The 1982—Bunker Hill Day Parade, which will be held on Sunday June 13th, commencing at 12:30 p.m. (assembly time 11:30 a.m.), is truly the people's parade and in order for it to be successful we need not only more financial assistance but workers to help in the organization and formation of the parade.

To date we have received the support of several local organizations and businesses in either financial donations or sponsorship of a band. What has happened with the others? Don't they either have any community spirit or commitment to our district?

It is rather surprising that some of the businesses located in Charlestown, whose very survival depends on our patronage have yet to donate a dime—why?

Possibly they are either going to make a financial contribution or sponsor a band, but if so they haven't informed anyone as yet and the time is getting short.

Memorial Day Clean-Up Scheduled For Phipps Street Burial Ground

On Saturday, May 29th, the Charlestown Preservation Society will sponsor a clean-up of the Phipps Street Burial ground. Phipps Street is Charlestown's oldest cemetery and contains a

collection of early carved gravestones which is famous for both its high quality and diversity. Many of these stones were carved by Joseph Lamson, a Charlestown stonemason, and his sons Nathaniel and

Caleb. Phipps Street is also important as one of the few remnants left after the British burned the original town during the Battle of Bunker Hill.

As one of the state's outstanding early burial

grounds, Phipps Street receives many visitors, not only from Massachusetts, but from all across the country. Since last fall, considerable trash has collected inside and around the fence. Memorial Day weekend is an appropriate time to do some spring cleaning and get Phipps Street ready for visitors.

Anyone who would like to

help in this clean-up effort is welcome. We will meet at the Phipps Street entrance at 9:00 a.m., Saturday morning. The City Department of Public Works will provide a truck later in the afternoon to remove all the trash that has been collected. The Charlestown Preservation Society will provide trash bags and some lunchtime

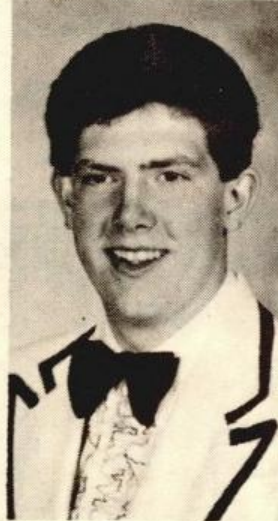
refreshments. Be sure to wear appropriate clothes and bring work gloves since there is a lot of broken glass.

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Fire Sweeps Through Vacant Building

 An early morning fire last Saturday swept through a three-story, vacant wooden framed structure at the corner of Winthrop and Warren Streets. The fire engulfed the first floor storefront in a matter of minutes and moved up the wall to the roof, causing extensive damage to the entire building. It is not known at this time whether the Boston Redevelopment Authority, which owns the property, will level the damaged structure.
 First fire apparatus at the fire scene were Ladder 9 and Engine 32. Engine 50 was fighting another fire at

the time. Damages, according to the Boston Fire Department, were set at \$3,000.
 Many residents believe the building and the whole block, which it is a part of, should either be redeveloped or torn down.
 "That whole section on Winthrop Street between Main and Warren could go up like that," said one nearby resident. "On a windier day the fire could have spread to inhabited houses." Another suggested, "Tear that whole damn eyesore down."
 The Arson Squad is now investigating this fire of suspicious origin.

Reportedly, a white male between twenty and twenty-five was seen at the fire site shortly before the blaze began.
 Thanks to the alertness of area residents, the fire was confined to the corner building.

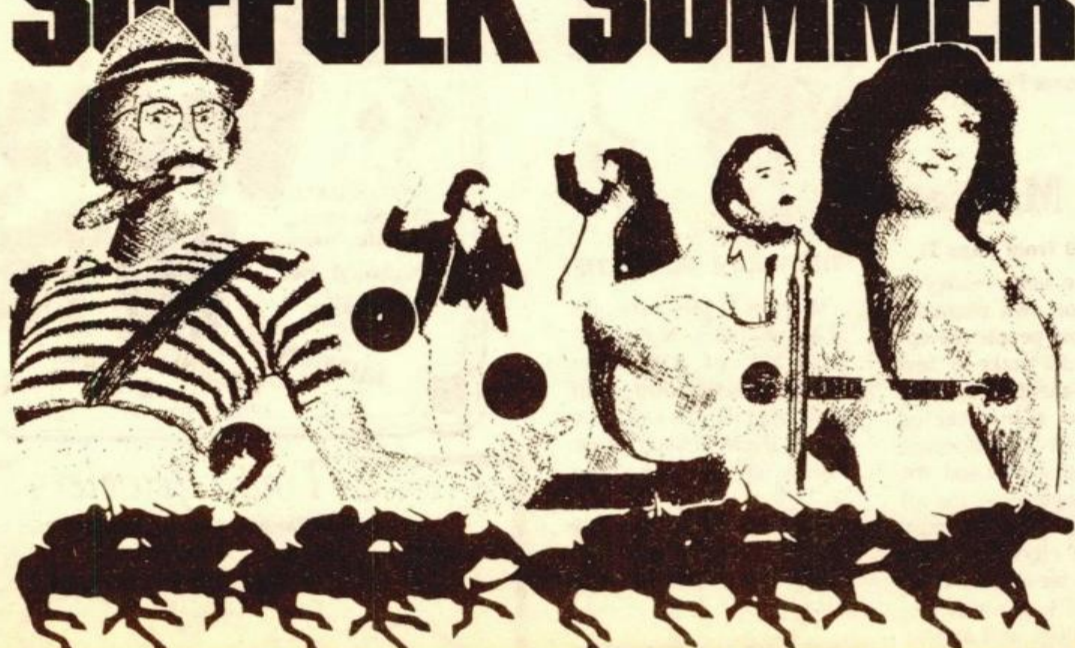

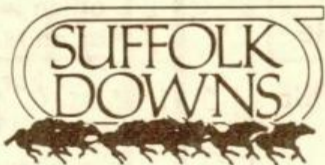

Views On Dental Health

DENTAL X-RAYS

For a dentist to conduct a complete dental examination without using dental x-rays, is like watching TV with your eyes closed. "Why", you may ask, "can't the dentist use his eyes and trusty mirror to do the same diagnosis?" Because, as the "unsinkable" Titanic discovered; like icebergs, most serious dental trouble is beneath the surface and out of view.

Dental x-rays often reveal beginning decay between the teeth or beneath a filling or at the bottom of a narrow pit or groove in the chewing surface. The amount of bone supporting teeth that has been destroyed by periodontal disease, the development of root abscesses and cysts, the presence of unerupted teeth or broken root fragments or impacted teeth can only readily be determined by x-rays since these abnormalities are normally hidden from view.

With modern, shielded equipment and high speed x-ray film, only a very small amount of x-ray radiation is required to take a complete set of pictures. It's less than we normally receive from illuminated watch faces. The X-ray camera is one of the dentist's most valuable diagnostic tools.

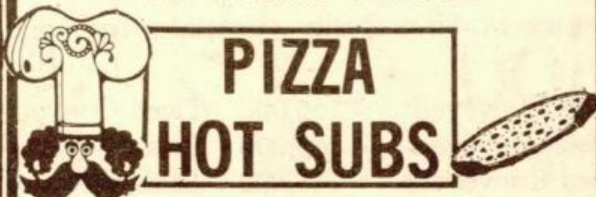

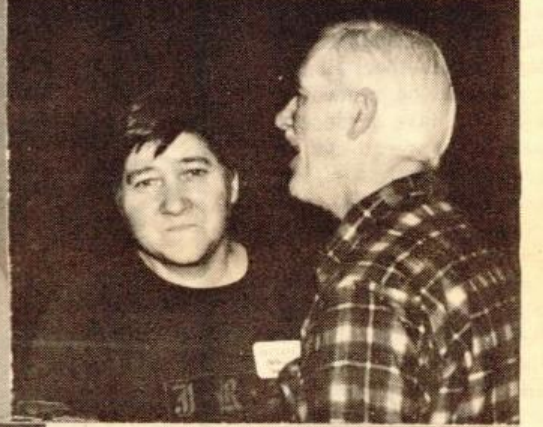
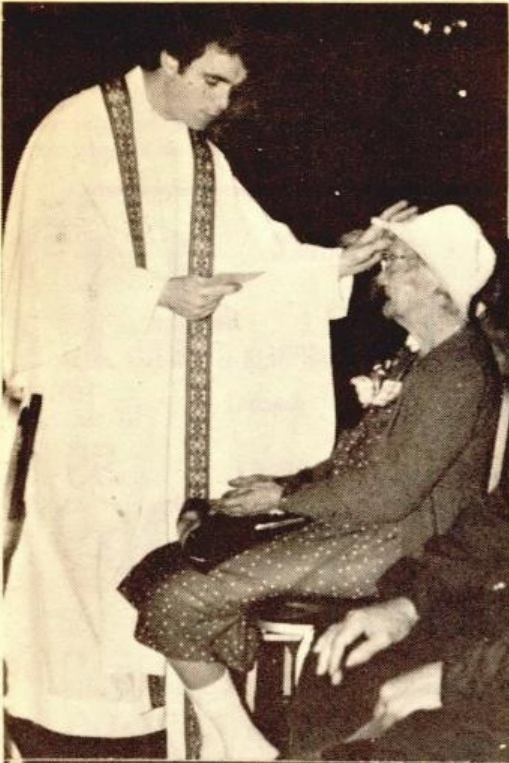

Property Equalization Inspections

The Office of Property Equalization, city of Boston, will be visiting the Charlestown area (Ward 2) in order to complete inspection on partially examined residences. This is being done in order to comply with the State Supreme Judicial Court's mandate that all cities and towns in Massachusetts revalue all real property to determine full market value.

OPE is required to gather data relevant to the determination of actual fair cash value. This data collection effort includes an on-site visit to each property in the city. Despite several attempts, OPE has been able to complete only an exterior inspection of several properties in this area. Owners of partially inspected properties will receive a letter requesting that they schedule an inspection appointment. We request that homeowners respond to this notification immediately.

Data collectors will be returning to your neighborhood to complete this interior inspection. During their visit, which will take 10-15 minutes, they will record such information as the number of apartments, number of rooms, and types of plumbing, electrical and heating systems.

Fair cash values can be calculated only on the basis of complete and accurate data. If the data collectors are unable to complete an interior inspection, they must presume that the property is fully completed at the highest level of quality, which could result in an over-valuation of your property.

OPE representatives will identify themselves with picture identification cards bearing the city of Boston seal. Individuals without proper OPE identification should not be allowed on your property. The data collectors will visit Monday through Saturday, May 24 to May 29, 1982, 9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Please call immediately for an appointment at 725-3307, 3308.

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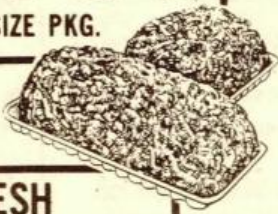
