### Bunker Hill Tenants Task Force Sues BHA Over Welding Of Penthouse Doors

On Friday morning, September 27th, the Boston Housing Court will hold a hearing on the Bunker Hill Tenants Task Force's request for injunctive relief

against the Boston Housing Authority (BHA). The court case stems from the failure of the BHA and the Task Force to resolve the issue of the Housing Authority's in-

attention to weld shut the "penthouse" roof top doorways. This action would block the development residents' only second means of egress.

A second meeting on September 17th was requested by BHA legal counsel Wilber Comadore who, along with David Gilmore, Special Deputy of Operations and Rod Solomon, Chief Legal Counsel met with the Task Forces' Maintenance Committee. At that meeting, David Gilmore claimed the legal right to weld the doors without obtaining permits and said he saw no other alternative.

The Task Force has retained Harvey Shapiro, Esq., of the law firm Collier and Sessa, to represent the residents of the development.

Task Force board and committee members are raising funds for legal cost through a "safety first" raf-

## City To Issue Notices Of Estimated Tax Payment

The City of Boston, consistent with State Law, is planning to issue Notices of Estimated Tax Payments while completing the revaluation of all property for Fiscal 1986. The Commonwealth requires that all cities and towns revalue property every three years. Boston's revaluation is scheduled to be completed in the spring of 1986.

Boston taxpayers will receive notices in early October. The Notices of Estimated Tax Payment will not be based on the anticipated new assessments, tax rate, or actual taxes due for Fiscal 1986. In most cases, they will reflect half of the total taxes due last year. The Notices will not be voluntary bills and must be paid within 30 days of the date of issue to avoid interest and penalties.

In the winter of 1986, following the issuance of appraisal notices listing the new assessments, homeowners will have an opportunity to meet with assessors at neighborhood hearings to discuss any questions they may have.

The actual Fiscal 1986 tax bill, based on the new assessment and tax rate, will be issued in the spring of 1986. It will reflect a credit for payments made on the Estimated Tax Payment. The legally prescribed period for filing abatements will follow the issuance of the actual tax bill in the spring and will not be affected by the Notice of Estimated Tax Payment.

"We are very pleased to report that the revaluation is on schedule and proceeding as planned," said Commissioner of Assessing William B. Coughlin. "Data Collectors have been well received in every neighborhood of the city. The information they have gathered to date has proven to be very reliable and will ensure that the spring assessments are accurate and fair."

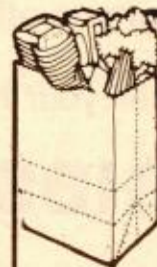

## BRA To Hold Public Hearing On New Housing Creation Regulations

The Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) Board of Directors will be holding a public hearing on Tuesday, October 1, 1985 at 7:30 p.m. in Room 801 at Boston City Hall on proposed Housing Creation Regulations. The Housing Creation Regulations will establish a mechanism by which developers obligated to make linkage payments, may satisfy that obligation to the city by building low to moderate income housing.

Under Article 26 of the Boston Zoning Code, developers of certain projects, known as Development Impact Projects, must contribute to the alleviation of the city's housing shortage by satisfying a Development

Exaction, which is an amount equal to \$5.00 per square foot for every square foot of gross floor area in excess of 100,000 square feet, to be paid over a period of 12 years. Article 26 also offers another option to developers obligated to make linkage payments, which is they may create low or moderate income housing. These new regulations that will be adopted will encourage these developers to opt for the creation of housing now rather than the payment of money over time.

BRA Director Stephen Coyle said, "The Flynn Administration wants to respond to Boston's critical need for affordable housing now, not in twelve years.

We believe that these new housing regulations will allow us to do that. We encourage members of the public to attend this hearing and to comment on the city's linkage formula and how it can be better implemented so that housing for our residents can be built."

## Nucci Campaign Effort Gears Up

The President of the Boston School Committee, John A. Nucci, has begun to step up his re-election campaign in anticipation of the November 5th final election. President Nucci, whose name did not appear on the preliminary election ballot due to the fact that he is facing one opponent, has been meeting with campaign supporters across the district. Said Nucci, "I look forward to the next several weeks of campaigning and meeting the voters of the district. I find that getting away from the hectic business of being President of the School Committee, and meeting

with constituents personally is an extremely effective way to measure public opinion and concerns. Undoubtedly, I am able to better serve as your voice on the School Committee after hearing, directly, your input."

Nucci was first elected to the School Committee in 1983 and, remarkably to most political observers, became President after serving only one year. His election in 1983 earned him the highest plurality of any candidate in the City of Boston, carrying each and every precinct in the district.

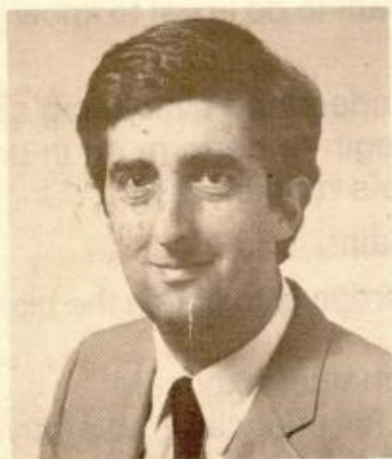

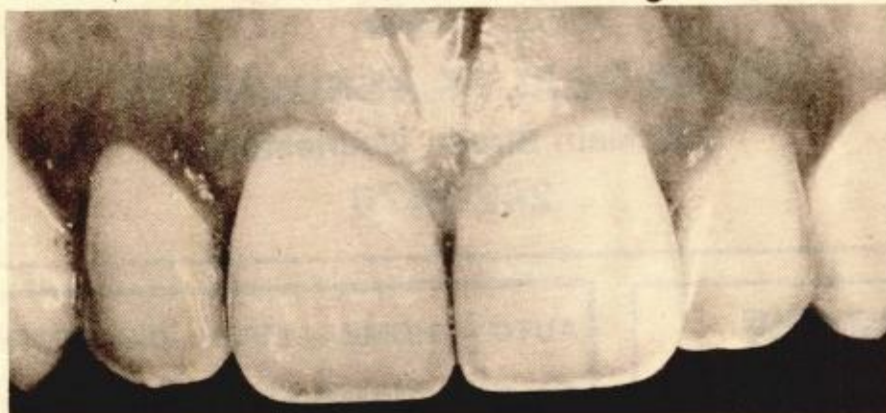

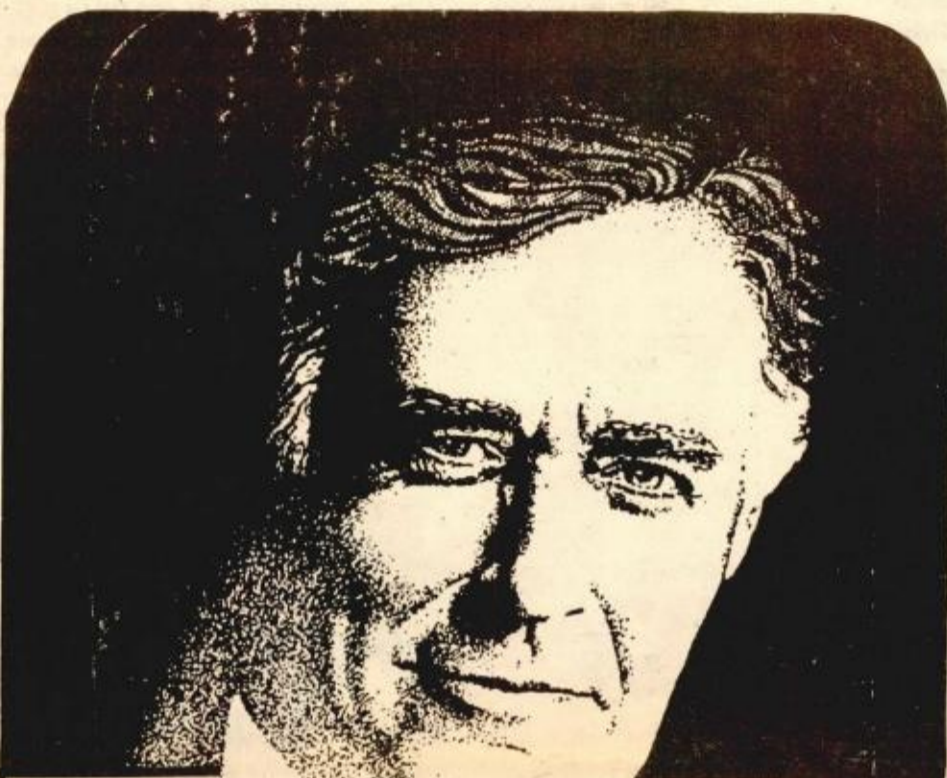

## College Aid And Information Offered In New Handbook

Representative Richard Voke currently has available the latest edition of "Handbook for College Admissions and Financial Aid", a brochure designed to introduce and inform prospective post-secondary education students and their parents about area colleges and universities, as well as potential sources of financial aid.

The handbook, prepared by the Association of Independent Colleges and Universities in Massachusetts (AICUM), briefly re-

presents information on enrollment size and makeup, tuition and other associated costs, application requirements and deadlines, as well as other pertinent information published to acquaint potential students with the various educational opportunities available to them.

In addition, the handbook discusses how, when and where to apply for financial aid, and provides telephone numbers and further reference points for those who

have questions or need additional information of eligibility and availability.

Representative Voke, who was recently commended by AICUM for his outstanding assistance as Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee in aiding the goals of the member colleges and universities, noted how especially important submitting timely financial aid applications to the various agencies can be. "Due to the limited funding for many financial aid programs, a Massachusetts Financial Aid Form (MFAF) should be completed and submitted as

soon after the first of the year as possible," commented Voke. By doing this, the applicant will ensure that he/she will be eligible for the maximum amount of financial aid possible. MFAF applications are available through the high school guidance department or any post-secondary school's financial aid office.

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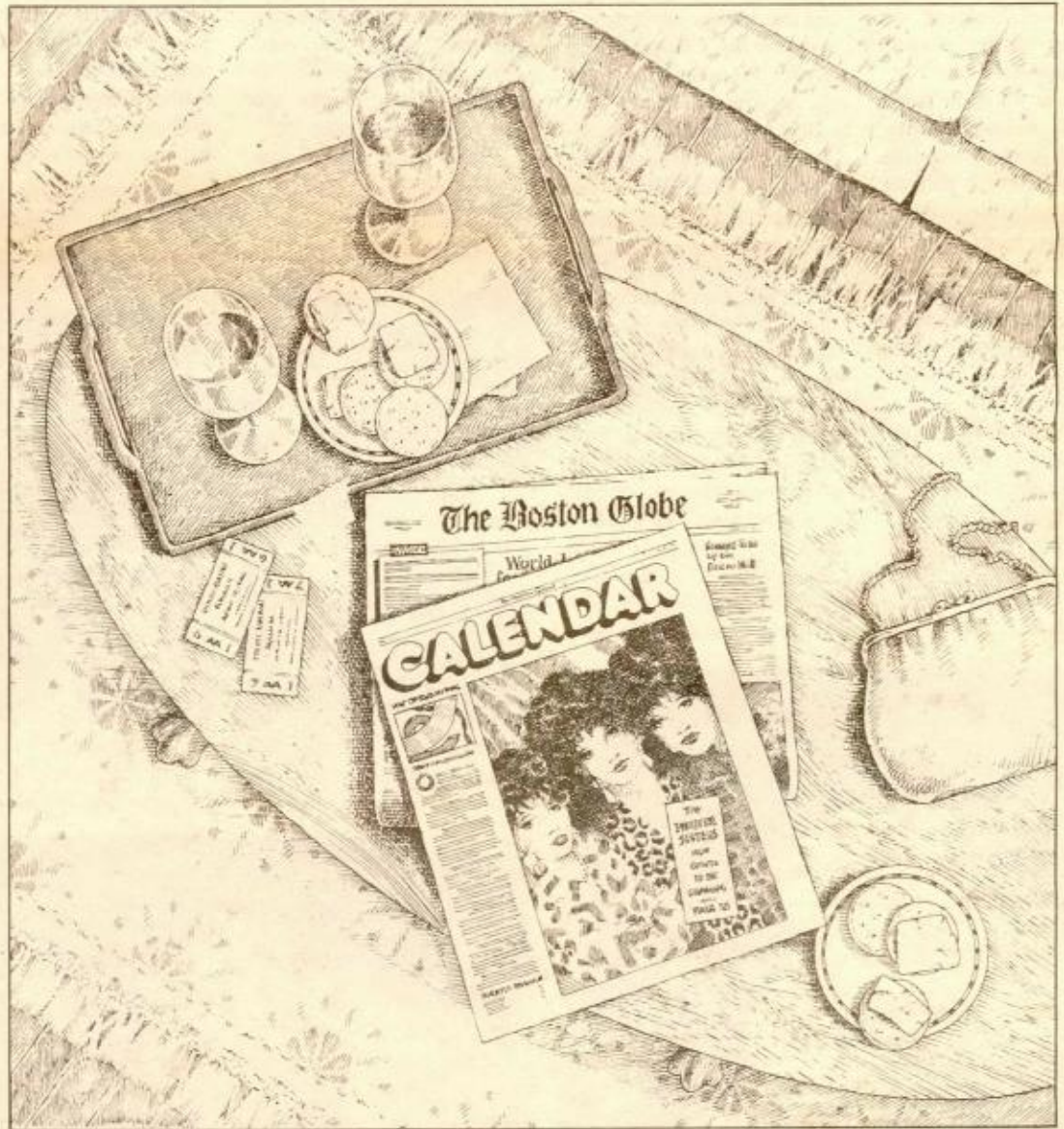

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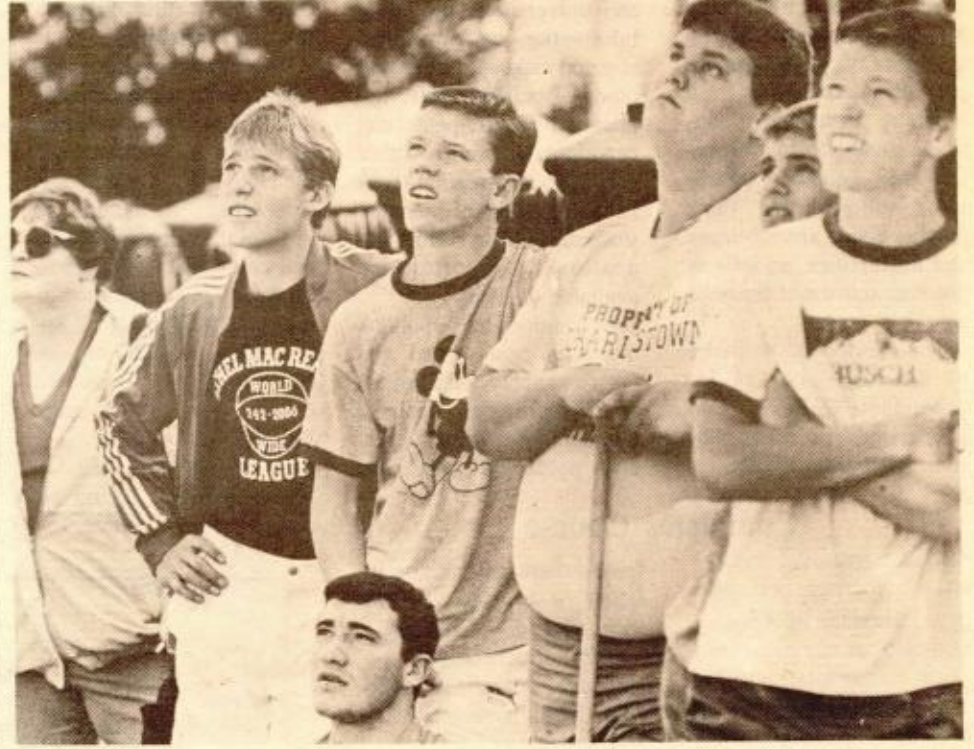
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# McChunk Team Captures 1985 World Halfball Tournament Title

When asked about next

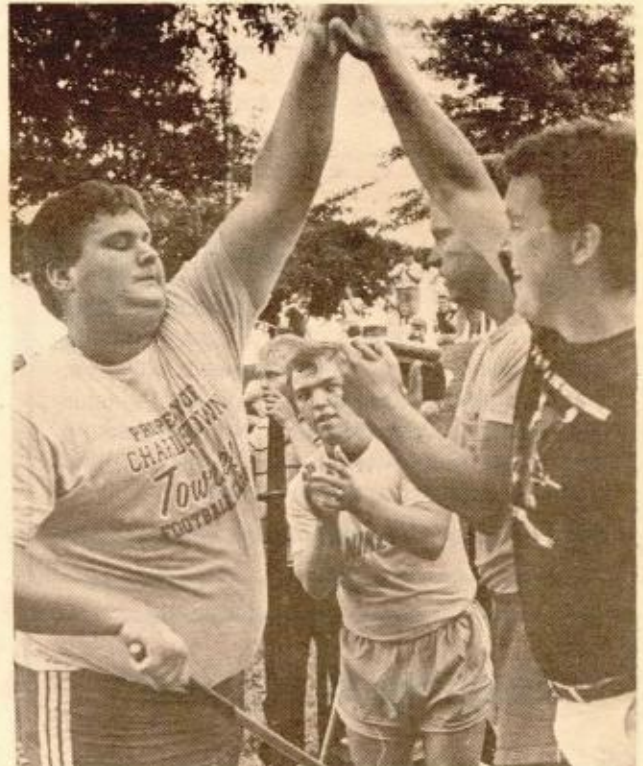

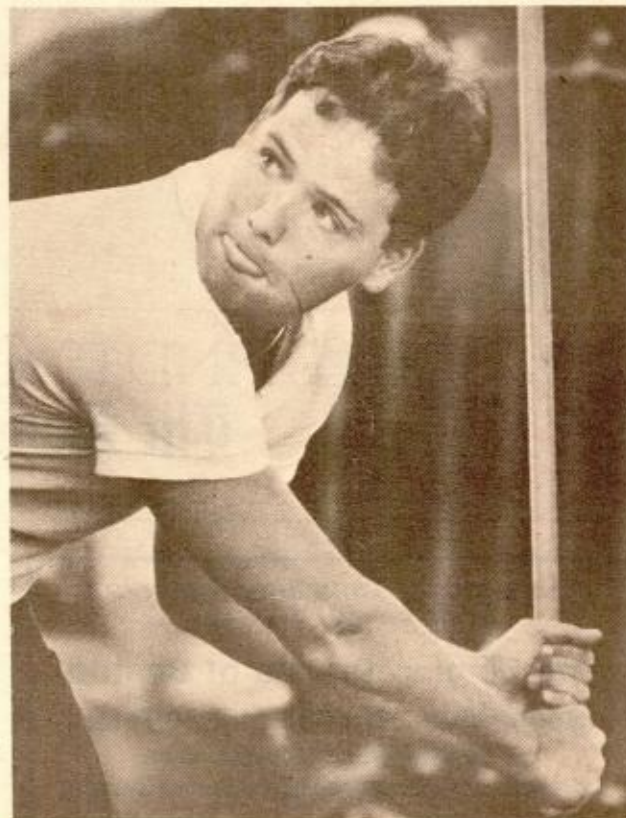

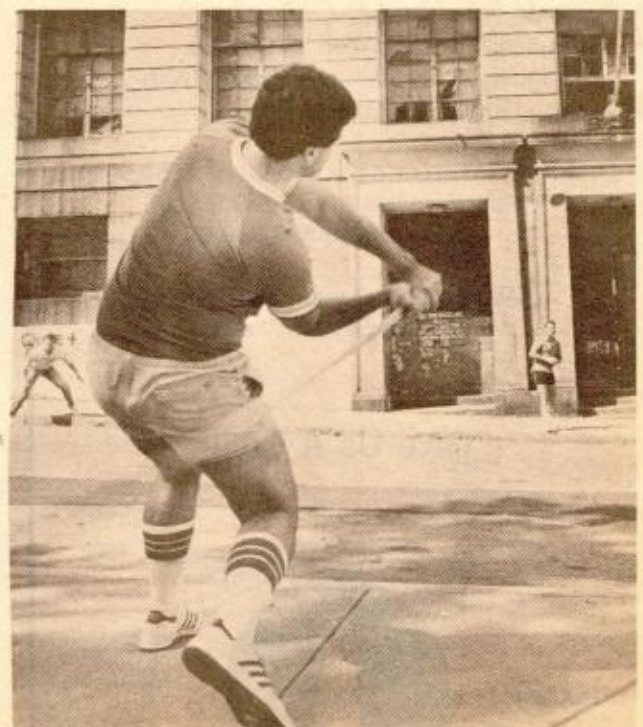

## Facts About Drugs — F.A.D.

"All the facts aren't in, so what's the big deal about my smoking pot? It's no more harmful than alcohol."

It IS a big deal. The frightening thing is that it's use is so common that some people would like to take it out of the drug category and treat it as "something some people just do."

The facts that are already known are that children are smoking pot younger and younger. Regular pot use obstructs the air passages in the lungs. It also interferes with the growth and division of cells in the lungs. These effects are slow and build up over time. Marijuana smokers increase their chances of contracting chronic bronchitis, emphysema, lung cancer, and lung infection.

In the areas of reproduction, smoking pot can lower the fertility of both male and female. THC, the active ingredient in pot, affects the fetus in pregnancy, and is a cause for great concern.

Possibly the most subtle damage is done in the home of the pot user. Kids change when they use pot regularly. They seem constantly tired and their appetites change. They neglect their personal appearances, their rooms and their belongings. The wide changes in mood are hard on their families, especially the anger and the defensiveness. There is almost always a drop in grades and change in friends. Teens are changing anyway, but teens using pot are unpredictable and difficult to live with. If you see a few of these symptoms in your child, ask him/her about drug use and discuss it openly.

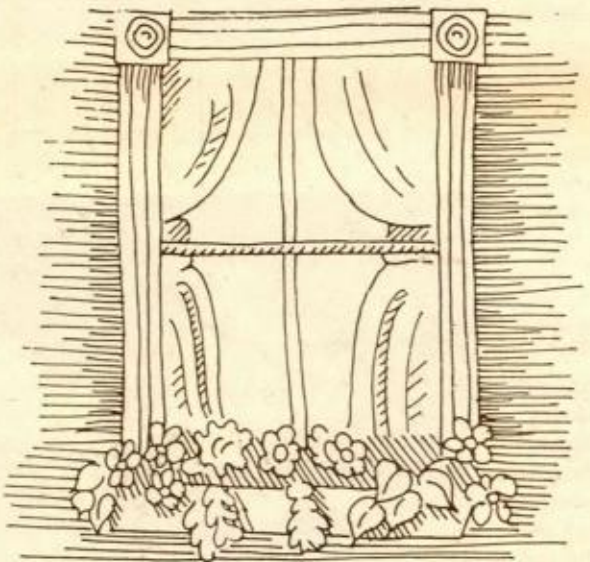

Building 199 will have the capacity to provide parking for all tenants of the center, as well as for their clients and guests. 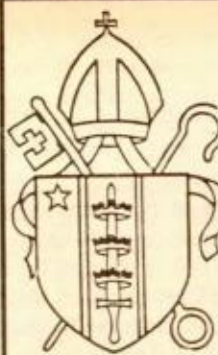

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### Nurturing Daring Conference

What do Jimmy Carter, Pearl Bailey, Robert McNamara and Dante have in common? A peanut farmer turned President, a jazz singer studying theology at Georgetown University, a former Ford Company executive who became a Vietnam-era Defense Secretary and then ran the World Bank, and a statesman turned world-class poet. These are individuals who have made a career change that affects the way we experience our lives today.

Career change was once relegated to the wealthy, the eccentric, or the severely disenfranchised. But career change, once the exception, has come of age. The Sunday New York Times (September 8, 1985) says, "When unemployment insurance was established, the expectation was that each citizen would have one career. Now...experts expect an average of four careers in a lifetime."

The forces that have brought this change in work patterns are socio-economic and far-reaching. The post-industrial world has created an enormous and changing service sector with a de-emphasis on manufacturing; the U.S. is buffeted by severe international competition. Advancing technology has brought new opportunities in both products and operational methodology. The 70's and 80's have seen acquisition, divestiture, and takeovers affecting thousands in the workforce. And

finally, the very nature of chosen professions has radically changed over the last thirty years. For example, medicine and law are not the respected fields they once were. Post-war expansion of education has created a set of values and expectations that are often beyond the capability of our institutions to deliver. Amidst these rapid changes career change is sometimes chosen, sometimes forced. And the individual is left with increasing responsibility for managing and steering his/her own professional course.

Nurturing Daring, a conference sponsored by the Lincoln Filene Center at Tufts University and the Greater Boston Chamber of Commerce, presents an opportunity for professionals to explore and affect mid-life career change. The conference will take place October 17 through 19 at the Hilton Inn at Colonial (Route 128, Wakefield, MA).

The conference features over 40 regional role models who have made major career changes. It also offers the services and expertise of 15 co-sponsors whose organizations concentrate on the dynamics of innovative and positive transitions.
