### Birmingham And Voke In Effort To Freeze Auto Insurance Rates

Responding to a Weld Administration proposal to hike auto insurance rates an average 6.8 percent for 1992, Sen. Thomas Birmingham and Rep. Richard Voke joined with their Democratic colleagues to enact legislation to freeze auto insurance rates for 1992. This action forstalls any increase in auto insurance premiums for Massachusetts drivers.

"Drivers in Charlestown have for too long now been

held hostage by the insurance companies' annual increase in auto premiums. These insurance companies seem to think that they have a right to gouge us year after year and this nonsense must come to an end," said Voke.

"When I first ran for office, the serious problem of unacceptably high auto insurance rates was an issue that I felt must be addressed. It is a priority of mine to provide some relief for the working men and women of Charlestown who must purchase this insurance. I'm pleased to honor my commitment to them." stated Birmingham.

#### NOMINATIONS SOUGHT FOR SECOND ANNUAL COMMUNITY AWARDS RECIPIENTS

The Charlestown Community Appreciation Awards Committee, sponsored by the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, will hold its second annual Community Appreciation Awards Banquet on Saturday, March 28, at the Knights of Columbus hall. After a very successful event last year, the committee is hoping that the community will once again respond to a call for nominations in the seven award categories.

The purpose of the awards ceremony is to recognize those who have helped enrich the quality of life in Charlestown, but have done so in such an unassuming manner that their deeds have gone unheralded and, in most cases, unknown to the general population. Seven award categories have been established to encompass all aspects of the community. Residents, non-residents, businesspersons and employees are urged to take the time to nominate a person, business or organization deserving of recognition.

Recipients of last year's awards, persons, businesses and organizations that have previously received recognition for their deeds and members of the committee and the Neighborhood Council are not eligible to receive an award.

Award recipients will be chosen by the committee from nominations received from the community. Persons who sent nominations last year are requested to resubmit their choices for these awards. If potential recipients would be eligible for consideration in more than one category, submit an entry for each award. The number of entries received does not make that candidate more eligible for consideration. Rather, the quality and description of the good deeds performed, enhances chances of being selected.

#### AWARD CATEGORIES

- Youth A Charlestown resident who is 18 years of age or younger as of Jan. 1, 1992 whose deeds have gone unheralded.
- Elderly A Charlestown resident who is 55 years of age or older by Jan. 1, 1992 whose deeds have gone
- · Organization An incorporated non-profit, Charlestown-based group that primarily serves Charlestown and whose goals are geared toward the betterment of the community.
- Business A Charlestown-based business that supports and enhances the quality of life in the Charlestown
- Public Servant A person who performs service within his/her job capacity, but goes beyond that job description in service to the betterment of the Charlestown community. (Example: an employee of the federal, state, county, city or an authority/government agency or community agency who may or may not be a resident of Charlestown.)
- New Resident A person who has taken up residency in Charlestown within the last 10 years and whose deeds have contributed to the quality of Charlestown life.
- Unsung Hero A Charlestown resident whose deed/ deeds were performed within the community and have gone publicly unhonored. These deeds cannot be performed as part of his/her job performance. There is no age restriction for this recipient. The deed/deeds would result in the enhancement of the quality of life in Charlestown.

### Mitigation Committee Meets With The MWRA On Ferry Site

The Charlestown Neighborhood Council Mitigation Committee met on Dec. 19 to receive an update on Charlestown Marine Park at the former Amstar Sugar site; the status of community funds to be provided as a mitigation measure by the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA); and a report of the MWRA's occupancy of the former Revere Sugar

Committee members present included Chairman Moe Gillen, Bob Scalli, Bill Galvin, Jim Conway, Jeanne Davis and Kevin Roche.

There was no representative present from the Harold Brown organization to speak on Charlestown Marine Park. Gillen said that work has been going on at the power plant at the front of the building. Complaints have been voiced of Sunday work, which Gillen said was denied by a company spokesman. He reported that Bay State Trucking is the first-floor tenant and said that the leasing agent has been trying to secure additional tenants.

Carrie Fuchs of MWRA spoke on the money agreed upon under the Memorandum of Understanding between the MWRA and the city. MWRA will provide \$50,000 annually for three years to local organizations. Recommendations will be made to and approved by the CNC and then the checks will be issued directly from MWRA to the organization. The first \$50,000 must awarded by June 30. A committee will be set up by the CNC at its January meeting which will not include members repre-

senting local organizations. MWRA's Charles Scott, supervisor for the Revere Sugar site, said that the authority opened seven bids on Dec. 16 for \$2.4 million in general construction. He said that the low-bid contractor, Reynolds Brothers Inc. of Canton, will go to the MWRA Board of Directors on Jan. 8 for approval, and work should begin at the site two to three

Scott said that the contract will involve the demolition of two Quonset-type buildings and two masonrytype buildings, adding that rodent control is included in the contract. This part of the project should be completed in a month from its start and then construction will focus on underground utilities and drainage, cable repair, roofing on a small building and site fencing.

Also in February or March, marine work will get underway with some demolition, shore protection and pile driving. According to Scott, construction activity should be completed by the end of July to mid-August. He added that personnel ferry transfer operations should begin by middle to late May.

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
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★ Multiple Accidents — On Thursday, Dec. 26 at approximately 8:30 a.m., a woman jogger was hit by a car outside Sully's Pub at 85 Main St. The vehicle, a 1988 Chevrolet four-door sedan, was traveling on Main Street toward City Square when the accident occurred. The woman, a 32-year-old resident of Trenton Street, was rushed to Mass. General Hospital suffering from head trauma and bodily injuries.

According to eyewitness reports, the woman was jogging along the sidewalk on Main Street and entered the street without realizing a car was approaching because she was wearing a walkman with headphones. The driver, a Charlestown resident, could not stop the car in time to avoid hitting the woman, one witness stated.

At press time, the woman's condition had been elevated to fair and stable.

An ambulance responding to the scene hit an ice patch at the corner of Rutherford Avenue and Austin Street and collided into a cement wall, knocking down a traffic signal light. At the time of the accident, the ambulance traveling at approximately 35 MPH with sirens and lights flashing. The two EMTs in the vehicle were not hurt, but the ambulance sustained extensive damage.

Crews from the Boston Transportation Department responded to replace the traffic light and Public Works Department personnel sanded the icy area, caused by a water leak. A tow truck had to be called to remove the ambulance from the scene.

- \* MEPA Waiver Denied The Secretary of Environmental Affairs Susan Tierney has denied a request by the Boston Redevelopment Authority to waive the Massachuestts Environmental Policy Act (MEPA) regulations requiring an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the proposed Biomedical Research Center on 16th Street in the Charlestown Navy Yard. Tierney outlined her reasons for the denial in a seven-page statement issued on Dec. 23.

The BRA had submitted a Notice of Project Change (NPC) in 1990 requesting to be permitted to proceed with certain projects in the Yard's End section of the Navy Yard. In response to this request, the Secretary required that the 1978 Master Plan be updated to reflect the numerous changes in the development planned for the Navy Yard during the 12 years since the original plan was submitted. This Jan. 2, 1991 requirement included regulatory changes taken place since the 1978 Master Plan that needed reconsideration.

In response to this request, the BRA prepared a Draft and Final Supplement Environmental Impact Report (FSEIR), of which the FSEIR was found to be adequate on Oct. 17,

Tierney stated: "While I agree that certain issues have been satisfactorily studied, I feel that other issues need further consideration, on a project-specific basis."

Tierney has required the BRA to submit additional information on a wind-tunnel study, a pier management plan, a traffic mitigation plan and a transit mitigation plan.

She stated: "The purposed of these reports is to ensure that the expected impacts of the proposed development would be adequately mitigated." Tierney said that she feels these issues will be resolved before Phase II of the Charlestown Navy Yard development moves into construction.

(continued from page 3) MWRA to advertise locally for job openings, and the lack of employment for members of the International Longshoremen's Association on the site. One resident, who is a member of the ILA, pointed out that the organization has a contract with Massport which should be honored by the MWRA who is renting the site from Massport. Sentiments were strong that Charlestown hasn't gotten its fair share in the job market on any level.


As to the site itself, Scott said there will be parking for 300 cars entering the area at approximately 6 a.m. with the ferry leaving for Deer Island at 6:20 a.m. and arriving back in Charlestown at 4 p.m. He said there would only be a day shift and it would operate five days a week, Monday through Friday. He said the exception could be a contractor working overtime on Deer Island to meet the schedule.

Area residents cautioned

Scott of the anger that would be created if Belmont and Sackville streets became the direct routes to the ferry site. They also stressed the enforcement of no parking by the workers on adjacent streets. Gillen added that under the MOU, two police officers paid by MWRA would be on duty in the area.

As to landscaping, Scott said there would be a hedge row to provide a visual screen along Medford Street. He said that lighting will be beyond the guard shed into the parking area, and a committee member asked that its installation be sensitive to area residents. Scott noted that the chainlink fence on the perimeter would be repaired.

Council members are looking to the MWRA and Massport for answers to employment, traffic and landscaping issues and want the two authorities to be up front in their dealings with the community, something that has been in question in the past.











"Any of them could do it if they have the desire and the facilities," Adams said.

Adams also supports developing an indoor-outdoor tennis facility in Charlestown.

Coach Walter Smierzchalski of Dorchester, who has been working with the CHAD Tennis Club since its beginning nearly two years ago, said, "Things are going superbly" with the tennis program.

"We've got two new coaches," Smierzchalski said, mentioning Adams, an experienced club coach and Daniel Cayarga, a professional coach from Winchester. "We've got the support of the community. And the breakfasts and dinners at St. John's before the matches are the best idea so far.

St. John's Episcopal Church on Devens Street in Old Charlestown has been hosting the CHAD Tennis Club for pre-match meals throughout November and December.

Smierzchalski also pointed out that the club's older, more experienced players are now qualified to "develop and teach the younger kids" when the summer program expands. "Some of the boys are already terrific coaches," he said.

"Tom Desmond deserves a lot of credit," Smierzchalski said. "He started this program from nothing. He's done a terrific job."







★ CANA Traffic Change — Central Artery/North Area (CANA) Coordinator Ed Barr has announced that effective this week access from City Square to the Tobin Bridge will be rerouted as work continues on the tunnel connections to the Central Artery/Tunnel (CAT) Project.

The detour began on Jan. 6 and will continue intermittently throughout the year. Traffic will use the Water Street on-ramp to enter the Tobin Bridge northbound between 7 a.m. and 2 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Although the detour route will have appropriate signs and police details will be positioned at critical intersections, drivers will experience delays due in part to a one-lane restriction on Route 1. Motorists are advised to adjust their travel schedules to allow additional time due to these expected delays.

Barr stated that MBTA bus stops in the area will not be affected by this phase of the project.

★ North Washington Street Bridge — The deplorable condition of the North Washington Street Bridge connecting City Square with Boston proper has been no secret to residents and commuters for some time. But the collapse of one of the structural beams early last Sunday morning caused some alarm as the bridge first began to sag and eventually a hole opened up large enough that a jeep could have fallen in.

The structural damage has forced the closing of two lanes on the northbound portion of the bridge to traffic entering City Square from the North End. This reduction in lanes compounds the traffic woes for the Central Artery/North Area (CANA) project with only two lanes in each direction until the bridge repair work can be completed.

According to Boston Public Works Commissioner Joseph F. Casazza, the bridge was due for reconstruction within the next few weeks. Luckily a contract was advertised last September to put a new deck on the structure and undertake other needed repairs. The \$2.3 million project will be funded by the Massachusetts Department of Public Works and is expected to begin within the next week, Casazza stated.

Once reconstruction begins, the project will take six months. Only two lanes inbound and outbound will be open for the duration of the contract, Casazza stated. Repaired lanes will open to traffic to allow work to be done on the remaining portions of the bridge.

The Boston Transportation Department will post signs and traffic devices to direct traffic before construction begins, and will continue to update the signs to speed the flow of traffic during the reconstruction project.

All materials must be clean. Any plastic or metal rings and caps must be removed from bottles. Labels may be left on. If materials are not clean, they cannot be accepted.

Public Facilities Department Project Coordinator Emily Haber stated that the work should take one week to complete, and that all debris will be taken away on a daily basis during the contract.



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

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
