Federal Money To Fund Partnership Programs

Mayor Kevin H. White announced recently that Boston has received a \$431,938 federal grant to develop partnerships between the Parks and Recreation Department and 15 to 20 neighborhood organizations to manage and maintain park facilities and programs.

Boston was awarded the grant in a nationwide competition and will receive a larger percentage of the \$5 million in available funds than any other American city. The city has named the program "Boston Partners in Urban Recreation." The program will serve as a national model public tor/neighborhood/private sector partnerships.

The grant will fund a two-year program under which Boston neighbor-

hoods will have the opportunity to upgrade their maintenance and recreation programs in their park areas. Under the program, neighborhood groups and organizations will be invited to make proposals, in an effort to acquire a portion of this grant to help maintain a relevant park facility or program. Program guidelines will be developed in conjunction with the private sector.

Community organizations will design their own programs, with technical assistance from the Parks and Recreation Department. Each neighborhood group will first determine the community's priority needs, which might range from maintenance of ex-

The Rat Corner

To the Editor:

It is unfortunate that the Bunker Hill Irish Heritage Society has chosen to use the "Irish Update" to expound political views concerning the ongoing war in the north eastern corner of Ireland. (Irish Update-Thursday, August 12, 1982). The "Irish Update", originally edited by Marty O'Brien the correspondance secretary for the Society, is the voice of the B.H.I.H.S. The "Irish Update" is a forum to be used to further the stated goals of the Society by keeping members and the public in general informed about activities which are relevant to Irish heritage, culture, etc.

As one of the founders of this organization, I hate to see the goals of the Society abandoned. The original group that took the idea of a Charlestown-based Irish cultural organization and brought it into being, included people who differed politically. There were those that were vocally anti-I.R.A.; those who supported the I.R.A.; and those that said nothing about the current political and military situation in Ireland (none were pro-British), but everyone agreed on one thing-the organization would remain neutral. These feelings are incorporated in the constitution and the by-laws. They call for the Society to stay clear of politics, be they local, national or international. As an early member of the Society and a current member of the Board of Directors, Mr. Walsh must be award of these principles. As the editor of the Update he should stay clear of politics in his choice of articles. If he wishes to speak as an individual he has a guaranteed right to do so.

The author of the Echo article displays a short-sighted political outlook. He is caught up in the ballyho which has been stirred up, yet he uses the same sledge-hammer tactics employed by the Globe. He falls into their trap by simplistically dividing the Irish community between those who support "the I.R.A. actions and the overwhelming majority of peace-loving Irish men and women....". The Globe cartoon is a phony issue. It is a red-herring and we should not let it become the center of a new Irish solidarity. Anyone that needed this cartoon to raise their political consciousness enough to make them realize that the Boston Globe and the U.S. news media in general are pro-British and anti-Irish must have been sleeping for at least the last fifteen (15) years. (You would think that Bonnie Prince Charles and Lady Di were our first family).


