### City To Award Final Designation Of Old Charlestown High

The City of Boston, through the Public Facilities Department, will convey within two weeks the former Charlestown High School to designated developer Graham Gund Associates (G.G.A.) When the Boston School Department declared this school sur-

plus property. Public Facilities Department received numerous proposals for development. Some of these proposals were for condominiums, other requested up to forty-eight rental units.

Through public meetings, discussions with neighborhood residents,

and with modifications requested by Public Facilities Department, the G.G.A. design was chosen. The proposal includes forty rental units, demolition of the annex for 17 suppressed parking spaces to complement the 23 spaces in the basement of the structure, and special emphasis on

the preservation and restoration of the interior and exterior architecture. With compliance to neighborhood and departmental concerns the G.G.A. design was most appropriate to serve the public interest. Construction to begin shortly after conveyance.

### World War II Destroyer Crew Returns To Navy Yard

Crew members of a World War II destroyer built in Boston will be at the Charlestown Navy Yard on Friday, February 8, at 10:00 a.m. aboard the Cassin Young. The World War II veterans will donate a combat picture of the ship, the Heywood L. Edwards (DD 663), to the National Park Service.

The Heywood L. Edwards was built at the Boston Navy Yard in 1943. The National Park Service maintains the area as an historic site, part of Boston National Historical Park, where USS Constitution and the World War II destroyer Cassin Young are berthed.

The Heywood L. Edwards was an outstanding example of Boston's contributions to the war effort. The ship received the Navy Unit commendation and seven Battle Stars for her role in the Pacific War, including operations at Saipan, Palau, Leyte, Surigao

Strait, Luzon, Iwo Jima, and Okinawa. The Heywood L. Edwards also holds the record among all U.S. warships for the longest uninterrupted duty in a forward combat area in World War II—128 straight days.

The ceremony on February 8 will be open to the public. Former crew members of the Heywood

L. Edwards and the Cassin Young will be available to answer questions, and the

National Park Service will make the Cassin Young available to the public and members of the media. After the ceremony coffee will be served in the Hull Room in Building 5.

### Underpass Closed

Due to the repeated ice conditions in the Sullivan Square Underpass, the City of Boston's Public Works Commissioner Joseph Casazza has issued orders to close both roadways to all vehicular traffic.

The closure will begin on February 9, 1985 and will remain closed until warmer weather allows the reopening. The icing condition will be rectified prior to next winter and a new lighting system will be installed by April 16, 1985.

# Tufts U. Students To Study Traffic Problems

The Charlestown Citizens for Rational Development has asked Tufts University's Urban Studies Department to provide a team of students to study and report on traffic and parking problems in Charlestown. Professor Rob Hollister has selected a group of three graduate students and one undergraduate student to undertake this project. Following is a first look at defining some of the issues facing the Charlestown community. Charlestown citizens are invited to send their ideas and concerns to C.C.R.D., P.O. Box 54, Charlestown, 02129. These letters will be shared with the Tufts team.

### WHAT ARE THE ISSUES?

Charlestown expects a number of new large scale developments to come on line in the next couple of years. What are these developments? Where are they? What new demands will they generate for traffic and for parking? What choices are there for how the town can meet these demands?

Many of the existing single family homes are being subdivided into multiple units. Many of the residences that used to sponsor one car now have two or three. Are these beliefs accurate? Is the impact of traffic and parking significant enough to be of concern to Charlestown? How can these problems be alleviated?

Can truck traffic on Medford Street be re-routed? What is the scope of the problem? How might the situation change if the sugar factories are converted to other, more intensive, industrial waterfront uses?

Is traffic volume or speeding a problem on Main Street and Bunker Hill Street? To what extent are these streets used by suburban commuters to get in and out of Boston? What alternatives are there for reducing the problem?

Are on-street parking spaces being used by suburban commuters? What is the extent of the situation? What

problems does it cause for Charlestown residents? How can the problems be alleviated?

How many new housing units are expected to be added to Charlestown in the next three years? How many cars will come with these units? How many parking spaces are there now? How many parking spaces will be needed?

How many new office and retail square feet will be added in Charlestown in the next three years? How many cars will come (both employees and customers) with this new development? How many parking spaces are needed now? How many will be needed?

Which neighborhoods have particularly acute problems with parking? What can be done to help these particular neighborhoods?

Is the transportation and traffic routing plan adequate to ensure that the Charlestown Navy Yard is accessible to Charlestown and to the rest of Boston? Are there ways the traffic route can be improved?

Is there adequate coordination between the various city and state agencies that deal with traffic and parking issues? What are these agencies?

### PHASES OF THE PROJECT:

#### PHASE ONE: FACTFINDING

The Tufts team will interview local residents, developers, city and state officials to understand the scope of the problem and future development plans.

#### PHASE TWO: ANALYSIS

The Tufts team will analyze the data, maps and plans they have collected according to an analytical framework that is intended to clarify the problems encountered during Phase One.

#### PHASE THREE: RECOMMENDATIONS

The Tufts team will prepare a series of recommendations or possible options intended to alleviate the problems identified in Phase One.

#### PHASE FOUR: PRESENTATION

The Tufts team will present their findings and recom-

mendations to the Charlestown community at a public meeting and will make the information available in a written report that can be shared with neighborhood organizations and city and state officials.

## Democrats To Caucus February 9th

Registered Democrats in Ward Two, Charlestown will be holding a caucus on Saturday, February 9, 1985 at 2:00 p.m. to elect delegates to the 1985 Massachusetts Democratic Convention which will be held in Springfield for the purpose of adopting a party platform.

Ward Two, Charlestown will be electing 12 delegates and two alternates equally divided between men and women, to send to the Convention.

Matt O'Neil Jr. will call the caucus at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School Street. The caucus is open to all registered Democrats, persons ineligible to register and

media representatives. The only persons eligible to participate in any portion of the caucus are those who are registered Democrats in the ward or town as of December 31, 1984. There will be no absentee or proxy voting.

Candidates for delegate and alternate must also be present and give his or her written consent to be nominated and that nomination must be seconded by two persons present at the local caucus.

All ballots will be written and secret. Those candidates receiving the greatest number of votes on the first ballot will be elected.

Each candidate will be

allowed to make a two-minute speech and to distribute on his/her behalf one sheet of paper listing qualifications and ideas.

If you are a high school drop-out aged 16 to 21, the Action for Boston Community Development (ABCD) New Beginnings Program can help you earn while you learn the skills to get back on a career track.

"New Beginnings", a part of the ABCD Learning Center, offers each student a career-based, individualized education and employment plan, and guaranteed job placement if a student wishes to work

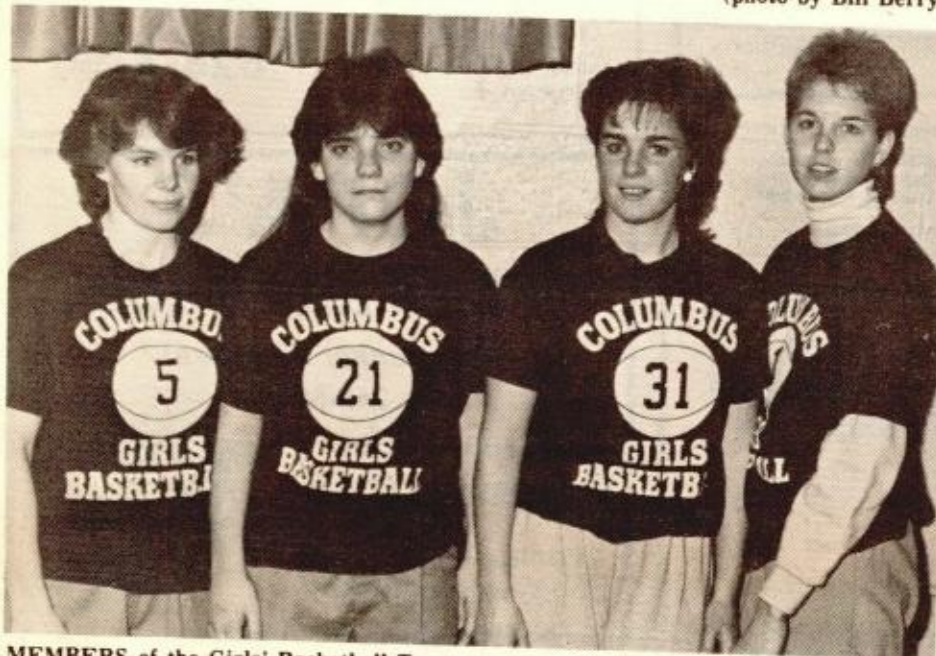

## MGH To Launch Coordinated Care Program In Charlestown

The Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH) has launched its Coordinated Care Program, designed to keep elderly out of the hospital and in their homes. Funded by The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Program for Hospital Initiatives in Long-Term Care, the MGH program has undergone a year of intensive planning. The foundation has announced that it has renewed its grant for \$500,852 for three years to allow the hospital to begin implementing its plan in Charlestown, Chelsea, and Revere.

The Coordinated Care Program, which will eventually enroll more than 300 patients, is a natural extension of many of the services the MGH has offered to local residents for several years. With its systems of community health centers and other programs that emphasize community- and home-based care, the hospital has sought to provide its elderly patients with alternatives to long, and often unnecessary, hospital and nursing home stays.

The Coordinated Care Program, however, provides one ingredient that has never before been available to these elderly patients—a team of MGH health care providers who will coordinate the many varied services, available both through the hospital and the community, and determine which ones best meet the particular needs of each patient.

The coordinated care approach emphasizes continual, consistent management of a care plan on a one-to-one basis. The team members are a nurse and a social worker, who work closely with the primary care physician (who oversees all aspects of the patient's care). A geriatrician is also available for consultation. Team members will follow the patient from admission to the MGH, through the hospital stay, and after discharge to other facilities or home.

"The team's aim is to coordinate services for frail elderly, particularly in that initial period after hospital discharge when older people may run into real problems," said Alan Jette, Ph.D., Acting Coordinator of the MGH program. "Plans set up may fall apart; new needs arise that may not have been anticipated. The team's involvement will help the primary care physician and community agencies provide essential services to this high-risk group of patients, who likely would not have taken advantage of such services."

From the elderly patient's point of view, the program aims to increase the chance of staying at home, using non-institutional services, such as visiting nurses, foster care, day care, and other home care services, rather than resorting to hospitalization or long-term confinement in a

nursing home.

To facilitate communication and coordination among the hospital, health centers, and other agencies, the Coordinated Care Program has developed a computerized record system. "Information sharing is the key to long-term care," said Dr. Jette, who is also Associate Professor of Gerontology at the MGH Institute of Health Professions. "Unlike the hospital setting, in community-based care, every agency has its own records. Although much information sharing exists, without the computer system it is difficult to keep information current throughout the provider network."

Initially, the hospital, its health center, and the team will share the MGH systems. Other agencies, including Spaulding Rehabilitation Hospital and the MGH/Spaulding Home Care Program (both owned by the MGH), the

Visiting Nurses Association, and participating home care corporations, will receive updated information as it occurs. Sometime in the future many of these providers may also become part of the computerized network.

"Our goal is to see a reduction in the need for institutional care, a reduction in the rate of hospitalization, and fewer people going to long-term institutions," said Dr. Jette. "At the MGH almost 40 percent of patients over age 65 who are admitted with congestive heart failure are readmitted within six months of discharge. Not only is hospitalization expensive, it is highly disruptive for this age group. If hospitalization is appropriate, it will

of course occur. However, we think that a large proportion of our elderly patients are better able to

manage their health problems in their own homes with our help and with the assistance of community health providers."
