A Sock Hop for youngsters 5 to 10 years of age will open Charlestown

Pride Week. Charlestown Mayor Debbie Lang is organizing the dance, which will be held from 2 to 6 p.m. on Sunday, June 7 at St. Catherine's Hall on Tufts Street.

A "Salute To Charlestown" by the USS Constitution will also be on June 13 when some 150 lottery winners and their guests will board the ship for a turnaround cruise, courtesy of CDR. Christopher Melhuish, USN, commanding officer, and the U.S. Navy.

A new addition to the celebration is a Bunker Hill Day Concert by the newly formed Charlestown Chorus. It will be held at 3 p.m. on Saturday, June 13 at the USS Constitution Museum in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

The annual Battle of Bunker Hill Road Race, to benefit the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club, begins with the two-mile novice race at 8:30 a.m., followed by the 8K at 9:30 a.m. on Sunday, June 14.

The annual Bunker Hill Day Breakfast, sponsored by the Bunker Hill Associates, begins at 9 a.m. on Sunday, June 14 at the K. of C. Hall, 75 West School St.

The gala Bunker Hill Day Parade, led by Chief

Marshal William J. "Bill" Foley, chief of interpretation for the Boston National Historical Park, will step off from Hayes Square at 12:30 p.m. on Sunday, June 14. The parade is being dedicated in honor of the Boston National Historical Park and its mission of "preserving the past for future generations."

Over 28 musical units have committed to march, and various organizations are planning floats. Residents and visitors are asked to remove their vehicles from the parade route by 9 a.m. on June 14. (The streets that will be posted for "no parking" are listed elsewhere on this page.)

The commemoration of the 223rd anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill will be held on Wednesday,

June 17.

An Ecumenical Service at St. Francis de Sales Church, atop Bunker Hill, will begin at 9 a.m. after which a procession will form on Bunker Hill Street and march to the Monument Grounds for the patriotic exercises, scheduled to begin at 10 a.m. The Monument Orator will be the Hon. Ralph C. Martin, District Attorney of Suffolk County.

The day's activities will conclude with the 175th annual meeting of the Bunker Hill Monument Association at noon at Bunker Hill Post 26, The American Legion Hall, 23 Adams St.

### Cars Will Be Towed On The Parade Route

Residents of Charlestown and their guests, visitors and businesspersons are warned that they must remove their cars from the parade route and assembly area by 9 a.m. on Sunday, June 14, so that the parade may proceed in an orderly fashion without obstructions. Any cars left on the streets after that time will be towed by the Boston Police Department.

Streets that have a No Parking provision from 9 a.m. until the conclusion of the parade are:

- Bunker Hill Street from Chelsea Street to Sullivan Square;
- Main Street from the intersection of Main, Bunker Hill and Medford streets to Union Street;
- Union Street to Washington Street;
- Washington Street to Harvard Street;
- Harvard Street from Washington to Main streets;
- Pleasant Street from Main to Warren streets;
- Warren Street from Pleasant to Monument Avenue;
- Monument Avenue from Warren to Monument Square;
- Monument Square from Monument Avenue to Pleasant Street;
- High Street from Pleasant to Green streets;
- Green Street from High to Bartlett streets;
- Bartlett Street from Green to Concord streets;
- Monument Square from Concord to Lexington to Winthrop streets;
- Winthrop Street from Monument Square to Common Street;
- Common Street from Winthrop to Park streets.

Also, the streets where the parade is assembling will have a ban on parking from 9 a.m. until the parade leaves the area, sometime after 1 p.m. Those streets are: Lowney Way, Chelsea Street from Gate 1 to Medford Street, Decatur, Corey, Tufts, Vine and Hunter streets.

Since 1893, BGCB has provided activities,

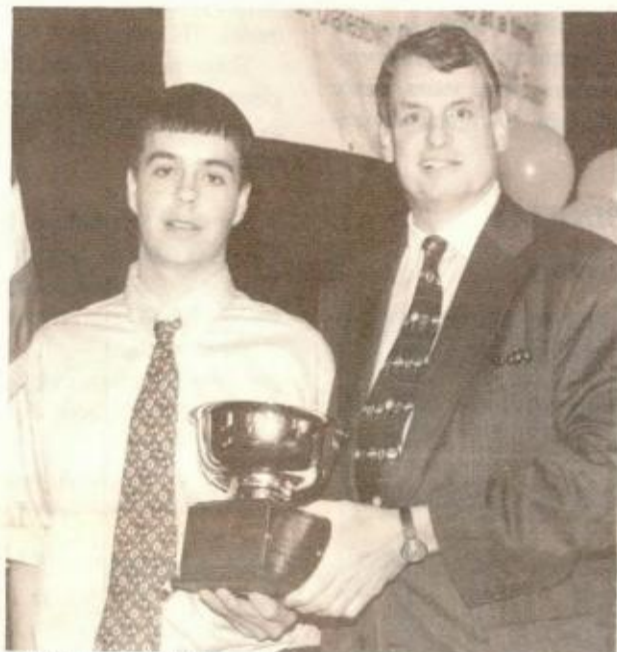
programs and counseling services that help many of Boston's most at risk youth to become caring and responsible adults.

## Keane Presents Check To Edwards Middle School

## Contract Awarded For Boston Harbor Dredging

Boston Harbor will be dredged under the terms of a \$31,927,300 contract issued recently by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The dredging, which will be accomplished by Great Lakes Dredge & Dock Co. of Oak Brook, Illinois, will begin this summer and take 18 to 24 months to complete.

Great Lakes Dredge & Dock Co. submitted the lowest of four bids for the work which ranged as high as \$53 million. The government estimated the dredging would cost \$51 million.

The contract calls for maintenance and improvement dredging in the vari-

ous channels and berths within the harbor. The Reserved Channel will be deepened from 35 to 40 feet except for the upper 1,340 feet. In addition, some berthing areas will be dredged to 40 feet, as will be a turning area in the main ship channel opposite the Reserved Channel.

The Chelsea River channel will be deepened from 35 to 38 feet, while a major portion of the Mystic River channel, along with some berthing areas, will be dredged to 40 feet. Finally, a portion of the main ship channel leading to where the Mystic and Chelsea rivers meet will be deepened from 35 feet to 40 feet

to provide a maneuvering area for vessels entering the Mystic River.

An estimated total of 2.1 million cubic yards of rock, silt, sand, gravel and clay will be removed. Dredged material not suitable for unconfined ocean disposal will be deposited in cells dug below the bottom of the navigation channels and capped with clean material. The remaining material will be taken to the Mass. Bay Disposal Site about 25 miles east of Boston.

All work will be accomplished under the supervision of a Corps of Engineers dredging inspector to ensure compliance with contract requirements.

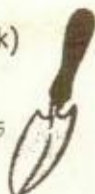
