

BY THE NUMBERS


During the 2017 legislative session, 442 bills were placed on the calendar in the Florida House. Of those, 308 were sponsored by Republicans, 50 were sponsored by Democrats, and 84 bills had bipartisan co-sponsors. To put that in a percentage, nearly 70 percent of the bills that were heard were Republican bills, 11 percent were Democratic and 19 percent were bipartisan.



NOTABLE LEADERS

Sen. Jose Javier Rodriguez (Miami)

This session, Senator Rodriguez introduced a series of energy-related bills (SBs 456, 974, 976 and 1100) aimed at protecting the environment and consumers' pocketbooks. Rodriguez notes, "Consumers in Florida continue to subsidize an outdated energy system in Florida that stifles innovation, shuts out competition and hurts our environment." Unfortunately, the republican-led Senate refused to hear these bills.



Senator Farmer stood up to big insurance companies and polluters this



session by sponsoring bills that would protect Floridians' quality of life. Farmer introduced a bill that would have prevented insurers from passing higher rates and fees onto consumers, and sponsored legislation that would have paved the way for a statewide fracking ban, protecting our drinking water. Sen. Farmer's bills did not advance through

committees thanks to conservative leadership's refusal to tackle these issues.

Sen. Perry Thurston, Jr. (Ft. Lauderdale)

Throughout the 2017 session, Senator Thurston, a member of the senate Education Committee, was a strong voice for public education. As conservative leadership pushed a massive giveaway to for-profit corporations at the expense of our local public schools, Perry Thurston led the charge against such efforts to undermine Florida's public school children's chance at success.



Rep. Loranne Ausley (Tallahassee)

House Speaker Richard Corcoran claimed this year's budget process would be




open and transparent, but he failed to deliver on this promise. Rep. Ausley clearly articulated Corcoran's blatant hypocrisy on this issue: "All the lofty speeches we heard about the new era of openness and transparency that would be brought to the budget process this year were apparently nothing more than meaningless words... Floridians are tired

of the empty promises that have become the status quo in Tallahassee over the last twenty years and it's now clear this will not be the year anything changes."

Rep. Janet Cruz (Tampa)

House Democratic Leader Cruz championed a wide range of issues this session, including HB 1191, a bill that passed unanimously and will help thousands of patients, especially Florida's seniors by synchronizing their monthly prescriptions. Cruz explains, "Multiple tripsto the pharmacy each month can be a burden that




Rep. Carlos Guillermo Smith (Winter Park)

Representative Carlos Guillermo Smith introduced a bill to improve the Bright Futures scholarship program by expanding access to a quality college education by covering tuition for more students, allowing more funds to pay for textbooks costs as well as summer classes. Smith's work led to the scholarship program receiving an additional \$180 million in much-needed funding - the permanent expansion of which Gov. Scott vetoed.







PREVENTED FLORIDA FROM BUILDING A SKILLED, PRODUCTIVE WORKFORCE:

HB 623 / SB 666 - Florida Competitive Workforce Act

- OVERVIEW: This filed legislative proposal, if adopted, would have protected anyone who lives or works in Florida
 from being discriminated against at work, in housing or in public places because of their sexual orientation or
 gender identity. Expanding nondiscrimination protections in the workplace improves morale, increases
 productivity and employee retention and sends a clear message to the international business community that
 Florida respects diversity and inclusion.
- SPONSORS: Rep. Ben Diamond, Rep. Rene Plasencia, Sen. Jeff Clemens
- STATUS: Died in Careers and Competition Subcommittee

UNDERCUT LOCAL SMALL BUSINESSES & OPPORTUNITIES FOR RETURNING SERVICE MEMBERS:

HB 197 / SB 152 – Small Business Grant Program – Veterans Employment

- OVERVIEW: This bill, if adopted, would have offered a tax credit to Florida small businesses that make it a priority to hire our veterans.
- SPONSORS: Rep. Daisy Baez, Sen. Rene Garcia
- STATUS: Died in House Local, Federal and Veterans Affairs Subcommittee & Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Transportation, Tourism, and Economic Development



FAILED TO CONSERVE & PROTECT FLORIDA'S NATURAL RESOURCES:

SB 198 - Environmental Regulation Commission

- OVERVIEW: This legislative proposal would have required the governor to fill vacancies on the commission within 90 days so that openings can no longer be used to ram through industry-backed measures that threaten our environment.
- SPONSORS: Sen. Linda Stewart
- STATUS: Passed in Senate; died in House Messages

HB 451 / SB 442 – Advanced Well Stimulation Treatment (Fracking Ban)

- OVERVIEW: This proposed bill, if adopted, would have prohibited well stimulation treatment, including hydraulic fracking, in order to protect our natural resources, most importantly, our precious drinking water supply.
- SPONSORS: Rep. Janet Cruz, Rep. Mike Miller, Sen. Dana Young
- STATUS: Died in House Natural Resources and Public Lands Subcommittee & Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on the Environment and Natural Resources

SHORTCHANGED OUR KIDS' ACCESS TO QUALITY EDUCATION:

SB 964 / HB 1249 - Education Accountability

- OVERVIEW: This bipartisan measure, if adopted, would have overhauled the burdensome testing requirements that take up too much class time in Florida public schools, end state oversight of teacher evaluations and delete controversial rules that tie evaluations to students' test-score results.
- SPONSORS: Sen. Bill Montford, Rep. Halsey Beshears
- STATUS: Died in Education Committee

HB 489 – Restore Our Bright Futures Act

- OVERVIEW: This bill, if adopted, would have expanded access to affordable college by covering more students, textbook costs and summer classes under the Bright Futures Scholarship program.
- SPONSORS: Rep. Carlos Guillermo Smith
- STATUS: Died in House Post-Secondary Education Subcommittee



FAILED TO PROTECT CONSUMERS' POCKETBOOKS:

HB 319 - Helen Gordon Davis Fair Pay Act

- OVERVIEW: This important legislative proposal, if adopted, would have strengthened state law to protect employees based on their sex or gender identity from wage discrimination.
- SPONSORS: Rep. Lori Berman, Rep. Janet Cruz
- STATUS: Died in House Careers and Competition Subcommittee

SB 160 / HB 945 - Minimum Wage

- OVERVIEW: This legislation, if adopted, would have increased the state minimum wage to \$15 an hour.
- SPONSORS: Sen. Jose Javier Rodriguez, Rep. Al Jacquet
- STATUS: Died in House Careers and Competition and Senate Commerce and Tourism Subcommittees

SB 974 – Public Utility Environmental Remediation Costs

- OVERVIEW: This bill, if adopted, would have created a mechanism to prevent utilities from passing cost of remediating environmental damage caused by the companies on to the customer.
- SPONSORS: Sen. Jose Javier Rodriguez
- STATUS: Died in Senate Communications, Energy and Public Utilities Committee



ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY INDEX — METHODOLOGY

Throughout the 2017 Legislative Session, FloridaStrong monitored votes on key economic issues that demonstrate a legislator's governing philosophy and values.

In the following pages, FloridaStrong highlights votes that were taken on the floor of the House or Senate where every legislator's position was represented. However, because certain legislative proposals never made it to the House or Senate floor, we also included some of the most important actions taken in legislative committees on measures that never reached the floor. In these cases, we have presented the relevant committee votes and only the positions of those who serve on those particular committees are highlighted.

If a legislator voted in support of our economic opportunity priority, his or her vote is recorded as a green check. If a legislator voted against our economic priority, his or her vote is indicated with a red X. If a legislator did not vote on an issue, their vote is recorded as N/A. If a legislator voted after roll call, his or her vote is recorded as YAR (yes after roll call) or NAR (no after roll call) when applicable.

Scores were calculated by averaging each lawmaker's vote on economic opportunity priority legislation. For instance, if a lawmaker supported seven out of eight of the selected bills on which they could vote, they receive an 88 percent in the index. If a lawmaker supported one of the selected bills, but could only vote on six, they receive a score of 17 percent. Additional recognition of sponsors/co-sponsors were calculated as follows:

- Bill sponsor/co-sponsor on economic opportunity legislation: + 5% to final score
- Bill sponsor/co-sponsor on anti-economic opportunity legislation: 5% from final score

Lawmakers who scored higher than 60 percent received a passing grade, while those who scored below 60 percent received a failing grade on the economic opportunity test. If you are interested in additional scoring information, please email info@florida-strong.org.
