Time Home Buyers

the end of Elwood Street is being closely monitored by CANA engineers and that no future problems with that line is anticipated; lights on the new retaining wall will not flood the surrounding area with unnecessary light; and the vacant land under the bridge is owned by Massport, and

they will be notified to clean it up.

The future use of six parcels of land in the City Square area that will come available for development when the CANA project is completed was addressed by New England Aquarium ad-hoc committee member Ivy St. John. St. John requested the MDPW establish a process of opening dialogue between all agencies involved with deciding the use of these parcels and that a regular progress report on the situation be issued. DeGrosso informed St. John that "the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) will not take the land over and do what they want. Former MDPW Commissioner Tierney made a commitment to the community that they will have input and Commissioner Garvey will continue to honor that commitment." He further stated that

"whatever happens to that land, Charlestown people will have a say." He suggested that residents continue their involvement with groups such as the North Area Task Force to monitor this issue, and he concluded, "No decision will take place without community meetings held by the MDPW to see what the community wants."

Flanagan informed the gathering that a meeting is being scheduled to discuss the Central Artery/Third Harbor Tunnel project as it relates to moving the ramps now located behind Bunker Hill Community College approximately 400 feet away from that area. The date and location of this meeting had not been determined at presstime, but Flanagan stated that it would take place within a few weeks and adequate notification will be given to the community.

Two-member teams will debate the non-binding referendum option on the Nov. 7 ballot. Panelists include Carol Wright, Committee

for Better Education and Ellen Guiney, Mayor's Office, in support of changing to a mayoral appointed school committee; Joyce King, Citizens for Voting Rights and Thomas O'Reilly, president of the Boston School Committee, will speak in opposition to changing the present structure of the elected school committee.

The debate is free and open to the public.

Bunker Hill Community College Awarded Training Grant

The Bay State Skills Corporation Board of Directors has awarded a total of \$111,878 to train 95 Massachusetts residents.

Among the award recipients was Bunker Hill Community College which received \$20,850 to prepare 35 individuals to be phlebotomists. These individuals are currently employed at three hospitals operated by the Department of Health and Hospitals, including Boston City Hospital, Mattapan Hospital and Long Island Hospital. The program will last one year, and graduates will be certified Phlebotomy Technicians.

This program is a 50/50

matching grant, whereby BHCC has in-kind support from private industry totalling \$20,851, matching the BSSC grant.

The Bay State Skills Corporation, a quasi-public corporation, was created in 1981 to award state dollars on a competitive basis to training institutions for industry-responsive education and training. BSSC's unique model requires each program to work with private industry to ensure that the programs meet the training needs of industry.

The City Scene

Regardless of what the so-called political pundits declare, it's still a seven-horse race for Boston City Council.

Those observers who tell you it's all over, want it all over because most have special interests, but there is more at stake on Nov. 7 than seats on the Boston City Council or School Committee.

Somewhere in there, most veteran pollsters believe, is Boston's next mayor, be it Michael McCormack, Bruce Bolling, John Nucci, Maura Hennigan-Casey or Peggy Davis Mullen. Even Rosaria Salerno has thoughts about sitting in City Hall's Eagle Room.

You may recall that only 18 percent of the electorate turned out for the Boston Primary, and you may also recall that during nine of the hours that the polls were open, the weather was atrocious. On Election Day that turnout could double or triple.

Here's why: Ray Flynn will have his forces out en masse in support of an appointed School Committee. Also, there are contests, some of them heated, in all but two of the City Council tilts, in district School Committee races and at-large School Committee races.

However, it is the elected vs. selected School Com-

mittee referenda that going to propel most of the people to the polls. Why? Because the mayor will have every precinct in every ward covered in order to prevent an encore of the embarrassment he suffered when the City Council watered down his original plan for an appointed School Committee.

The mayor will also mandate each and all connected with his administration to vote for the measure, and this bodes well for McCormack and Salerno, both Flynn favorites. Both should benefit from the school question turnout.

Albert "Dapper" O'Neil is once again expected to top the council ticket with

Chris Iannella second, but both Salerno and McCormack are shooting for the ticket-topper title.

In doing so, they are violating an old political premise that demands that you always look over your shoulder to see who's gaining on you.

Coming fast is fifth-place finisher John Nucci, who appears to have gotten his act and support together, young John Newman Flanagan, whose strength surprised most observers in the primary, and Joe Casper.

Nucci is much better than his runner-up showing displayed. He is strong city-wide, and a large turnout and good weather could see

him surge. John is consistently one of the few bright lights on the beleaguered School Committee.

Young Flanagan is a force to be reckoned with for years to come. Considering the rotten weather and small turnout in the preliminary election, he did remarkably well for a first-timer. Next Election Day he will again do fine in West Roxbury, and if Sen. Arthur

Lewis throws his full support to him, Flanagan could take coveted Jamaica Plain as well.

Joseph W. Casper may have finished a disappointing seventh last month, but he's also now in gear and coming fast. Casper didn't run as Casper in the Primary and it showed. Now he's the old Joe Casper and don't expect him to take any prisoners.

Boston Awarded \$6.5 Million For Elderly Housing

Boston Mayor Raymond L. Flynn and Congressman Joseph P. Kennedy (D-Mass.) have announced that two low-income elderly housing developments, in Charlestown and Brighton, have been granted \$6.5 million in below-market rate loans through the Section 202 program of the office of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Approximately \$2.8 million of the funds will be used by the National Council of Senior Citizens to turn the former Charlestown Municipal Building at the corner of Lexington and Bunker Hill streets into 43 efficiency apartments. Also, \$3.7 million will go to the B'nai Brith for the construction of 50 units of housing

in Brighton.

"This is very welcome news for two very worthy projects," said Flynn. "There is a great demand for affordable elderly housing throughout the city, and federal financial assistance is critical if we are to meet the needs of our elderly population."

"Senior citizens have devoted their lives to building up this country," said Kennedy. "The least we can do is to provide affordable housing for all our senior citizens."

"I'm glad to see the federal government take this step forward to begin to meet our commitment to seniors in Charlestown and Brighton."

providing additional assistance to the Charlestown development by assigning staff from the Public Facilities Department to help the project sponsor, the National Council of Senior Citizens, and by agreeing to sell the former Charlestown Municipal Building for only \$1. Future residents of the site, at 112 Bunker Hill St., will also benefit from the wide variety of elderly services provided by the Kennedy Center, which is located nearby.

Tenants in both the Charlestown and Brighton developments will receive rent certificates through the federal Section 8 program to help make their monthly payments.

The two Boston projects competed with nearly 400 applications for Section 202

funds from across the country. HUD selected 155 projects in 39 states to receive \$327.1 million for the construction or substantial rehabilitation of low-income elderly housing. Section 202 loans cover up to 100 percent of total development costs and may be repaid over a 40-year period at below-market interest rates.

The city of Boston has helped create nearly 250 units of low-income elderly housing in the last three years by offering financial assistance and surplus properties.
