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Petitions Are Presented At Precinct 7 Resident Parking Meeting

Residents of Precinct 7 gathered at Bishop Lawton Hall on Dec. 11 to drop off petitions and begin the initial planning stages for resident parking in their neighborhood. The meeting was facilitated by Tom Cunha, Precint 7's representative to the Charlestown Neighborhood Council. Representing the Boston Transportation Department (BTD) was Dick Loring, supervising Traffic Engineer.

In total, over 400 signatures were collected on Main, Bunker Hill, Short, Baldwin, Chappie, St. Martin and North Mead streets. The petitions will go to the BTD for verification.

The meeting proceeded with the presumption that enough signatures had been collected to implement a resident parking program on those streets. There was a real sense of urgency to begin the program as residents expressed their frustration not only with commuter parking, but with real

threats to the safety of Charlestown residents as parked cars have been clogging the intersections, particularly at Medford Street. There was a report that a parked car was seen blocking the ambulance bay at Sullivan Square. Loring assured those present that any activity in other precincts toward resident parking will not hold up the implementation of Precinct 7's program.

Residents expressed concerns about "sign pollution when the parking program is instituted. Loring explained that the BTD will use existing poles when available as they, too, do not want to inundate streets with signs. He went on to explain that it is difficult to install new sign poles in the winter, so they need to make use of existing pole locations.

The residents outlined their preferred guidelines for the program beginning on the main thoroughfares. It was suggested that the

program be implemented from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Friday.

On Bunker Hill Street, resident parking only restriction was recommended for the odd side and twohour, resident exempt, parking was recommended for the even side. It was suggested that Main Street be resident parking on both sides with two-hour parking from the ambulance station to Charbonnier Street.

It was recommended for Medford Street that resident parking only be implemented on the residential side and two-hour parking be instituted on the commercial side. Please note: This applies to the Precinct 7 portion of Bunker Hill, Main and Medford streets only.

The general consensus was that resident parking only be enforced on the side streets in Precinct 7. These streets are Short, Baldwin, Chappie, St. Martin, and North Mead. There was some discussion about the hours and days needed for the program. Some residents preferred an 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday program while others were in favor of a 24hour-a-day program.


Loring informed residents that he will bring these suggestions back to the BTD and they will take a closer look at the situation to evaluate the needs of the community as well as businesses in the area. The BTD will come back to the community with its recommendations for the program in about one month. Another meeting will be scheduled so residents can review the BTD's plan and offer suggestions to work out any outstanding issues.

BHCC Offers Irish-American Literature Course



A NEW TAX BREAK FOR FAMILY BUSINESS

The Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997 offers some estate tax relief for family-owned farms and businesses. Under the old law, estates could exclude \$600,000 in assets from tax. The new law gradually increases this exclusion to \$1,000,000 between 1998 and 2006. However, estates that include family-owned business interests are not limited to this general exclusion; they may be able to exclude up to \$1,300,000 in assets. For estates that are able to take advantage of the increased inclusion, the additional tax savings are available in 1998. There is no gradual phase-in as with the general exclusion.

The new law is effective for estates of people who die after 1997. There are a number of requirements for the estate to qualify for the family-owned business exclusion. For example, the value of the family-owned business interests must exceed 50% of the total estate, and the decedent or his family must have materially participated in the business for at least five of the eight years before his death. The business must be located in the United States, and it must be owned at least 50% by one family, 70% by two families, or 90% by three families. The estate must pass its ownership to "qualified heirs," which can be members of the decedent's family or individuals who were actively employed in the business for at least 10 years before the decedent's

The qualified heirs or their families are required to materially participate in the business for at least five of any eight year period within 10 years after the decedent's death. If they do not, they are subject to a recapture tax.

Family farms and businesses should review their eligibility for this new exemption. Call us for details and any assistance you may need in taking advantage of this important tax break.

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


