ACTIVITY 1

Pete the Cat Headband

What you need:

- ✓ Blue craft paper
- ✓ Yellow craft paper
- ✓ White craft paper
- ✓ Black craft paper
- ✓ Glue
- ✓ Scissors



What you do:

Cut two long strips and two triangles out of the blue craft paper. Cut a circle out of yellow craft paper, a triangle out of white craft paper, and two narrow strips out of black craft paper.

Tape or glue the two strips together and glue ears to the back of the strip.

Show children how to cut the circle in half to get two half circle eyes. Glue to the front of the strip.

Add glue below and between the eyes and attach black whiskers.

Cut out two small blue triangles and two even smaller white triangles and glue on the eyes. Add nose triangle on top of the whiskers.

Fit band around the child's head and staple the band together. Cut off excess paper.

ACTIVITY 4

Dancing Shoes!

What you need:

- ✓ Lace

- ✓ Cardboard

- ✓ Yarn (or string or ribbon)
- ✓ Hole Punch
- ✓ Glue
- ✓ Scissors
- ✓ Markers for coloring!



What you do:

Lace up your dancing shoes for a rockin' good time! Practice fine motor and visual skills with this shoe lacing activity. Print shoe template. Color in and paste onto cardboard. I used flaps from an Amazon delivery box 😊 Cut out shoe and hole punch lace circles. Lace with yarn. Be sure to leave ends long to make practicing a little easier. The bunny ear method seems to be catching on the best but I recently saw [THIS lobster claw method](#) and it is genius!
