



BREAST CANCER

- · One in every eight women in the United States develops breast cancer.
- · The cause of breast cancer is not known. However, risk factors have been identified.
- · Breast cancer is diagnosed with self and physician examinations of the breasts, mammography, ultrasound testing and biopsy.
- . There are many types of breast cancer that differ in its capability of spreading to the other body tissues.
- · Treatment of breast cancer depends on the type and location of breast cancer as well as the age and the health of the patient.
- · Between the ages of 50 and 75, yearly mammograms are recommended. Between the ages of 40 and 50, mammograms should be discussed with your health-care provider.

"Your mammogram is suspicious for breast cancer." "Your biopsy was positive for breast cancer." These are among the most terrifying words a woman can hear from her health-care provider. Breast cancer elicits so many fears including those related to surgery, death, loss of body image and loss of sexuality. Each woman needs to make sure that she has all of the information she needs to make the best decisions concerning her care. Optimally, these issues are best discussed with your health-care provider on an individual basis.

Who is at risk for breast cancer? Currently one in every eight women in the U.S. develops breast cancer. The exact cause is not known and most likely involves many factors including genetic, environmental, nutritional and hormonal.

Breast cancer is more common in high socio-economic groups, unmarried women, women from urban areas and Jewish women. The most prominent risk factors are age and gender. Men can develop breast cancer, but women are 200 times more likely to develop it than men. Breast cancer is 400 times more common in women who are over 50 years of age than those who are between 20 and 40. Family history of breast cancer will increase the risk of developing breast cancer in a woman three to five times.

Recently, a breast cancer gene called BR CA1 has been identified. This gene is felt to be responsible for only two to four percent of all breast cancer cases. Currently, the test for this gene is only available at certain research centers.

Women who started their menstrual periods before age 12, those who have had delayed menopause which would be after 55, and those who have had their first pregnancy after the age of 30 have a mildly increased risk of developing breast cancer. Pregnancy and breast feeding have a protective effect in preventing breast cancer.

Mammography and breast examination serve as the foundation in screening for breast cancer. Mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast. It has the ability to detect a cancer in the breast when it is quite small, long before it may be felt by breast examination. Some 85 to 90 percent of all breast cancers are detected by mammography, while just 10 to 15 percent of breast cancers are not visible on mammography but can be felt on physical examination of the breast.

It is extremely important for women to have a regular breast exam as well as mammograms in order to most fully ensure that she has no evidence of breast cancer. Breast examinations should be performed by the woman's health care provider during the routine physical examination. It should also be performed monthly by the woman, herself, using the techniques of self breast examination. The best

time to do a breast self examination is three days after the menstrual period has stopped.

An ultrasound test uses sound waves to visualize the structures inside the breast. It is often used to distinguish between cysts, which are fluid-filled, and solid tumors. If an area is suspicious for cancer, a biopsy, which is the removal of a piece of the tissue to analyze under the microscope, is usually performed to confirm or deny the diagnosis. Some 80 percent of biopsies are not cancerous.

The management of breast cancer is quite varied and complex. The subtleties of each case make it most important for each woman to discuss her options with her medical professionals. The best chance of eliminating breast cancer is prevention. However, we currently do not have the knowledge to prevent breast cancer.

The capability of diagnosing breast cancer in a much earlier stage than in previous years does exist. Early diagnosis of breast cancer can be achieved with a routine mammography and early biopsy of any suspicious lesion. The earlier a breast cancer is found, the better the chances are of a total cure. The more we educate ourselves about breast cancer issues, the greater the likelihood of controlling this deadly disease. Sandra Bock PA-C, M.Ed.

Boston National Historical Park To Unveil Handbook On The Revolution

The full story of Boston's revolution includes the belief and political practices that an assorted group known as "the people" brought with them to the conflict with Britain. The new National Park Service Handbook, "Boston and the American Revolution," explores Bostonians' ideas of liberty, not through the eyes of the town's most prominent men, but through the eyes and actions of 18th-century shipwrights and shoemakers, barrelmakers and goodwives, tavernkeepers, shopkeepers, and sailors.

Special features of the handbook highlights Boston's role in coastal and trans-Atlantic trade; artists and artisans in colonial Boston; a typical day on the Boston waterfront; the impact of the Sugar and Stamp acts on resistance to British authority; the Boston Massacre; the Boston Tea Party; Boston's African Americans in the Revolutionary era and after; the encounters at Lexington and Concord; the Battle of Bunker Hill; and how the occupation and fortification of Dorchester Heights helped drive the British out of Boston.

"This handbook interestingly and importantly emphasizes the idea of liberty advanced by ordinary men and women in colonial Boston," said Martin Blatt, historian for Boston National Historical Park.

In a reception at Faneuil Hall today, Oct. 1, that will be attended by Boston Public Schools Superintendent Thomas Payzant, the Freedom Trail Foundation will announce its donation of copies of the handbook to each of the Boston Public Middle School libaries, as well as to each of the 26 branch libraries of the Boston Library System and to the City of Boston Community Centers.

The beautifully illustrated 96-page handbook is an accessible, full-color guide for the general public, students and educators. It is available for purchase from Eastern National bookstores at two locations in Boston: Boston National Historical Park Visitors Center at 15 State St. and at the Charlestown Navy Yard.



'An Evening With Claude Monet'

Youngsters like things that go bang.

Maybe it's the thud of it. Well, the fifth grade teachers are using this to reach and teach their students about gravity. It's HEAVY stuff. There was no lack of volunteers to help Ms. Carter conduct science experiments about the pull of gravity on objects of different sizes. A big book and a little pencil were dropped from a level height and the teacher didn't even complain.

It was a good connection to the story they read about the *Wayside School*... The story tells of a teacher who tried to teach about gravity by dropping a computer and the box it came in out of the window to see which one hit the ground first. The students loved the story but, needless to say, the fifth grade teacher didn't follow it up with a demonstration of her own ... Good thing!

The budding scientists don't appear to be shy. Neil Gillis was the judge, Casey Schievink, Jennifer Buckley, Joshua Lopez and Nevin Lonergan were the experimenters.

Ms. Rooney's class has been reading James and the Giant Peach. Students wrote how they would finish the story. Mark Fichtner wrote: "James and his friends might go so far that they would get stuck on the point of the Empire State Building . . ." Now, there's a writer with imagination. The Small Business Administration suggests a five-step process of Y2K readiness. (For those on the web, go to http://www.sba.gov/y2k/ for additional details.)

1. Awareness. Make sure everyone in your organization knows about the Y2K problem.

2. Inventory. List all possible areas where you might have a problem.

3. Assessment. Determine how severe the problem is in your business and which systems are flawed. Begin right away - some date-sensitive systems that do forecasting may start to fail well before January 1, 2000. Check with outsiders you depend on to see if they are prepared. Ask your insurance company if you are insured for possible problems.

When you find a faulty system, use one of the 3R strategies - repair, replace, or retire it. For instance, Microsoft recommends updating all PC programs to 1997 or later versions.

4. Correction and testing. Once you think you have everything right, you need to make sure. Testing should be isolated from your regular work environment to avoid corrupting your current working systems.

5. Implementation. Move your Y2K compliant systems into your regular business operations.

When you have completed the five steps, keep your systems free from further problems. Test new components, software, or business relationships before adding them.
