## Federal Money To Fund Partnership Programs

Mayor Kevin H. White announced recently that Boston has received a $\$ 431,938$ federal grant to develop partnerships between the Parks and Recreation Department and 15 to 20 neighborhood organizations to manage and maintain park facilities and programs.
Boston was awarded the grant in a nationwide competition and will receive a larger percentage of the $\$ 5$ million in available funds than any other American city. The city has named the program "Boston Partners in Urban Recreation." The program will serve as a national model for public sec. tor/neighborhood/private sector partnerships.
The grant will fund a two-year program under which Boston neighbor-

## City Conducting Property Inspections

> Boston's Office of Property Equalization (OPE) is now conducting inspections of the city's business personal property in compliance with the State Supreme Judicial Court mandate that all cities and towns in the Commonwealth revalue all properties to determine full and fair market value.
