MESSAGE FROM THE OFFICER IN CHARGE

The lessons around adaptability learned in 2020 helped us to face the many challenges in 2021. With new terms added to our vocabulary, from Omicron to heat domes, our police officers and support staff displayed tremendous flexibility and perseverance, continuing to drive down crime and provide responsive service to the community. This report details some of the individuals and units who have contributed to our collective goal of enhancing public safety in Surrey.

COVID-19 continued to present new challenges throughout 2021. The protocols developed by our Emergency and Operational Planning Unit (EOP) in 2020 proved to be essential when Omicron hit in 2021, and allowed us to shift resources to ensure core-policing operations were maintained across the city. The EOP provided essential support when several natural disasters and weather events hit, coordinating emergency assistance to affected staff, and readying the detachment to assist neighbouring jurisdictions.

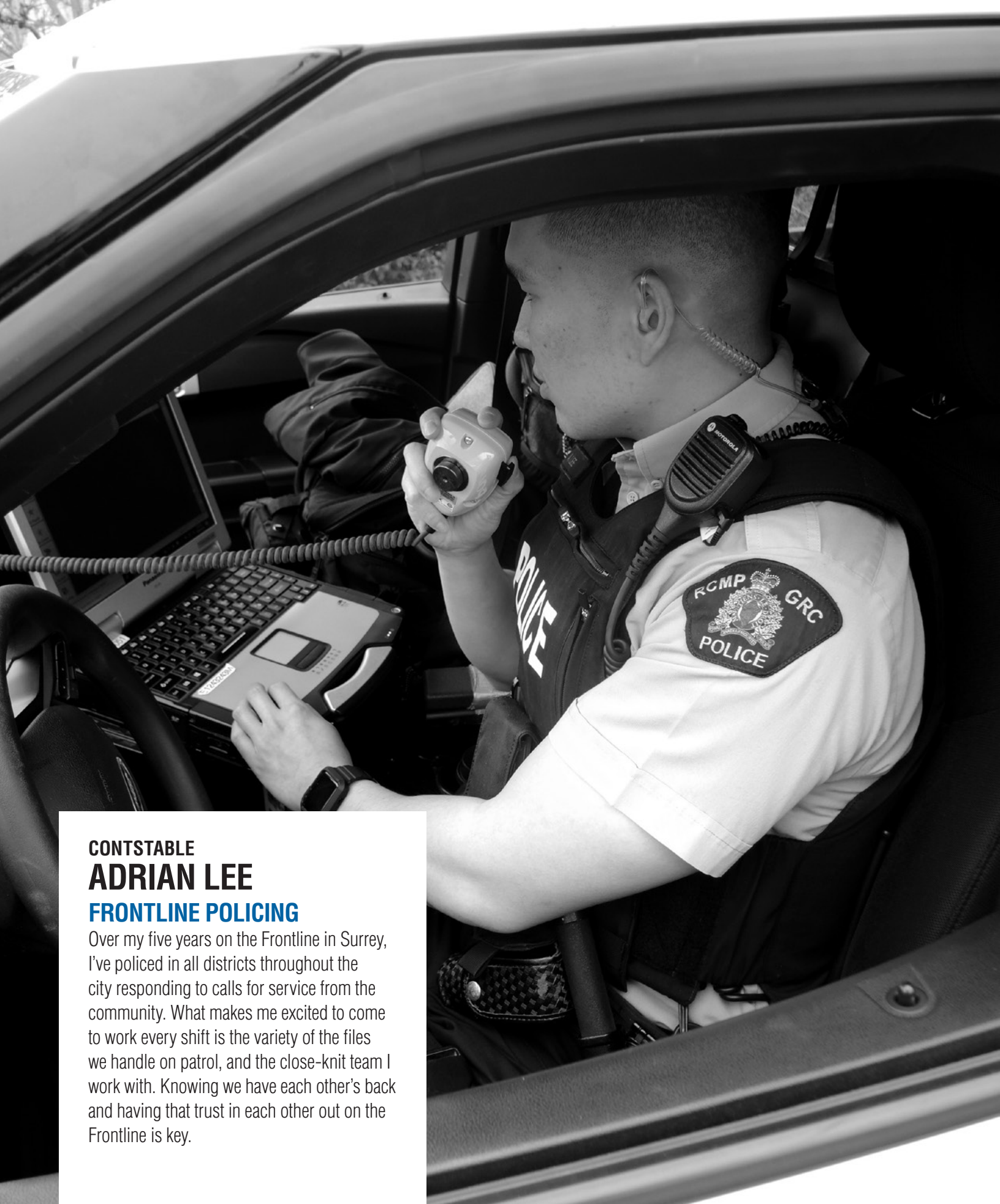
Extensive work and planning continues by all parties involved in the ongoing Surrey policing transition. In November 2021, we welcomed the first deployment of Surrey Police Service (SPS) officers into our detachment. This marked the start of the initial phase of the transition, where SPS officers work alongside RCMP officers under the Surrey RCMP command. A transition of this magnitude is complex. I've been very impressed with the professionalism demonstrated by both SPS and RCMP officers during this initial deployment. We will continue to work with SPS and all public safety partners to ensure a policing transition where public and police officer safety remains number one.

Reviewing the shift reports from the Frontline every day, there are a few key themes that stand out. The illicit drug trade continues to be a large driver of both violent and property crime. Drug addictions and mental health issues account for a significant number of the calls for service. Last year, our officers administered 144 doses of life-saving Naloxone to overdose victims, attended over 7,600 calls that involved a person suffering from a mental health crisis, and over 2,000 suicidal calls for service.

While our teams focus on both enforcement and intervention, these societal issues extend far beyond policing. The collaboration with both health and community partners is essential to help support individuals facing mental health, addictions issues and homelessness in our community. Outlined in the report is some of the proactive work by the Police Mental Health Outreach Team, Car 67, Surrey Gang Enforcement Team, and the integration of nursing staff into our Cell Block area to best support our vulnerable population. The innovative strategies demonstrated by these teams are considered a best practice and have been adopted in other jurisdictions.

In the myriad of files we attended in 2021, from the routine calls, to the dynamic major crime files or the tragic situations, what has stood out for me have been the countless acts of kindness and compassion displayed by our officers, employees, and by citizens of Surrey. Whether a small gesture or a life-saving action, these acts inspire me every day.

In 2021, Surrey RCMP celebrated a milestone anniversary, 70 years of service to the community. I want to thank each of you for your tremendous support, partnership and outstanding contributions to public safety in our city. It is truly my honour to serve as Surrey's Officer-in-Charge.

POLICING PHILOSOPHY

COMMUNITY POLICING

Public safety is a shared responsibility between the police and the public, working together to achieve a safe community.

INTELLIGENCE-LED POLICING

Research, analysis and evidence-based decision making are critical to effective and efficient policing.

INTEGRATED POLICING

Integrated police services enables maximizes resources and our ability to respond in a coordinated, timely fashion. Surrey RCMP benefits from the services of a number of Lower Mainland Integrated Teams including Integrated Police Dog Services, Integrated Forensic Identification Services, Emergency Response Team, Integrated Homicide Investigation Team, and Integrated Collision Analysis Reconstruction Team.

SURREY POLICING TRANSITION

In 2018 the City of Surrey exercised its authority under the BC Police Act and began the process to establish a municipal police service. A policing transition of this magnitude is unprecedented in Canada, and requires detailed planning and collaboration.

In 2020, the Surrey Policing Transition Trilateral Committee (SPTTC) was established between Public Safety Canada, the Province and the City of Surrey to develop and implement the phased integrated transition of the RCMP to the Surrey Police Service (SPS).

INITIAL DEPLOYMENT OF SURREY POLICE SERVICE OFFICERS

As part of a phased, integrated policing transition, the first group of experienced police officers with the Surrey Police Service began their deployment with the Surrey RCMP in November 2021.

During this initial phase of the policing transition, the RCMP continues to be in command as the police force of jurisdiction in Surrey, overseeing all operational policing matters and the delivery of policing programs and services.

As part of the onboarding process, SPS officers receive a detailed orientation outlining Surrey detachment's policies and practices. After the orientation and pairing up with an RCMP officer for a few shifts, SPS officers are out responding to files, for the time being, in RCMP branded vehicles.

Public safety remains our number one priority throughout the transition process.

NEXT STEPS

The RCMP and SPS are executing a joint human resources strategy to ensure the coordination and deployment of SPS officers alongside Surrey RCMP officers. Work will now shift to developing critical pathways to determine processes for such issues as: change of command, transfer of assets, and information management and technology.

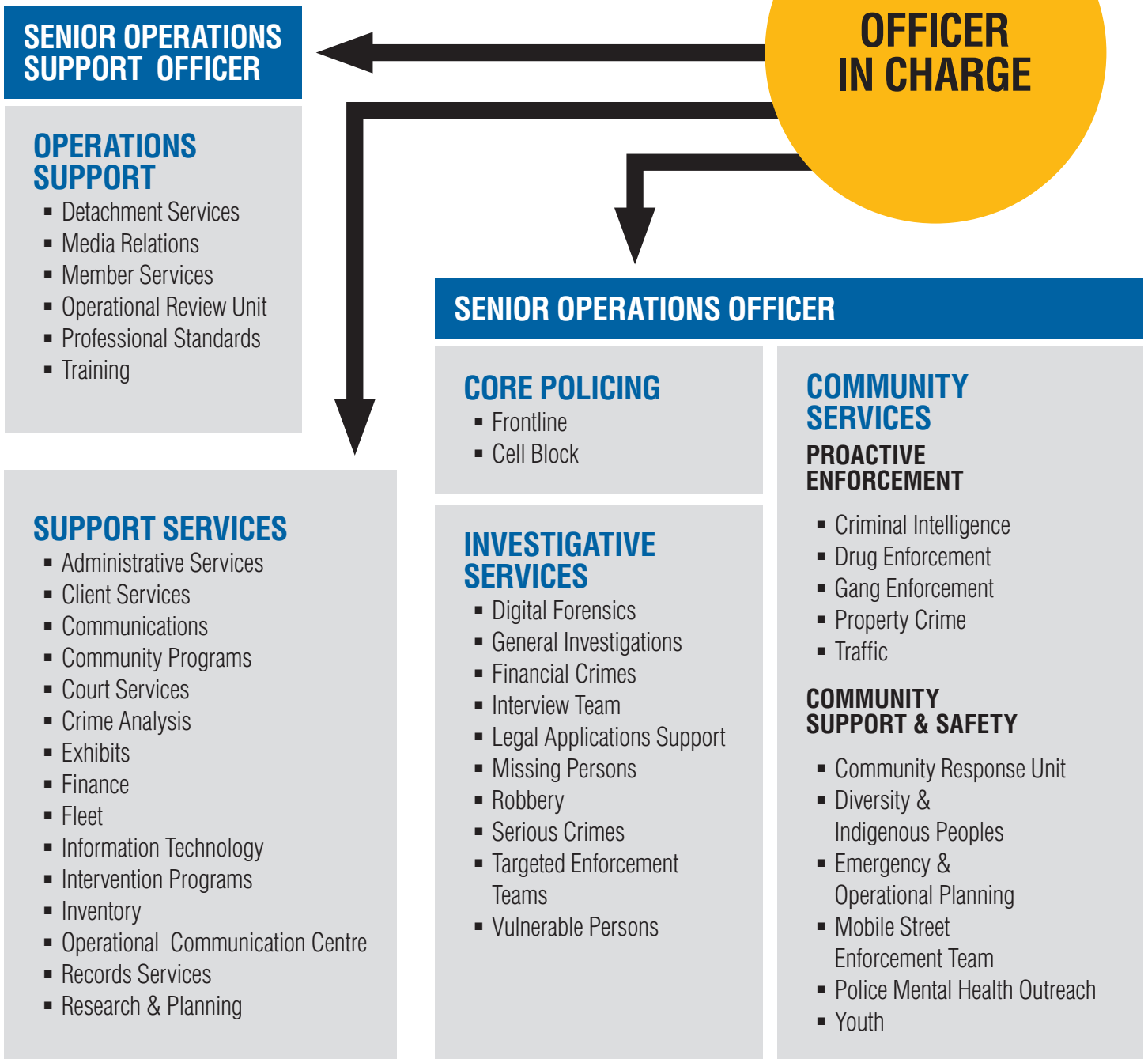

TELECOMMUNICATIONS OPERATOR

The Operational Communications Centre provides 24/7 call taking and dispatch support to policing operations in Surrey and White Rock. On average, staff handle between 500-600 calls for service on any given day. It's a fast-paced environment that requires timely and accurate collection and dissemination of information to police officers on the road. The OCC is the lifeline between the community and the police, a role that is vitally important to both officer and public safety.

STAFFING LEVELS

The Surrey RCMP has maintained the same staffing levels for the past three years. The City of Surrey establishes the level of police resources and budget for policing in Surrey.

UNIFORM POLICING

Over 500 officers provide a visible, uniformed police presence in the community. This includes Frontline, Traffic Services and our Community Response Unit, as well as teams that focus on foot and bike patrols, mental health outreach, gang enforcement, youth and engagement with diverse communities.

EMPLOYEE DIVERSITY

Surrey RCMP aims to be reflective of the diverse community we serve. Collectively our employees provide service to the community in over 50 different languages, with over one third of officers self-reporting as visible minorities. In 2021, females made up 20% of our Commissioned Officers in leadership positions.

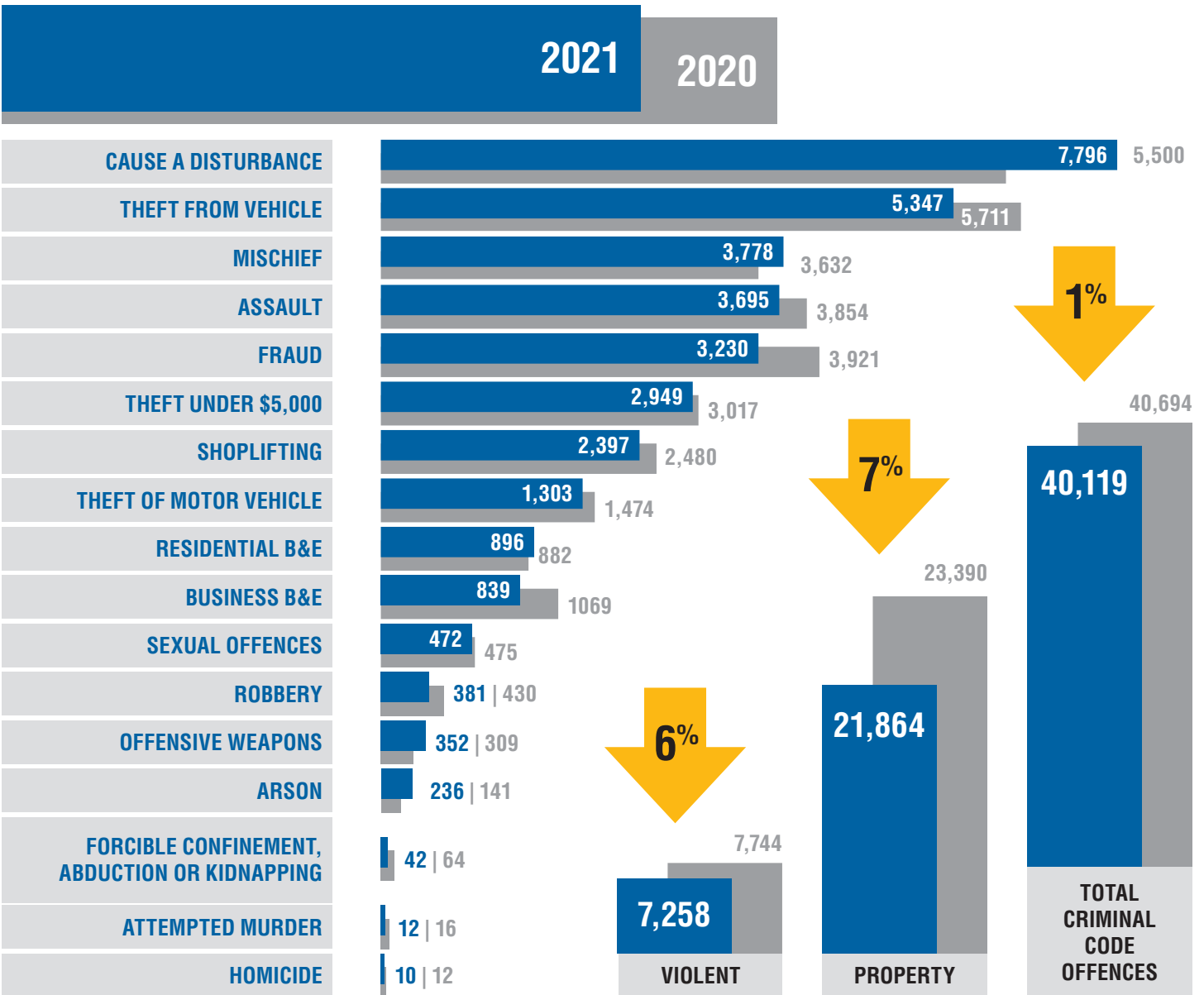

EMERGENCY & OPERATIONAL PLANNING UNIT

The Emergency Operational and Planning Unit (EOP) has played an integral role ensuring the continuity of policing operations in Surrey during the COVID-19 pandemic. They developed and managed the impact of several COVID variants on staffing levels, carefully monitoring core-policing resources. When wildfires and flooding hit communities and closed highways in the region, they activated the Emergency Operations Centre to assist any staff affected and ensure the Surrey RCMP would be ready to help neighbouring communities in need. The EOP Unit coordinates efforts to deal with any protests, demonstrations, and rallies in the city.

SURREY GANG ENFORCEMENT TEAM

Our Surrey Gang Enforcement Team (SGET) has extensive knowledge of the individuals involved in the Lower Mainland Gang Conflict. SGET seeks to disrupt the criminal activities of gang members through drug investigations, vehicle interdictions, and regular checks on individuals who are subject to court-ordered curfews.

SGET also works closely with Surrey schools and community groups to help prevent youth from joining gangs.



Surrey RCMP's Drug Unit uncovered a fentanyl super lab in the Spring of 2021, recovering the equivalent of 26 kg of illicit fentanyl or 13 million fatal doses. The fentanyl lab was the largest and most sophisticated lab to date encountered by the RCMP Clandestine Response Team.

INADMISSIBLE PATRONS PROGRAM

Our Inadmissible Patrons Program (IPP) deters gang members from meeting and conducting business in Surrey. Participating IPP establishments authorize police to remove known gang members and their associates from their business.

DRUG TRAFFICKING

The majority of gang activity revolves around the purchase, distribution and sale of illicit drugs. Our Drug Section targets individuals and groups involved in the trafficking of fentanyl, as well as individuals and groups with linkages to gangs and organized crime.

INTERNET CHILD EXPLOITATION UNIT

Our team investigates the possession and/or distribution of online child sexual exploitation material, online child luring, and the possible sexual abuse of children in our jurisdiction related to this crime type. We see a large volume of files come in through third parties, referred to us through the National Child Exploitation Crime Centre. Our primary goal is to ensure the safety of these young victims. We also help to end the cycle of victimization through participation in programs like Project Arachnid, which issues takedown notices to electronic service providers to remove images and videos of child sexual exploitation from the internet.

The Police Mental Health Outreach Team (PMHOT) works collaboratively with health and community partners to help residents who have contact with police and are dealing with mental health issues, homelessness, and/or addictions. The team focuses on building relationships and assisting with connections to services.

Car 67 pairs a police officer with a Fraser Health nurse to respond to police calls that involve significant mental health issues. The nurse provides assessments and referrals, while the officer provides crisis intervention and ensures the safety of the nurse and clients.

WORKING WITH PARTNERS

Addressing issues of mental health, addictions and homelessness requires the support of the entire community. While social issues are not police issues, we are often the call of last resort – in middle of the night, or when someone, such as a health worker or family member, feels they may be in danger. The Police Mental Health Outreach Team attends several meetings a month with over 20 agencies. We work together to ensure that the privacy and well-being of vulnerable citizens are paramount in every incident requiring police attendance.

CELL BLOCK

REGISTERED NURSE AMNEET, TEAM LEAD CELL GUARD JAG, & SGT. TEICHRIEB

The officers, cell guards, and nurses who work in the detachment's Cell Block provide 24/7 support to ensure efficient processing, monitoring and care of prisoners in a secure environment. In 2021, over 4,600 prisoners were lodged in Cells. Many prisoners who are brought to Cells have complex medical, mental health and addictions issues. Recognizing the importance of in-house medical support, Surrey was the first RCMP detachment in Canada to integrate nurses into Cell Block operations.

PROACTIVE PATROLS

Our Mobile Street Enforcement Team (MSET) uses bike and foot patrols to reduce crime and provide a highly visible police presence in commercial areas and greenspaces. In 2021, MSET made 318 arrests while out on patrols in the city.

COMMUNITY POLICING & SPECIALIZED TEAMS

Officers with our Community Response Unit work out of offices in each of our five policing districts. They focus on local crime issues and connecting with residents. In addition, our specialized auto and property crime target teams address prolific offenders who may be active in a specific community.

ADDRESSING PROBLEM PROPERTIES

Together with the City of Surrey, we identify and address properties causing significant public safety issues. By addressing 40 problem properties in 2021, we are able to reduce overall crime in those areas.

Our officers regularly engage with Surrey's business improvement associations and chambers of commerce. Together, we work to prevent and address crime and nuisance issues that negatively impacts Surrey businesses.

**CRIMINAL COLLISION
INVESTIGATION TEAM (CCIT)**

As an investigator with the CCIT, I am called out to investigate traffic collisions that involve serious injuries or fatalities in Surrey. We work directly with a number of specialized units, including the Integrated Collision Analysis and Reconstruction Unit. Our goal is to follow the evidence and find the truth of what happened using the principles of Major Case Management. A big part of our job is liaising with the families; being able to find answers around the circumstances of the collision can help bring closure to the families who have suffered sudden and tragic losses.

Guided by data collected through the Black Cat Radar, Surrey RCMP Traffic Services conducted enforcement at 125 Street and 104 Ave in November. 12 vehicles were impounded in 12 days for excessive speeding, including this vehicle travelling 105 km in a 30 km zone.
