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Athletic Fund Seeks To Invest In The Youth Of Charlestown

The funding of sports programs for Charlestown youngsters has been a burden for the directors of local leagues and associations since they were founded. Each year the costs for putting a team on the field, in the court or on the ice mounts and as volunteers strive to coach and direct the kids, they also must lead the way in fund-raising.

Over the years, a funding organization for sports programs has been a subject of discussion. Although attempts have been made to form an organization, such efforts have been dismissed — labeled a dream — that is until two years ago when the topic was broached at a Charlestown Neighborhood Council meeting.

From that meeting CNC members and interested persons pursued the funding idea, listened to the directors and organizers of youth sports teams and heard their cries for help — help with the spiraling costs of equipment, rental fees and dues.

This small group of individuals continued meeting with great enthusiasm and remarkable attendance and,

after months of brainstorming, came up with a preliminary funding plan and the dream was on its way to becoming a reality. Thus was born the Charlestown Youth Athletic Fund which became incorporated in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts in May of 1990.

The CYAF has set out as its purpose to raise money

in order to allow all Charlestown children access to athletic programs. Its goal is to raise \$1,000,000 over a three-year period to endow a permanent trust. It seeks the support of corporations, foundations and government, as well as that of the residents and business people from Charlestown.

Distraught Residents Seek Relief As Vandalism Closes Pool

During what was probably the hottest day in recent memory, the Clougherty Pool at the Doherty Playground on Bunker Hill Street remained closed to the public on Saturday due to a despicable act of vandalism which took place late Friday, July 19.

After hours, an individual or individuals made their way into the pool area and defecated into the water, creating a health hazard and making it necessary to close the pool.

Some 125 residents waited anxiously outside the pool the next morning in hope of getting relief from the scheduled 100 degree temperatures forecast for Saturday. No relief was in sight as the vandalism the night before left the pool unavailable to the public.

Distraught residents returned to their homes and began making telephone calls to the city's 24-Hour Hotline and to Judy Evers, community liaison for the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services. Evers stated that she received over 100 phone calls at her home requesting the reopening of the pool as soon as health requirements were met.

The pool reopened at noon on Sunday, July 21 and residents enjoyed an ex-

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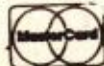
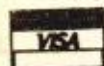

Residents are urged to attend this meeting on infestation and what is being done to eliminate the problem.

★ **Common Street** — Developer Bruce Daniel went before the Boston Redevelopment Authority Board on July 18 seeking permission to contract two single-family homes at 23-24 Common St. Each home would have three bedrooms, 2½ baths, roof deck and rear patios over garage space for two cars on Ellwood Street.

Area residents have expressed their con-

cerns on density and massing of the proposed structure and ongoing dialogue has been taking place between the neighbors and the developer. The BRA Board voted to defer action on the proposal until community issues are resolved. The proposal is slated to go before the city Board of Appeal on Aug. 13.

★ **Main Street And Lawnwood Place** — Formacs Inc. was given tentative designation for the development of Parcel R-107, located at Main Street and Lawnwood Place, by the BRA Board in action taken July 18. The principals of Formacs Inc. are four Charlestown men who share equal partnership. They are Doug MacDonald, Joe McGonagle, George MacDonald and Dan McGoff.

The proposal for the site includes seven units of housing with three two-bedroom condominiums at market rate; three three-bedroom condominiums at affordable prices; one four-bedroom single-family home facing Lawnwood Place; and three retail/office spaces on Main Street. The developer will return to the BRA within 90 days to present evidence of financing for the development.

★ **City Square Traffic** — Central Artery North Area (CANA) officials reviewed the

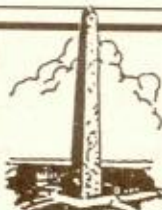

deployment of detail officers from the Boston Police Department this past week. According to Stephen Collins, community liaison with the CANA and Central Artery/Tunnel projects, CANA officials will continue with the reduced number of detail officers through August, reviewing the numbers as traffic increases in September.

Collins said that there are six detail officers and two supervisors currently assigned to the CANA area, four in City Square and two at Keaney Square at the Boston end of the North Washington Street Bridge. He said that the timing has been improved at the pedestrian crossing in City Square and there has been no noticeable increase in traffic backup.

In response to questions raised at the recent Police/Public Safety meeting, Collins said the officer assigned to the intersection of City Square and Rutherford Avenue is the pivot and he or she controls the traffic to allow emergency vehicles to clear the area. He said that Boston Health & Hospitals officials have received no complaints from ambulance drivers attempting to get through the area. He added that the ambulance stationed at Sullivan Square is manned from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. daily.

Collins said that he would continue to monitor the area during rush hour. He said that complaints should be forwarded to him at 951-6005.

★ Fire On Parker Street — A series of incidents resulted in the arrest of a woman for a breaking and entering at 21 Parker St. and the setting of a fire at 23 Parker St. on July 18. Damage to the home was estimated to be

\$6,000.

A resident of 21 Parker St. called the Boston Police at 11:30 p.m. to report a breaking and entering. According to the police report, officers were dispatched at 12:05 a.m. The resident reported that she heard a loud noise inside her son's bedroom and when she went to investigate she saw a woman outside on the fire escape pulling on the window. The suspect reportedly told the woman that she lived at 23 Parker St. and thought this was her apartment as she had lost her keys. She then fled down Parker Street toward Cambridge Street.

At 1:12 a.m., officers and the Boston Fire Department responded to a radio call for a fire at 23 Parker St. The report indicates that fire was found in the fourth floor entrance and the third floor landing and were listed as incendiary in origin. Two residents were evacuated from the building.

A woman sitting on the steps of 23 Parker St. was identified as the suspect in the earlier break in at 21 Parker St. She was approached by the police officers who saw that she had ashes covering parts of her clothing and there was a strong odor of smoke coming from her person. Boston Fire Lt. Henry Hickey, in the presence of Inspector John O'Sullivan and the two police officers, read her the Miranda warning and charged her with the arson of a dwelling and breaking and entering in the nighttime.

The 24-year-old woman, identified as Lori Edwards of 23 Parker St., was arraigned in Charlestown District Court on July 18. She is scheduled for a probable cause hearing on July 31.

The Board of Directors of CYAF is spearheading this fund-raising drive under the direction of Chairman John F. Sheehan and President John L. Tobin, assisted by Treasurer Dennis X. Collins and Clerk Peter P. Looney. Members of the board include Thomas Annartone, Polla Bilodeau, Sheila Brown, Francis "Bud" Coleman, Stephen M. Collins, Thomas V. Desmond, Kevin P. Gallagher, Robert McGann, Martin O'Brien Sr., Daniel C. Smith and James F. Walsh.

Honorary Board Members who have lent their names to this fund-raising effort represent the fields of sports, business, religion, education and government. Three persons who have made a serious commitment to Charlestown youth are the individuals who have agreed to serve as independent trustees to administer the trust. They are Helen Chin Schlichte, assistant to the secretary of the Commonwealth's Executive Office of Administration and Finance; William McCabe, commissioner of public safety for the Commonwealth; and Eric T. Philippi, vice president, Alex, Brown & Sons. Tobin stated that the trustees were selected as "people of the highest character" with the capability and experience to manage such a fund.

Tobin admits that the organization's plans are ambitious. He adds that the trustees, directors and board members share the common goal in believing that all children who wish to participate in athletic programs should be able to do so regardless of financial

means — and they intend to raise the funds to provide those means. He noted that by establishing a permanent trust, the youth could benefit for years to come.

With the establishment of the trust, the board will solicit funding proposals from sports groups. The board has voted to give preference to already existing programs which provide activities for young people under 18, the majority of program participants being Charlestown residents. They would prioritize activities with volunteer help, and would require the submission of a detailed budget to justify the funding. The timetable to begin distribution of funds has not yet been established but, Tobin added, the existing athletic teams would be notified as soon as CYAF is ready to begin returning money to

the town.

The directors believe that support of the CYAF is an investment in the community's youth as the youngsters and the entire community will benefit from these athletic programs which foster traditional values of teamwork, discipline and sportsmanship. The expression of that investment will be the issuing of certificates of non-transferable and non-redeemable stock to the supporters of the fund as a symbol of their investment in the community's youth.

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An off-duty Arlington firefighter and two Arlington residents recently saved the life of an 84-year-old Somerville woman who nearly drowned in Mystic Lake.

"It's one of those things where I was in the right place at the right time," said Arlington firefighter Paul Morrison, who quickly administered Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) to revive Edith Zanelli after Phil McLaine of Arlington pulled her from the water and onto Sandy Beach in Winchester.

McLaine spotted Zanelli on the surface of the water, unconscious, while he was swimming nearby. McLaine said when he approached the victim he saw "bubbles coming up from the water."

Morrison, a resident of 7 Ellwood St., Charlestown, saw the emergency transpire while he was sitting on the beach and listening to music. "Luckily I knew she hadn't been out for more than five minutes, because I had seen her swimming," said Morrison, who came quickly to the aid of Mc-

Laine. "I think her breathing had stopped for about two to three minutes." He said he was aided by Margaret Marino, who helped him during the CPR.

The CPR brought Zanelli's breathing back. Shortly after she regained consciousness, the Winchester Fire Department took her to the hospital, where she was placed in intensive care.

"It was no big deal, I just dragged her to the beach and it so happened the fireman was there," said McLaine.

Both Morrison and McLaine said Zanelli's face was "purple" by the time she was up on the beach. "It's a sight you don't forget in a hurry," said McLaine.

There were no lifeguards on duty. The Metropolitan District Commission, which controls the beach, says the beach was officially closed at the time.

Morrison, who is currently on leave due to back and knee injuries he sustained on an April 5 fire call, is experienced in water rescues. This was his fourth one, he said. "I used to be

a lifeguard at Revere Beach," he said. "I saved two people in 1968." He also said he used CPR to save the lives of two boys who had tipped over in a boat three summers ago on Lake Winnepesaukee.

"Being in the Fire De-

partment, you see it all the time," said Morrison. "People were screaming. I had to say 'calm down, somebody call the Fire Department.'" Morrison has worked for the Arlington Fire Department for 18 years.
