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## Essex Begins Year At St. Catherine's As Pastoral Associate

One of her three favorite places to be is outside in the Charlestown Catholic Elementary schoolyard, right about 2:15 p.m. when all the best socializing of the day goes on. The activity, the chatter, the children, energize Susan Essex, the new pastoral associate at St. Catherine of Siena Church.

While Father Ron Coyne, St. Catherine's pastor, is introducing Essex to just about everyone around the neighborhood, she is not a complete stranger in Charlestown. She's been hidden in the Navy Yard for the past three years, traveling by foot and bike back and forth to Cambridge where she worked for a student educational travel company.

Admittedly, Essex says she knows very little about where she lives. She decided to give up the business world for the time being to volunteer in the church, at Charlestown Catholic Elementary School and in the community.
Some people might guess that a church volunteer would be in training to become a nun or a priest. Essex, however, comes to St. Catherine's through the Lay Volunteer Program of the Archdiocese of Boston, which provides placements for people not necessarily heading toward profes-
sions in the clergy. Essex says that she chose to volunteer through the Catholic church because of her religious faith and her belief that openness is the key to being successful in a community. She also credits an older sister, who enjoyed a volunteer experience with the Jesuits, as a source of inspiration.
"The church is open to everybody," Essex says, "and you get to know everybody by not overfocusing on one area."

Church and family were important parts of her upbringing in rural Vermont as the seventh of eight children. Essex, 27, says she learned the necessity of doing what needed to be done, such as chopping wood, from her family. And she gained an enthusiasm for the city through her small town, where her eighth-grade class launched a total 14 graduates.

Charlestown and its issues are a long way from where Essex was schooled in Strafford and Norwich, Vt. And while Essex is excited to learn about Charlestown, she also hopes to give something of herself during her service through teaching.

It was through a special teacher that Essex discovered a love for the German language in high school. "It gave me the idea that there's a world that exists

beyond me," she says. "Learning languages is not just opening your eyes to a book but opening your eyes to the world."

Foreign languages offer a unique opportunity for openness, according to Essex. "Languages are important and often get left out of education," she says. "They're a great tool for broadening your mind."

Essex continued studying the language and culture in college, graduating with a German major and a political science minor. She later taught English at an Austrian high school,
and now she plans to get Charlestown Catholic sev-enth- and eighth-graders interested in learning Latin.
As she gets to know the town, people will see a lot of Essex over the next year through her varied and many involvements with St. Catherine's, including Mass, teaching CCD to sixthgraders, the pastoral council, CYO, Junior CYO girls basketball and communitywide activities.
Essex will do a lot of what Mary Featherston did in her frenzied pace to keep up as one of Coyne's associates. In fact, for a little while it may prove a bit difficult for some to think of her as Susan Essex and not as Mary's replacement. Off-handedly, some will, and do, call her Mary, but Essex thinks that is a good sign.
"I think people have been very welcoming because of her reputation," she says. "I am grateful to her and feel lucky to have met with her before she left."

Coyne, who once described Featherston as wholesome, calls Essex wonderful, energetic, and, of course, open.
"She's a spirited young woman who is interested in learning about herself," he says of his new pastoral associate. She's here to share her gifts and talents and to leam from us."

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## Candidates In Last Minute Drive To Seek Voter Support

The questions ranged from alternatives to resident parking in Charlestown to stances on the Home Rule Petition. The answers ranged from blunt to creative. Now they will have to wait until Tuesday's election to see how they fared in Charlestown at last Friday's Meet the Candidates Night.

The Mishawum Park Tenants Association (MPTA) hosted the two-hour ques-tion-and-answer forum in its Dunstable Street community room to give residents an opportunity to ask at-large and District One City Council candidates about specific issues. Hosting and moderating the timed-response event were MPTA representatives Al Copithorn and Peter Looney.

For District One, concerns were centered on deregulation of federally subsidized housing developments and Massport plans for Logan Airport runway expansion. Incumbent Diane Modica and candidate Vincent Zarrilli both favored supporting the Home Rule Petition to keep rents down for families, they differed on the Massport additional runway proposal.
"While Massport says that the planes will take off over the harbor, at some future date, they will go right over Charlestown," Modica said in opposition. "Why do we have to be subjected to additional health impacts? More traffic? More congestion?"

Zarrilli, on the other hand, supports Logan expansion, saying the facility is being scapegoated when it has been a "major economic plus" for the area. "Pollution results from planes backing up and running their engines while they're waiting," Zarrilli said. "The runway relieves this congestion."
In her two-minute opening, Modica said that she wants to continue making progress, crediting the opening of the police substation on Main Street and having signed on to the Home Rule Petition because "affordable housing stabilizes neighborhoods."

Zarrilli said he thinks the state's "Big Dig is the most perverse project in the entire country," saying that his Boston Bypass proposal will prove cor-
rect in the next two to three years. According to Zarrilli, the bypass would be 11 miles of doubledecked roadway from Logan, along the harbor, over and under the Tobin Bridge, then joining Route 93 at Sullivan Square. A railway system on each deck would move people back and forth from the airport.

The Boston Bypass would also partiy address the question regarding altematives to resident parking restrictions for commuters, Zarrilli said, by dealing with parking in a new way using "parking towers." He said the state has not considered the bypass because "they never thought of it themselves."

You have probably seen the bright yellow Back the BB and political signs all over town. One question
asked directly of Zarrilli was if he planned on taking the signs down. "All signs will be down within 10 days of the election, by Nov. 17," was Zarrilli's response.

Seven at-large candidates were asked similar questions and shared their positions on issues of importance to them. Incumbents Albert "Dapper" O'Neil and Peggy DavisMullen seek re-election based on their records.
"I am a full-time city councillor and I do my job," O'Neil said. "Dapper O'Neil is never going to change." His full-page campaign statement about the truth of the council says it all, he said.
Davis-Mullen said she loves her job and thinks the council has made progress, especially in terms of police presence. "I feel
like I have only begun," she said. "I like being a full-time councillor, and I don't want to do anything else."
The other five at-large hopefuls participating in the forum were former Boston Police Commissioner Francis "Mickey" Roache, young Teamster Mike Flaherty, public service lawyer Frank Jones, juvenile justice champion Paul Gannon and former City Council candidate Stephen Murphy. All the candidates support the Home Rule Petition, and topping the list of priority issues for each of them seemed to be education and public safety.
Following a question-and-answer period, each candidate was given two minutes to make a final pitch for Charlestown voters' mark on Tuesday's
ballot.
Murphy said he wants to make a difference. "I want to work with people who are going to buck the trends," he said, "not do a study,"

Gannon described himself as having a "strong independent voice" and being especially concemed with the city's school system.

Jones, who grew up in Chicago public housing and became a lawyer to work for low-income people, said schools and learning how to get students' parents meaningfully involved are key issues. "Everything comes back to education," he said. "Nothing is more important than education."
"Give a young man a chance," is what Flaherty of South Boston said. "I'm not making any false promises or grand-standing. I'd like to see the
council put aside political infighting and look at the schools, economic development and community policing."
Roache said his best qualities are that he is accessible and a good listener. "I'd like to continue my commitment to public service." he said. "This time as a city councillor.' Davis-Mullen said she hopes she is not a stranger in Charlestown, having worked on public safety and education issues here in her past two years of service.

And perhaps veteran incumbent O'Neil was once again the most straightforward about what was considered by some Mishawum residents as a low turnout for such an event. "I don't blame people for not being here," he said, "but you must vote. So, vote."

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## PUBLIC SAFETY

- In September of this year, Diane Modica delivered on her campaign pledge with the opening of a neighborhood policing post in Charlestown, the first such police facility in Charlestown in fifteen years.
- In February 1994, during a rash of robberies in the North End and East Boston, Diane Modica successfully lobbied for the deployment of six additional police officers for East Boston and two additional police officers in the North End.
- Due to East Boston's major traffic impacts, Diane Modica advocated for and received five additional school crossing guards for $\mathrm{FY}^{\prime 9} 96$, beginning with the new school year.
- Through the efforts of Diane Modica a second ambulance has been placed in East Boston during heavy traffic periods to ensure that East Boston is not left in a vulnerable situation.
- In cooperation with the Boston Police District 7, Diane Modica's office organized and conducted two Women's Safety Workshops in East Boston (May 2, 1994 \& May 13, 1995) to provide women with a self-defense course to enhance their safety. Over one hundred and fifty women attended the workshops.
- During the FY 96 budget hearings, Diane Modica voted for an additional 40 police officers in addition to the Mayor's recommended 120 officers.


## TRANSPORTATION

- In response to requests from residents of the Charlestown Navy Yard, Diane Modica was able to expand MBTA bus service into that area and assure residents, especially the elderly, access to downtown Boston.
- Delivering on a campaign promise, the East Boston Ferry was reestablished with a one year pilot project providing ten minute service to Downtown Boston during peak periods.
- In opposition to the construction of the Massport's proposed 14/32 runway, Diane Modica introduced a resolution and won unanimous support of the Boston City Council to oppose the runway's construction and urged the MEPA, the FAA, the United States Environmental Protection Agency, Massport and Governor William Weld to do so as well.
- Protecting the interest of North End businesses and residents, Diane Modica maintained consistent representation on NEWCAC for neighborhood review of design and construction issues as they relate to the construction of the Central Artery/Third Harbor Tunnel Project.
- On August I, 1994, Diane Modica held a hearing to determine how the 7.3 million dollar state appropriation would be spent by the various city departments overseeing the construction of the Central Artery/Third Harbor Tunnel to ensure that traffic management, rodent control, environmental enforcement, surface restorations plans, and the impact on businesses and residents be addressed.
- At the request of several neighborhood activists, Diane Modica was able to secure the installation of a pedestrian traffic light on Paris Street adjacent to the Callahan Tunnel in East Boston next to the Paris Street Gym. Funded entirely by the Massachusetts Turnpike Authority, this traffic light will increase the safety of hundreds of children and elderly who cross in that area and utilize the gym.


## ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

- Neighborhood commercial revitalization and waterfront development have been at the forefront of Diane Modica's agenda in the effort to improve the quality of life and promote economic development in District 1. She strongly supported the designation of East Boston's Maverick and Central Squares for the Main Street Program and voted to fund a BRA study to explore the viability of the East Boston and Charlestown waterfronts which. along with the reestablishment of the East Boston Ferry is, a necessary first step for a successful revitalization effort.
- The adoption of the Sambucca bill, of which Diane Modica was a Council cosponsor, enabled hundreds of small businesses in the North End and across the City to increase their gross sales and net revenues without the burden of a full liquor license.
- Diane Modica has also been working with the film industry to promote film making in Boston because she believes it can provide a tremendous boost to our local economy as well as take advantage of the City's talent. To that end, a feature film entitled "Pirates Point", has committed to shooting a substantial portion of the film at East Boston High School.
- In addition, Diane Modica supports the idea of a state of the art sound stage in Charlestown. This project would generate $\$ 26$ million dollars annually in direct and indirect benefits through film and video production activities and provide vocational training in film and video making technology.


## YOUTH EDUCATION

- As Chairperson of the Council's Special Committee on Youth, Diane Modica felt it was important to introduce young people to the workings of the Council by inviting students and teachers to City Hall to participate in a mock Council session. Through her formation of the Student City Council Program approximately sixty students and their teachers have participated.

We receive the Patriot on a regular (almost) basis here in what is left of America's Paradise, so we were surprised and delighted to see your inquiry about our health and well-being. We would like to let everyone know that physically we are fine, and that most of our house stayed where it was supposed to. There are some pieces of gutter that are now tree omaments, also a small palm tree, some Hibiscus bushes and what appears to be all the leaves blown off every tree within a mile of our house have either sunk to the bottom or are floating in the pool.

We are told by the local power company that we may. have power by Nov. 15. (They lie!) Meanwhile, every morning I go down to my portable generator (we have two - one is a back-up), talk nice to it, give it a little kiss, say a prayer and start yanking on the starter cord and make our
own electricity so we can take cold showers and drink cool beer, not cold - I'd kill for one of those!

As destructive as Hurricane Marilyn was to St. Croix, what it did to St. Thomas was amazing. Walking down Main Street along the harbor and seeing sailboats 50,60, up to 100 -feet long, tossed up against the shops $100-150$ feet away from the sea wall, was a sight that had to be seen to be believed. Many more houses were destroyed on St. Thomas than on St. Croix. But we are "Townies" and we survived. It will take a lot more than some high-speed hot air to do us in (Dolly said she's been living with it for 30 years - she's not scared) . . . what's that supposed to mean?
Anyway, thank you for your concem. We're alive, well and living large in the Virgin Islands. (Have a cold one for me!)

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## McLaughlin House Seeks Charlestown Clients

The Dennis McLaughlin House of Charlestown is planning to bring its program up to full capacity in December and is currently in the process of recruiting Charlestown residents who are eligible and interested in enrolling in the program. The McLaughlin House is a new transitional program for homeless women who are at least six months in recovery from alcohol and/or drug addiction The program, which is housed at the Armed Forces YMCA in the Charles town Navy Yard, offers transitional housing for up to 18 months with a six month grace period.

The McLaughlin House is collaborating with a variety of health, social service, educational training, and housing programs in the community to provide its clients with a wide range of supportive services, which include: case management; information and referrals; advocacy; substance abuse and relapse prevention counseling; positive parenting classes; health and mental health services; educational, training, job-readiness, and job-placement pro-
grams; childcare; a wide range of basic, self-sufficiency skills workshops; a variety of cultural, recreational and social programs; assistance with applying for subsidized housing; and support in locating permanent housing. Program graduates will be encouraged to continue their involvement in the prog. ram and receive follow-up counseling and housing stabilization services.
To be eligible for the program, women need to be: 1. at least 18 years of age; 2. substance-free for at least six months; 3 . referred through a social service agency; 4. working, in school, or willing to pursue educational, training, or job opportunities; and 5 . homeless, which may include living in a temporary housing situation, such as a shelter, half-way house, or substance abuse treat-
ment program.
The program accepts women who are pregnant, women who have children up to 11 years of age and women without children. If women have children in the custody of the Department of Social Services (DSS) or other caretakers, the McLaughlin House staff is available to provide family reunification services to those parents.

The McLaughlin House is also accepting referrals of women who are not yet six months into their recovery from substance abuse but would like to be put on the waiting list. This includes women who are currently in substance abuse treatment programs.
