Voke Travels To Washington To Ask For Federal Aid

Thirty-five Massachusetts lawmakers arrived in the nation's capitol March 9 to lobby federal officials for increased funding for local water and sewer projects, including the Boston Harbor Clean-Up Project. Led by House Majority Leader Richard Voke, the legislators will seek rate relief for

the 2.5 million residents serviced by the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority.

"From Charlestown to Framingham, residents and business persons are continuing to be pressured by spiralling water and sewer rates. By making this trip to Washington, D.C., we all hope to bring our concerns to the attention of our federal officials by stressing the needs for rate relief," said Rep. Voke.

According to Voke, Massachusetts is only looking for "its fair share" of federal funding, "Water and sewer projects around the

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



country have received 50 percent federal participation or more over the years, yet we are only getting 4 percent. While the clean-up of Boston Harbor is necessary, it is of such regional and national importance that the feds must get more involved financially," Voke commented.

In Washington, Voke and his fellow members of the MWRA State Caucus, the bi-partisan, bi-cameral legislative committee sponsoring the trip, will meet with the Massachusetts Congressional Delegation before moving on to other meetings with members of Congress.

"Our congressional delegation continues to keep the pressure on the Clinton Administration to up the federal commitment for fund-

ing. While we are all confident in our delegation's ability to secure more harbor clean-up money, we

hope to provide them with even more ammunition for their fight," stressed Voke.

Backed with figures that show Boston's water and sewer rates are the highest in the country, Vokeois optimistic about the prospects

for a successful trip.

"We have a legitimate story to tell and solid facts to back us up. By working together with our congressional delegation, I hope the rate relief we all need will be coming soon," concluded Voke.

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

I remember well the first time I rode through the Sumner Tunnel. Dad told me we were beneath the Boston Harbor, and I looked up fully expecting to see water leaking through the underground roof. Even today, while traversing the Sumner or Callahan, I look for drips. It is my greatest wish that I never see one.

For many years I rode the old MTA (now the MBTA) trains and trolleys through tunnels going to and from Boston English High School and Northeastern University. Along the walls of these tunnels were long pipes. I do not know what purpose they served, but I remember very well a friend saying, "Imagine having your head out the window and placing the bottom edge of your teeth on that pipe while the train speeds through the tunnel!" Today, if I have the occasion to ride the train from Community College station into downtown, I look at the pipe along the tunnel's wall, and get a chill. It is the same feeling I get when I think of a person running his finger nails across a blackboard.

And who of us from my era has never boarded a small boat at an amusement park with a favorite beau to ride through a darkened "Tunnel of Love"?

In the heavy snowstorms of earlier years, wasn't it fashionable to dig a tunnel through the snowbanks? I last did that with my own children after the Blizzard of 1978.

Perhaps this town's most famous tunnel runs under Wood Street and connects the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club's two buildings on Green and High streets. I would like to have a nickel for every boy who ran, wet, cold and naked through the tunnel after using up the swim section of his "combo." I am still not sure why we were required to swim naked at the old Boys Club. I have been given a few possi-

ble explanations as to the reason over the years, but I have never been fully convinced as to the validity of any of them.

"Not everybody can afford a swim suit, so if everyone cannot wear one, nobody will," was one. "Cleanliness," was another.

Though not sure of the reason for swimming "au natural," I am overly certain of the coldness of the tunnel.

Girls from the old Girls' Club also used the tunnel on Mondays when the pool was made available to them, but they wore bathing suits, didn't they? Maybe all the girls could afford one, or maybe they were just a whole lot cleaner than us guys. Who

There was another tunnel in this town, one that was used by boys, by girls, by men, by women and by entire families for that matter. And they were going swimming, but unlike the boys at the club's tunnel, these folks were properly attired, or at least they were supposed to be.

This particular tunnel ran under railroad tracks and separated a small park, replete with trees and benches where women gathered with small children on warm afternoons, and Dewey Beach.

To remember the tunnel, one would have to have been around the town during the 1950s and earlier. To remember Dewey Beach in its heyday, one would have to have been around the town several years earlier, for even after the beach was closed to swimmers, the tunnel remained.

Perhaps as a very young child, I was taken to Dewey Beach by my mother. Something in the deep, dark recesses of my mind says I was there, but I cannot be sure. What I am sure of, however, is that I did swim at Dewey Beach after it was closed to swimmers.

By the time my horizons had broadened enough to travel beyond Elm Street, the

sands of Dewey Beach had become oil soaked and quite uninviting. But it was also forbidden, thus making it very attractive to those who would not mind being much dirtier after a swim than before.

There were several different ways to reach Dewey Beach from Medford Street, but all except the tunnel involved the danger of crossing railroad tracks, thus leaving the tunnel as the safest route to the beach.

By the early 1950s the tunnel had deteriorated into a dumping ground and growing amounts of debris littered its floor.

It was in the late 1950s, I believe, when the American Sugar Company took control of the property at Dewey Beach and began

construction of its refinery.

As a lifeguard at the Bunker Hill Pool in the early 1960s, I could look down from my station at the rear of the diving pool to see Dewey Beach and the tunnel being swallowed up by the extensive construction. An office building and a huge steel dome slowly began to blanket the area that had once been an integral part of Charlestown folklore.

Ironically, today the American Sugar Refinery is closed, and below its immense emptiness, in the muddy bottom of what was Dewey Beach and the tunnel, lies countless memories of this town in another

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

★ Neighborhood Council Meetings . . . Community Benefits Committee

Chairperson Nancy Keyes has announced that the Community Benefits Committee will meet at 7 p.m. tonight, Thursday, March 11, at the Kent Community Center, 50 Bunker St. The committee will discuss the procedure for community groups to apply for a grant from the \$50,000 to be awarded by the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority as the second part of the \$150,000 in mitigation money for the community.

Planning & Zoning Committee

The Planning & Zoning Committee will meet at 8 p.m. on Thursday, March 18 at the Kent Community Center, 50 Bunker Hill St

According to Chairman Tom Cunha, the Boston Redevelopment Authority will be presenting information on CANA Parcels 1, 2, 3, 4 and 6 in City Square. There will be a review on a parcel-by-parcel basis to allow the committee to fine tune its zoning plan for the area in preparation for a presentation to the Charlestown Neighborhood Council which will be followed by a vote by the council on the proposed plan.

Monthly Meeting

The monthly meeting of the Neighborhood Council will be held on Tuesday, April 6 at 7 p.m. at the K. of C. Hall, 75 West School St.

The council meetings are open to the public, and all are welcome to attend.

★ Bomb Scare In Navy Yard . . . According to a Boston Police Department spokesperson, the Armed Services YMCA on Second Avenue in the Charlestown Navy Yard was evacuated mid-afternoon on March 10 when a bomb threat was reportedly telephoned in. The BPD Bomb Squad was called in to investigate and the spokesperson stated it was a hoax.

YMCA personnel and guests remained in the lobby of Building 149 until the all clear was given.

★ Police Community Relations/Public Safety Meeting . . . Officer Joe McNulty of Area A of the BPD and Mel Stillman, chairman of the Neighborhood Council Public Safety Committee, conducted the monthly meeting on March 9 with a handful of residents and Neighborhood Council members present.

McNulty pointed out three crime incidents that took place this past week that are relatively unusual in this community. Two involved women being knocked to the ground and their handbags snatched — one on First Avenue in the Navy Yard and the other on Walford Way. Both women reported they were assaulted by two young teens, both wearing ski masks. The third incident took place in the Bunker Hill Mall, where a couple preparing to get money from an ATM machine were accosted by a man with a knife who demanded that the man get him money from the machine while he held a knife on the woman.

There were also three armed robberies last week — the liquor store at Thompson Square was held up on March 1, Neworld Bank on March 2 and Store 24 in the Navy Yard on March 5.

McNulty also spoke of the high incidence of stolen cars and the prevalence of angel dust in the community.

A questions was raised as to whether there is adequate protection. McNulty responded that there are two service units with one officer and a rapid response vehicle, adding that they do travel the town on a random patrol as well as on special locations that have been determined as trouble spots.

It was noted that problems seem to be mounting and that there should be a push for automobile and drug units to be assigned here.

One resident stated that the last time the community had a wave of violence, it was when angel dust surfaced. At that time there was strong response from the police. He said that the police should know that the residents want the drugs off the street, adding that "angel dust has done horrible things."

McNulty was asked to bring the message back to Deputy Superintendent Bob Hayden that the community felt strongly about the drug problem and a unit should be brought in to deal with the matter.

Discussion arose on Charlestown High School, and while the problem of congregating seems to have eased at the corner of Concord and Lexington streets, there are still concerns on the responsibility of the school relative to early dismissal and the requested truant officer has yet to be assigned to the area. It was also noted that a student was arrested two weeks ago when she was found to be carrying two guns in the school.

One resident stated that he did not understand why the police were not targeting persons who were known to have committed serious crimes. He said that persons suspected of murder were usually into other illegal involvements and every means should be used to get those individuals off the streets. He added that he knows this isn't a "perfect world," but the community should put pressure on the BPD to respond to this.

It was suggested that next month's meeting focus on drugs and McNulty will request that a supervisor from the Narcotics Squad attend the meeting.

★ Street Reconstruction Update . . . The winter is officially over, at least that is what Mario Susi & Son, the Charlestown street contractor, is telling us. Susi is in the process of obtaining construction permits; the schedule was submitted (see elsewhere on this page); materials are on site; and the company is ready to go to work.

Signs were prematurely posted on Lawrence and Seminary streets, but leaflets are being distributed now and trench excavation is planned for 7 a.m. on Monday, March 15. Of course, Mother Nature has to agree and give us decent weather. The schedule calls for the drainage to be installed on Lawrence and Seminary streets, followed by the installation of new water lines.

Susi plans to start off with one crew and, as the next couple of weeks go by and when the weather improves, he will his increase his workforce to three crews. There will also be a subcontractor or two working for short durations. Things will get busy, but nowhere near the magnitude of work that was going on last summer. Those who have seen Susi's operation know that he keeps things clean and runs an overall efficient project.

Not noted on the **new** construction schedule are the locations of incidental subcontractor work such as tree planting, signs and pavement markings on the previously constructed streets. These isolated work items and locations, like the punchlist and remaining roof drains, are of short duration and are thus prohibitive to schedule much in advance. However, this work will be ongoing while the **new** street construction gets underway. The new sign plans are approved and the arborist is scheduled to pick out the trees for Susi's Charlestown streets contract in the next couple of weeks.

At the Mead Street Stairs (40 Flights), the finish work, such as sidewalks, requires more spring-like conditions so the Middlesex Corporation is not ready to mobilize yet. There are still eight to 10 railing posts to be fabricated and then painted. The new submission for painting is presently under review. Look for Middlesex to get going more toward the end of the month.

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


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
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Strong Enrollment At Charlestown Catholic For September 1993



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

Child Eats Grandmother's Heart Pills

Specialist instructed Brian to be taken to the hospital immediately, where his stomach was washed out and he was given activated charcoal by mouth to absorb the chemicals. His heart function was closely monitored on an EKG machine. After further consultation, Brian was transferred to Children's Hospital in Boston and admitted for further treatment and observation.

It was estimated that Brian had swallowed verapamil and isosorbide tablets, used to help the heart muscle produce a slower and deeper heart beat when a patient has high blood pressure and angina. Brian did not become seriously ill and made a complete recovery. If he had absorbed more of these powerful medications, his heart could have stopped beating.

The Massachusetts Poison Center in 1992 consulted upon almost 11,000 calls concerning poisoning by medications, and upon another 29,000 non-medication toxic exposure calls. Over 60 percent of those calls concerned children under the age of 5.

The following precautions are offered to parents and caretakers of children to keep them safe from poisons:

Store ALL medicines,

household cleaners, automobile products, personal care products, pesticides, and ALL chemicals in locked cabinets out of sight and out of reach of the naturally curious preschool child.

- · Never, never store chemicals, household cleaners or medicines in food contain-
- · Avoid taking medication in front of children. Young children learn by imitating
- · Too much iron can be very dangerous to a young child. Never give more than the instructed dose of vitamins, particularly those that contain iron, to a child. Keep all vitamins locked away . . . out of reach.
- · Alcohol can be a dangerous poison to a young child. Mouthwash, perfume and after-shave all contain large amounts of alcohol. Keep such products out of reach . . . locked away.
- · Less than a teaspoon of: methysalicylate or camphor-containing products, lotions and creams rubbed in to ease pain, and teething gel, can be serious poisons if swallowed. Keep them all locked away.
- · A well occupied and supervised preschool child is much less likely to get into poisons.

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A New Sport In The Commonwealth

Public employee bashing has become a new sport in the Commonwealth. Just listen to those talk-show hosts and many of their callers across the AM radio dial. But this public worker bashing also seems prevalent up on Beacon Hill. Listen to the rhetoric of Gov. Weld (a public employee himself) and his cronies inside the Weld administration. Even Lt. Gov. Cellucci gets in the act.

It upsets me when public workers are bashed by folks who know very little about work in the public sector. I have been employed by the State Department of Mental Health in both support services and direct care since 1972. When I hear folks talking about public employees getting paid for doing next to nothing, I wish they would spend one hour working direct care in a mental health facility before they make their unfounded judgments.

Charlestown has always had a strong representation of workers in the public sector, federal, state and municipal. My father worked in a direct care position for nearly 38 years at Boston City Hospital. He rarely missed a day of work and never came close to getting rich with his city job. My uncle, Neal Harrington, worked for over 25 years for either the MTA or US Post Office. My brother has worked over 19 years for the US Postal Service. My family's history is public service.

Public service is easy to criticize. One bad experience with a government agency and many are ready to pounce on public workers as useless and overpaid. Bashing is a copout. People bad-mouth those who toil in the public sector because they know so little of it. But it is a worse crime when public sector employees bash themselves. We already have enough folks out there being anti-public worker without aiding and abetting them. Me! Of all people! The other day even I was guilty of doing some of my own bashing. While driving into Store 24's lot in Thompson Square, I saw a Boston Transportation Department station wagon enter the lot from the exit, blocking two parking spots. A meter-maid, excuse me, parking enforcement offficer, jumped out and went inside the store. She was inside for no more than one minute but it made me angry that a city employee whose job it is to enforce parking regulations would be so absentminded on city time. As I saw her drive off, I mentioned to someone about how she had parked and what if I had done the same thing where she was on duty ticketing.

That's bashing and it came from my own mouth. It's bad enough when I hear it on the radio, but God, why was I so (insert B-word here)? We public employees are constantly on trial thanks to a Republican governor who feeds into the misplaced anger of taxpayers. Public employees deserve kudos for putting up with so much. Most of us, like my father, will never get close to being rich. But we will have the satisfaction of knowing the jobs we do provide a needed public service that cannot or is not being provided by the private sector.
