### Kennedy Secures Air Conditioning For 100 Ferrin Street

It will be a cooler summer for residents of the Charlestown Elderly Apartments.

A year after the Ferrin Street elderly housing opened, Congressman Joe Kennedy secured a commitment from federal officials to install air conditioning in the 42-unit building. "This is great news for the residents of the development," said Kennedy.

Kennedy continued, "When we dedicated the project last year, I joined with Mayor Thomas Menino, Councillor Diane Modica, Rep. Richard Voke and Sen Thomas Birmingham in promising to do everything we could to keep our elderly cool during the hot summer months."

The federally-funded development was constructed with air conditioning ducts but until this week, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development had balked at installing a central air conditioning unit.

In a letter to Kennedy this week, the chief of HUD's multifamily housing division promised to have the air conditioning set up and running by June 15.

The development was funded through the HUD Section 202 Program with the support of Kennedy. After the June 1995 dedication, residents petitioned HUD for the installation of air conditioning and worked with Kennedy and other local elected officials to secure the agreement.

"I'm pleased, but not surprised to see Cong. Kennedy effectively resolve yet another need of Charlestown's residents. When we contacted him about the air conditioning situation, he dropped everything else and made it his top priority. I am happy to join with him in announcing a solution to this problem," commented Voke.

Modica stated, "The Charlestown community is fortunate to have such an able leader as Cong. Kennedy. Once again, he has delivered on a commitment to the residents of Charlestown.

"I was pleased to join with our delegation, including Mayor Menino, Sen. Birmingham and Rep. Voke, to ensure that health concerns of our elderly citizens are pushed to the forefront and have been advanced so that the residents of 100 Ferrin St. can have many comfortable summers in a building that they have come to love," added Modica.



### State Treasury Seeks To Return \$85 Million In Unclaimed Property

State Treasurer Joe Malone announced that the treasurer's office has compiled a list of individuals and organizations who have money waiting for them under the commonwealth's abandoned property law.

The list was published in the form of a free-standing insert in the Boston Sunday Herald on Feb. 25 and in the Boston Globe on March 3. The local list appears on page 5 of this week's Patriot.

"This year, over \$85 million has been turned over to my office as unclaimed property," Malone said. "I urge every citizen to check the abandoned

property listing."

Accounts which have been inactive for more than three years are declared abandoned and turned over to the treasurer's office for safekeeping. Unclaimed property consists of any financial asset that has not had any owner-generated activity for an extended period of time.

This includes savings accounts, checking accounts, unpaid wages or commissions, stocks, underlying shares, uncashed dividends, customer deposits or overpayments, certificates of deposit, credit balances, refunds, money orders, paid-up life in-

surance policies and uncashed benefit checks.

In accordance with the Mass. Unclaimed Property Act, property becomes "unclaimed" when there is no owner-generated activity on a financial asset for a three year period, 15 years in the case of travelers checks. Under the law, the "holders" (banks, insurance companies, businesses, etc.) must make a determined effort to locate the true owner. If they are unsuccessful, they are to report the names and last known addresses of the owners to the treasurer's office, where additional efforts are made to locate the owners. The money is

then deposited in the General Fund. There is no time limit on claiming abandoned property. Owners and their heirs need not pay a finder's fee to anyone to claim what rightfully belongs to them. All funds accrue interest until claimed.

Anyone who sees their name on the unclaimed property list may call the treasurer's office at 367-0400, Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. When calling, respondents should give the name as it appears on the list, plus current address, address three years ago, social security number, and daytime telephone number.

### Voke's Copayment Reform Could Save Insured Millions

Continuing to wage a battle against industry giants, Rep Richard Voke's recent victory to change the calculations on certain copayments could save policy holders millions of dollars. Attacking the way the industry charges copayments owed to hospitals who have discount agreements with insurers, Voke says policy holders should pay a copayment based on the discounted hospital charge, not the retail charge as is the current practice.

"Presently, a typical policy holder with a 20 percent copayment would pay \$200 on a \$1,000 surgery bill. Yet, in many cases, the insurance company has negotiated their own discount with the hospital, as high as 50 percent or greater. While the insurer in this would save \$500 with a 50 percent discount, the policy holder would actually pay 40 percent of the bill. This is very wrong, so I have acted to reform the system," said Voke, a respected consumer advocate.

Under Voke's plan, copayments would be based on the reduced rate. In the example Voke cited above, the copayment would be reduced to \$100, saving the policy holder \$100.

Although the bill still needs Senate approval, Voke's message is making its way through the insur-

ance community. At least one major insurer, Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Mass., recently testified that it has established Jan. 1, 1996 as the date it will base copayments for hospitalization on the lesser of the retail or discounted rate. Others are expected to follow.

"It is tough enough for many to afford copayments without being charged double or triple what they should actually pay. While righting this wrong, I will continue to press the insurance industry for other reforms which make insurance more affordable and responsible to consumers," concluded Voke.



"Doherty Park and other urban spaces continue to remain as critical today as nearly a century ago when they were envisioned as respites from urban life. With the grant money we previously authorized being dedicated to improvements in Doherty Park and our continued commitment to support other funding programs to address the future needs of our urban park network, we are certain to provide the 'seeds' to allow our parks' significance in our community to 'grow' even further, added

As part of the Open Space Bond Bill they just championed, Birmingham and Voke succeeded in reauthorizing the urban park grant program, the source of funding for the Doherty Park project. That program is now accepting applications for the next grant cycle. Additionally, Charlestown's legislators were also able to establish a new program dedicated to future preservation of the state's Olmsted Parks, like Doherty Park.

Birmingham noted that "another authorization targeted to the priorities of city dwellers and initiated in the Legislature is a \$2 million grant program to demolish abandoned buildings and convert the properties into parks or recre-

As the Charlestown Patriot reported in February, plans for the Doherty renovation include upgrading the stairs, pathways and "look-out" rest areas. Boston is adding \$164,000 to the project for a total of \$455,000 in improvements. Work is scheduled to begin this spring.

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#### WHAT EVERY SPOUSE SHOULD KNOW BEFORE SIGNING A JOINT RETURN

The advantage of filing a joint tax return is well known - you generally save money compared to filing separately. However, there is at least one potential disadvantage. Both spouses are jointly and severally liable for the entire income tax bill, including interest and penalties, even if one earned most or all the income.

This issue most commonly arises when there are unpaid taxes from joint filing years, and a couple later separates or divorces. The IRS can pursue either spouse for the full amount. If you're the easiest one to find, or if you have liquid assets, you can end up paying the entire bill.

When this happens, the only relief is the so-called innocent spouse rule. If you can prove that you had no reason to suspect tax shortfalls and you did not personally benefit from unreported income, or that you signed joint returns only under duress, you may get off the hook. Unfortunately, this is easier said than done. The IRS and the courts have been notoriously stingy in allowing innocent spouse relief.

What can you do to head off trouble? First, consider the obvious. If your family spends much more money than the income shown on your tax returns, warning lights should go off. If you don't understand all the tax and financial issues in the joint return, ask questions. In certain circumstances, you may even want to consider hiring your own tax professional to advise you before signing.

If you are headed toward separation or divorce, it may be best to file separately. You may pay a little more tax, but that's better than leaving yourself liable for the tax sins of someone who is no longer on your side. Don't file jointly unless you're sure that all income has been reported in the return, and the taxes have actually been paid.

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
