Residents Halt Cable Contractors From Entering Burial Ground

Spokesmen for both the City of Boston and Cablevision of Boston, have apologized for the residential alarm cable contractors created when they began digging in the Bunker Hill Street Cemetery last Thursday.

Minutes after the workers sawed into the sidewalk, neighbors of the historical graveyard, made a series of phone calls to the Patriot, Charlestown

Promising that the trench would be re-sodded. Rick Borten of the Mayor's Office For Cable said that the Parks and Public Works Department were outraged, however, no gravesites had been disturbed. Borten said it would be made clear to Cablevision of Boston that damage would be restored and that residents should not hesitate to call the Cablevision office again if they have concerns or questions concerning the installation of cable lines.

Westerly neighbors of the graveyard said they were amongst the first to complain about the digging in the yard. "You would think someone would know better." said Irene Fratalia. According to Fratalia. her husband spoke with workers, showing them signed releases to burrow through their yard for cable line installation.

"At first it seemed like they were going to stop. but then they began digging again and that's when my husband got on the phone and started making some calls." Fratalia said she thought that maybe the contractors saw that digging through and re-seeding a graveyard as being cheaper than having to restore the Fratalia's cemented yard. However, Sid Whiting, General Manager of Cablevision of Boston said this was un-

"It was a very regrettable mistake," said Whiting "Someone used their judgement poorly and incorrectly. Whiting also said the graveyard would be sodded.

The Clubhouse at the Ryan Playground (Neck) will be operated and maintained by the Kennedy Center beginning May 16, 1983. We hope that this will lead to greater Community control over this beautiful playground. We want to encourage all community input over how our parks are utilized.

FOSTER GRANDPARENTS

Could there be a more perfect definition of the phrase "mutually beneficial" than the Foster Grandparent Program? Probably not. It's an experience in which older persons and children thrive ... together!

In this program, low-income people over age 60 spend 20 hours a week working one-to-one with special needs children in schools, hospitals, day care centers, and battered women's shelters. In return they receive a \$40 per week stipend, their lunch, and their transportation costs. Each older person "grandparents" two children.

For the children, the Foster Grandparenting experience establishes a milieu of constant caring, patient attention, and quiet acceptance. In day care centers, schools, and shelters they rush to greet their older friends. In hospitals, the consistent, daily presence of a "grandma or grandpa" helps children cope with illness and a strange, often frightening environment.

"The program allows older people and children to meet each other's needs in a wonderful way," says Director Edith Stein. "The old are often lonely with time on their hands and a lot of love to give; the youngsters need and respond to love."

The Foster Grandparent Program began in 1964 as part of the federal government's antipoverty effort under the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO). Later, it became part of the Older American Volunteer Programs, under the ACTION office.

In Boston, under the sponsorship of Action for Boston Community Development, Foster Grandparents began working with children in two state schools in 1965. Today 110 grandparents work at 32 sites which include schools, day care centers, hospitals, and battered women's shelters. Although federal dollars support the program, several agencies have raised funds to contribute to the program, including Massachusetts General Hospital, and the YMCA. Agency spokespersons claim the program is not only beneficial, it's cost effective because foster grandparents work one-to-one with those children who need special attention thus releasing staff for other work.

The Kennedy Center is interested in bringing this program into Charlestown. Funds are short but you can help.

There will be a "Night at the Pops" on June 25, 1983 to benefit the Foster Grandparents program.

The Boston Pops will perform with conductor John Williams of "E.T." and "Starwars" fame conducting. Also, on that program will be "Peter, Paul, and Mary" and special appearance by Ruth Gordan.







May Is Better Speech And Hearing Month

May is "Better Speech and Hearing Month" in the United States. Although that might not affect you directly, one out of every 10 people - including your neighbors and family members - is affected by a speech, language, or hearing disorder.

For some people this might mean being passed over at work for that promotion because of poor communication skills. For some, there is the constant fear of embarassperience an articulation disorder from injury to the mouth or nervous system.

Most everyone has experienced a temporary voice disorder following a day of cheering at a football or basketball game. When the hoarseness doesn't go away, a voice disorder had developed. Talking with lots of tension, or excessive screaming or yelling can actually cause callous-like growths on the vocal folds (vocal cords located in the The final category, fluency, refers to disruptions in the timing of speech. The most common problem here, stuttering, results in hestitations, repetitions, and/or blocks as a person tries "to get the word out." Most very young children go through a phase in which they repeat things, but if repetitions break up syllables ("Wha-Wha-Wha-Where's Mommy?") or create anxiety or tension for the speaker, the person is probably stuttering.



ment by an inability "to get the words out." For some families, it means the frustration of a child who, because he or she cannot express needs, may withdraw or develop tantrums or behavior problems. For other individuals, it may mean a voice which becomes more and more hoarse, periodically "giving out" completely.

Disorders of communication affect people of all ages intelligence, and economic levels. It is never too early to suspect; in fact, sometimes speech-language deficits are the early warning signs of an underlying medical condition. These communication disorders are generally divided into four categories: language, articulation, voice, and fluency.

Language disturbances affect one's ability to understand what is said (for example, to know what a single word means, or to follow long directions), or to put thoughts into words (e.g. to name things or to be able to say complete sentences). Infants during their first year may have language delays in recognizing words and connections. Language problems in older children may lead to troubles in school. For adults, language disturbances may affect memory or the ability to find the right word for something. Any head injury or stroke may result in language impairment.

Another category, articulation disorders, applies to the way words and sounds are pronounced. Many people think of a lisp ("thoup" instead of "soup") as an example of an articulation disorder. Sometimes the problem is confined to one sound; sometimes it affects many sounds making speech very difficult to understand. Although we often associate misarticulation with children, some adults who never had therapy available as children continue to "mispronounce" sounds. In addition, anyone may ex-

"Adams apple" or "voice box"). Disease and inflamation of the throat/vocal folds may also affect voice. As a result many different things may happen; voice may sound hoarse, harsh, nasal, stuffed up, gravelly, strained, breathy, too high or low, or too loud or quiet.



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

Although it may sound pretty bleak, each of the above disorder types, may be treated in speech-language therapy. The earlier detection is made, the greater the outlook for improvement. This holds true for infants as well as senior citizens, and everyone in between.

Diagnosis and treatment of communication disorders is done by Speech-Language Pathologists who have master's degrees, and are certified by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association. Services are available in hospitals, health centers, public schools, university clinics, and some private offices. Insurance and public assistance coverage is generally available for services when there is a charge.

Does speech-language therapy make a difference? Here is what some Charlestown mothers have said:

"Everyone thinks she is talking so much better... I can understand everything. Wish I knew about this therapy program before."

"My son is now able to convey his wants and dislikes in actual words rather than grunts and groans and yelling. Although he is only 2½...the steady progress he is making in his speech makes him feel good about himself."

If you or a member of your family may be affected by a communication disorder, consult a Speech-Language Pathologist. If no problem exists, or if it is a minor one for which suggestions can be given, your mind will be at ease. If your suspicions are right, not only will you have identified a problem, but you'll be on your way to solving it.



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
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The "Isaac Hull" Collection Now At The USS Constitution Museum

Beginning May 12, 1983, the USS Constitution Museum in the Charlestown Navy Yard is displaying for the first time anywhere a stunning collection of treasures from the age of fighting sail, the Captain Isaac Hull Collection.

The collection, which is on indefinite loan to the Museum from Mrs. Roger C. Elliot. a collateral descendant of Captain Hull. includes prizes he won during the War of 1812 as captain of USS Constitution. personal belongings, and a wealth of archival material. Additional pieces pertaining to Hull are on loan to the Constitution Museum by the Wadsworth Atheneum, Hartford; the Old Derby Historical

Society, Derby, CT; the Peabody Museum of Salem; and the New Haven Colony Historical Society, New Haven, CT.

The centerpiece of the Collection are the prizes that were showered on Hull following Constitution's victory over HMS Guerriere in the early days of the War of 1812. Hull was an instant hero, and grateful people from Maine to the Carolinas hastened to commemorate Hull.

made for Hull by Philadelphia silversmiths Fletcher and Gardiner, a flatware. The silver and china were in use by members of Hull's family until very recently.

There will also be several important 19th century paintings included in the exhibition, most notably Gilbert Stuart's 1807 portrait of Hull, last publicly exhibited at the old Museum of Fine Arts in Copley Square in the 1890s. Four 1812 paintings of the engagement with Guerriere by Michael Felice Corne are on loan from the New Haven Colony Historical Society, and a circa-1833 portrait of

gift from the citizens of that city. The governor of the State of Connecticut ordered equally lavish gifts to be given to Hull by his home state. Some of the finest craftsmen of the era were commissioned: Nathan Starr of Middletown, CT, fabricated a dress sword and scabbard of gold and damascus steel, and Simeon North, whose shop neighborhood Starr's in Middletown, fashioned a pair of .58 calibre goldmounted walnut duelling pistols. These three pieces are considered to be among the finest examples of early 19th century American artisanry extant.

The City of Charleston, South Carolina, presented Hull with a six-piece gold-on-silver tea service, each piece engraved with a tribute to Hull's skill and bravery. Ironically, the service was made in England, by the London firm of A.P. & W. Bateman.

Many of Hull's personal possessions are also included in the Collection: A Dutch tall case clock. walnut veneer on walnut. that Hull brought back in Constitution from a trip to The Netherlands in 1811; his gold pocket watch and eyeglasses; a gold-framed oil-on-ivory miniature that contains a braided lock of hair. Three pieces of the Hull family Chinese export hard-paste porcelain tableware are included, as well as a setting of silver

Mrs. Hull has been loaned by the Wadsworth Atheneum. A painting of Constitution being chased by a British squadron by Julian O. Davidson (1882) is from the Constitution Museum's own collection, a gift of the New York Yacht Club.

Among Hull's many accolades were two medals; one a gold Congressional medal (engraved by John Reich in 1812-1813) bearing a much-imitated rendering of the duel between Constitution and Guerriere, and one an extremely rare medal designed by Major

Pierre Charles L'Enfant in 1783 and presented to Hull by the Society of the Cincinnati, who made him an honorary member in 1816.

The exhibition "ISAAC HULL, A Forgotten American Hero'' will be at the USS Constitution Museum, adjacent to "Old Ironsides" in the Charlestown Navy Yard, from May 12, 1983 through September, 1984.

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
