

# Hundreds Attend Wednesday's Parksley Library Groundbreaking

Parksley has had lots to celebrate lately, but Wednesday's groundbreaking for the new library might have been the biggest of them all. Hundreds, including Gov. Ralph Northam, Sen. Lynwood Lewis, Del. Robert Bloxom, and students from Metompkin Elementary School, turned out for the galvanizing event.

"I like to see projects start and finish," said Bloxom. "What we're going to see today —this is years in the coming. Finally, we got all the pieces together and we're going to have a great regional library," Bloxom told a reporter shortly before the groundbreaking started.

"It truly takes a village — it takes a team —to make things like this library

happen," Northam told those gathered, before acknowledging the contributions of volunteers, local elected officials, and Bloxom and Lewis.

"We don't have but so many cookies in the cookie jar in Richmond, but you made this a priority," Northam said, addressing Lewis and Bloxom about the \$1.5 million in state funds secured for the library.

Lewis, who grew up on nearby Adelaide Street in Parksley, said he was "tremendously excited" to see the town as the home of the new library. "And the crowd speaks to how the community is excited as well," he said just before the event started.

# District 4 Supervisor Candidates Kabler and Leatherbury Face Off

The Northampton County Board of Supervisors has two candidates, David Kabler and Dixon Leatherbury, vying for its District 4 seat.

They faced off at a forum hosted by Citizens For a Better Eastern Shore Oct. 17 at Occohannock Elementary School after introducing themselves to the audience.

Leatherbury grew up on the Eastern Shore, and the Machipongo farmer is the current chair of the Northampton planning commission. Kabler moved from Virginia Beach to the Shore about 30 years ago. He also lives in Machipongo and is a real estate agent. He is the current chair of the Northampton County Parks and Recreation advisory board.

The candidates alternated as the first to answer each question. The first three questions and topics of discussion were provided in advance.

Town Hall Meetings Leatherbury did not advocate specifically for town hall meetings, but he (Continued on Page 4)

"The libraries have not become passé," said Richard Lewis, chairman of the Library Project Steering Committee, pointing out new libraries had been built recently in Crisfield, Md., and Berlin, Md., and upgrades to the Salisbury, Md., library.

"For the folks who have given their time, money: Your dream becomes a reality today when we stick shovels in that pile of dirt," Richard Lewis said, referring to soil piled on top of the parking lot of the old Fresh Pride grocery store. The building is being remodeled to house the library and the Eastern Shore of Virginia Heritage Center.

"No one is happier than me that construction is finally beginning," said District 5 Supervisor Harrison Phillips. He thanked Northam, Lewis, and Bloxom for securing state funds and thanked Board Chairman Donald Hart for allowing him to speak for the board of supervisors at the groundbreaking. "He knows how much this project has meant to me from the very beginning." Phillips' district abuts Parksley and he manages the Jaxon's Hardware store in downtown Parksley.

In addition to the \$1.5 million from the state, Accomack County kicked in \$2 million. The remaining \$1.5 million was raised by the Eastern Shore Public Library Foundation through fundraisers, capital campaigns, grants, and a loan.

A library board construction committee worked with Waller, Todd, and Sadler, now a Woolpert Company, of Virginia Beach, to design the 20,837-square-foot facility. Its construction is being overseen by Accomack County.

Anticipate another celebration when the library opens, expected around the end of next year.

supports an "open-door policy" for discussing county issues with citizens. He plans to provide his email address and cell phone number to his constituents, and he noted citizen input is welcomed at all public meetings.

Kabler said he would host meetings for issues of "widespread community interest" such as Northampton's comprehensive plan or zoning ordinance, major infrastructure projects, and town or county debt.

#### **Declining and Aging Population**

To serve the elderly better, Kabler called for more EMS training and equipment and possible expansion of an "unsung hero," Star Transit.

A community center would provide the elderly – and all citizens – opportunities for recreation, socialization, exercise, and health screenings, he said.

He encourages youth who go off to college to return to the Shore as teachers, medical professionals, and business owners.

"One major decision the county fac-

es is whether we wish to be a retirement community or a viable and dynamic place for people of all ages to live," Leatherbury said.

He agreed Star Transit is a "real gem" and said the county should reduce the need for public transportation by developing town edge districts (areas adjacent to incorporated towns), including building multi-family housing and businesses within walking distance of one another.

#### Sea-Level Rise

Leatherbury said the county shouldn't spend money on unnecessary projects in "threatened areas." He recommended enforcing the Chesapeake Bay Preservation Act and reconsidering which lots the county considers "buildable."

"I understand the allure of waterfront property. It's beautiful and relaxing and can provide recreation. However, it comes with its own set of risks to its owners."

Kabler added that waterfront property owners should be aware that first responders may not be able to reach them in an emergency. The comprehensive plan must include a plan to combat sea-level rise and recurrent flooding, and high residential density in floodprone areas should be discouraged.

The remaining questions were written and submitted by audience members.

#### **Poultry House Setbacks**

Kabler identified Northampton's current, "healthy" poultry house setbacks as 1,000 feet from a property line or road, 1,500 feet from a town, and 2,000 feet from the shoreline. He is a "staunch opponent" of poultry houses as they exist in Accomack County.

The question suggested that Leatherbury advocates for a 200-foot poultry house setback, but he rejected the notion and called the current setbacks a "closed issue."

#### **Broadband Internet**

The Eastern Shore of Virginia Broadband Authority (ESVBA) is building out its infrastructure and providing public institutions and private businesses and homes with direct access to high-speed internet via fiber optic cable.

Leatherbury said ESVBA is "doing a great job, and they're doing it without being subsidized by the county." He acknowledged that ESVBA managers cannot speed up the buildout or they will "burn up all of their capital and not be able to continue operation."


Kabler added that the county cannot speed up the extension of its fiber optics, but it can support a technology center that will feature broadband access and shared workspaces. Such a facility is planned for Exmore.

#### **Unaddressed Issues**

The candidates were asked which issues have been largely "ignored" in Northampton County.

Early childhood education was Kabler's answer. He believes Northampton should have more public educational services for young children with "autism and other types of disabilities" like his 6-year-old grandson, who receives services in Accomack. "Northampton needs to do a better job at that," Kabler said.

The housing gap was Leatherbury's answer. About 24% of Northampton citizens live in poverty, and even "moderate income" individuals like teachers have difficulty affording homes due to the cost of living rising faster than wages, he said. Leatherbury called for more affordable housing and subsidized housing.

#### **Public Schools**

One question regarded retaining teachers and improving classroom morale.

Leatherbury seemed to favor local funding for teacher raises, although he found morale to be sufficient. "I see these teachers with smiling faces, and I see students with the same thing. I think morale is great."

Kabler said, "The future of Northampton County Public Schools depends a lot on increased attendance, increased enrollment."

He suggested that implementing the free breakfast and lunch program (Community Eligibility Provision) would boost school attendance, and improving infrastructure would attract young families and increase enrollment.

#### **County and Town Relationships**

"Cape Charles is a shining light in this county," Kabler said. It's a "perfect example" of a town working with its county.

He advised county supervisors to attend town council meetings to get a better understanding of community needs and noted he recently attended an Exmore town council meeting.

Leatherbury called for better communication regarding town needs and the county's ability to fill those needs.

#### **Economic Development**

The type of economic development Leatherbury would like to see is "light industry" that doesn't require high water use, pollute the water, or compete with aquaculture for natural resources.

Kabler wants more tourism, entrepreneurism, specialty manufacturing, and scientific research.

#### AFDs

The candidates were asked if they believe AFDs (Agricultural-Forestal Districts) create tax breaks for the wealthy.

Kabler said farmers deserve tax breaks and farmland does not use many public services. AFDs help preserve open space and "rural character" and promote tourism.

Leatherbury also supported AFDs and added that Northampton farmers pay one of the highest tax rates on farm machinery in the state or country.

#### Tax Revenue

Leatherbury said Northampton also pays high real estate taxes compared to other Virginia counties, and its budget relies heavily on those taxes.

"The homeowner cannot bear the full burden" of county expenses, he said. More tax revenue should come from businesses. He supports moderate in-



creases in meals and transient occupancy taxes so tourists pay their "fair share."

"So that we don't have to raise taxes, we really must raise revenue," Kabler said. The top three industries, agriculture, aquaculture, and tourism, need support and new ideas for generating revenue, he said. His suggestions include growing hemp and using hydroponics, as well as providing more education and workforce training.

#### Infrastructure

Northampton's greatest infrastructure need is its public schools, Kabler said. Supervisors recently approved spending more than \$28 million for renovation and construction at the Northampton High School complex that will be "state-of-the-art."

The county also needs a community center to provide recreation for young and old alike, he said.

Leatherbury said the county's greatest infrastructure need is a public sewer system to serve multi-family housing in and around towns and to protect Northampton's waters and aquaculture industry.

#### Public Education Funding

Leatherbury did not believe he was adequately equipped to decide if the



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# Volunteers Join With Northampton County To Restore Birding Boardwalk

Birding Eastern Shore and the Eastern Shore Master Naturalists are partnering with Northampton County to restore one of its hidden gems, a nature path and boardwalk tucked away in a seemingly unlikely spot behind the Northampton landfill.

The project "fits with our mission to enhance the appreciation of birds, wildlife, and the Eastern Shore of Virginia," said Martina Coker, of Birding Eastern Shore.

The boardwalk was built in 2004 with a \$60,000 Coastal Zone Management grant.

Coastal Zone Management is a federal program administered by NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration).

Over the last 15 years, the boardwalk has fallen into disrepair but will be restored "so that the public may safely enjoy this beautiful location," Coker said.

The restoration is made possible by a \$20,000 Coastal Zone Management grant received by Northampton County and facilitated by Birding Eastern

Shore, known formally as nonprofit Eastern Shore of Virginia Birding and Wildlife Programs Inc.

Northampton County employees began working onsite Wednesday, Oct. 23, with volunteers that included members of Birding Eastern Shore, Eastern Shore Master Naturalists, as well as Northampton Supervisor John Coker.

The boardwalk is in a prime location for birding or just enjoying nature in the Beverly area, about two miles north of the University of Virginia research center in Oyster and four miles east of Cheriton.

Before the volunteers even left the landfill, where they met up Wednesday morning, they were treated to a night heron sighting across a pond.

Behind the landfill, a short trail leads to the boardwalk, which ends in an overlook of Brockenberry Bay.

The renovation will include the installation of signs that provide visitors information about the maritime forest and its inhabitants.

The project has been designated as a master naturalists stewardship project, meaning the Eastern Shore



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# 1 DIES FROM INJURIES IN ONLEY MULTI-CAR CRASH

A four-car crash on U.S. 13 in front of McDonald's in Onley injured 15 people, one of whom died Sunday, said Onley Police Chief John Spivey.

"Three vehicles were stopped at the light. The fourth vehicle failed to stop, which in turn hit the other, which in turn hit the other" Spivey said, describing the chain reaction. "The back two were SU-Vs and the front two were sedans."

Spivey arrived on the scene around 2:30 p.m. Friday, estimating the crash happened about 10-15 minutes before. Onancock Volunteer Fire Department was already there and had begun to assist the injured.

Ambulances transported 10 of the injured to nearby Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital. Others injured elected to leave by private vehicle.

Spivey was interviewed by telephone Saturday as he completed paperwork from the crash. "They (Onancock Volunteer Fire Department) did a fantastic job," he said. "Moving that many people is not an easy thing."

"We had an incident command system that worked," said Onancock Chief Adam

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James. He had command of the scene and paramedic Spencer Davis served as EMS officer, taking the lead in assessing and prioritizing patient transport.

Patients were "shipped out based on the critical nature of care," said James. Some of the noncritically injured were transported together in ambulances with multiple medics.

"Spencer did a good job determining who was a priority for transport and in what order," James said.

Route 13 was shut down intermittently for a combined estimated 30-35 minutes. "We tried to accommodate traffic as best we could, but there came a time when we had to shut it down," Spivey said.

Accomack County Sheriff's Department and the Onancock Police Department assisted by providing traffic control. Tasley, Parksley, Melfa, Painter, and Saxis, which had just left the hospital, assisted with emergency medical response. Companies in Bloxom and Nassawadox stepped in to take calls that would have gone to Onancock and Parksley during the time Onancock and Parksley were tied up at the scene.

Spivey said no charges were filed.

Kabler touted aquaculture as a fast-growing, clean industry. He noted the creek bottoms are not under county control, but concerns may be relaved to VMRC.

#### **County Expenses**

"It's not about cutting expenses, I think our administration is doing a great job at that," Kabler said. "So, how do we raise revenue? That's really the big question here."

Leatherbury added that many county staff salaries are set by the state, as well as the required number of sheriff's deputies. He suspects that county supervisors are "running a pretty tight ship on expenses" already.

#### **Affordable Housing**

An audience member asked if Northampton would consider following other Virginia counties in obtaining special financing for teacher housing.

"The county does not need to be in the housing business," Leatherbury said, although it can be the catalyst for building teacher housing.

Kabler said multi-family housing

needs central water and sewer service to be affordable, and the county must stay apprised of federal and state funding opportunities, which are scarce.

#### **TOT Taxes**

When asked if he would support a change in state law requiring state parks like Kiptopeke to collect TOT taxes (transient occupancy taxes) as other campgrounds do, Leatherbury gave an "easy yes" to additional county revenue.

Kabler was unsure if a public park should have to collect TOT taxes like a private park, and he said he is neutral on the subject.

During his closing remarks, Kabler invited everyone to "participate in the county's future" by visiting the Northampton County website and taking the survey on the comprehensive plan. "Your voice will count this time," he assured citizens.

Leatherbury confirmed that the updated comprehensive plan will address new issues like sea-level rise and said he is committed to "transparency in this government and every government in this country."

Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 5, and the polls in Northampton County will be open from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m.

A late afternoon fire Friday claimed a Townsend house that was under renovation and damaged a neighboring home. There were no injuries, said Cheriton Volunteer Fire Company Chief Thomas Moore.

The Eastern Shore 9-1-1 center took the call at 4:01 p.m., according to Moore. "The first engine arrived at 4:14," he said. "When we got there, she was fully involved."

"A house fire is an automatic five-company alert," Moore said. Units from Cape Charles, Eastville, Nassawadox and Exmore also responded, along with tankers from Painter and Wachapreague.

The structure was between two other homes, one of which sustained heat damage to its siding and windows.

The fire was under control by 5:18, and firefighters departed the scene just before dark.

The cause of the fire is under investigation.

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# **Coast Guard Auxiliary Tips: Surviving Cold Water**

#### Submitted Article

This week we focus on surviving in cold water.

First, call for help before you get wet but not at the expense of donning that life jacket. As you enter the water, cover your nose and mouth with your hand. This will keep you from inhaling water when you gasp.

Second, if you have other crew huddle up, use the life jacket "D" rings and attachments to hook yourselves together then get as close as possible to each other.

Stay huddled; the combined body heat will benefit all of you. If you are alone, get into the HELP position: bring your knees up as close to your chest as you can and keep them there in any way possible.

Third, put your whistle in your mouth so you can blow it if you see a boat. Whistle sounds carry farther, are easier to hear, and can be used longer than yelling.

Fourth, turn on the jacket's Marker Light that also makes it easier to find you. As soon as you are settled, use your cell phone to call again for help let rescuers know you are in the water. Finally, remain calm, lay back with as much of your body out of the water as possible and let your life jacket do its job! If you have done the things we have discussed, we will find you — trust in that. We will be covering all of this and more in our November Safe Boating Class.

**Local Aids notices:** On the Eastern Shore — in the vicinity of Lighted Buoy 11 to Lighted Buoy 11A — channel depths may be as little as 5.7 ft. at Mean Low Water. On the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel the three navigation lights on tunnel island number one are extinguished.

# Residents Concerned About Fire Training School in Cheriton

Some Cheriton citizens don't want a fire training school in their town, but for the past eight years, their wishes have continually gone up in smoke.

The Pacific Atlantic Professional Academy (PAPA) is directed by Lee Goldman, of Norfolk, who also directs the Mid-Atlantic Maritime Academy (MAMA).

PAPA has operated in Cheriton since 2011, on land leased from the town, behind the Cheriton Volunteer Fire Department.

Locals sometimes call the fire school the "maritime academy" because maritime firefighting training and Coast Guard training are among the programs offered by the nonprofit.

Since 2011, several citizens have complained on numerous occasions to the town council about the smoke generated by the outdoor firefighting training exercises.

Complaints about the smoke have ranged from ruining laundry hung outside to triggering asthma attacks.

A majority of the complaints were made

by a couple whose home on Sunnyside Road is adjacent to the fire department.

The outdoor training exercises occur no more than once or twice a week, for no longer than 30 minutes at a time, former fire chief Eddie Stockton explained at a town council meeting last year.

But locals have persisted in their objections.

Granville Hogg, a resident of the Cheriton area, raised concerns about PAPA before the Northampton board of supervisors in September.

He said he heard that the school is moving to a new location in Cheriton on Route 13.

"I look at this from the standpoint that if I were riding up Route 13, that the smoke might attract my attention, probably away from my driving skills," Hogg said.

He was also concerned that the rumored new location is near a daycare center.

Spencer Murray, chairman of the board of supervisors, said he was unable to determine the board's position on the matter because it had not been presented to the board for a vote.

Director of Planning and Zoning Susan McGhee noted that a school is a byright land use in Northampton County.

Hogg suggested holding the outdoor training exercises either at the county landfill, where the wind would blow smoke over the marsh, or at the Eastern Shore Regional Fire Training Center in Melfa.

Stockton has indicated that conducting the fire training in Cheriton is more convenient for his crew than traveling to Melfa.

"I hear your concerns, but ... I can't tell that school where to conduct their training," Murray told Hogg.

"Just because of the fact that it says it's a school doesn't necessarily mean that it may not be dealing with biohazard materials," Hogg said.

Supervisor Dave Fauber, who represents Cheriton's voting district, drives by the school several times a day, he said. He observes the outdoor training only about twice a month and doesn't believe the practice is harmful.

But he admitted that "if we give

these people a hard enough time, I guarantee you, MAMA's going to leave."

"They're going to get out of this county, because ... no place is the right place for them, and they're going to leave. And I think that would be unfortunate, because it's a good organization," Fauber said.

Murray recommended that Hogg contact the school directly about his concerns.

"At this point, I don't know that there's anything this board can do about it," Murray said.

PAPA's lease of town-owned property is typically renewed annually, in November. The school pays more than \$500 per month for the lease.

PAPA also pays the Cheriton Volunteer Fire Department \$1,200 per month to use its facility.

At the Oct. 23 Cheriton town council meeting, Mayor Larry LeMond reported that Goldman requested to renew her lease, but only through Jan. 30, 2020.

A motion was made to renew the lease for the requested period at the current price, and it was seconded and passed unanimously.



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#### Shaeffer Addresses Onancock Christian Businessmen's Association Story and Photo by Bill Sterling about 3 percent compared to a 5 permunity to address

Jim Shaeffer, the recently appointed president of Eastern Shore Community College, spoke to the Eastern Shore Christian Businessmen's Association Sept. 24 and promised candor and trans-

parency under his administration. Shaeffer is the founding dean of the College of Continuing Education and Professional Development at Old Dominion University, instituted in 2014, a position he held until assuming his position at ES-CC. He holds an undergraduate degree from Iowa State University, a master's degree from Kansas State University, and a doctorate from Northwestern University.

The first topic Shaeffer addressed was ESCC's enrollment, currently 622, down 33 students from last year. He noted that regular college enrollment is steady, but dual enrollment is down. The dual enrollment program allows high school students to take courses at ESCC that provide college credit and also help toward high school graduation.


However, Shaeffer pointed out that students are taking more classes and full-time enrollment (FTE) is down about 3 percent compared to a 5 percent decline in students.

Shaeffer said he expects that faculty and students will move into the new facility under construction in December. The new academic building includes five new technology and science labs, a new welding lab, an enlarged and updated library with new technology and study spaces, a spacious Student Activities Center with dedicated vending and warming kitchen, and an expanded adult education area.

While Shaeffer said the faculty and students are excited about moving into the new facility, he admitted it was very difficult to have recently eliminated 12 administrative positions as part of the college's three-year reboot.

"On the human side we've had some challenges," said Shaeffer.

He cited four challenges he saw upon assuming his position after being appointed in May. He feels ESCC is a food desert and has acquired donations to provide healthy snacks, working with the Foodbank of the Eastern Shore. He also has worked with nonprofits in the community to address homelessness, a situation he said is affecting some students. Transportation is also an issue, and Shaeffer said Star Transit is working with the college to provide better routes. Finally, lack of scholarships keeps some students away, and recently \$20,000 was raised to help enroll students who could not otherwise attend.



velopment at the college was Old Dominion University signing a Guaranteed Transfer Agreement with regional community colleges, whereby ESCC graduates are guaranteed admission to ODU and given a student pass to participate in ODU activities. It also will provide classes online. He said the

agreement will achieve one of ESCC's goals: to offer four-year degrees on the Eastern Shore without having to leave the area.

"It's a new day at the college. It's going to take some work, but we will be better off next year than we are today," concluded Shaeffer.


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## **CBES Bike Tour This Weekend**

Rain or shine. Wind or calm. Saturday, Oct. 26, 1,100 cyclists from across the U.S. will depart the Exmore Town Park to begin their pedal-powered, bi-coastal exploration of Virginia's Eastern Shore. It's the Citizens for a Better Eastern Shore 27th Annual Between the Waters Bike Tour and it's the biggest ever, with a record-breaking number of participants registered to ride.

As the 2019 Host Town, Exmore is the designated starting point and finish line and is rolling out a big welcome mat — or more precisely, welcome banners and signage. And town officials are paying special attention to details of convenience and safety.

Parking for 500-600 cars is blocked out. Several streets will be closed to facilitate the cyclists. The parking area at Exmore Town Park has been reserved for bicycles only. A new bike fitting station is in place, courtesy of Northampton County Tourism, and the Western Auto on Main Street adjacent to the town park is on standby for last minute equipment repairs or replacements. Exmore is ready. "We're excited to introduce our town to these 1,100 cyclists and their guests," said Exmore Mayor Doug Greer. "With our friendly residents, our many shops and services, plus our small-town appeal, Exmore offers these visitors something that's becoming rarer each year: an authentic Eastern Shore experience."

Stork Storytime Program Helps Families Deliver Literacy

A thousand things sound like a lot, but when a child is read to for just 10 minutes a day from birth to age 5, that child is prepared to walk into the kindergarten door ready to learn. Research shows that 80% of brain growth happens in the first three years of life, making it a critically important time in a child's development.

In partnership with the Library of Virginia and the Soho Center and funded by the Institute of Museum and Library services, 1000 Things Before Kindergarten features a custom folder, log sheets, activity sug-



gestions, and book prizes for every 100 books or activities completed. Activities include things like playing with water, singing, counting, measuring, drawing, coloring, and visiting the library. It will not take long to earn a brand-new book. Every time a child visits a story time event at the public library, at least four or five activities/stories can be entered into his or her log sheet.

Every day is full of opportunities to have positive "before kindergarten" early literacy experiences and finding quiet time to read one more good book with a child is always a great way to end the day. On Saturday, October 26, 2019, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., the Northampton Sheriff's Office and the Drug Enforcement Administration will give the public its 18th opportunity in 9 years to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Bring your pills for disposal to Northampton Sheriff's Office at 5211 The Hornes, Eastville, Va. (The DEA cannot accept liquids or needles or sharps, only pills or patches.) The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

The last NTBI was held on April 27, 2019. On that date, the effort across the nation resulted in the collection of approximately 457 tons of pharmaceutical controlled substances and other medication for safe and proper disposal. In Virginia 137 agencies collected over 22,345 pounds at 197 collection sites. As a result, our communities are safer because of the disposal opportunities.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to

diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug Got Druces abuse in the U.S. are alarm- Turn in your unused or ingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs.



Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines-flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash-both pose potential safety and health hazards.

Fishing from the Shore By Bill Hall

The deluge of last Sunday seems to have had minimal impact on this week's fishing action. Speckled trout and small stiped bass (rockfish) remain abundant along the marshy banks of the upper Virginia portion of the Chesapeake Bay as well as inside the creek mouths of the lower bay. Water temperatures in the Maryland portion of the bay are approaching the bottom end of the trout's comfort zone, so how much longer the fishery will last is anybody's guess. Puppy drum action has shown improvement with some of the puppies making the 18-inch minimum size limit. The deep water rocks in Pocomoke Sound still hold populations of spot, bluefish, gray trout, and a few croakers. Schools of schoolie-sized stripers are beginning to be marked by flocks of feeding birds in the waters of Pocomoke and Tangier Sounds. Flounder action on the seaside remains good for this time of the year. The surf is still holding whiting (kingfish, sea mullet), spot, bluefish, and the occasional red drum. Black sea bass are active over the offshore wrecks.

Lower Shore – Chris Snook, of Chris' Bait & Tackle, reported that speckled trout action was still good along the fish traps south of Kiptopeke. Puppy drum and striped bass, some of which are very small, have come from the same area. Puppy drum catches have also shown some improvement on the seaside. Flounder have been caught from the Kiptopeke State Park Pier.

**Cape Charles** – Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle, reported that the speckled trout fishery remained "fantastic" over the last week. He said that the numbers of fish are "unlike anything we have seen in quite a few years." Most anglers are reporting catches of fish in the 18- to 21-inch class. Puppy drum to 24 inches have been taken off the Cape Charles Fishing Pier as well as inside some of the bayside creeks. Schoolie-sized rockfish have been reported, but the majority have been under the minimum size limit.

Wachapreague - Amanda Manzella, at the Wachapreague Inn, reported that there has been some action on red drum in the surf. A group of her customers had a successful flounder outing while fishing with Captain Nat Atkinson aboard the Foxy Lady. Another customer found bluefish and small flounder. Frank and Austin Smith caught a variety of fish, including grouper, blueline and golden tilefish, blackbelly rosefish, dolphin (mahi), vellowfin tuna, and albacore on an offshore trip with Keith Neal of Teaser Sportfishing. Sandpiper Marine will have its grand re-opening at the new location on Lank-

ford Highway in Tasley on October 16, 2019, from 9 a.m.-2 p.m. Several special promotions and refreshments are planned for the celebration.

**Chincoteague** – Donna Rae Roeske, at Captain Bob's Marina, reported that flounder and stripers are being caught from the bulkhead near the canal at Curtis Merritt Harbor, while undersized rockfish are being caught during the evenings inside Mosquito Creek. She added that there has been some drum action in the surf. Captain Bob's will close for the season following this week.

Pete Vasiliou, at Captain Steve's Bait & Tackle, reports that flounder action remains very good for this time of the year. He told me that lots of keepers have been taken inside the bay as well as from the shore. Lots of speckled trout are in the creeks right now, he added. Striper fishing is improving as the water temperatures fall and the ratio of keeps to throwbacks is getting better, he said. In the surf, there are "lots" of bluefish with an occasional red drum. Kingfish and spot are also still encountered in the surf. Offshore wreck fishing is producing black sea bass and keeper-sized flounder. A group of shop regulars caught a nice selection of rockfish while casting artificials from the shoreline of Saxis on Monday afternoon.

**Upper Shore** – Captain Matt Abell, of Seahawk Sports Center, told me that the water temperature had fallen to 59-degrees on the Maryland side of the Virginia-Maryland line on Monday, making trout scarce in the same waters where he was catching 15-20 per trip just a week ago. Monday's trip did produce easy limits of rockfish to 26 inches. Most of the fish were caught casting paddletails on jigheads in the Albino Ghost and Opening Night color combinations. Some of the fish were found under flocks of feeding birds.

Ten-year-old Tracy Brooke Selby, of Greenbush, (above, right) wanted to be allowed to achieve the way her brothers do.

In November, after years of going camping with her family — her parents are Boy Scout leaders and her teenage siblings are Scouts — she finally got a chance. Tracy joined a co-ed Cub Scout pack in Parksley.

"I like it a whole lot better because I get to earn the badges," Tracy said. She had basically been participating since she was four or five years old. "I just wanted to earn the badges like my brothers and I was upset about it,"she said.

She turns 11 on Jan. 1, and by then will have finished work on her Arrow of Light, the highest rank and award in Cub Scouting. At that point, she will be able to join her friends.

Her next goal is joining female BSA Troop 100 with her friends above from left, Jasmine Gonzales, 15, Jestiny Yager, 12, and Leiah Thornes, 14.

Those girls were the first on the Eastern Shore of Virginia to become girls in the Boy Scouts of America (BSA) and are all working at becoming Eagle Scouts.

Leader Danny Jackson and his assistant, Tara Howland, are both active duty Navy at Wallops Island. Jackson, 31, earned Eagle status when he was a youth in Georgia.

"When we allowed girls last year to come into Cub Scouting, I wanted young women to be able to come in (fully)and not just start," Jackson said.

Jackson obtained a national waiver to start with fewer than five young women. Troop 100 was formed right before summer camp at Henson Scout Reservation, in Salisbury, Md., had its coed week-long event.

The girls "just have to sleep in separate campsites and have separate bathrooms," Jackson explained. The troop started with four Scouts but one girl, though still registered, has not been back since July. "She may have decided this isn't for her."

Jasmine, a ninth-grader at Arcadia High School, said scouting is teaching her self-confidence. She has moved around a lot because her dad is in the military and she is shy. She enjoys meeting new people and learning new things and already has badges in photography, environmental science, citizenship to the world, and archery, which was her favorite at camp.

"I don't have a bow of my own, but I am saving up and to get a sleeve so I don't bruise my arm."

"I am into a lot of the sciences ... and how things came to be how they are."

According to Jestiny, "There's more than one thing to like" about being in the troop. "It's really fun for everybody here. We just mess around with each other all the time." She likes the joking, but is also serious about her nature and swimming badges.

At the camp pool, the lowest depth was 8 feet.

The girls spread their knowledge. After hearing about Jasmine's love for archery, Justiny said she will take the course next summer.

Leiah earned shotgun, climbing, world citizen, and first-aid badges. Prior to becoming a Scout she knew nothing about shooting. "We learned not to hold the barrel in someone's face, how to clean a gun, (and) to keep your finger off the trigger until you're ready to shoot. We had to shoot clay pigeons."



First-aid is Eagle required. "I like learning about health because I always wanted to be a doctor," Leiah said.

It's been a learning experience for Howland, too. She was in the Girl Scouts for three years but never slept in a tent. Now she is also learning about tying

knots, handling knives, and cooking.
