Cadet Suspended For Slow Response To Elderly Women

A Boston Police cadet has been put on a two-day suspension following his failure to dispatch a request for help by two elderly Charlestown residents living in the Mary Colbert Apartments on Devens Street.

Last Sunday, the two elderly women both called police following assaults on them from three teen-aged girls who illegally entered the elderly complex and were abusing the facilities. Although the calls were placed at 2:15 p.m., police did not show up until 5 p.m.

According to one woman, who prefers that her name not be used, the three girls, estimated to be 13 years old, had been in the complex several times before, asking to borrow sugar, foil and butter to make

cookies. The girls told the victim that they were granddaughters of one of the other tenants.

The victim said she finally realized that the girls were trespassing when they solicited 75¢ donations for St. Mary's School, a school which has been closed a number of years. At this point the woman warned the girls to leave or she would call the police.

Later in the afternoon she and another tenant of the Colbert Apartments came across the girls in the Lounge area of the complex. The area's furniture had been completely rearranged into the kitchen and both areas were littered with tonic cans and wrappers.

One woman told the girls

to clean up before she would hand over their jackets. At this point the girls struck and knocked both women to the ground and scurried out of the complex.

Police are searching for the girls, believed to be Charlestown residents. Good descriptions were given the police. Deputy Superintendent Joseph Saia said that the cadet felt he did not have adequate information to dispatch a patrolman to the scene of the incident. However, after reviewing the tape on which all calls are recorded, it was found that the cadet did have adequate information and should have dispatched a patrol car to help the elderly women.

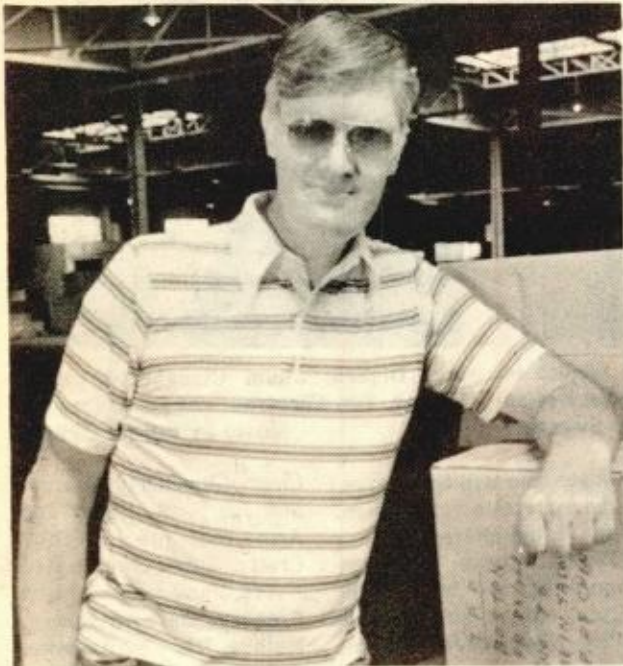

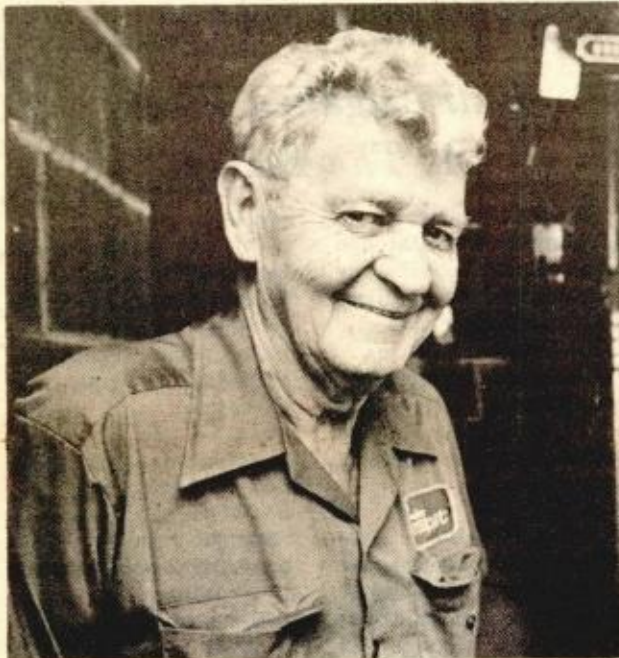
Massport Honors Two Charlestown Residents

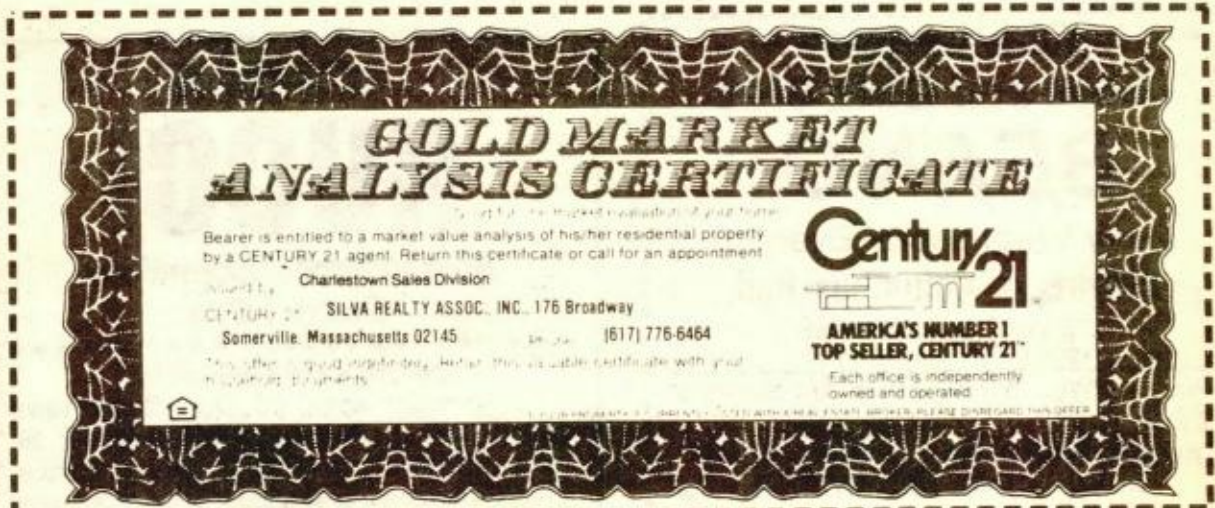

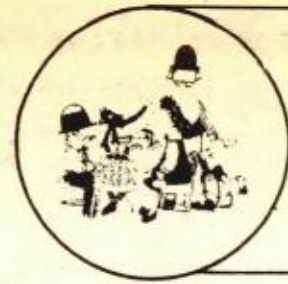

"Back To School" Program Being Planned

by Maria Girvin
 School drop-outs or those who wish to acquire their high school diplomas and reside in the Bunker Hill Housing Project may find an alternative to a G.E.D. program in a Back to School Program being designed by Life Focus

Center Director Jack Millerick.

Recently funding for Millerick's program was approved by the Bunker Hill Housing Project Tenant Task Force for \$80,000. Although, no contract has been signed nor has any money passed hands, negotiations between Millerick, the task force and Boston Housing Authority (BHA) have been ongoing for several months.

The funding for Millerick's program will be made possible through a \$1/4 million grant

allocated by BHA to the task force for the purpose of creating a multi-service unit in the project at 76 Monument Street, according to Task Force member Mary MacInnes.

Although the task force had hoped to see the program implemented this fall, Millerick and Elaine Gross of BHA do not see the program in full swing until the first of the year.

The BHA is committed to working with Charlestown to help their kids back into school. However, we are still in the discussion stage as to

the design and running of the program Jack Millerick has proposed. By the first of next year, we hope to have something funded," said Gross.

While Gross explained that no formal needs assessment has yet been done, Millerick, in his proposal, has estimated that approximately 125 to 150 teens between the ages of 13 and 19 have dropped out of school. He estimates there is a total drop-out population between the ages of 13 and 26 of over 750.

Millerick agreed with Gross on conducting a needs assessment saying that a consulting firm may have to be called in to perform the job before the program can be implemented.

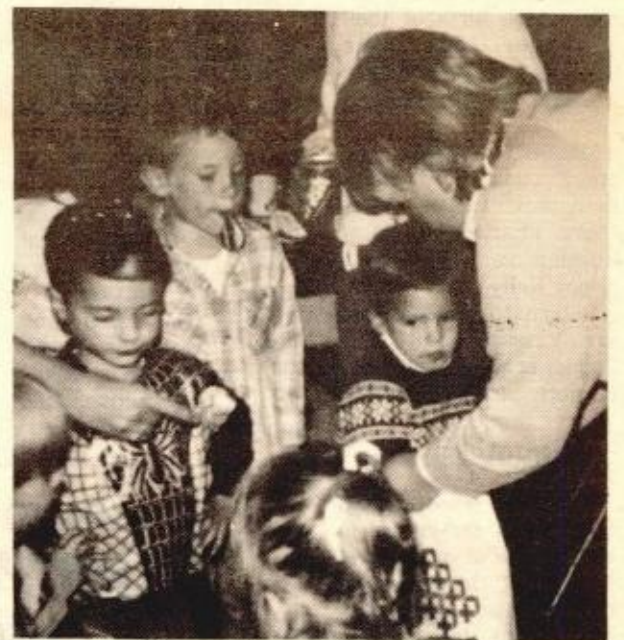
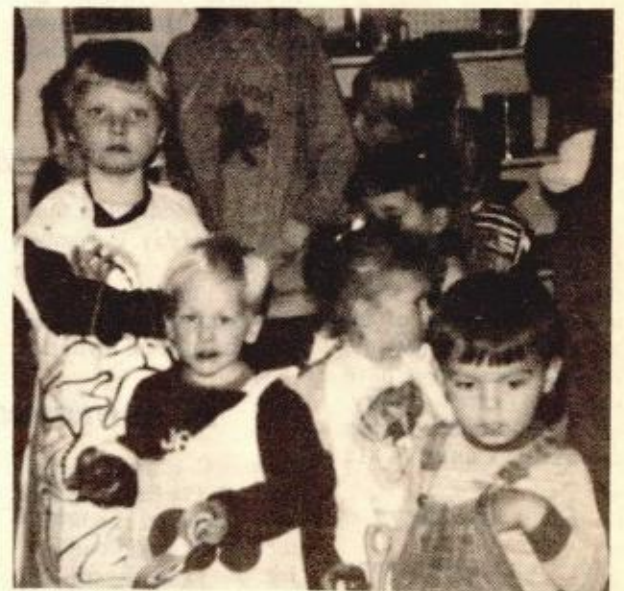
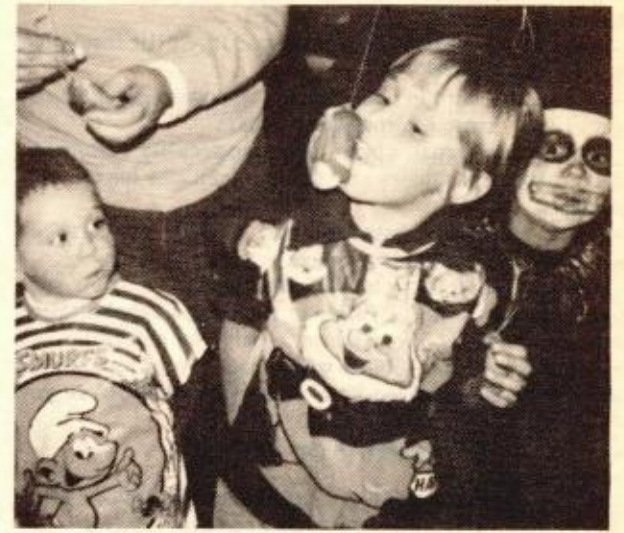
Although the multi-service building is not expected to be completed by January, 1984, Millerick will begin the back-to-school program in available space at the Life Focus Center located in City Square. Presently Millerick is interviewing for a director of this program.

The back-to-school program is only one of several additional programs expected to be funded by the multi-service center. Once completed, the task force will accept bids from other community organizations for programs which will benefit those living in the Bunker Hill Housing Project. Already the task force has hired Community Organizer John Ballard who is helping the task force identify the needs of their tenants and seek resources and programs that will help meet these needs.

Under The State House Dome

Historic Election For Boston City Council

Twenty-six candidates are jockeying for election to the nine district and four-at-large seats in the newly-constituted Boston City Council, an historic confrontation for the so-called "Council of the 80's" which will replace the present nine-member body.

With this sweeping change in city government will come major complications - confused further by the fact there will also be a brand new mayor - and at least one of the seven incumbent councillors seeking re-election is doomed for defeat in that five of them are bidding for only four at-large seats.

Judging from the primary results, Council President Joseph M. Tierney and Councillors Albert L. (Dapper) O'Neil and Christopher A. Iannella appear reasonably sure of re-election. The fourth at-large seat, however, will be hotly contested by incumbents Terence P. McDermott and Michael J. McCormack and School Committee woman Jean Sullivan McKeigue. In the primary, McDermott led fifth-place McCormack by some 9,000 votes and Sullivan-McKeigue by an even heftier margin.

Biggest surprise of the primary was the disappointing finish by Councillor McCormack, a hardworking and effective worker whose leadership ability would be an asset to what will be a new and largely inexperienced Council. McCormack carried an extra burden in that contest: the illness of his 73-year-old father who reentered the hospital after suffering a setback in his battle with cancer. At one point, McCormack almost dropped from the race because his father's illness took the emphasis away from his personal campaigning.

A graduate of Catholic Memorial, Boston State College and Suffolk Law School, McCormack is a former Boston teacher and onetime assistant attorney general who was raised in Brighton's Fidelis Way housing project. He's the only councillor endorsed by elderly activist Frank Manning for his work on housing, elderly affairs, tenants' rights and health care issues.

Buoyed by drawing the No. 1 spot on the election ballot, McCormack's other endorsements include the Boston Tenants Campaign Organization, many labor unions and a veritable

"who's who" of Massachusetts Democrats, including names like Dukakis, Bellotti, Scaccia, DiMasi, Serra, Galvin, Voke and Paul White.

Iannella will stick with the techniques that has already earned him 11 terms on the council and a ticket-topping spot in the primary - direct mailing, a few radio ads, high visibility and name recognition.

"Dapper" O'Neil the "common man's candidate," a solid second-place in the primary, will target veteran groups for special attention as the only veteran in the race and continue to emphasize that he is a full-time working councillor with a proud record of constituent service.

Tierney will emphasize his background strengths at a time of dramatic change in city government, the need for the "stability and experience" he possesses.

While a new Council will come into being after the election, there is high expectation that the enlarged body will prove more effective and truly representative despite what will be its newness and inexperience. Oldtimers recall

that the former 22-man council that was the predecessor to the present council had performed effectively until dismantled in 1951 for mainly political considerations.

Whatever happens, it will be a government body less responsive to whoever is mayor and should be more thoughtful of the unique requirements of the various neighborhoods

than the present council. In the final analysis, change should be healthy.

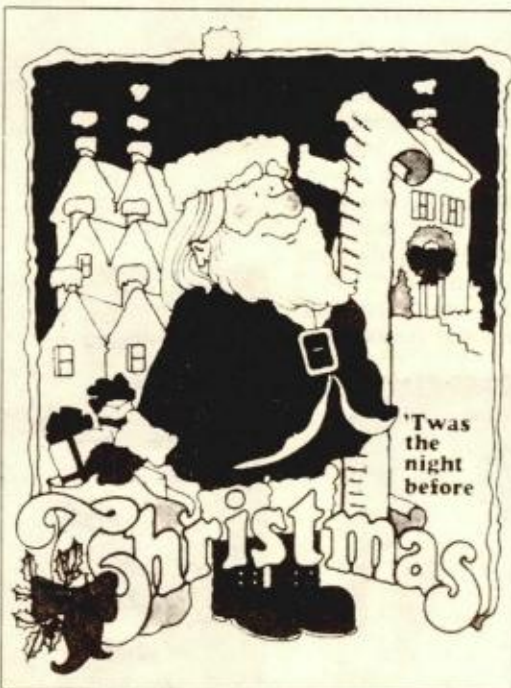

In their tribute to her, the Life Focus Center held a ribbon cutting ceremony, dedicating their newly-built kitchen to her.

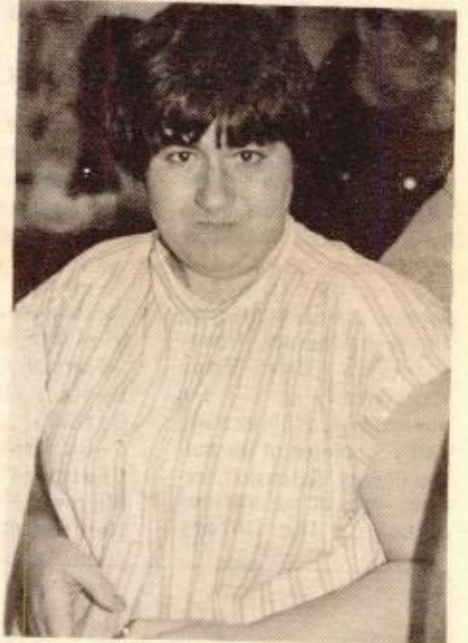

IN CASE OF INJURY FROM SPORTS**

Our children are constantly involved in soccer, football and many other sports throughout the year. We must always be aware of the possibility of injury to the mouth and teeth.

Although most injuries are minor and heal quickly, occasionally a tooth will be completely knocked out. If this happens, the tooth should be kept moist by placing it in a wet towel or tissue. Immediately contact your family dentist. In many cases, the tooth can be repositioned in its proper location. Usually it is secured with a wire or plastic splint to aid in healing. The degree of success varies and greatly depends on obtaining professional care in the shortest possible time.

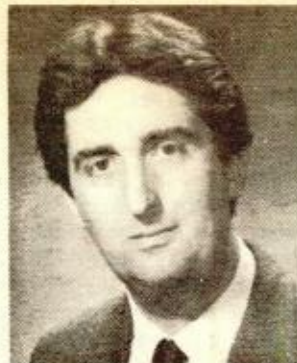
The Tigers defeated league rivals Bishop Fenwick, St. Gregory's, and St. Mary's of Lawrence twice each, while also beating

The Kent/Charlestown Council Election was held last week. Five new members were elected and three current members were re-elected. People should look for flyers in stores along Main Street and Bunker Hill Street explaining the programs. Also look for the article in this week's Patriot entitled "See You At The Prom." The article contains much information on how these programs work and what is required of participants.

The Kent/Charlestown will be initiating a number of evening school classes in January. We are looking for individuals who can teach sewing, cooking (especially Chinese cooking), crafts, woodworking, furniture repair/restoration, photography, filmmaking, CPR/health

and exercise, nutrition, ceramics, business math, shorthand, creative writing. These classes will be held at the Charlestown High School Community School and will be available on a fee basis to adults in Charlestown. Anyone with these skills should call the Community School Office weekdays. This is a good way for people with talent to share that skill with their neighbors and earn some money at the same time.

This is the last week anyone can sign up to take the GED Test scheduled for this month. The Test will be offered at the High School Community School on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday, November 14th, 16th and 17th. Please note that the Test was originally scheduled for Tuesday, November 15th. Since that is Election Day we have changed the night to Monday, November 14th.

See You At The Prom

The GED program at the Kent/Charlestown Community School is now in its second year. Last year, thirty-one program participants were awarded GED certificates at a celebration, attended by Boston City Councillor Ray Flynn.

The GED (General Educational Development) is also known as the high school equivalency certificate. To receive the GED, a person must pass five separate tests and achieve a minimum average score on all five combined. The tests are in the areas of reading, writing, math, social studies, and science.

Classes at the community school help to prepare students for these tests. The program is open to anyone 16 or older who has officially withdrawn from school. Many of the students in the program have been out of school for a long time or are unsure about the idea of returning to school. Because each person's educational background is so different, classes are designed so students can work at their

own pace in the areas they need to study. Generally classes are small, and tutors are available to assist students on an individual basis.

The GED tests are given right at the community school every other month. Anyone who registers ahead of time may take one or more of the tests. There is a \$5.00 registration fee, and a cost of \$3.00 for each test.

Since the community school has both a GED program and a diploma program, many people get confused about which one is best for them. Unfortunately there is no simple answer to this question. What's right for one person may not make sense for you. Your choice depends on many things, such as how good your skills are, how much time you're willing to put into an educational program, your reason for going back to school, plans you might have for your future, and how much you already know.

For many people, the GED is likely to be easier and quicker to get. The GED tests are mainly concerned with how well you read, do mathematical computations, and recognize rules of grammar. The tests require very little previous knowledge even in the areas of science and social studies. Since the tests are multiple-choice people may get an answer right just by guessing.

The external diploma, on the other hand, measures not only your basic skills, but also your understanding of subjects that affect your daily life, like consumer economics and health. Some of this will already be familiar to you from your personal experience. To get your diploma, you are expected to show that you can apply what you've learned to realistic situations, such as comparison shopping or finding out where in your community you can apply for fuel assistance.

Some employers and colleges prefer the diploma to the GED. The Armed Services, especially the Air Force, do not tend to honor the GED these days. It is not clear at this time how the GED and the diploma will compare in the future.

If you are undecided whether to get a GED or a high school diploma, you can begin to work on your basic skills while you're making up your mind. You can always switch from one to the other, or go for both. You may find that talking to people who have gotten one or the other can help you in making this decision.

On October 21, 1983, Officers observed a car being operated in an erratic manner on Bunker Hill Street. When the officers stopped the car, at the corner of Bunker Hill Street and Green Street, they observed the driver to be in an intoxicated state. The driver failed the field sobriety test, was unsteady on his feet, and had slurred speech. The suspect was taken to Area A, where he was read his rights and booked. The suspect also refused to take a breathalyzer test.

The suspect was a 41 year old West Roxbury man. He was arraigned the following morning at Charlestown District Court.

On October 22, 1983, Officers responded to a call of a burglary at a residence on Kingston Street. Upon arrival, the officers spoke to the victim, who told officers that some person or persons unknown, entered his apartment through either the front door or the skylight. The person(s), took a Sony 15 inch color TV, a Panasonic phone answering machine, and 14K gold cuff links. The detective unit of Area A is investigating this incident.

On October 24, 1983, Officers received information that there could possibly be a break in that would take place in the area of Main Street. The informer told police that the suspect was possibly armed. At approximately 3:30 a.m., Officers responded to an alarm going off on Main Street. The officers were unable to apprehend the suspect. The officers interviewed several neighbors and obtained a description of the suspect. There was no entry gained of the

building, although the suspect broke a large pane of glass. All of this information was given to the detectives at Area A, and they are investigating this incident.

On October 26, 1983, Detectives from the Auto Squad observed an East Boston man attaching stolen plates to a car on Pearl Street. The plate was reported stolen in Revere in January. The Detectives questioned the man about the plate. The auto investigator at Area A will obtain complaints from the Charlestown District Court.

Stolen cars were recovered in the following locations in the past week: On October 26, 1983, Main Street, Dunstable Street, Terminal Street, Elm Street. On October 27, 1983, Polk Street, Main Street, and Cross Street.

Facts About Drugs — F.A.D.

"I have had one bad trip on L.S.D. how can I be more careful next time?"

There is really no answer to this and there really is no way to prevent a bad trip! But it is important to know that friends around a person on a bad trip should keep the atmosphere as gentle and calm as possible, and should not leave the person alone. In cases when the person becomes uncontrollable, it is best to seek medical assistance or call a hot line for help.

L.S.D. (Lysercic Acid Diethylamide) is very much around, and has been since 1938. It is one of the most potent mood altering chemicals, a hallucinogen and is usually taken in tablet or capsule form. During the 1950's and 1960's L.S.D. experimentation was legally conducted in all sorts of therapy including psychotherapy for terminal cancer and mind exploration of all sorts. Now people use it to escape, for relief from anxiety, etc.

The effects are usually felt 30-60 minutes after an oral dose: euphoria, clumsiness, giddiness, Elusions of geometric shapes, patterns, electric colors and distorted shapes are common experiences. There seem to be profound insight flooding the mind. Tolerance, the need to take larger and larger doses to produce the same effects, develops quickly. This phenomenon will carry over to tolerance of other hallucinogens such as mescaline and PCP.

No withdrawal systems are evident when a person discontinues use. But there are cases of users craving for the intoxication, though research concerning this is not complete! Common unpleasant reactions to acid are: intoxication of fears, panic, great confusion, extreme anxiety, accompanied by unpleasant sensory images. During a bad trip, the user may feel the experience will never end or they will go crazy. Flashbacks are experiences in which certain parts of the original drug experience happen again without taking the drug again. They may happen anywhere, sometimes brought on with stress or other drugs such as pot. No one really knows the cause of flashbacks and they become less frequent over time.

Again, a person should be handled with care and calm during these experiences. The danger that PCP has been added to L.S.D. is very real and many unexpected reactions are complicated by this. "Mescaline" is often PCP and combinations.

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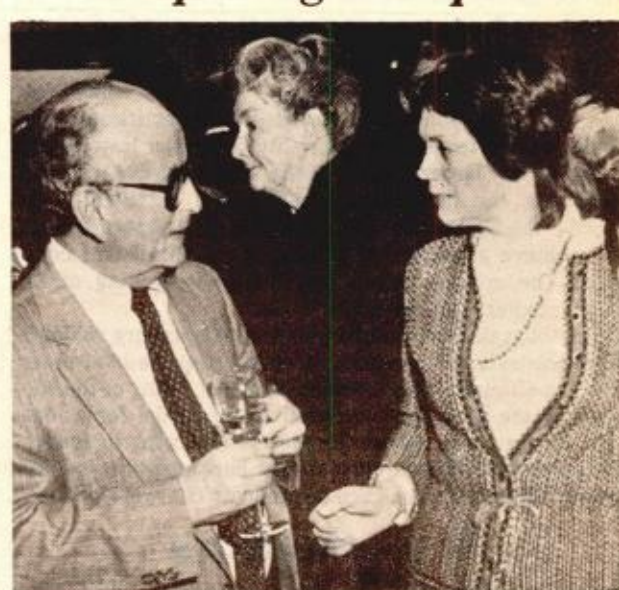

Spring Bulbs

Remember last February, when it seemed as if the cold, snow, and grayness of winter would never end? And then, poking up through the snowy mud, was a little shoot of green, soon to bloom and bring the promise of warmth and spring. Now is the time to plant those spring bulbs around your home to brighten your spirits during the next dreary February.

Spring bulbs flower from February to June. The actual dates vary by weather conditions and planting locations (beds facing south or in the warmer soil next to the house foundation flower earlier) but the sequence remains the same. The earliest bulbs are snowdrops, crocus, winter aconite and iris reticulata, followed by grape hyacinth, daffodil and anemone, then hyacinth, narcissus, and squill, and finally dutch iris and allium in early summer. Many varieties of tulips, a traditional favorite, are available and you can choose early, mid-season, or late flowering types. With a little planning, you can enjoy a continuous, changing array of flowers through early, mid-season, or late flowering types. Before planting, consider the effect you will create. The two main methods of planting are grouping and naturalizing. Grouping means that the bulbs are placed at regular intervals for a more formal display. Naturalizing is a method of scattering the bulbs for a random, "natural" effect. The bulbs are dropped by handfuls over the area, and planted where they land. Generally, larger bulbs like tulips and hyacinths are grouped, and smaller bulbs like daffodils, snowdrops and crocus are naturalized.

Spring flowering bulbs are planted in the fall before deep frost hardens the ground so that the bulbs can form a root system and become acclimatized. Bulbs don't require much care, but do need a well-drained, slightly acid soil (pH 6.0). To prepare the bed, spade the soil to a depth of 12-18 inches and mix compost or dried manure and bonemeal (at the rate of 5 pounds to 100 squarefeet) with the soil, allowing the ground to settle for a few days. If you prefer to plant each bulb separately, add a few cups of compost or manure and a cup of bone meal to each hole dug. Large bulbs are planted about 6 to 8 inches deep and spaced 5 inches apart, smaller bulbs about 3 to 4 inches deep and 2 to 3 inches apart. Place the bulbs firmly in the soil, and make sure that the pointed ends are facing up. Cover the bulbs with an inch of soil, and water; then finish filling the hole with soil and water again. If you wish, mulch to a depth of three inches can cover the bulbs to protect them during the freezing cold of winter, but the mulch should be pulled away when the bulbs sprout.

Bulbs are available everywhere now, from grocery and hardware stores to nurseries. When choosing your bulbs, check to make sure that each bulb is firm, not shriveled or marked by soft spots. Heat or rough handling causes the bulbs to deteriorate, so keep them cool and plant soon after purchase. Once the bulbs are planted in the ground, you can look forward to many colorful springs.

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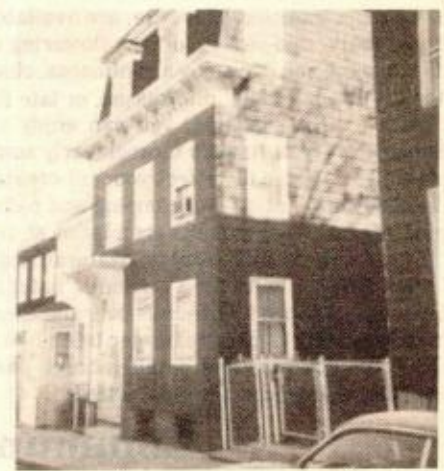
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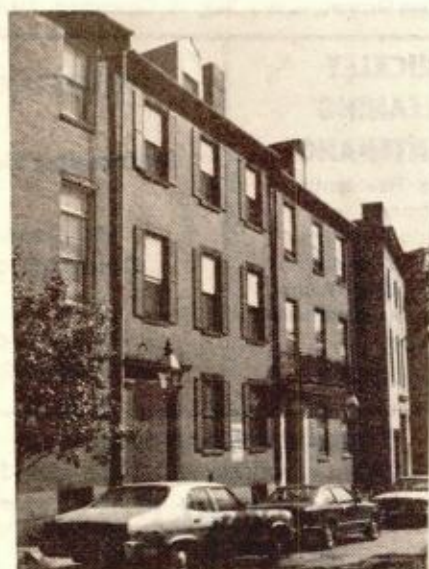
