## Development At The Top Of The CNC Agenda

After a two-month summer recess, the Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC) assembled for its monthly meeting on Sept. I at the K . of C hall.

Council members in attendance were: Peter Looney David Whelan Don Haska, Jim Conway, Jim Alwood, Judy Brennan, Peg Bradley, John Dillon, Tony Troiano, Bill Galvin, Ken Stone, Tom Cunha, Bill McCabe, Edna Kelly, Richard McCarthy and Mel Stillman.

The first presentation of the evening was regarding 7-9 Sherman St., in the Sullivan Square area). Allen Sheehan represented the developers, L\&B Trust, and provided a brief history of the building. The trian-gular- shaped building was constructed in the 1800's and was used as a factory. In past years, it was used as a carpentry and woodworking shop.

Sheehan stated that the current proposal calls for the development of 13 artists' mixed-use rental
units. The structure has recently undergone a major rehabilitation, including the installation of new smoke alarms, sprinklers, and firefloors. Sheehan assured the council that these steps were necessary to bring the building up to code and the developer did not intend to rent space to artists who use welding torches or other hazardous materials.

He went on to explain that the building is partially occupied by carpenters using the space for woodworking. While some tenants may leave the building, should the building (continued on page 3)

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# Development At The Top Of The Neighborhood Council Agenda 

(continued from page I) become mixed use, all are aware of the situation and some may choose to stay. Sheehan stated that the owner of the property is looking to develop the property after noting the successful development of artists' lofts in Hyde Park, the South End and the Leather District.

Council members expressed concerms relative to affordability, garbage removal, type of materials allowed in the building, volume of traffic and exterior improvements. Tom Cunha, precinct 7 representative and chairman of the Development Committee, agreed to hold a public meeting to discuss this matter further. Peter Looney, Council chairman, encouraged the developer to initiate discussions with immediate abutters before the public meeting.

Ken Stone, Council representative to the Central Artery Committee (CAC), provided an update on the plans for better access to the Paul Revere Park from the Gilmore Bridge.

Currently, pedestrians can only access the park from City Square, a fact that concerms residents. Many believe that the new park system should be accessible from Austin Street and the Gilmore Bridge. Presently there is only a five-foot sidewalk that allows pedestrians to access Cambridge.

A new proposal calls for an 8- to 10 -foot sidewalk to be constructed on the opposite side to make a better connection from Austin Street to the Gilmore Bridge to the new park. The city of Boston's Environment Department sent the CNC a copy of a letter endorsing the proposal and is working with the CAC to develop plans for the construction. Stone informed the CNC that the new sidewalk would not
encroach on the roadway as it would be attached to the bridge. The CNC voted to endorse the proposal and support the Environment Department's letter to the MDC.
District One City Councillor Paul Scapicchio was in attendance and welcomed the CNC members back from their summer break. He noted that he was looking forward to working with them on the issues facing the community.

Charlestown resident Betty Golden addressed the council relative to the future development of parcel R-87 at Tremont and Prospect streets. Golden urged the council to hold another public meeting regarding the parcel and its developers criticizing the process and alleged changes to the tentative developers plans. Golden alleged that the plans that were presented to the community have been changed to include a four-story building in place of a $21 / 2$ story building on the parcel in the original plans

Many of the members of the CNC were incensed at the possibility that a proposal could be altered so as to conflict with the original Request For Proposal (RFP) for R-87 as to both height and the increased cost of units, inasmuch as one of the key factors in selecting the developer was affordability.

CNC member Jim Conway urged that the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) Director Tom O'Brien be invited to a meeting in the near future to clarify the situation. He further noted that in his long experience with the BRA, dating back to the 1960 's, he had never heard of a proposal, such as R-87, being scheduled on the agenda of the BRA Board for a vote of approval without the community being noti-
fied so they could attend and express either their approval or disapproval.
Tom Cunha announced that the Development Committee will hold a meeting regarding the future development of Parcel 2 , located at the intersection of Main and Bunker Hill streets. He later told the Patriot that the meeting will be held on Thursday, Oct. 1 at the K. of C. hall. 75 West School St.

Ron Taylor, a resident of Baldwin Street, asked the council about the status of resident parking in precinct 7 Cunha informed Taylor that the council will send a letter to the city of Boston Transportation Commissioner requesting a status report on resident parking.

The Summerfield Suite Hotels sen a copy of its environmental report to the CNC relative to its proposal to construct a hotel in City Square. Comments on the proposal are due to at the Mass. DEP by the end of September. Cunha has asked that three more copies of the report be sent to the community for review. The council still has serious concerns about the parking plans for the hotel and will ask the developer to address this issue at its October meeting and then have it referred to the Development Committee for future public hearings.
Council member Jim Conway sug gested that the CNC invite the Sail 2000 Committee to the council to discuss its plans, including traffic and parking impacts for the event, since the it is to be held in the Charlestown Navy Yard. He urged the council to take a proactive approach to this matter so the town does not bear an undue burden of traffic for the event.

The next meeting of the CNC will be at the K. of C. on Tuesday, Oct. 6.

"Healthy Kids, Strong Parents, WIC Works Wonders" you have seen the flyers or your child may have brought the brochure home from summer camp. You are probably wondering "What is WIC?" WIC is a health and nutrition program serving Women, Infants and Children, with, or who are at risk of, developing nutrition related health problems.
WIC provides nutrition education and counseling to pregnant women in order to assure they give birth to healthier babies. Pregnant mothers with poor eating habits tend to give birth to infants born with lower birth weight and smaller head circumferences. These infants have a greater risk of developing related health problems in the future.
Mothers are encouraged to teach children proper eating habits in order to stay healthy. Mothers are also reminded that children with proper eating habits tend to do better in school. At the end of each session with Certified Nutritionists, the participants receive checks to buy specified nutritious foods. Families are able to receive referrals to services such as day care centers or health care providers.

There are several misconceptions regarding the WIC Program. The most common is that WIC is a
form of financial assistance to people who do not work. Actually WIC is a supplemental food program that is available to families within certain income guidelines, which includes working parents. The income guidelines vary according to the size of the family.
For example, a family of four with an annual income of $\$ 30,433$ is eligible for WIC. Children may continue with the program until their 5th birthday. Another misconception revolves around one's immigration status. Participating in the WIC Program does not affect an immigrant's ability to apply for a green card or re-enter the country.
The main purpose of the program is to provide various nutritious foods at a reasonable cost during critical stages of pregnancy and child development.
Does WIC really work? Studies have shown that mothers who participated in the program received prenatal care earlier and gave birth to bigger babies. There is also a decrease in the numbers of premature births and fewer cases of fetal deaths

WIC infants and children receive more vitamins and nutrients resulting in better health. Children receive regular medical care and immunizations. Families who have participated in the WIC program gener-
ally buy more nutritious foods than families who did not participate in the program.
